Peace River Publisher Sees Rupert as Outlet

Too Little Attention Being Paid To This Port — Would Be More Economical Than P.G.E. Extension

"In planning a railway outlet for the Peace River empire too little attention is given Prince Rupert," writes George M. Murray, former M.L.A. for Lillooet and now publisher of the Alaska Highway News at Fort St. John in a special article in his paper inspired by the article of Richard L. Neuberger on Prince Rupert in the Saturday Evening Post. "This port at the terminal of the Canadian National Railway could serve the north just as well as any other. From the Prince Rupert terminal, Peace River products could be shipped to world ports. A Grande Prairie-Prince Rupert line would involve less capital expenditure than the extension of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway north." Mr. Murray also sees the possibility of developing trade from as far west as Montana in the United States through Prince Rupert to Alaska.

Mr. Murray's article is as follows:

Everyone in Northern British Columbia is excited over an article which appeared recently in Saturday Evening Post setting forth the glories and opportunities of Prince Rupert. Capt. Richard Neuberger, well known on Alaska Highway, is author of the article, which reviews the story of Rupert since the time that Dick McBride and Charles M. Hays figured prominently in early day history of the port.

Capt. Neuberger reveals the growth of shipping to Alaska from Rupert and gives figures to show that United States merchants and manufacturers are reaching the Alaskan coasts cheaper by way of Rupert than by Seattle.

One result of the article was a radio round-table held at Seattle where Neuberger stoutly defended his Prince Rupert story against the Chamber of Commerce spokesmen for Seattle.

In planning a rail outlet for the Peace River Empire, too little attention is given Prince Rupert. This port at the terminal of the Canadian National Railway could serve the North just as well as any other. Canadian National officials know this and they know also that a short line from Grande Prairie to Obed or Entrance on the C.N.R. would provide one outlet for the Peace River grain and coal. From their Prince Rupert terminal, Peace River produce could be shipped to world ports.

A Grande Prairie-Prince Rupert line would involve less capital expenditure than the extension of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway north. True, such a line would not give much relief to the Land Beyond the Peace. But on the other hand this could be served very well for a time by an extension of the N.A.R. from Hines Creek to Fort St. John, Hudson's Hope and the Foothills of the Rockies. It would be a long way round about haul from Finlay Forks. But then: what does it matter if a load of lumber, coal or wheat is a few days extra on the road?

Another interesting factor here is the activity of Great Falls, Montana in seeking access to the Alaska Highway country. The Chamber of Commerce there is dead set on making Great Falls the great focal point for trade and travel north from "the Heart of America." They are linked now by air and highway northward. They have their plans for a hook-up of rail connections northward. It is conceivable that Great Falls could share in a big way in the development of Prince Rupert. It certainly has little in common with Seattle. There is keen rivalry. Great Falls wholesalers could place stuff in the warehouses of coastal Alaska via Prince Rupert. They could reach interior Alaska on a Great Northern rail extension northward. Back of Great Falls are the powerful Minneapolis and Chicago Railway financial and industrial barons.

VANCOUVER MAY BE LEFT BEHIND

Vancouver which swings the balance of political power in British Columbia is sound asleep politically as far as Northern B.C. development is concerned. Seattle and Tacoma have shown some interest in shipping by water to Alaska but are accused by Alaskans of selfish exploitation of the northern territory.

This movement by Captain Richard L. Neuberger and the powerful Saturday Evening Post to bring Prince Rupert to the attention of the world as a great seaport should shake the younger generation of B.C. business men into wakefulness.

Vancouver should surely assert itself or in regard to northern trade it will be left far behind. Prince Rupert, on the global map has many advantages over Vancouver, New Westminster, Seattle and Tacoma.

United States Building Up Strength Against Attack

WASHINGTON, D. C. (CP)—Military development in the United States reflect the "very, very serious" world situation noted yesterday by Secretary of State George Marshall. But as he voiced his warning he implied a plea for the American people to keep cool. Other top officials in both diplomatic and military branches of the government took pains to stress this. All efforts to build up the armed might of the United States are being aimed solely at guarding against aggressive attack, it was emphasized.

