Sun Life Invests In Celanese Mill

The Sun Life Assurance Co. has subscribed to the extent of \$3,000,000 in the recently issued bonds of the Columbia Cellulose Co., which is constructing a cellulose pulp mill at Port Edward near Prince Rupert.

GURKHAS IN MALAY FIGHT

SINGAPORE.—Gurkhas, experienced jungle fighters of the Burma campaign, and detachments of the Malay Regiment, advancing under Royal Air Force Spitfire cover, reached Pulau, Malayan communist stronghold, today in spite of insurgent resistance.

The force advanced nine miles south from British-held Guamang to test insurgent strength in the south Kelantan area and reported encountering communist resistance.

This is an area where the insurgents are believed to be trying to gain enough territory to hoist the Red Flag and proclaim the first communist republic "state" in Malaya.

THE WEATHER

Synopsis

SECOND LUMBER CARGO SHIPPED THROUGH RUPERT

Second recent cargo of lumber to be brought to Prince Rupert for rail shipment to the United States, arrived here Monday in tow of the American tug Pacific Foam. It was shipped by Ketchikan Spruce Mills Ltd.

A week ago, the same company shipped through a "pilot" consignment, slightly smaller than this one. It is understood that similar shipments will be arriving here from the Alaska city every 10 days.

The Pacific Foam, which was purchased recently by Ketchikan Spruce Mills Ltd., towed slightly more than 100,000 board feet on a scow. The tug is under command of Capt. W. C. Cloudy.

The lumber was loaded into four railroad cars, two of which are consigned to Nebraska destinations, one to Tennessee and one to Iowa.

Early this year, Juneau Spruce Corporation shipped a scow containing more than 500,000 board feet of lumber through Prince Rupert. The company had plans to make other shipments by the same route, but the mill was closed by a strike controversy.

Now, however, the mill is back in operation and there are reports that the interrupted traffic may be resumed.

Previously, all Alaska lumber was shipped direct by boat to Seattle.

Longview Lumber Dock Fireswept

LONGVIEW, Washington.—Disastrous fire swept Weyerhaeuser lumber assembly dock here last night. Piled lumber as well as a major portion of the dock were destroyed. Mill buildings nearby were saved.

Close Silence After Stalin Parley Is Kept

RUSSIANS PUT IN NEW ROAD BLOCKS AND STRENGTHEN THEIR FORCES—BRITISH COMMANDER IS RECALLED

BERLIN (CP)—While close-guarded secrecy continued at all capitals in regard to what transpired at the conference of western power representatives with Premier Joseph Stalin at Moscow on Monday night, tension increased in Berlin today. New blocks have been installed by the Russians on the roads leading into the city.

RUSS PLAN ON DANUBE

BELGRADE.—The Russians today presented their draft plan which would give communist-ruled states of Eastern Europe exclusive control over the Danube River.

Delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky presented the proposal to the Danube conference where the communist Russian bloc out-votes Great Britain, United States and France seven to three. He demanded "protection" of sovereign rights of the Danubian states over the 1,800-mile waterway, a major one in central Europe.

LEAVES GOV'T POSITION HERE

Former Immigration Inspector R. D. Evans, who has resigned from the government service, left Monday by car for Vancouver to join his family.

He accompanied Allan Morgan to the interior. Mr. Evans is replaced by C. N. McLean, formerly of the White Rock immigration station who arrived in the city recently.

HEMORRHAGE DEATH CAUSE

Cerebral hemorrhage was the cause of death of John Harris, 29-year-old Canadian Pacific Air Lines engineer of Prince Rupert, who collapsed and died at Terrace on Sunday, an inquiry by Coroner Will Robinson at the interior town revealed yesterday.

Mr. Harris collapsed while on a picnic at Terrace and died almost immediately on a baseball field where he had been playing. Cerebral hemorrhage was given as the cause of death by Dr. Stanley G. Mills who performed an autopsy.

The body was brought to Prince Rupert yesterday and will be sent to the family home at Penticton for burial. Mr. Harris had lived in Prince Rupert for the last year, coming here when C.P.A. began its air service between this city and Vancouver.

KETCHIKAN MAN SAW LOUIS FIGHT

D. Dudley, Ketchikan boxing enthusiast, who went to New York especially to see the recent Louis-Walcott heavyweight boxing bout, arrived in the city on last night's train and is proceeding north on the Prince Rupert tonight. Dudley had a sixth row ringside seat and is full of interesting recollections of the big pugilistic event.

