A Greater Commonwealth

IN THE INDEPENDENCE of its completely autonomous and separated parts, the Commonwealth of Nations is, evidently, as strongly solidified as ever. It was a stirring incident last night in London when the eight nations, assembled in conference, by their own free will and accord, reunited themselves in the new "Commonwealth of Nations" with a common King.

Paradoxical political phenomenon, this was an event of historic significance, a manifestation of the power of free sentiment and honored tradition, a tribute to the statesmanship of the men who brought it about.

And most notable and gratifying of all is this free decision of the Republic of India to remain within the Commonwealth of Nations.

The spirit of the British, even though the name may now be dropped, goes on as gloriously and strongly as ever in this history in the making, this grand demonstration of developing democracy in practical form.

Not in coercion or authority but in freedom and independence has the path to amity and peace been found.

CANADA GETTING HOMES

A LTHOUGH the housing situation may still seem grim in some of the more rapidly developing communities or in centres where population, for one reason or another, may be concentrating, it cannot be said that Canada has not been making real progress in new home building.

Final and official reports on house building in Canada in 1948 are now available. The achievement was creation of more than 81,000 new homes.

Apart from being the biggest house-building year on record, 1948 marked the turning point in the post-war housing shortage which Canada shared with many other countries. New families are coming into existence in Canada at the rate of just over 80,000 a year.

The figures are from the quarterly report "Housing in Canada," just issued by the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

The report shows that since 1945 a total of 276,000 houses have been built in Canada. This means that one out of every 12 Canadians now live in a new post-war house. It also shows that the building achievement in 1949 will better the 1948 all-time high record. While 81,000 houses were finished last year 95,000 were started. That means more than 95,000 houses will be finished this year.




