WASHINGTON, (CP)—For the first time in its history, the United States is contemplating a world war in which this country would be an aggressor.

ROME (CP)—The Italian government said today that it has 330,000 armed men, including a shock force of 150,000, ready to strike swiftly against any attempt at election violence.

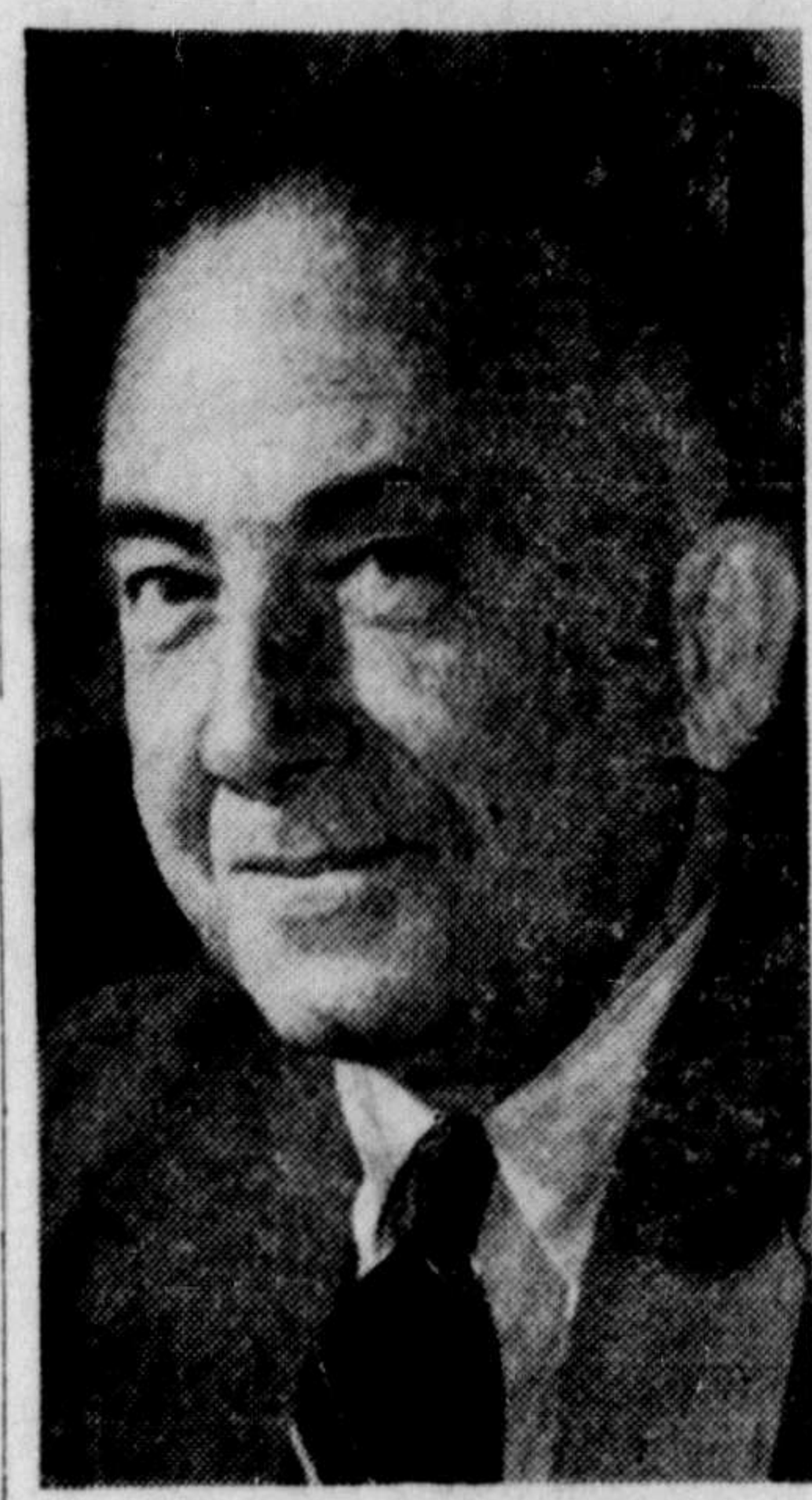
Appeal On New Rates, Date Set

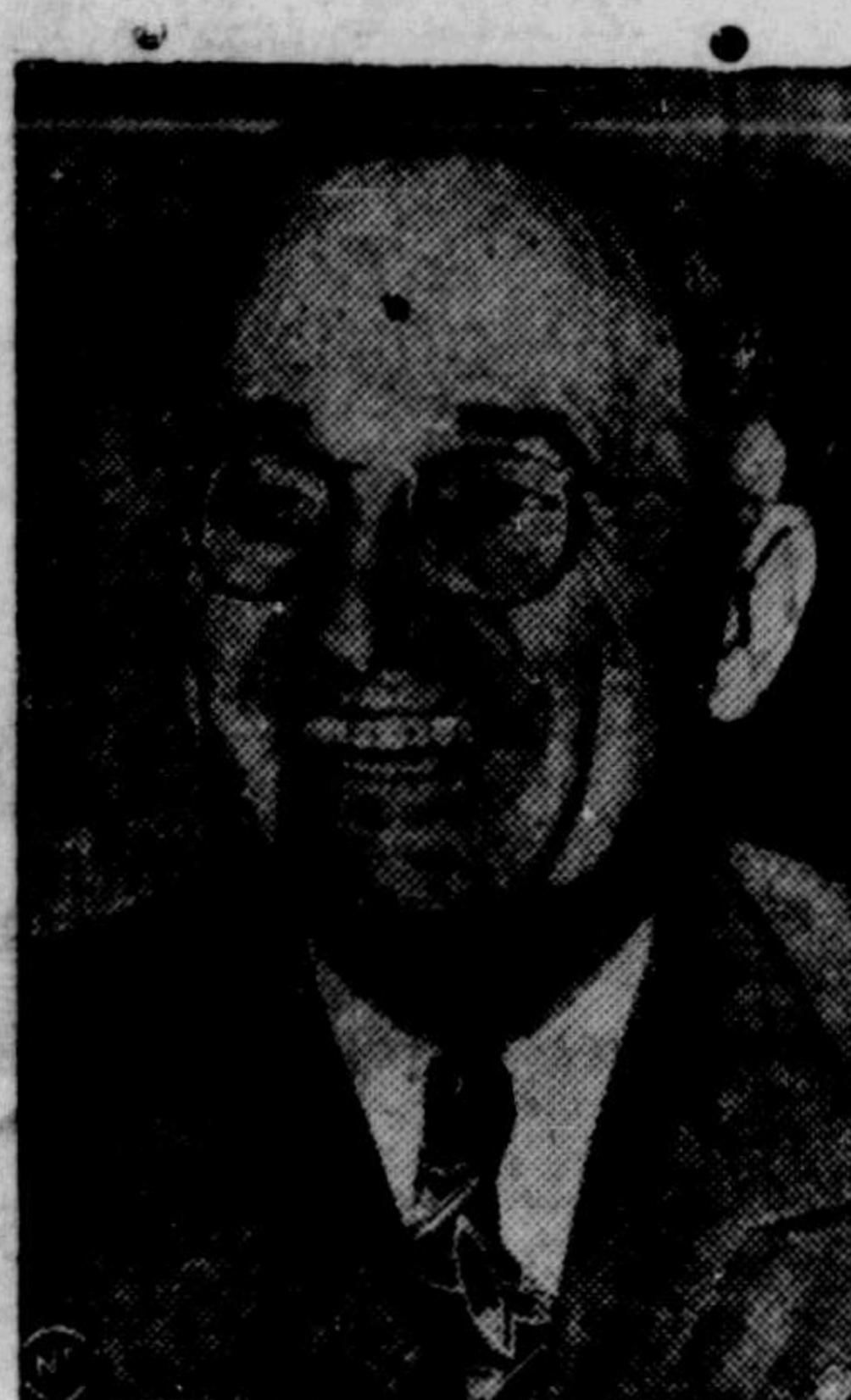

Lewis Repudiates Coal Strike; Tells Followers To Do As Like

WASHINGTON (CP)—John L. Lewis, leader of the United Mine Workers of America, told striking coal miners today that they can do as they please about returning to work.