READY FOR CONVENTION

All Ready For Big Party Gathering at Ottawa

OTTAWA.—Speeches will be broadcast by CBC from the Liberal national convention opening tomorrow. Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King will be heard. Voting for the new leader is to take place Saturday.

They are giving the convention its final touch of spit and polish today. All is ready for the big opening in the Coliseum at Ottawa's city-owned Lansdowne Park. There Prime Minister King will deliver an address and formally open the three day party get-together at which party organization will be whipped into shape and a new leader selected with the final round of balloting Saturday afternoon.

More than four thousand party supporters from across Canada will attend the sessions.

ISRAEL CHARGES BREACH OF TRUCE

TEL AVIV.—An Israeli military spokesman Tuesday charged that the Egyptians had broken the Palestine truce by attempting to seize a hilltop near Revivim settlement, not far from Asilim, Monday night.

The government is to make a formal charge against Great Britain to the United States mediator of a breach of the truce in issuing electric stores July 29 to the Egyptian army.

Bound for Juneau, Whitehorse and Fairbanks to obtain color and material for further writings, R. L. Livestock Smuggling

Cattle "by Hundreds" Said to be Taken Across Line—Hogs Too

VANCOUVER.—A Seattle customs official, Howard MacGowan, said in a telephone interview yesterday that British Columbia cattle "by the hundreds" have been smuggled into the United States during the past few months to beat the Canadian beef export embargo and draw lucrative prices on United States markets.

MacGowan, chief enforcement officer for Washington State, said he and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police had already arrested three Canadians and two Americans and there would possibly be more arrests. A truckload of cattle and two truckloads of hogs have been seized.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police here said they had been investigating but would not comment.

MacGowan said that one of the main arteries in the Fraser Valley smuggling was from Aldergrove, British Columbia, to Linden, Washington.

There has also been smuggling in the Osoyoos area. It was there the hogs were taken.

Canada Hoop Team Is Out

HARRINGAY ARENA, Eng.—Canada was eliminated from further basketball competition at the Olympic Games today. The Canadian team, which had previously lost to Hungary, suffered a crushing 57 to 35 defeat at the hands of Brazil today.

Pat McGeer of Vancouver led the Canadian scorers with eight points. Bill Bell and Reid Mitchell of Vancouver had five each and Ollie Bakken of Vancouver Clover Leafs, Doodie Bloomfield of Montreal, and Harry Kernode of Vancouver, four. Nev Munro of Vancouver had three and Murray Waxman of Montreal, two.

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MORE THAN POLITICS

UNLESS SOMETHING unexpected and sensational happens on the international scene which, although unsettled and still fraught with serious possibilities, is becoming a bit dull, the national Liberal convention in Ottawa this week-end should be a major news item, attracting widespread interest. Although it may be looked upon as strictly a political gathering in fact, it will be much more than that in import since it has been called to elect a leader and lay down policies for a party which constitutes and actuates the government of the land until the next general election and has more than an even chance of continuing to do so.

With signs already abundant that there will be more than one bone of contention, with young Liberal organizations expressing their intention of putting some life into the old bones, with various social and economic questions due to be brought forward for free and full discussion, it is apparent that the sessions are to be lively ones. And this should be all to the good for the old party for it should spur it with energy to match the power which it possesses and which might well die without some revivification at this very propitious time.

They will be doing some serious thinking and talking at this unofficial parliament this week-end and it should redound to the benefit not only of the party but of the country. And Canadians, regardless of their political leanings, will follow the proceedings with deep interest, realizing that what is decided upon in Ottawa thereat will have an important bearing on how Canada shall act in domestic and international affairs in the critical days that appear to be immediately ahead for the whole world.

RESENT YANKEE HELP

SIR STAFFORD CRIPPS touched a sensitive point in British pride when he announced American advice was being asked on industrial production.

There were outbursts in the House of Commons from Conservative members and even the Chancellor of the Exchequer's Labor supporters weren't particularly happy. There still are wide differences between the British and American way of life.

Attention was drawn to this difference by Sir Malcolm Stewart, top man in the British cement industry, who wrote to the Times regretting the "outburst of feeling suggesting our amour propre is offended and that we are shy of seeking advice."

"The salient fact is that in spite of much recent progress some of our major industries are still woefully behind efficiency obtained in Canada and the United States," he wrote.

