## Palestine

THE UNITED NATIONS General Assembly is being called into special session April 16 to deal with the tragic Palestine situation. After six months of attempting to bring about some sort of a settlement, an already bad situation has become calamitously worse. Hopes raised when the United Nations undertook to find and supply a solution, have faded in attempts to evade responsibilities implicit in the partition recommendation. The outcome is a shocking blow to the prestige of the United Nations with now the slimmest of prospects, even with the special session of the United Nations, of averting even further intensification of developing trouble.

It is unfortunately only too clear that Palestine is being dealt with as a pawn in a game of big power politics. In spite of the inept reversal of the United States in regard to partition, a policy which was adopted last fall through exertion of United States influence, the foresight of which statesmanship has since been proven to have been so lacking, there is little likelihood now that the Assembly will reverse itself.

In the face of Arab resistance, partition, it is evident, could only be imposed by force and the means to impose force under the United Nations organization could be provided only by the big powers including Russia. Current experiences in Germany cannot but help make the western powers nervous if the Soviet troops should be installed in that region where certainly there is no desire to have Russia.

And, even if partition were dropped, who, after all, will shoulder the respond bility of intervention? But who likewise will acovet the same responsibility under the different abel of trusteeship, a responsibility probably even more burdensome since whoever wielded authority as a trustee would have to fight not one faction but two. It was just such a situation, and not then inflamed by the frustrated prospect of early realization of the Zionists' hopes, that drove Britain to throw up her hands and declare her intention to get out.

Now the one slim hope of averting an intensification of recent trouble is some compromise between Arabs and Jews, which would involve a retreat sure to disrupt the recent truce between Hagana and Jewish extremists, and set Jew against Jew, as well as against Arab.

We are lost in a labyrinth, from which there seems to be no road of escape.

### EMBARRASSING EMBRACE

THE C.C.F. Party, through its leader, its national bulletin and in other ways, has been making clear that it repudiates the support which the Labor Progressive (or Communist) Party seems deter-

mined to give it, says the Montreal Gazette. "Throughout the years," says M. J. Coldwell, "the C.C.F. has kept its skirts absolutely clean." As far as purpose and intention are concerned, this may be altogether true. But a little red supporter is now holding onto those skirts. And however unbidden or unwanted he may be, he is there for good reasons of his own.

The key to the matter would seem to lie in Mr. Coldwell's statement that "the C.C.F. will not collaborate with the Labor Progressive Party in any way, direct or indirect." It would seem quite clear that the C.C.F. Party is determined to have no direct collaboration with the Communists. Mr. Coldwell's statement is made in good faith and in good faith it may be accepted. But the indirect collaboration is another and (as it happens) a quite important matter.

The fact is—and it is a very important fact that the Labor Progressive Party, almost certainly under higher inspiration, has decided that the C.C. F. is following certain policies which are sufficiently close to the Communist party line to make them useful and worthy of at least whatever temporary strengthening Communist support may give them.

No doubt there are many general lines of C.C.F. policy which the Communists might regard as tendencies in the proper direction. The C.C.F. has conveniently favored centralization. It has habituated the minds of its followers to the idea of regulation and the desirability of control. It has favored a political condition in which the state grows bigger and the individual grows less. It is true that the

Mr. Coldwell has said that the fanatical belief of the United States in free enterprise is a danger to world peace, just as is th fanatical belief of Russia in Communism. He has said that it is "the domineering attitude of the United States that is driving the peoples of Great Britain and Europe into Communism." And he has wished that this country and the United States were separated by an ocean. As for national defence, he and his party would seem to favor neutrality.

When Mr. Coldwell speaks in this manner he ought not to be in the least astonished or surprised that the Canadian Communists have come to his aid and comfort. Nor ought he to be surprised that his repudiation of their support makes not the least difference in their determination to support



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