Lewis' unusual message to the miners came just before President Truman was reported to be about to ask the federal court for an injunction to end the three-week old work stoppage.

Lewis disclaimed any personal responsibility for the walk-out but a three-man fact-finding board, reporting to the President, blamed Lewis for the strike.

"We Will Not Be Bullied—" British Say

BERLIN (CP)—United States authorities, using troops, kept twenty-two Russians out of a Soviet building in the American sector of Berlin today and announced that they were blocking off the sector from the Soviet zone.

General Lucius D. Clay, United States military governor, declined to make any statement about the blockade but it was interpreted generally as a counter move control measures instituted by the Russians.

Fifty United States military policemen barred entrance to all but Germans employed in the building. Some Russian officers remained inside the offices and American guards permitted the Russians to bring food for them.

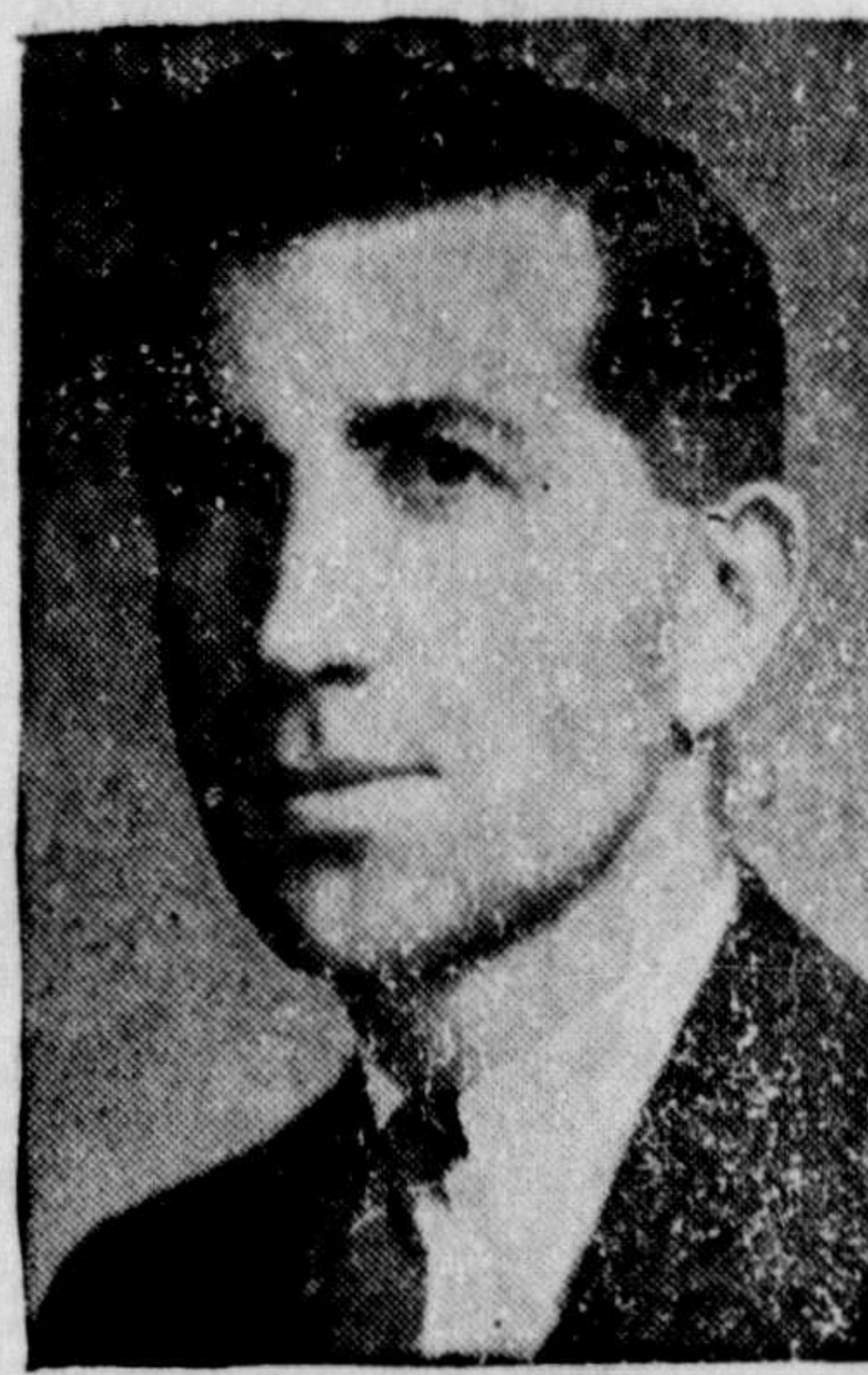

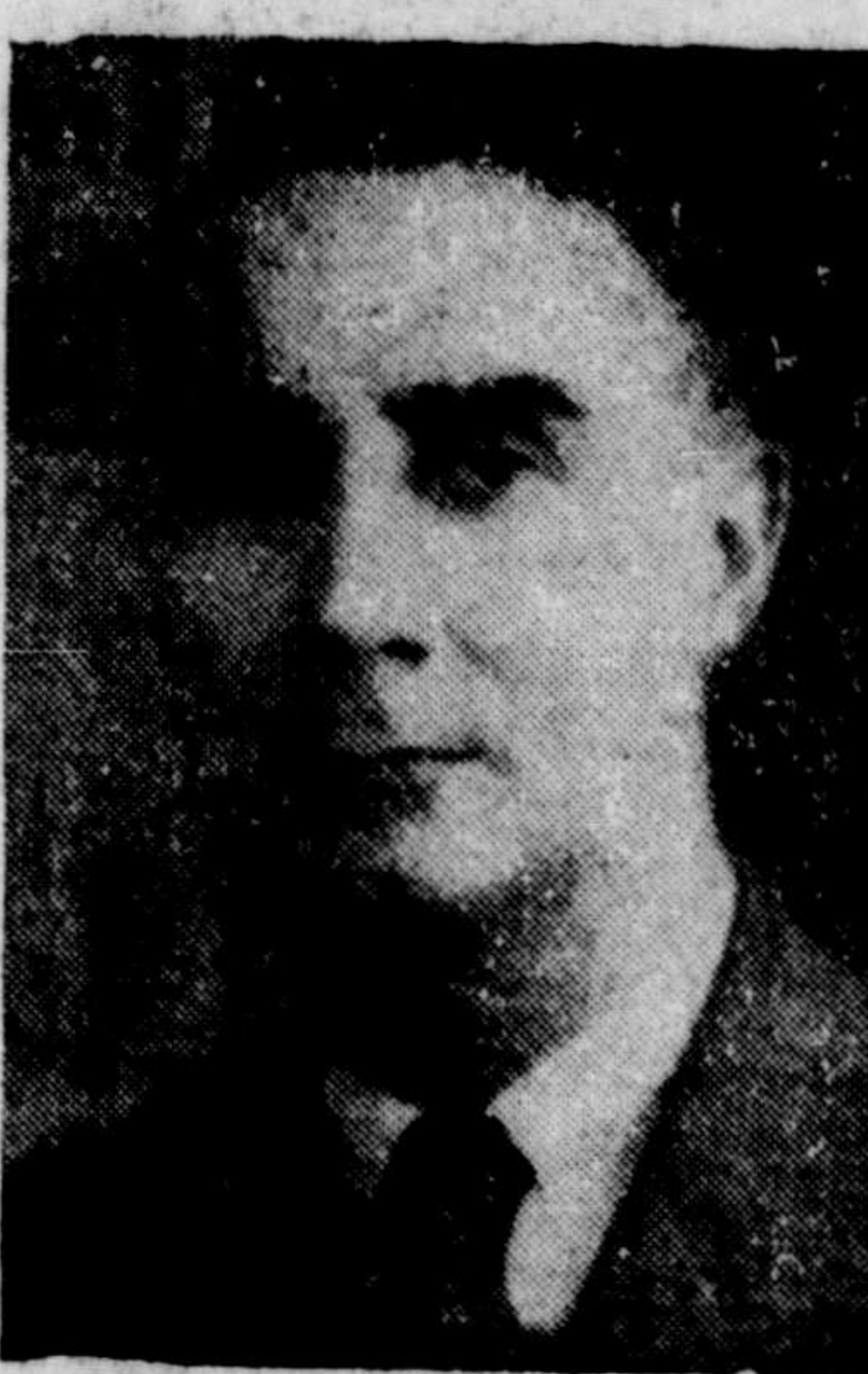

Palestine

THE UNITED NATIONS General Assembly is being called into special session April 16 to deal with the tragic Palestine situation.

It is unfortunately only too clear that Palestine is being dealt with as a pawn in a game of big power politics.

In the face of Arab resistance, partition, it is evident, could only be imposed by force and the means to impose force under the United Nations organization could be provided only by the big powers including Russia.