But he added that he wondered how American methods could be applied in the United Kingdom. British branch plants in the United States could compete with American firms but couldn't raise factories in this country to the same level of efficiency.

"The logical conclusion is that to make British industry as fully efficient as American industry the same political-industrial condition would have to apply," Sir Malcolm concluded.

"This would call for such a reorientation of government policy with regard to industry that it would doubtless prove unacceptable to a Labor government and possibly to sections of some of the other political parties."

Sir Stafford announced in Paris last week establishment of an Anglo-American advisory council on Britain's productive activity. When he told the Commons about it, Anthony Eden, deputy leader of the Opposition, said acidly that it seemed difficult to accept "that any industrial country, however eminent, can look over the general field and give us instructions on how to conduct our business."

"No one had suggested they would give us instructions," Sir Stafford retorted angrily. "The intention is that they should advise how best we can benefit if we wish to do so from experience in America."

F. Fairham, Labor member from Oldham, put his finger on the public pulse when he asked:

"Is the Chancellor aware his mistaken action will leave a nasty taste in the mouths of many of our citizens and will only strengthen suspicion of those people who have already said our economy now has been geared to American policy?"

He got no reply from Sir Stafford but many of his Lancashire constituents must have nodded their heads approvingly. Britons may admit they are slow and conservative but up and down the country there is a stubborn belief that if left to herself the country will somehow muddle through—even without the help of the Yankees.

Editor, Daily News:

I am writing this letter from my bed in a hospital in Vancouver. I was sentenced to two years' imprisonment in Okalla. Why? For doing what any man would have done under the same circumstances. What would you do if you came home unexpectedly from your hard work fishing and trying to keep the family going and found your children in the condition that I found mine? Surely, I beat my wife up but whoever put it in the paper that it was near to death? The same day as the officer told the magistrate at my trial that my wife was close to death, I, myself, phoned the nurse in charge of the floor at the hospital and she informed me that there was nothing serious to worry about and she would be out in a week or so. In fact, when I was taken up by the chief of police to the hospital to see my wife, he said she was all right and further informed me that she had never laid any charge against me.

But here am I in hospital with heart torn to pieces and tortured in mind after having lost, as I have, my whole family. How has a man any chance to cure his t.b. if he is worried and tortured? Was it an unforgivable sin, I did?

DISTRICT SAWLOG PRODUCTION UP

Sawlog scale in the Prince Rupert forestry district in July totalled 32,123,251 board feet, more than 12,000,000 board feet greater than in June and 6,000,000 feet greater than in July, 1947.

Total sawlog production for the first seven months of this year is 132,516,838 board feet, as compared with 126,701,943 for the same period last year.

Pole and piling production in July was 98,965 lineal feet bringing the year's production to date to 1,718,282 lineal feet. In July, 1947 the output was 87,822 feet and the seven month total 1,866,130.

Railroad tie production last month was negligible, while 405 units of cordwood were cut in the district.