POLICE IMPOUND FIRST VEHICLE

Taken Into Custody Because It Had No Pink Card

City police Wednesday afternoon impounded the first car in Prince Rupert under the "financial responsibility" clause of the Motor Vehicle Act following a collision on Third Avenue between a car owned by the Fishermen's Co-operative and the police wagon.

The car, said to have been driven by Lloyd Rice, was taken into custody because it lacked the "pink slip" indicative of insurance coverage. It will remain in the hands of the police until released by authority of the Superintendent of Motor Vehicles.

According to Constable Keith

De Witt, driver of the police wagon, the Co-op car pulled out from the curb on Third Avenue near the Killas and Christopher Block at 5:30 Wednesday afternoon, striking the right rear fender of the police vehicle which was proceeding eastward.

Damage to the police car was set at \$15. The other car received damage to the left front fender and headlight.

The vehicle is said to be covered by liability insurance but because it did not carry the pink card showing that it was covered, it was seized by the police.

The case is the second this week wherein a car has been impounded. A Ford, driven by Olaf Hanson, was placed in police custody at Port Edward Sunday night after an accident

Russia Won't Talk To Jews Or Arabs

NEW YORK (AP)—Russia threatened today to walk out of the Big Four talks on Palestine if Jews and Arabs were invited to take part in the discussions. Russia's Andrei Gromyko rebuffed a new American attempt to call the Arabs of Palestine or the Jewish Agency before the Big Power conferences. He said Jewish-Arab conciliation efforts of the past had failed.

JERUSALEM—The closely-guarded Jewish Agency building was badly damaged by an explosion today soon after a car flying an American flag was seen entering its courtyard. Early reports said the death toll was eleven with ninety injured, twenty seriously.

Gas Price In B.C. Up Two Cents

Prince Rupert Price After Today Will Be 38 Cents

VICTORIA (CP)—Premier Byron Johnson today announced that the retail price of gasoline will rise by two cents per gallon throughout British Columbia at midnight tonight.

Standard grade gasoline will now cost 34c a gallon in Vancouver and 35c here and in most other sections of the province. (Prince Rupert price will be 38c).

Of the increase 1½c is earmarked for the companies and ½c for the dealers.

Tragedy Of Masaryk

SUICIDE OR NO SUICIDE, the third storey plunge of Jan Masaryk, foreign minister and son of the founder of the free republic of Czechoslovakia, to death on a flag-stoned street of Prague, is a tragic incident significant of the unhappy situation within the nation since the anchluss of aggressively expansive Soviet Russia.

If Masaryk was a suicide, it must be that the situation within Czechoslovakia is a very hopeless one to cause such a rash act. If he was coerced or murdered, it bespeaks an equally desperate situation.

Whatever happened, there seems no question that there was the aspect of martyrdom to the cause of democracy in the tragedy of Masaryk.

STRANGE LITTLE ANIMALS FROM SYRIA ARRIVE IN PRINCE RUPERT

A mother hamster and her litter of 12 were dug from an eight-foot burrow near Aleppo, Syria, in 1930. The tiny animals were domesticated and found to be ideal for pets and laboratory animals.

In two boxes measuring about a foot square by six inches deep, six of these little animals arrived by express Monday night. Mr. T. N. Rowe, who is organizing the Shawatlans Mink Ranch on Eleventh Avenue, received two females and a male. His son Bobby acquired a female and Douglas Paterson now has a pair. The boys intend to raise the hamsters as pets but Mr. Rowe has other plans. He thinks their fur may have some value and he intends to experiment with them as a source of fresh meat for his mink.

An adult hamster is about 5 inches long and weighs from 4 to 5 1/2 ounces. They have only a stub for a tail and, while it is claimed they look like a miniature bear, their features appear to have more resemblance to a bush rat. Their coat is a golden

brown on the upper portions with the lower part white.