And, even if partition were dropped, who, after all, will shoulder the responsibility of intervention? But who likewise will accept the same responsibility under the different label of trusteeship, a responsibility probably even more burdensome since whoever wielded authority as a trustee would have to fight not one faction but two.

Now the one slim hope of averting an intensification of recent trouble is some compromise between Arabs and Jews, which would involve a retreat sure to disrupt the recent truce between Hagana and Jewish extremists, and set Jew against Jew, as well as against Arab.

We are lost in a labyrinth, from which there seems to be no road of escape.

EMBARRASSING EMBRACE

THE C.C.F. Party, through its leader, its national bulletin and in other ways, has been making clear that it repudiates the support which the Labor Progressive (or Communist) Party seems determined to give it, says the Montreal Gazette.

The key to the matter would seem to lie in Mr. Coldwell's statement that "the C.C.F. will not collaborate with the Labor Progressive Party in any way, direct or indirect."

The fact is—and it is a very important fact—that the Labor Progressive Party, almost certainly under higher inspiration, has decided that the C.C.F. is following certain policies which are sufficiently close to the Communist party line to make them useful and worthy of at least whatever temporary strengthening Communist support may give them.

No doubt there are many general lines of C.C.F. policy which the Communists might regard as tendencies in the proper direction.

Reminiscences and Reflections By W.J.

A feature of the fiftieth anniversary of the Vancouver Province is the reproduction of two front pages, each bearing a historic date. One goes back almost half a century—February 27, 1900, the turning point in the South African war.

