Simple Life

VITH THE COMING of September most seek-W ers of the simple life have returned to their ordinary jobs. The quest is still unsatisfied, is not capable of satisfaction if the return from lake or sea or mountains is dictated by the need of getting from the Throne. the children back to school. No parent ever leads a simple life.

Whether the simple life is possible or only an unattainable goal remains a matter of opinion. Thoreau, with his motto of "Simplify, simplify," was really a fairly complicated person. He may be admired for his acceptance of a jail sentence in lieu of paying a tax that he considered unjust, but the action was not consistent with his creed of simplicity. Tolstoi's theatrical simplicity caused more trouble to himself and others than living an ordinary life could have brought about. The simple lives of the Doukhobors, for whose migration to Canada he was partly responsible, have not brought complete peace of mind either to themselves or their neighbors.

Getting close to Nature is a phrase sometimes | made. used as a synonym for simplicity of living, but the users of the phrase overlook the complications that attend the process. Go close to Nature, give her the least chance, and she'll start getting close to you with such unwelcome attention as sunburn, mosquito-bites and poison ivy. Her ants and wasps insist on sharing the simple picnic fare, and her winds blow smoke in your face.

The truly simple life seems, on analysis, to be that which is lived in familiar surroundings. The value of holidays is to provide a contrast. Farmers | thoughts. To the city man, after his annual bout with Nature, and even more to the city woman, the simple life exists in the world of washing machines, gas stoves, unlimited hot water and automatic heat and refrigeration.

Gambling

N ENGLAND a Royal Commission on Gambling has been holding public hearings and, like most Royal Commissions, will probably discover a good deal about what everybody knows already, with some statistics to prove that its discoveries are true.

The Economist discussing the widespread habit of gambling in its various English forms, incidentally proper temperature and ready shows that morals are relative, for it says that "the mere fact that so great a proportion of the public now accept betting as a normal form of entertainment has removed much of the viciousness from it. Pool forms are filled up in the family circle and they are for the most part regarded as competitions and not as a form of gambling."

The paper does not seem particularly hopeful that anything will be done to curb the gambling industry, although it is notorious that it employs thousands of persons who might be turned to more socially productive work. No government, however high its pretensions of morality and however desirous it might be of eliminating the "spivs" from the national life, can afford to offend these thousands, who also possess votes.

It might also be mentioned that the Government has a steady revenue from the gambling industry. Offtrack betting is discouraged by heavy legal penalties, unless it is done on credit. And credit bets must in practice be placed by mail, telephone or telegraph. All these services are under the British post office, so the Government thus collects a small but certain fee on every bet placed. It also shares in the football pools, because the bets are sent in by postal notes, which are also a government monopoly.

It is within the bounds of possibility that, whatever the Royal Commission may report, the Chancellor of the Exchequer may persuade his Cabinet colleagues to have pity on his difficulties and leave gambling alone.
