STAN PARKER, GOOD CITIZEN
























INDIAN JUDGES -LOST POSITIONS

Even a judge can lose his job. And a British judge, at that.

When India and Pakistan took over, no less than 40 found themselves unemployed. It had been assumed they would continue in office. But in this there was disappointment.

In effect, the two new dominions said: "Your services are no longer required." Of the 40, four are—or were—chief justices. Some were drawing salaries up to \$36,000.

To date, no alternative posts have been heard of nor has compensation been given. A few are considering returning to Great Britain to serve as junior counsel.



Lindsay Sets Senior Hoop League Scoring Record

The final statistics of the Senior Basketball League show Jack Lindsay edging out Rupert Holkestad by 1 point. His 8 points in his latest game gave him the needed margin to win. The Co-op sharpshooter also scored the most field goals, 108; most points in one game, 28, hitting this mark twice.