The first recalls a private incident of possible interest, even though its occurrence, was so long ago. Caught in a high-banked loop of the Modder River, the Kimberley region, the army under General Piet Cronje, after actions and a period of siege, surrendered to the forces directed by Lord Roberts, personally in command.

Thousands of prisoners journeyed south, in succeeding weeks. Performing guard duty in a makeshift box car was not uninteresting. On the long, leisurely trip to Capetown, there was ample time to observe the unshaven and do a bit of chinning with those for whom the war had ended.

I became chummy with Frank Berger. Half in fun he'd remark that when he was not in jail, he was a prospector. We talked by the hour, bumping along aboard an unlovely train, and with numerous stops for a variety of reasons. Frequently he would read from a well thumbed little book—a Bible, with his name and address on the flyleaf. Would he sell? He thought a while, finally naming what would be four bits in Canada, and the deal was closed.

Two years slipped by. Discovering an ex-private cannot live on glory, without something additional, contact was made with printers' ink. High hopes and low pay distinguished this start in exploring the ramifications of reporting. The daily newspaper call was made as usual at the railway station back home in St. John. Friendly John

THE LIFE OF FAITH

(By Archdeacon E. Hodson, St. Peter's Anglican Church)

"The life which I now live in the flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me."—Galatians II, 20.

