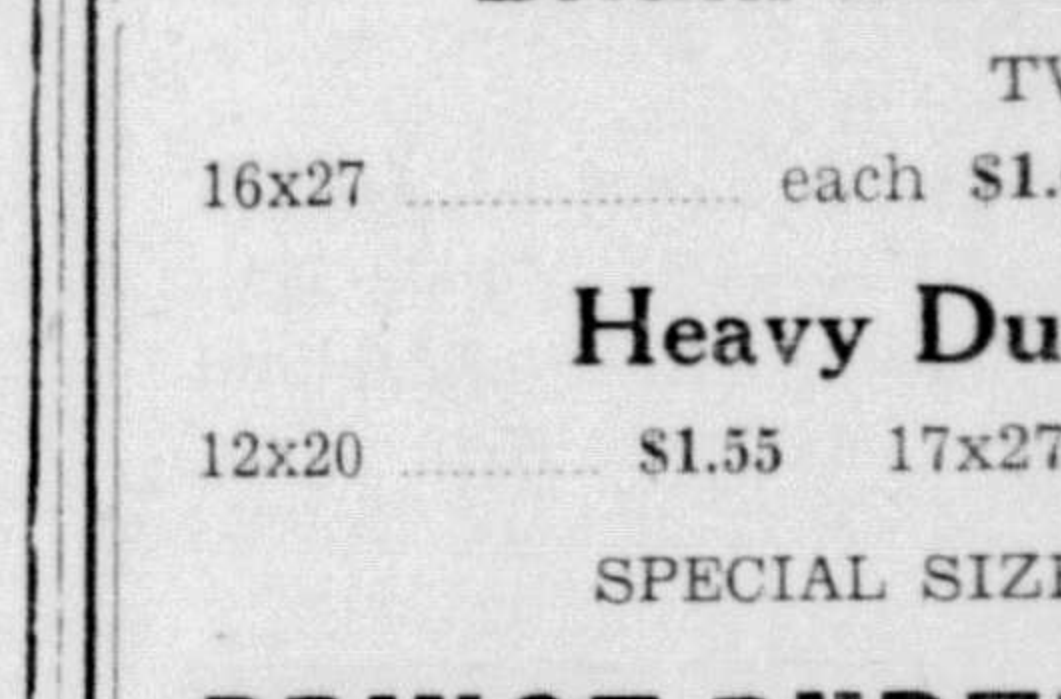

arrived, Johnny-on-the-spot, with both hands full of a new and better poison. It did the trick. It worked a sad, sad ending to a sad existence.

On one occasion, after a similar battle between a rat wise to traps and poisons, finding the carcass revealed a family of 17 baby rats. Mr. Boas thinks such numbers a little outstanding but non-the-less, an example of the prolific fecundity of rats. Reproducing, in even smaller numbers, four times a year is a significance to be remembered by those who keep them for pets.

This feeding is done unwittingly of course. No one, on question would say: "a dog, and a cat, a few hens—and several rats which we never see."

Instead, they feed the dog at the back door, and the cat. There is little left of the meal but it takes little to attract a rat. A few crumbs are enough. Add a soup bone, thrown to the dog who gnaws contentedly for awhile, not dreaming that when he leaves it the rats move in.

In the hen-yard it is even better. Rats like whatever hen-like—grain, mash or just the pebbles from vegetables. Besides, in the usual clutter of pens and boxes, there is shelter from wind and rain, and the human eye.

Garbage-tins, however, are the chief delight. Particularly the ones where housewives are so busy they have no time to place a lid on tightly. The ones with lids, with no disarray of paper and garbage about them, are a total loss.