It is claimed that a female, after she has reached the age of 8 to 10 weeks, will produce a litter of up to 16 young every 9 to 11 weeks. The animals are inoffensive, making it possible to keep them in the house. Feeding is not much of a chore as a tablespoon of table scraps and seeds is sufficient for them each day. They don't object to being handled and, if they get loose, they are not destructive and would quickly die or be killed by cats or dogs if they remained outside.

A hamster can be taught simple tricks such as answering a bell and, if a ladder or treadmill is put in their cages, they will spend hours exercising on the apparatus.

The hamsters that arrived in the city Monday came from Duncan on Vancouver Island. Whether these tiny foreigners will make a hit with the pet lovers of Prince Rupert remains to be seen but it is a safe bet that the boys who have this novel attraction are going to be very popular with their chums for the next few weeks.

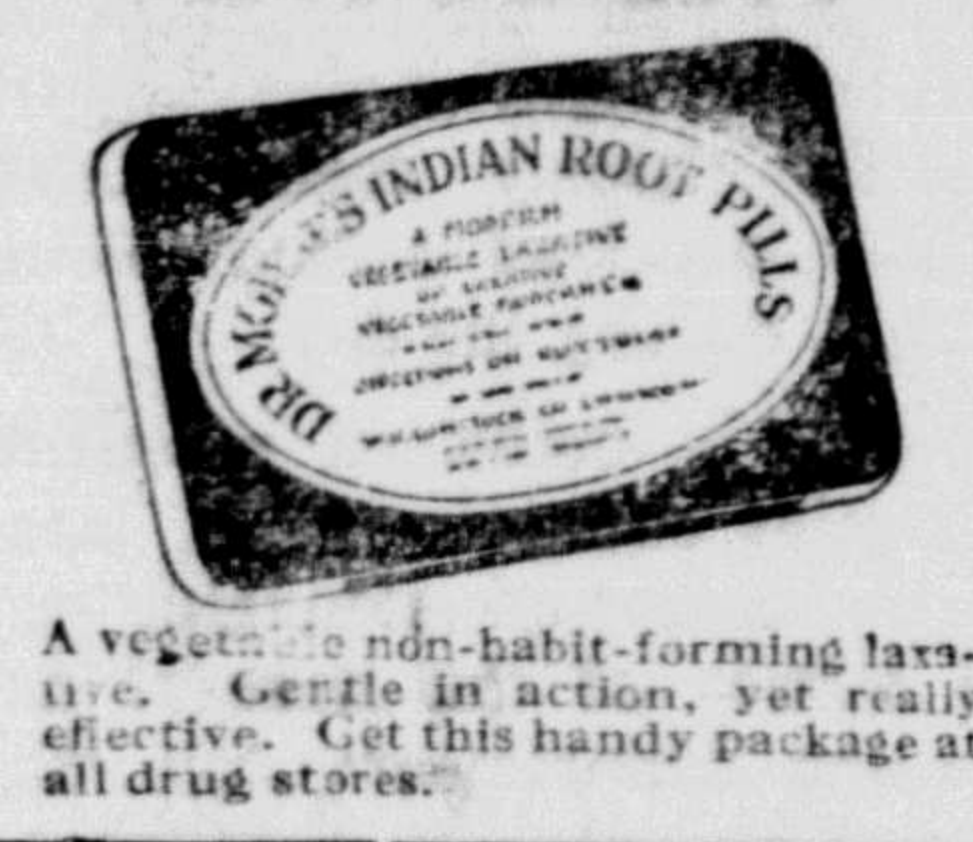

Climaxing years of planning and months of construction, Lindsay Motors opened their new garage and service station today at the corner of Second Avenue and First Street, making available to Prince Rupert motorists one of the largest and finest automotive plants in the province.

The spacious, lofty building, generously lighted and superbly equipped, is designed not only to meet the needs of today but those of years to come.

Although the fine building was opened today for public inspection, the president of Lindsay Motors Limited, John S. Lindsay, explained that work of finishing the garage will be continued for several more days. Congratulations and best wishes upon the opening have been received from many firms that were associated with the construction of the building and those which will do business in

Heated Storage and Outdoor Parking

In addition to providing an excellent mechanical repair service and gasoline sales service, the garage will offer heated storage accommodation. Immediately east of the building will be a hard surfaced parking lot measuring 46x100 feet.

