## Stanley Cup— Maple Leafs Edge Wings

**Deciding Game Tonight—Rangers Eliminate Canadiens**  
TORONTO (CP)—One more victory over Detroit Red Wings tonight and Toronto Maple Leafs will enter the final of the National Hockey League play-offs in quest of their fourth straight Stanley Cup. Going into tonight's sixth clash of their semi-final series, the Leafs are in the driver's seat with a three to two advantage in games.  
Toronto won its 3rd victory by defeating Detroit 2 to 0 Thursday night.  
New York Rangers went into the final with a three to nothing victory over Montreal Canadiens. Winning four games to one, the Rangers will meet the winners of Toronto vs Detroit in the final.

## Walter Huston, Actor Passes

**HOLLYWOOD**—Walter Huston, noted Canadian-born screen actor, died of a heart attack yesterday in his home here. On Thursday he had celebrated his sixty-sixth birthday and appeared then to be in fine health.  
Born in Toronto, Mr. Huston started his stage career as an end man in a minstrel show at Massey Hall in 1900. His first appearance in New York was as a legionnaire in "Julius Caesar" from which he was dismissed because he forgot his lines. He kept on his stage career and later went into the movies in which he achieved fame. His last triumph was in "Treasure of Sierra Madre" in which he won an Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences for outstanding achievement in a supporting role.  
Mr. Huston interrupted his acting career for several years and became a civil engineer.

### LEOPOLD'S RETURN DOUBTFUL

**BRUSSELS**—Premier-Designate Paul van Zeeland said today he had failed to form a government to bring Leopold III back to his throne. He hopes to complete a cabinet by Tuesday. "Slight last minute difficulties," said the Social-Christian supporter of the exiled monarch, prevented finishing the cabinet line-up he had expected to present for Regent Prince Charles approval at noon today.

### NEW ZEALAND QUILTS MOSCOW

**MOSCOW**—D. P. Costeio New Zealand's charge d'affaires, announced today he would leave Moscow as soon as he had completed details for the closing of his country's legation there. New Zealand announced the closing of its legation yesterday. Frederick Doidge, minister of external affairs, said that keeping a Moscow legation was too expensive for a small country. Costello made an official farewell call yesterday on Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.

### SENATOR DIES

**MONCTON, N.B.**—Senator Antoine Leger, aged 69, died in Hotel Dieu Hospital last night after suffering a stroke yesterday, Senator Leger, former secretary-treasurer of New Brunswick under a Conservative administration, was summoned to the Senate in 1936 during the regime of Prime Minister R. B. Bennett. His death cuts the Conservative representation in the Senate to fourteen. Standing now is: Liberals, 75; Progressive-Conservatives, 14; vacant, 13. Total 102.

### NEWSPAPERMEN AND UNION

**BATH, Somerset England**—Ten thousand British newspapermen are to vote to decide whether to cut themselves adrift from the main body of British trade unionists organized in 8,000,000 strong Trades Union Congress. Decision to hold the ballot was taken at the annual conference here yesterday of the National Union of Journalists.

## Baptist Head In B.C. Is Coming

The president of the British Columbia Baptist Convention, Rev. Dr. O. E. Daniel, will visit Prince Rupert from April 12 to April 24 and will speak at the Rotary luncheon Thursday next. Dr. Daniels is at present minister of the West Point Grey Baptist Church in Vancouver while he is in Canada on extended furlough from his work in the Canadian Baptist Mission in India. He is the author of several books and is a well known missionary lecturer in Canada and other parts of the world. He brings with him many interesting curios, moving pictures, and the world's finest set of slides on the life of Christ. He will hold services each night in First Baptist Church on week nights and at the three regular services on Sundays, from April 12-24.

## Hit By Train; Two Men Hurt

Two employees of Columbia Cellulose Co. were injured Thursday as they were struck by an eastbound C.N.R. freight train which was pulling to a stop at Watson Island. Jacob Hansen, 50, suffered a crushed right leg and cuts and abrasions. He was admitted to General Hospital here. His condition this morning was reported satisfactory.

The other man, 19 year old Robert J. Enright, received a slight cut on the forehead and obtained first aid treatment at the camp. The noise from the power plant is believed to have drowned out the sound of the oncoming train and they were unable to hear it. The accident took place at approximately 4:45 p.m. The east-bound freight left Prince Rupert at 4 p.m.

## Nationalists Claim Victory

**TAIPEI, Formosa**—Chinese Nationalists today claimed progress in their drive against long-established guerrillas on invasion-threatened Hainan Island. Dispatches from the big island ten miles off the China coast asserted that Nationalist troops have taken six villages and accepted surrender of 2,869 guerrillas in six weeks through to the end of March.

## Accord Between Two Premiers Is Concluded

**NEW DELHI (CP)**—India and Pakistan today concluded an agreement putting an end to bitter strife between Hindus and Moslems of the two countries. A communique announcing the agreement was issued an hour after Pakistan's Prime Minister, Liaquat Ali Khan, departed for his own capital at Karachi after meeting here with Prime Minister Pandit Nehru of India. Details of the agreement were not made known.

A jury of four men and eight women convicted Harold A. Mohr, 36-year old tannery worker, of the rifle-slaying of brother, Walter, at their home at nearby Coploy March 8. The jury recommended mercy. Walter died after being given a cup of coffee by Harold. The latter said his brother had asked him out of his misery.

two weeks' annual leave with pay after one year's service and three weeks after five years' service. It was prepared to offer three weeks with pay annually after one year's service and four weeks annually to everyone with ten years' service or more.

The reason for this length of holiday with pay was to take care of statutory holidays.

#### A PROFESSION

The firemen contended their job was a profession and that many hazards existed in Prince Rupert, more than in any other city in British Columbia of comparable size.

The city did not deny that fire fighting was hazardous but stated that only two buildings in this city of over three storeys in height existed and no industry here created any particular hazard.

The city argued that cost of living here is not 15 percent higher than Vancouver but submitted that this differential was

taken care of by the award of the conciliation board in a similar dispute last year. They received a 13.6 per cent raise across the board in 1949.

"Several members of the fire department answered questions as to their specified reason for a 15% raise in wages," it was stated in the city's brief. "We suggest to the Board that no member gave a satisfactory answer, the general trend of the answers being that they wanted more money and they compared themselves to certain tradesmen who work by the hour and to halibut fishermen who work seasonally."

The city conceded to a demand by firemen that their uniforms be ordered not later than April 30 each year.

Firemen asked for an increase in the city's contribution to the Municipal Superannuation Fund to provide them with a service pension of \$50 per month for the first 20 years of service and \$24 yearly for each additional year over 20. In the light of present conditions, the city stated, it declined any concessions with regard to that matter.

The city also declined to pay \$5 monthly service pay for fireman having served ten years and additional increase of \$5 for each month following five year period.

#### FREE TRANSPORTATION

Firemen demanded that the city provide free bus transportation to and from duty. The city found itself under no obligation to provide this service to firemen any more than for other civic employees.

"If any bus company is willing to give such transportation, it

may be a factor to be taken into consideration when the question of a franchise comes up, there being no franchise at the present time," the city's brief said.

At present a first class fireman receives \$224 monthly. A 2 1/2 in-

crease would raise their wage to \$230 per month.

The decision of the arbitration board will be announced next Tuesday it is expected. Both sides have agreed to abide by a majority finding.
