Propaganda ... Literature

THERE'S a sharp difference between "literature" and "propaganda."

No one objects to Russian literature on science, history or fiction, in our libraries or elsewhere, any more than to any similar literature from any other land.

But our liberty and freedom of thought should not make us an active agent to circulate "Russian propaganda" published in this country, or abroad, for the sole purpose of undermining and destroying our form of government.

In an ideological war, preliminary to a possible war by force, a potential enemy has almost unlimited power to peddle its propaganda. That makes it all the more necessary to combat such propaganda.

We are told that all books or literature are more or less propaganda. Still there is a wide difference in aims, objects and purposes.

An informed and aroused public opinion will easily differentiate between propaganda and literature.

DMORROW has been designated as "Bible Sunday" by the British and Foreign Bible Society. The principal objective of the day is to commend and receive subscriptions to aid the Society's work of printing and distributing Bibles in all languages and carrying the Gospel to all the world. It is an objective heartily to be commended and those who would contribute may know that what they give will be to a good cause which never was more timely or important than it is today.

And while we speak of the Bible the thought coccurs that, not only in the dark lands abroad, but even here in our own country there might well be a greater distribution and a greater reading of the World's Best Book which once used also to be called ...the "World's Best Seller." There might be a little heart-searching on the part of every person who gets thus far in the reading of this column. Would it be a good idea if the Bible was playing a greater part in our own libraries and our own selected liter-

The Seattle tug Monarch, which arrived here a fortnight ago under tow after losing her propellor in Dixon Entrance while towing a double section of Davis raft, is standing by at the C.N.R. wharf waiting for repairs to the log crib which are expected to be completed next week. The Monarch had her propellor replaced at the drydock. She suffered no other damage in the gale and her skipper, Capt. J. S. Reardon, managed to bring his tow of 3,000,000 feet of logs to shelter by good seamanship. However, one of the cribs was damaged when the tug's anchor dragged in a cove at Dundas Island. The raft is being re-bound with cable for the trip to Bellingham and

Seiners from Nelson Bros. Fisheries and Canadian Fishing Co., Butedale, are in operation at Poison Cove at the head of Mussell Inlet, catching herring from local populations which remain in coastal waters the yearround. Several hundred tons have been sent to reduction plants at Port Edward and Butedale. The fish are reported to be extremely small and uneven as to size. So far, there have been no signs of the spawning run of migratory herring on the north coast, although there is a good deal of activity off Vancouver Island.

Carrying a fair-sized list of passengers, some of them for the Islands, Union steamer Coquitlam, Capt. Alf Aspinall, arrived in port at 1 o'clock Friday afternoon on her weekly sailing. At midnight she left for the South Queen Charlottes, Cumshewa Inlet and Skidegate Inlet. Coming in from the Islands this trip, the Coquitlam is expected to have a considerable number of loggers from Island camps which are now having their seasonal cur-

The weeks of stormy weather along the coast between southeast Alaska and Puget Round, causing losses, delays and damage to shipping and air schedules did not pass up Lynn Canal where there were nine foot seas and near zero blasts. Boats needing aid included the Chilkoot car ferry and the Frinceton Hall Presbyterian Church mission craft.