The attractive new building is eye-arresting. Providing for a drive-in, under a canopy, the southwest corner of the garage and service station recedes in an arc. This architectural feature provides for an interesting effect above the canopy, where corrugated aluminum is combined with fireproof Dover

Large Building Has 19-Foot Ceiling

Because of the driveway, all automobiles will be gassed on the garage's own property. The clearance between the gas is-

white shingles with interesting results.

For the most part, the wooden frame building is covered with Insul-Brick siding made by Ace-Tex Corporation.

Under the canopy, which extends out 20 feet from the building and is well supported by two eye-beams and an upright steel pipe, are two B.A. Oil Co. gasoline pumps. These pumps are fed from two 1,000-gallon tanks made of 5/16ths inch steel, welded and rivetted. Hanging from the canopy are two compressed air outlets for the public's use.

and the building is 14 feet. The large building measures 114 by 97 feet and the inside height of the ceiling is 19 feet.

The over-all height is 32 feet.

In the mechanical service department, which takes the shape of a large letter "L" and enjoys daylight through 840 separate panes of glass on four walls, not a single pillar rises to present difficulties in moving automobiles and equipment. Because of the use of 114-foot Warren-type trusses, all ring-cut, no pillars were required in the construction.

The floor is composed of reinforced steel concrete, fabricated in 12x16-foot squares with expansion joints. In the service shop it is sloped two ways to

Equipped With Derrick Steam Car Cleaner

Just inside one of the doors a Wagstaff hydraulic hoist is countersunk in the floor, while on the other side, to the right on entering the two coors is the washing rack equipped with a Kerick steam car cleaner.

On the other side of the building is located a 30-foot greasing pit, well-lighted with vapor-proof lights for safety. Close by are latest model portable lubricating motor testing and battery charging machines.

Hot Water Heating System Provided

Heat is provided by an Aldrich Heat-Pak hot water system in conjunction with downbeat heaters equipped with explosion proof motors.

The front doors, off the drive-in, usher you into the main office, to the right of which is the one-car display room. Large display windows afford plenty of light during the day.

Behind a combined reception and sales counter is a large stock room, and alongside are the offices of the general accounting department and the general manager, S. J. Hunter.

The front office and service department are connected by large doors through which automobiles may pass easily to and from the display room. Nearby are well-appointed rest rooms for men and women.

ward a drain.

An exhaust system also has been built into the concrete floor to remove all gases from running automobiles. In this way carbon monoxide gas is prevented from accumulating in the garage.

Automobiles and trucks are admitted to the garage through two large sectional doors of the overhead lift type, constructed by Richard Wilcox of Toronto. These doors on First Street, are wide enough to conveniently accommodate the largest buses and trucks and are about 19 feet high.

An overhead track, equipped with pulleys and chains, runs from the big doors down the entire length and the width of the building, greatly facilitating the moving of heavy loads. The overhead track is 175 feet in length.

Along the well-lighted north wall are numerous mechanics' bays. Compressed air and electrical conduit pipes have been installed along three sides to simplify the work of the technicians.

California agreed that the coast provinces and states should have a "new deal" under the regulations because they are convinced that they are on a different migratory "flyway" than the areas east of the Rockies.

He defended last year's bag reductions as "timely" because it "will permit the department to take an inventory of game birds in the province."

The department, he said, is strongly in favor of curtailing non-resident hunters who have increased greatly in recent years. Last year, 4,100 non-resident hunters and 15,000 non-resident anglers took out licences in B.C. "We are not worried about it at the present time, but we are taking steps to decrease the non-resident trade. Undoubtedly, there will be an increase in license fees to non-residents."

One of the main reasons for the move is that Americans crowd into two areas in the south and these are rapidly becoming depleted. Other speakers were Geoffrey Lambley, of the Terrace Rod and Gun Club, Thomas Kelly, of the Ocean Falls Rod and Gun Club, Edward Moore, of Wistaria and Dennis Stevenson, new local game warden.