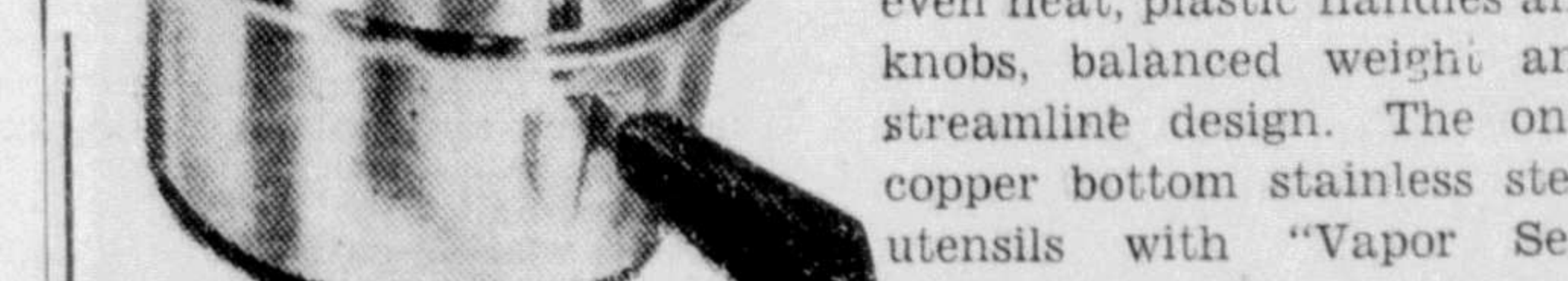

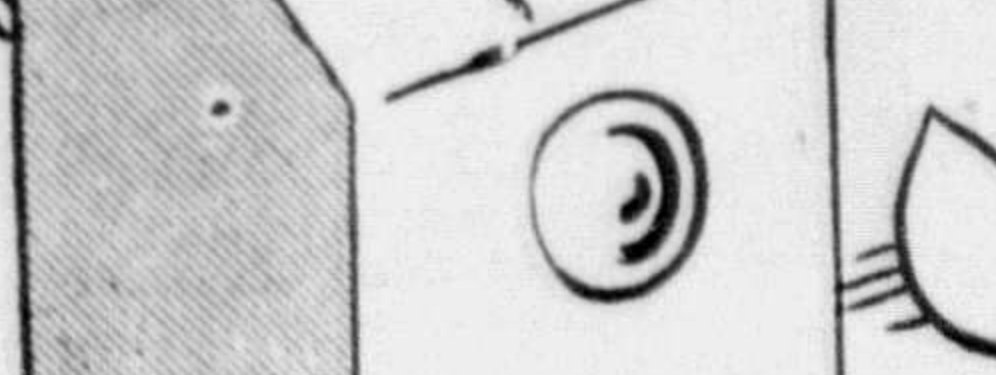

The Moose baseball team's drooping antlers were hitched up another prideful peg last night when they won their third successive victory in late-season play at Roosevelt Park. This time their victims were Merchants who fell before the lodge brothers by a score of 10 to 4.

For Moose, the victory does little to advance their spot in the league standings, made hopeless by a long series of early defeats, but it does assuage the pride of Moose players and fans to have three straight wins behind them, especially since two of them were off the top-dog Savoys.

PIONEER DAYS OF STEWART ARE RECALLED BY PREMIER CLOSING

STEWART — The actual closing down of the Premier Mine will not be until August 15. After that date it will be officially in effect and how long can only be conjectured.

The story of Portland Canal goes back for nearly half a century. The region first began to be heard of at the time of the Klondike

stampede when a Seattle mining promoter named Burgess persuaded several dozen men to contribute capital and examine the possibilities of the Naas headwaters where he said he had been and which held placer. Nothing was discovered, and Burgess made himself scarce.

One of the party, D. J. Rainey remained in the district. He staked a pre-emption and started lode prospecting around what was to become Stewart. Eventually he lost his life in a slide. It was through his activities that J. Wardlaw Stewart arrived and he staked tideflats adjoining Rainey's. Three brothers, all from Victoria, joined Wardlaw. They staked a townsite and called it Stewart. This was how the camp started.

There have been many ups and downs since. Lots were marketed. There was, in fact, a little boom. The second boom was in 1907 when Sir Donald Mann, interested in Groundhog coal, planned a railway from Stewart eventually to be another transcontinental. In fact, 14 miles of steel were laid be-

fore the boom burst. But it made a stir, nevertheless. Big London papers sent correspondents to Stewart.

At one time, no less than 62 mining companies, large and small, were active in Stewart. One correspondent sent to his paper a picture of men digging for gold in the heart of Stewart townsite but the men were only laying city water pipe. The picture was given front page display. There was also that yarn about "a mountain of gold."

The Premier mine property, ranking among the best anywhere in the north, for richness and duration of production, came prominently into the picture, after a good deal of preliminary difficulties. It was in 1916 a sample shipment which brought \$175,000 made a sensation. Two years later, the American Smelting & Refining Co. bought a controlling interest and began developments on a major scale which included an aerial tram to tidewater and construction of a mill. Since then until now the property operated continuously.

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SIX MEN VANISH INTO OTTAWA RIVER AS DES JOACHIM'S BRIDGE COLLAPSES—Six Men plunged to their death in the Ottawa River when a 170-foot section of a Bailey bridge collapsed 20 minutes before quitting time. The tragedy occurred at the Ontario Hydro's \$57,000,000 Des Joachim's power development project near Rolphton, Ont., approximately 150 miles north-east of Ottawa.

Children have become adults. The old days have passed on. Those who once were strangers are well established citizens. It's in this way a town grows instead of stagnating. Who would have it otherwise?

