

Civic Election

TOMORROW is civic election day. Citizens will go to the polls to choose boards of men and women who will direct policy of the municipality -one of the largest and most ramified local businesses. We have often in the past urged the importance of all the citizens and the voters taking an active interest in city affairs and exercising the prerogative and fullfilling the duty of voting so we do so again.

There is a goodly body of citizens offering their services. Since there are no great issues at stake and it is only a matter of choosing those best fitted to serve, it would be presumptuous for use to even suggest selections. Speaking generally, the candidates are well known and the voters can decide for themselves who of them are best qualified to do the job. Individual qualifications of fittedness we should say would be the yardstick of choice.

There is no lack of new material for the four two-year seats on the city council. Of the nine aspirants only two have had previous experience on the aldermanic board. There is also a long spread from the age standpoint. The voters should have no difficulty in selecting good men from the field.

Two doughty veterans of council service dominate the contest for the one-year vacancy which appears to occupy the limelight as far as contentention is concerned.

In the school board contest three retiring trustees have offered themselves for re-election. We can go so far as saying, without any expression of favoritism, we believe, that the three retiring trustees have done good and competent work and it has been good fortune of the city to have had their services. Whether there is any advantage to be gained by replacing them by three other undoubtedly good candidates is again for the electors to de-

So may the best men and women win tomorrow and may all the voters turn out in full numbers so there may be a full expression of preference!

As for the plebiscites, notably that in regard to the new telephone projects, there has been considerable explanation and discussion. There is, undoubtedly, difference of opinion, particularly on the telephone matter. Parks policy and chlorination are the subject of the other two plebiscites. The voters are intelligent enough to form their own conclusiens without prejudice.

PLEBISCITE, NOT BYLAW

A MAJOR ISSUE in tomorrow's civic balot-A ting will be the telephone prebiscite, on which all city voters will be asked to express an opinion. As the Daily News has on more than one occasion pionted out, this is not a money bylaw, nor a mandate for the city to go ahead to raise \$550,000 which council proposes.

It is only to determine popular opinion on this important question, whether or not the city council will have the people's support in the projected plan.

Voters will not be authorizing the city council to borrow \$550,000 for telephone rehabilitation. They could not if they wished because the matter must first be approved by the provincial Department of Municipal Affairs and so far, this has not been done.

However, the majority may have some influence on whether or not the provincial government will allow such a project to be begun at a later date.

If the majority vote in favor of the telephone proposal at tomorrow's plebiscite and if the plan is approved by the provincial government, a money bylaw will be prepared and presented to the ratepayers—not the voters in general—at a later date.

But tomorrow, all the voters will have the opportunity to express an opinion on this question: "Shall the city borrow approximately \$550,000 for the purpose of rehabilitating the City of Prince Rupert telephone system?"

It is an important question and one which should receive the careful consideration of every citizen.

A nother page will be added to the automotive history of Park ers tomorrow when Mayor Nora Arnold officially open the new, modern service station of Bob Parker Limited at th corner of McBride Street and Second Avenue.

Construction of the service station was commenced last July by the local contracting firm of Mitchell and Currie who have provided a building that combines a pleasing appearance with el ficiency of lay-out.

The entire building, which includes workshop, show room, of fice, as well as a parts and access ories department, is 100 feet long and 31 feet wide and occupies approximately half of the ground space. The remainder of the lot is given over to the spaciou drive-in and approaches to the workshop. The front of the build ing faces the drive-in and runs parallel to McBride Street.

The service island has two pumps, one for dispensing Chev ron and the other for Chevron Supreme gasoline. At each end o the island there are water and air connections and a projecting canopy, lighted by vapor-proof lamps, protects motorists and at tendants from rain and snow. A pressure operated signal auto maticly summons the pump attendant when a car approaches the island.

Four large folding doors provide easy access to the workshop which occupies the north half of the building. One of the doors leads to the hydraulic hoist and another permits entrance to an out-size grease pit designed especially to accommodate trucks or buses. The latest type of lubricating unit available, a Lincoln Portable Autoluber, has been obtained by Parkers to ensure prompt and efficient service to motor vehicles of all types. 