ALARMED AT NEW SERVICE

Ald. Brooksbank Sees Halibut Shipping Here Adversely Affected

The projected Prince Rupert-Ketchikan-Juneau car barge service will be the "ruination" of the landings of American halibut in Prince Rupert, in the opinion of Alderman Arthur Brooksbank, who foresees a dropping off on American fresh fish landings here when it gets in operation.

American halibut vessels will land their cargos at Ketchikan and Juneau, where they will be loaded into refrigerator cars, instead of at Prince Rupert as has been the custom in the past, he believes.

"It will throw many men out of work on the waterfront," Ald. Brooksbank said this morning, declaring that four or five men would be required to handle bonded cars here, whereas, in the past, scores have been required to prepare the fish for shipment to the United States. American halibut landings at Prince Rupert in recent years have been between 6,000,000 and 9,000,000 annually. This, Alderman Brooksbank believes, will drop to a mere fraction if fish can be exported in carload lots from the Alaska ports.

An announcement from Seattle Tuesday said that the South-eastern Alaska Transit Co. is planning to put a railway car barge service in action within 46 days. The service will extend as far north as Juneau.

How railway cars will be loaded onto the barges at Prince Rupert is a matter of speculation, since there is no proper loading wharf here at the present time. The wharf formerly used by the Swanson Bay car ferry, west of the grain elevator, is still standing, but is in need of extensive repairs.

Alderman Brooksbank believes that as a result of the new service, some of the smaller fish packing companies may be put out of business.