The Life of St. Paul is a life worthy of our imitation. As a matter of fact he invites us in one of his Epistles to do so in these words: "be ye imitators of me, as I am of Christ."

"The life I now live in the flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God."

The Christian life, he says is a life of Faith.

Let me first attempt to find out what faith is not. Faith is not, as some people say "believing in spite of evidence to the contrary."

It is belief in scorn of circumstances." Abraham gives forth at the word of God not knowing whether he went.

Faith is not mere credulity "believing what is not true" as the little girl said.

Credulity is based on insufficient evidence, while "faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

Faith is not superstition which has no moral value whatever, being based upon sentiment and ignorance.

What then is this faith by which one is enabled to live the Christian life?

It is an activity of the Soul, an energy of one's whole personality, a movement of the heart, the mind, and the voice, which enables the soul to rise above

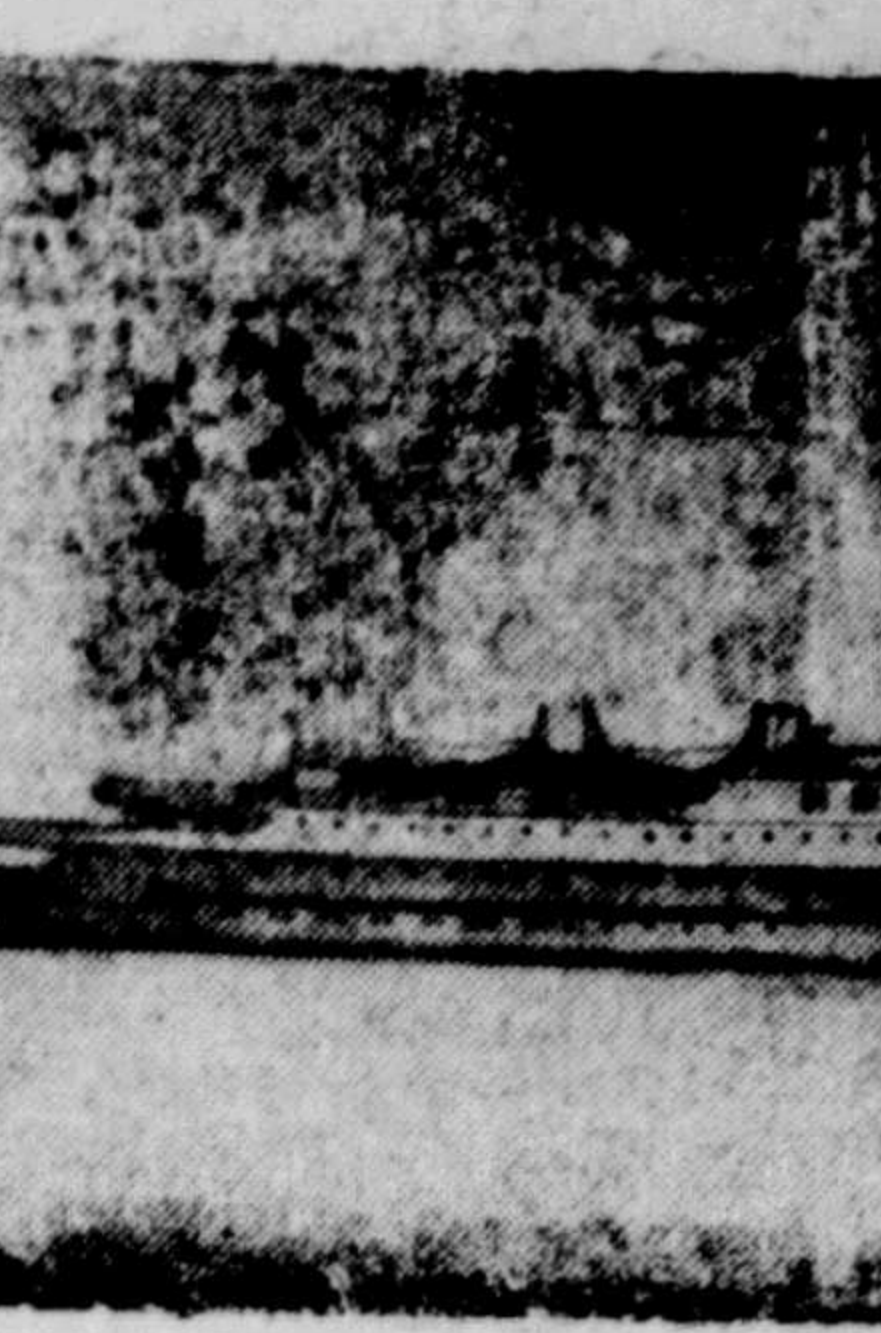

Port Simpson Boat Burned—Jim Bacon's Brother Held Unusual Post—Herring Impounded

A Port Simpson fisherman lost his boat recently in a fire that levelled the vessel while it was beached at the northern village. Edward Valpy's gillnetter Bellmore caught fire and burned when a can of gasoline upset in the forecabin while he was fixing it up for the start of spring fishing operations.

Apparently the rising tide changed the level of the vessel which had been beached, causing the tin of gasoline to upset onto the galley stove. Mr. Valpy was outside at the time, otherwise he would likely have been burned in the fierce blaze that followed.



B. J. Bacon, better known as Jim, who has been on Prince Rupert's waterfront since 1907, has learned that his younger brother Bill, in London, has retired from a position which he has held for 50 years. It wasn't an ordinary position. Mr. Bacon, on his retirement, and for many years before it, was superintendent of the King's Mews—the Royal stables. 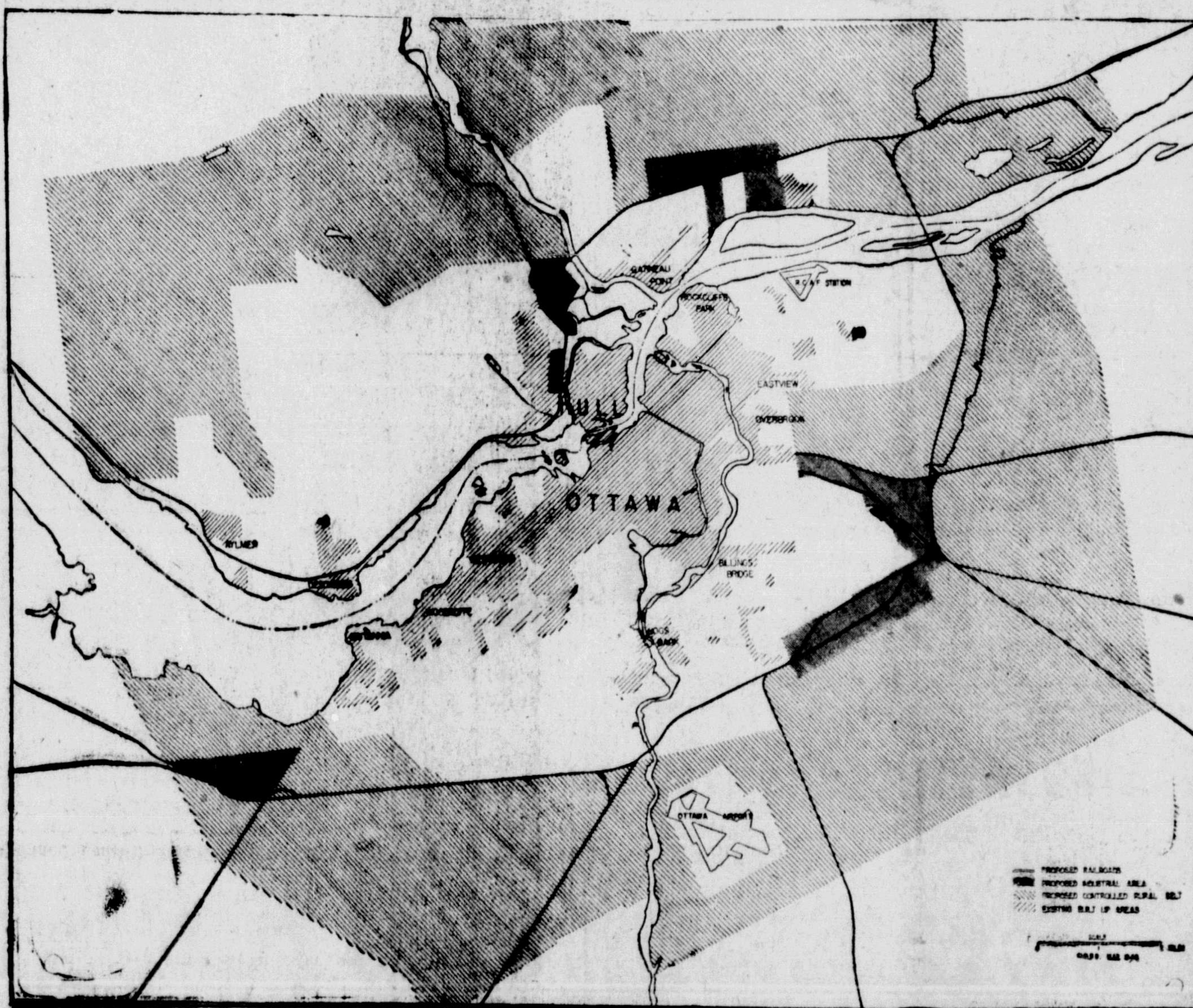

