A Grave Situation

CRAVE DANGER can be certainly seen if a Great Lakes steamship company should be permitted to arm its officers against the possibility of trouble arising out of the seamen's jurisdictional dispute. It would be the inevitable danger that would come by any other than the constitutional custodians of the law being permitted to take the law into their own hands. It would be almost sure to provoke serious trouble. A member of Parliament has said that it might even lead to "civil war" and it in all probability would lead to some degree of such conflict. It is to be expected that the authorities will see to it that such a threat is not carried into effect. Members of one seamen's union act wrongfully in trespassing on private property but the proper way to deal with that is for the constitutional authorities to see that these men are not allowed upon the ships without permission or authority. It would certainly be letting matters get out of control if such a pass was reached where ship's officers would use firearms, steam hoses or even tear gas to prevent such trespass. That is certainly no way to handle the situation.

There has never been a recorded case where all 62 percent of them changed their views overnight. Therefore there always remained a minority group as a check upon the majority, because they were just as able to present their views when out of power.

But under the beneficient rule of communism, the vice-premier of the party of 62 percent of the people, was sentenced to seven years' imprisonment, his private secretary to 30 years, and fifteen other defendants to varying terms. The charge under which they were condemned was "conspiracy against the state." It might have been described as being on the losing side. The benefits that communism brings to its world are benefits enforced. You accept them, or else- It is to be questioned whether any benefits are as clear-cut as that.

PURCHASING POWER

THE BIGGEST ARGUMENT today is that of the purchasing power of the people. No one really worries very much over a rise in prices, provided it does not put the goods which people want to buy above the price at which they can buy them. People who live on fixed incomes, pensioners and the like, are injured by any rise in price, and it is difficult to find any method by which some of these people can obtain some redress.

On the other hand, those who are earning and whose income can rise, as a result of increased wages, a better price for farm products or the like, are not damaged by a price rise, if their incomes go up at the same time.

The point is that there has not been a sign as yet in this country of a surplus of production, or an accumulation of goods which the people could not buy, so that evidently purchasing power has risen as fast as prices have gone up. The trouble is now that there is too much purchasing power in the form of money for the goods which are available, which is why prices still tend to rise.

That should bring home the lesson that purchasing power is not of much use if there is nothing to purchase. This is a lesson which seems to be badly needed by those who seem to think that all that is necessary is to raise everyone's income.

In fact, purchasing power, for the first time in Canadian history, is now being limited by the supply of goods to purchase. It is as though it were suggested that someone could cut more wood if he had a sharper saw. He could cut no more wood if there were no more wood to cut. Surely the point is that what this country needs is less talk about prices, and more talk about production, for in increased production lies the only possible hope of increasing the purchasing power of the Canadian people.
