An aged politician, V. D. Savarkar, who was described by the prosecution as the brains of the plot against Gandhi's life, was acquitted.

Five of eight defendants were given life sentences.

(1)—The United States Army said today that remnants of a fabulous Russian spy ring that operated in Japan with the greatest daring and success in history may still be at work in world capitals. The espionage ring was so bold that it slipped from the Japanese cabinet and German embassy in Tokyo secrets that helped change the course of World War II.

The Army has snipped parts of a 32,000-word report on the ring that General Douglas MacArthur sent over from

Fishing Boat Passing Cloud

Founders-One Drowned

VANCOUVER - The fishing boat Passing Cloud foundered off Egg Island in Queen Charlotte Sound Wednesday. Captain G. G. Brown is reported to have drowned. Three men were rescued.

The veteram coast skipper, familiarly known as "Buster" Brown is presumed dead since there is no trace of him following the marine disaster. He was 62 years of age and resided in Vancouver. For many years he plied up and down the coast in various ves-

The Passing Cloud, a herring boat, issued a distress call but became submerged before rescue attempts could be started by the packer Ribac.

It is believed Capt. Brown died of a heart attack or was washed overboard. The 59-foot Passing Cloud is well known at Prince Ru-

pert where she has delivered halibut and herring in the past years to the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative. The Passing Cloud, built in Vancouver in 1940 and owned

by Daniel E. Johnson of Vancouver and Eric V. Johnson of Ocean Falls, was a vessel of 59 feet 5 inches length, 18' 8" beam and 9' 3" draft. She had a 175 h.p. engine.

We Become Agreeable

DRINCE RUPERT Chamber of Commerce has received a committee report which accepts the view of the provincial government that cost of snow removal during the winter from the Skeena River Highway between Prince Rupert and Terrace is not justified by the traffic on the road. We who have been advocating that the road be kept open during the winter bow to the decision on the matter. We hope for no delay a little later on in the year when spring comes and the motorists become clamorous to get out on the road and drive to Terrace and beyond.

There are many things Prince Rupert might not have today if their conception had been thwarted by the factor of returns not justifying the expense. There might have been no dry dock, no ocean dock, no elevator—even no railway or no Prince Rupert.

If Prince Rupert is going to go along accepting that kind of an excuse, it is going to be easy from this point on in for the powers that be to successfully evade our further improvement and develop-

Indeed, we are mellowing and becoming extremely sound in our old age.

Of course, highway or no highway, we always have the railway—unless the Canadian National should decide to tell us that the revenue derived from the traffic does not justify the cost of running trains into Prince upert. *

LAUDABLE ENTERPRISE

OCAL INTERESTS which are taking over the - already popular Sangan River summer resort on Graham Island and plan further development along quite ambitious lines are to be commended on their enterprise. Appreciation thereof will undoubtedly be expressed in terms of local patronage.

An up-to-date and substantial resort of this character in this area has been a long felt need. It will give local people somewhere to go within handy distance of the city, yet far enough away and with surroundings sufficiently different to make an acceptable and pleasant change.

In addition to Prince Rupert people, tourists from farther afield will also be attracted as the resort becomes popularized. Undoubtedly those grand beaches of the Queen Charlottes are capable of much exploitation of this kind.

The tourist industry might well become something of large volume and importance to the Islands, helping to improve economic and transportation conditions which have long been a source of discontent and dissatisfaction to the people there and here. This may be only the start.

NICOLET-YAMASKA

THE RESULT of the federal by-election in Nicolet-Yamaska can be no comfort for the government and, conversely, may be the justification for Progressive-Conservative elation. It was conceded as a test of leadership strength and inpolitical quarters was regarded more as a St. Laurent-Drew contest than between the two young lawyers who were the actual standard bearers.

Mr. Drew, no doubt, has some justification in expressing the opinion that the result is indicative of growing Progressive-Conservative strength throughout Canada. At least, it looks like his party, with the Duplessis blessing, has gained some strength in Quebec by beating the provincial rights drum so loudly. Mr. St. Lourent consoles himself with the old saying that one swallow does not make a summer and the observation that the Liberals were divided, although the Independent Liberal received only an inconsequential votelittle more than the narrow margin of the Conservative win.

If the closeness of the result in Nicholet-Yamaska is any criterion, there might be reason to assume that the federal election, which the outcome of this by-election might or might not defer, will be a mighty uncertain affair to prognosticate about.

A request will be submitted to the city council by the Junior Chamber of Commerce that night parking regulations on city streets be enforced in the interests of public safety.

The suggestion was made by Junior Chamber President S. G. Furk who told the monthly meeting last night that snow conditions on narrow streets evernight further emphasizes these dangers.

City regulations forbid the night parking of vehicles on streets of 20 feet width or less unless parking lights are left burning. Last fall the city police made a campaign to clear the streets of unlighted vehicles but the Junior Chamber feels that the drive has flagged.

Street direction signs will also be a Junior Chamber concern this year. Allan Armstrong, chairman of the traffic committee, agreed to direct a project aimed at having street identification signs erected at intersections throughout the city. Cocity engineer will be sought.




