## WOLF RAIDS IN EUROPE

**Severely Cold Weather Forces Canine Mauraders Down From Italian and Norwegian Mountains**

LONDON, 0 — Frigid weather, which has been prevailing for the past couple of days in the British Isles and western Europe, will continue and still lower temperatures are in prospect, weather forecasters said today. Cold and snow have driven marauding packs of wolves down from the Sila Mountains in southern Italy.

In Norway packs of wolves have raided herds of cattle, causing such losses that military planes have been sent out to shoot them down.

## One Body Sighted Lashed To Derelict's Wheelhouse

### BODY IS HOGAN'S

**VICTORIA (CP)** — The body of Lewis Hogan of Vancouver was found lashed to the pilot house of the cannery tender Louisa Todd, beached in Whale Channel, south of Prince Rupert. Identification of the body as being that of Hogan, manager of Klemto cannery, was officially announced by R. W. Sinclair, production manager of J. H. Todd & Sons Ltd.

### Three Men Conceded to Have Perished—Rescue Vessels Trying to Get Alongside

It became certain today that Lewis W. Hogan, manager of J. H. Todd & Sons salmon cannery at Klemto; Charles Hoy, skipper of the cannery service boat Louisa Todd, and the engineer "Doug," last name so far unascertained, perished on Tuesday of this week in the loss of the Louisa Todd in Wright Sound.

At noon Hogan's body was removed from the wreck in Whale Channel.

In spite of extremely rough sea and a snowstorm, the provincial police boat P.M.L. 15 was able this morning to get near enough alongside the wreck of the Louisa Todd to sight the

body of a man lashed to the wheelhouse of the wrecked and partly submerged vessel in Whale Channel off Wright Sound south of Prince Rupert and not far from Butedale.

The vessel was boarded as soon as possible to recover Hogan's body and ascertain the fate of two other supposed victims of the storm-wrecked craft.

About three feet of the stern of the Louisa Todd is reported to be showing as well as top of the pilot house and a mast.

The provincial police boat radioed at noon today that it had taken the body of Hogan from the Louisa Todd, which was beached last night at Rivers Bight, Whale Channel. There was no mention in the brief report of any other bodies.

The wrecked vessel had been taken in tow and placed on the beach earlier by the Prince Rupert fishing boat Embria, Capt. Alfred Anderson, which sighted her at 4 p.m. Friday.

Heavy seas made it impossible for a lengthy examination of the wreck and the boats standing by had to withdraw shortly after she was boarded. However, another attempt will be made at the low tide stage this afternoon.

It was definitely ascertained this morning that there were three men aboard the Louisa Todd which left Hartley Bay last Tuesday for Klemto. They were L. W. Hogan, manager of Klemto Cannery, Charles Hoy, skipper of the vessel, and the engineer, "Doug."

Wrecked hull of the Louisa Todd was found stranded and partly sunk in Whale Channel off Wright Sound south of Prince Rupert, provincial police here were advised today. Report of the sighting of the body soon followed. The vessel evidently came to grief while returning to Klemto from a trip to the Indian Village of Hartley Bay. It is considered possible that she may have had engine trouble in Wright Sound and swamped in the high seas, eventually drifting into Whale Channel where the remains of the derelict were found.

The lighthouse tender reported having sighted the floating derelict in Wright Sound earlier in the week. Seven vessels of the Canadian Fishing Co. out of Butedale were soon combed the waters of Wright Sound for further trace of the derelict which was again sighted by the Good Partner yesterday and identified as the Louisa Todd.

The Louisa Todd left Hartley Bay on Tuesday for Klemto. The Provincial Police Boat P.M.L. 15 diverted to the Louisa Todd disaster from the investigation following the finding of an upturned dinghy, also in the Wright Sound area, from which it is feared three Klitima natives trappers may have lost their lives. They are still missing.

## THREE BISHOPS ARE EXECUTED

### Czechoslovakian Premier Would Purge His Administration of 'Reactionaries'

**PRAGUE (CP)** — The Communist Premier of Czechoslovakia, Klement Gottwald, speaking to thousands at a public rally, today demanded a "new government from top to bottom" in this buffer state between Russia and the West. His followers, massed in the old town square, cheered him, shouting: "We

\* are prepared" and "Long live the government of Premier Gottwald without reactionaries."

Gottwald insisted last night that President Eduard Benes, an independent, set him name a new cabinet, without ministers from three parties who turned in their resignations from the government yesterday.

The dissident parties were the Czech National Socialists, with two cabinet ministers, Slovaks, Democrats, with three, and the Catholic People's Party, with three. The leaders of these three parties quit the cabinet.

President Benes refused, for the time being at least, to accept the resignations of the anti-Communist ministers in the government. He appeared to be holding the government Communist demands, which he permitted to replace anti-Communist ministers who sought to resign.

This is the first open break in Czechoslovakia's postwar republic which was formed in April 1945.

Gottwald's government had been a seven-party coalition which governed by compromise and barter.

Leaders of the three parties resigned in letters to Benes who immediately called the parties' leaders to a meeting. Evidently he hoped there was some possibility that he might save the coalition by refusing to accept the resignations.






## SCOUT-GUIDE RALLY PROGRAM IMPRESSIVE