The Skeena River can be dangerous to the point of destruction. Some perhaps thought of this on Monday, reading in the Daily News of the trip to Terrace aboard the converted barge Inlander. Away back when the G.T.P. was building, one of the Foley, Welch & Stewart steamers went to pieces in that river.

Newfoundland has a flag of her own—the red ensign with

space in the lower right hand corner for Newfoundland's coat of arms — Britannia greeting two fishermen. This fact has possibly not been generally known, and it will, it is believed, be retained, whether or not the ancient colony becomes part of Canada. There is no sound reason why this should not be. Quebec has her flag. So has Nova Scotia. And as for Canada? Confound it all, haven't they got that flag argument settled yet?

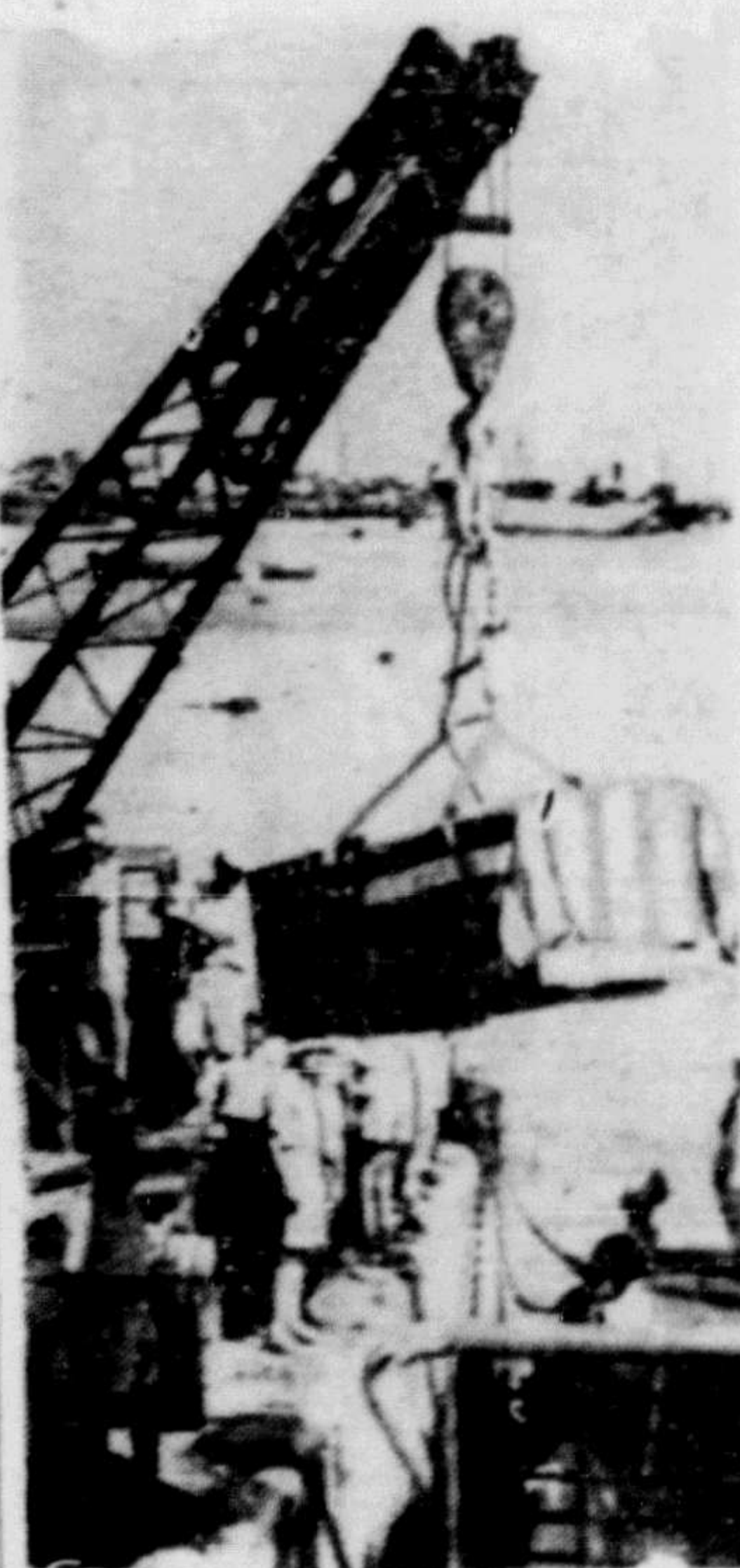