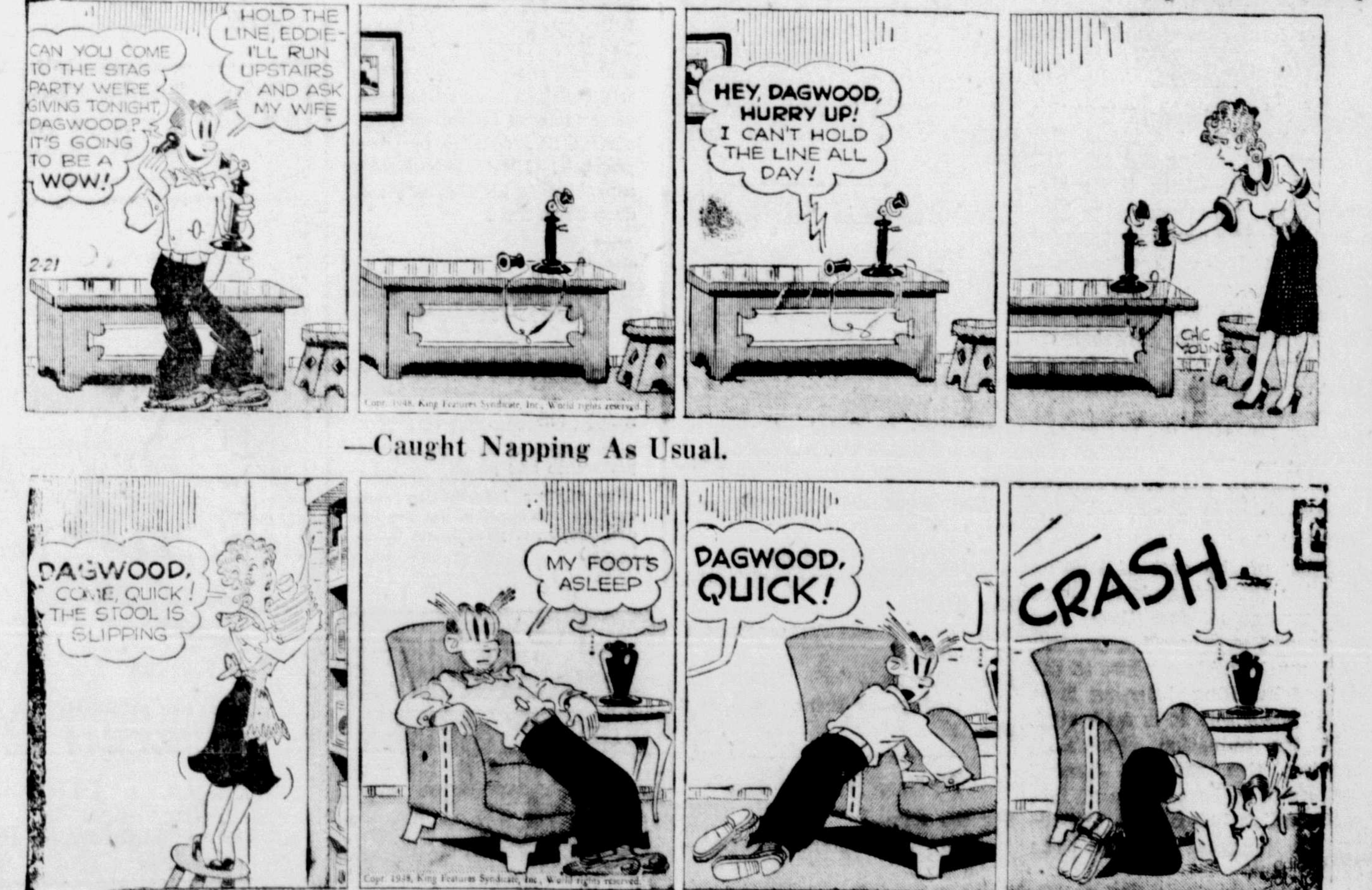

Sea Taking Winter Toll—Herring Operations On Coast Ending

The sea has again claimed its winter toll of lives along the north coast. Annually, it seems, some small boat succumbs to the winter storms, taking with it its complement of fishermen. A year ago it was a native boat which capsized in the Skeena, taking seven lives. This winter, it appears to be the Louisa Todd with her crew of three. Also there is the possibility that three others may have perished in the same area.

Reduction plants from Steveston to Port Edward are reported to be filled to capacity as packers continue to unload huge catches. Most of the fish has been coming from the Bella Coola-area where 37 seiners have been averaging about 2,000 tons a day. Needless to say, the fishermen and packers also have been doing nicely since they have each been getting from 89 to 93 cents a ton as their share in the various pools. Many fishermen are said to have netted more than \$1,000 in the 10-day period that Ogden Chaiuel was open early this month.

Believed lost on the Louisa Todd was Lou Hogan, manager of the J. H. Todd and Sons cannery at Klemtu. Well known and popular he had operated the cannery since 1939. Prior to that he had run a marine machine shop near Klemtu where fishing boats received repairs during the season. The plant was bought out by J. H. Todd and Sons and Mr. Hogan went with the company as cannery manager. He was known and liked by fishermen from Steveston to Prince Rupert.

The big fishing companies, who have been reaping a rich harvest in herring for the last several weeks along the mainland coast, are stopping the herring fishery by agreement among themselves today. The reason is mainly economic. Paying high prices for the herring, they are dependent on the export market for sales. They are fearful that the slump in American commodity prices may have an adverse effect on the market for herring meal.
