### Rain To Break Heavy Snowfall

The heaviest snowfall Prince Rupert has experienced in years has fallen during the past four days, measuring 23 inches. Last year, 20 inches was registered for the whole month of January. City streets are heavily banked and Third Avenue is piled high in the middle, making it a well-defined two-way thoroughfare. Slush may come with predicted rainfall for today and Friday.

Long expected rain occupied with heavy winds at 40 miles per hour will strike Prince Rupert by the late evening today finally bringing the continuous heavy snowfall to an end. This was predicted by the weather office on Digby Island this morning.

Maximum temperatures during the snowfall were above freezing with minimum levels dropping to between 27 and 30 above. Highest reading so far this year was 39 above at 4 p.m. yesterday.

### Operatic Delight—Revel Of Harmony

Horsfall Singers Bring Keen Pleasure to Local Audience

An audience of some 350 persons revelled last night at the Civic Centre auditorium in a feast of operatic music—grand and light—presented by Basil Horsfall's singers in a grand carnival of vocal eloquence which included costumes, scenery, and light. The whole affair was a delight to the ears and the eyes with the fine voices of the participants and their colorful costumes and delightful personalities.

Due to the show was the warm and vivacious Winnifred Hutt with her enchanting mezzo-soprano voice and gesturing with the charming little soprano, Vera Bryson, who was also singing. Hubert Loth, San Carlo tenor, made a fine impression with his virile singing and possibly the outstanding number was his dramatic rendition of famous harlequin theme aria of Act I from "Il Pagliacci." Dependable tenor Boris Fawcett who with Miss Hutt had been here before, ably took several leading parts.

While the grand operatic numbers were impressive, it was possibly from the several groups of light operatic excerpts that the audience derived the more pleasure. There were songs in solo, duo, trio and quartette from such as "Quaker Girl," "Dollar Princess," "Madame Sherry," "Spring Chicken," "Song of Norway" and "Belle of New York."

In addition to "Faust" and "Il Pagliacci," the singers presented "Carmen," featuring Miss Hutt in a wild Gypsy number, the sort of thing in which she especially excels.

Of course, it is Mr. Horsfall himself who has much to do with the making of the whole show, a smooth-running program that reflects such masterful but such unostentatious direction. The audience expressed its keen appreciation when Mr. Horsfall took his own bow.

The whole two-hour program provided a most entertaining evening of music, understood and acclaimed by all who turned out to enjoy it.

### Court of Revision—

### Valuations Discussed

Few Changes Made in Assessments—Only One Personal Appearance

Only minor alterations in the 1950 municipal assessment roll were made yesterday when Court of Revision with Ald. H. F. Glassey as chairman and consisting also of Ald. G. B. Casey, Ald. Don Fitch, Ald. Wilfrid McLean and Ald. G. D. Frizell was in session. With these minor revisions, the roll was approved and the court concluded its session.

The sitting was interrupted when the court went to the ground to view two properties in the view of nature of appeals.

Only one personal appearance was made, that being Martin Erickson who took exception to a \$6,000 valuation of his residence on Fourth Avenue East. This, he claimed, was inconsistent with valuations placed on neighboring properties, several of which he cited. He was critical of the method of valuating and held that new construction was at a disadvantage.

City Assessor H. D. Thain pointed out that the Municipal Act required that property be assessed at its true value but there was not the staff here to conduct the appraisals which would be necessary. However, the effort was always made to be equitable. He asked Mr. Erickson if he would take \$10,000 for his property, the reply being that it would be impracticable to do so. The Lafleche appraisals of 1947 were still used as a general basis.

The property of Mr. Erickson was one which the court went that of W. and J.M. Spark of Hays of W. and J.M. Spark of Hays Cove Avenue who complained at an improvement assessment of \$900 being too high.

After the inspections the valuations in each case were sustained by the court.

W. M. Wernerlund, lot 5, block 35, section 5, improvements reduced from \$800 to \$300. (original clerical error).

Karl Markl, lot 4, block 12, section 7, improvement figure of \$1500 wiped out (clerical error).

### Canadian-American Seiners Are Barred From Salmon Waters

VANCOUVER (CP)—A virtual "keep-out" order was issued yesterday to Russian and Japanese fishing fleets by the International Pacific Fisheries Commission which governs the rich Pacific sockeye salmon grounds off the Fraser River. The Commission ruled that territorial waters off the Fraser River extend beyond the three mile limit 'indefinitely westward.' The ruling not only bans threatened competition of foreign nations but specifically forbids big Canadian and American seineboats from entering the area.