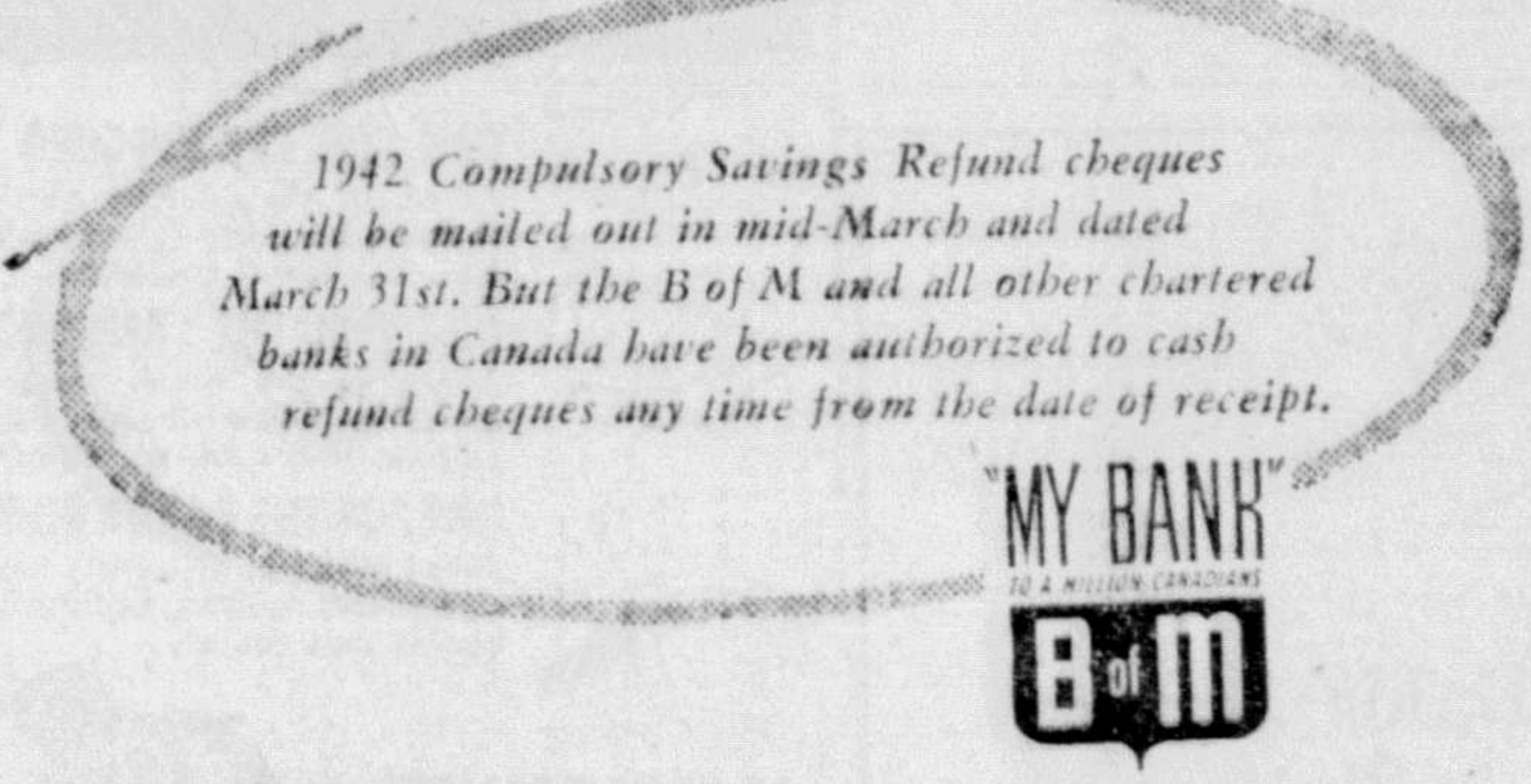

Vegetables which occupy the garden all summer, and yield continuously from the time they mature until the frost ends the harvest, usually should be sown only once.

Hardy varieties should be put in the ground as soon as it has been prepared, and tender kinds should not be planted until the conditions are safe for them.

Here, as with the short-season crops, it is important to avoid sowing more than your family can eat, or put up for the winter. How can this be determined?

The table shows how much space each crop requires to produce one serving for a family of four. You must first decide how well you like each vegetable, and how often each week you

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SHORT SPORT

The hottest argument to hit western hockey this season—surrounding the five-day suspension of Bill Ramsden of Lethbridge Native Sons for hitting Referee Russ McBride after he had been penalized—hasn't quite cooled off. The high scoring junior had an indefinite suspension slapped on him by President Al Pickard of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association after he struck McBride during a junior exhibition game at Moose Jaw between Sons and Moose Jaw Canucks. Pickard interviewed a repentant Ramsden five days after the suspension, reinstated him and said Coach Scotty Munro of Lethbridge was partly responsible for the incident. Pickard said that Munro "would do well to remember that C.A.H.A. expects a certain restraint from its coaches" and that Ramsden was "very definitely on probation."

A few days later Referee McBride hung up his skates and whistle for "business reasons" and almost to a man western sportswriters dashed to their typewriters and chorused that Ramsden was the luckiest kid on skates. Murray Brown of Moose Jaw Times-Herald suggested there was more than business involved in McBride's resignation. "Friends of the referees," Murray reported, "say

Broccoli, you will note, takes 2 feet of space in the row to provide one family serving. It should bear until real freezing weather arrives in the fall. How often would you like broccoli to be served this summer on your table? Once a week? Then sow 26 feet of broccoli. Twice a week? Thirty-two feet will be required. And so with all the all-season vegetables.

Space estimates given in the table are based upon fertile soil, and should be increased if you doubt the quality of yours. And remember that in garden planning, you need not make everything fit the estimates to an inch, but can give and take, accepting the table as a general guide, to enable you to balance garden yield with your family needs and avoid having wasteful surpluses of some crops, followed by scarcity of others.

Brown, who witnessed the game and described it as "sickening"—said "Everyone involved in the Lethbridge-Moose Jaw schlemozle except the referees got a break." Said Dave Dryburgh (Regina Leader-Post) "There's no doubt about Ramsden getting the break of the year when Al Pickard didn't bounce him for the balance of the season and there is cause for McBride to be disgruntled." The chorus was heard, too, in Alberta, where Bob Mamini (Calgary Herald) added that "Just how a player can be suspended and reinstated all within a week is something of a mystery."