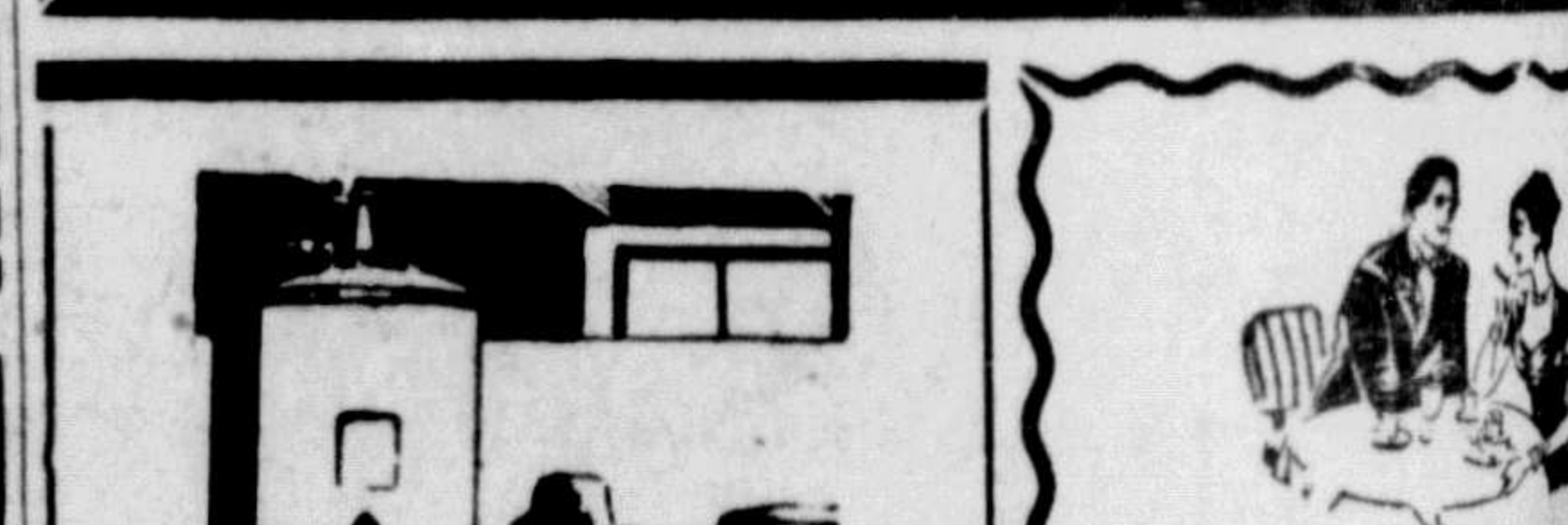