### Four Dead Of Violence

VANCOUVER (CP)—Violent death claimed four persons Wednesday on British Columbia's Lower Mainland. Three died in traffic accidents. The other plunged eighty feet to his death from Burrard Street Bridge here.

Vancouver's 1950 traffic fatality toll rose to five with the death of George Kempf, 66, who was in collision with a truck.

Earlier Alfred Scranton, 43, was killed when struck by an unidentified motorist. Police are still seeking the driver involved although what is believed to have been the abandoned death car was picked up in suburban Surrey Municipality. Mrs. Tony Wick was fatally injured when struck by a truck on the Trans-Canada highway.

The bridge plunge victim was William Rose, 70. His fall was broken by snow and sand. He lived for three hours after the fall.

### George Drew Blames Gov't

LONDON, Ont. — Unemployment is growing in Canada because of loss of markets in Great Britain and other sterling areas, Progressive-Conservative Leader George Drew said here last night. He claimed that the Liberal government had failed to tell Parliament and the people that serious losses would come in overseas markets although Minister of Agriculture Gardiner had known of the situation for two years past.

### CRISIS IS SETTLED

WINNIPEG—Political sources said today that settlement has been reached in the blow-up over cabinet representation which had threatened to shatter Manitoba's coalition government. There will be three Progressive-Conservatives in the cabinet and eight Liberal Progressives.


### GRAIN EXPORTS HIGH

VANCOUVER—Grain exports from the port of Vancouver during January climbed to a four-year peak and have almost doubled last season's shipments. The Vancouver Merchants' Exchange report for the month shows 31,117,677 bushels of grain have been exported from here since July 31.

RESCUE IN NORTH WHITEHORSE, Y. T.—Ten men were today huddled in biting cold around a wrecked aircraft on a desolate mountain top northwest of here as a ground rescue party and a helicopter converged on a 7,000-foot peak which has imprisoned them for 15 hours. The temperature hovers around 40 below. The men, five members of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry and five United States airmen, were in a two-motored plane which came down on the mountain top while engaged in the search for a missing United States transport. Three are injured. They may be picked up by two by the helicopter.

NORTH BATTLEFORD, Sask.—H. James Maher, 39, carried the Liberal banner to victory yesterday through a Saskatchewan provincial by-election in the Battlefords. His election was conceded last night by Alex D. Connon, CCF candidate, and Maher's nearest opponent in a three-way fight for the seat made vacant by death of the Liberal, Paul Prince. Latest count was: Maher, 3204; Connon, 3084; Tyson, Progressive-Conservative, 372.

Another active storm now 800 miles off the Queen Charlottes is expected to bring more rain to the coast during the afternoon and tonight. The congregation of the church, at a meeting Monday night of this week, made arrangements for the renovation of the Manse in preparation for the arrival of the new permanent pastor.




## Is Named After Donald Gordon

KAMLOOPS—It was bound to happen somewhere on the Canadian National Railways system that a baby should be christened Donald Gordon after the road's new president. This railway centre has had the honor and the first baby to bear the name is Donald Gordon Smith born one minute after midnight January 1. This fact became known with the arrival here of a silver mug inscribed "From Donald Gordon to Donald Gordon Smith," together with a letter from the President of the Canadian National Railways. The railway president would not have been aware of his namesake but for a proud grandparent who wrote the Canadian National magazine to enrol the child in the Young Railroaders' Club of the railway.

The railway president wrote to young Donald Gordon Smith, who will be one month old on February 1, in most friendly terms. "Any boy who is enterprising enough to arrange to be the first—and only—child to be born in Kamloops on the first day of this memorable year, 1950, is sure to go far," wrote Mr. Gordon. "When on top of that he has the good sense to be born into a railroading family, his future is doubly sure. I can't think of any better start for a boy in Canada than to be born into a family of railroaders. I hope you will follow in the footsteps of your father and your grandfather and go into Canadian National service when you have finished school. Of course, that is a long way ahead, for as I wrote you are only three weeks old."

"I was very pleased, you may be sure, to hear that you have been given my name. I hope it will bring you luck. Perhaps before the century is out you will be sitting in the chair I am now proud to occupy. In any event, I send my congratulations on your arrival to your parents and your grandfather and to you, my namesake. I send you my warmest wishes for a long and happy life."

The grandfather, T. P. Swift, is a World War I veteran who has 30 years service with the investigation department of the C.N.R. Arthur Gordon Smith, the father is a 23-year old navy veteran who joined the railway's bridge and building department three years ago.


