




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# The New Hotel

PART FROM SATISFACTION that steps are being taken to meet the conceded need for adequate and modern hotel facilities which industrial expansion and increased business and tourist travel will demand in Prince Rupert, the announcement that important British and American interests have decided to establish a fine new 165room hotel here is a gratifying indication of the confidence that outside people have in the future of this city. It is a demonstration of confidence and enterprise which should be tonic to local people many of whom may not be appreciating the impending prosperity and progress.

This new project, which apparently is already well in process of organization, is something about which Prince Rupert has long dreamed and the necessity of which is becoming more sharply realized, particularly by the travelling public. It a long time since Prince Rupert has had any extensive new hotel construction. Existing accommodation has served long and faithfully and, even with the new hotel, should continue to be useful and profitable. From the looks of things with one new development following another in the spiral of progress which is now undoubtedly setting in, there should be plenty of room for all.

It is interesting to note that the hotel plan provides for a modern new theatre, something that will also be welcomed here. In the new era, Prince Rupert should be able to support not only two good theatres but also probably more.

Hotels and theatres, though, are only two items of new and extended accommodations and services which Prince Rupert will be requiring now that it sems to be so well on the way to a new and bigger phase in its development toward metropolitan

One can think of such things as greatly needed modern housing including apartments and accommodations particularly for the auto travelling public, never forgetting the municipal facilities and services which are so shockingly deficient and which are already posing a serious financial prob-

The new hotel will be welcomed. It is long overdue. The enterprise that is bringing it here is to be commended and appreciated.

### VISIT APPRECIATED

T WAS QUITE SOME TIME since Prince Rupert had been favored with a visit from one of the federal cabinet ministers so the week-end call here of Hon. R. W. Mayhew, the minister of fisheries, was timely not because he came in the course of an election campaign tour but because it was appropriate that the head of the fisheries department should see the most important fishing port on The Canadian Pacific coast and familiarize himself with the business, facilities and problems here.

Mr. Mayhew, in course of conversation, showed he had a broad view and understanding of the fisheries industry from both the economic and conservation standpoints. He was not slow in admitting his appreciation of the increasingly important part that Prince Rupert is due to play in this and other industries.

Certainly the minister of fisheries, at least, should be a frequent visitor to this port so it was satisfactory to have the assurance of Mr. Mayhew that we would be seeing more of him here in future.

Possibly other federal ministers will be seeing fit to also favor us more frequently with their presence. 

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
