

The Fight Is On

THE DATE HAS BEEN SET. British Columbia - will have its general provincial election June 15. Less than two months, it will be a short and snappy contest. Presumably it will be followed not so long after by a federal general election. So we are going to have a busy time politically for a while.

Liberals and Conservatives are dropping party considerations to support the coalition. Both parties are agreed on that. They have a simple formula in the matter of the nominating of candidates. In the seats now having coalition members of the Liberal stripe, the Liberal organization will have the privilege of choosing the candidate. Skeena and Atlin are in that category. In the seats with Progressive-Conservative coalitionist members the P.-C.'s will have the choice. There are no northern seats in this position. Where C.C.F. members are sitting, Liberals and Conservatives are to get together to choose the coalition candidate. Prince Rupert, Omineca, Mackenzie, Prince George and Peace River are such seats.

The nominations, it is to be supposed, will be disposed of quickly so that the campaigns may be started with a minimum of delay.

As between Coalitionists and C.C.F. opposition, the issues are clearly defined.

The coalitionists will found their campaign on the big program of public works of province-wide scope and benefit and the policy of encouraging and supporting large-scale industrial development such as the celanese mill at Prince Rupert and the aluminum plant at Kitimaat, all of which, if proceeding without interference, will bring employment and prosperity.

The C.C.F., it says, would abolish the sales tax, something which it proposed to do in Saskatchewan but never got around to. It would further expand the social services, increase workmen's compensation benefits, depending on a problematical new agreement with Ottawa, something which even the friendly provincial governments have not been able to negotiate, or increased-"equitable"-taxation of industry to raise funds.

There will be a lot of froth and propaganda, as usual, from both sides. However, the people of British Columbia are an intelligent people. A lot of them can and, no doubt, will figure things out for themselves in the light of what they may consider fair and reasonable and possible of most benefits. It is to be hoped that the two contending sides—the coalitionists on the one hand and the C.C.F. on the other, will, in their campaigning and in the presentation of their cases, give the voters credit for some intelligence. It is to be hoped that sound and reasonable arguments for the electoral favor will be presented and that there will not be too much "eyewash" or "pie in the sky."

The verdict may be left with confidence to the able reasoning and the sound judgment of the province. We shall be hearing more and plenty.

IGNORED AGAIN-It was bright and sunny from coast to coast in Canada on Easter Sunday, says a dispatch today. For once, if they couldn't say good for us in these parts, they, at least, didn't say bad.

C.C.F. SPLIT

DECISION of the British Columbia section of U the C.C.F. to express itself as being opposed to the Atlantic pact may prove to be a matter of some embarrassment in the forthcoming election campaigns. Harold Winch, the provincial leader, with his ear to the political ground, has been quick in repudiating the stand of the conference, announcing that, in spite of the decision, he will support the Atlantic pact in the provincial election campaign too. In spite of Mr. Winch's boldness, however, there is still that conference decision and it has been past experience that the socialist party does not tolerate flouting of its manifesto decisions. However, the circumstances on this occasion are somewhat different and Mr. Winch may get away with it.

It will be in the federal campaign, of course, where the C.C.F. will have to come clean on the matter of the Atlantic pact. With the split in its ranks, the public of the ridings will be interested to hear how their respective candidates stand on the matter. The press has reported, without denial although weeks have lapsed, that Skeena's member, Harry Archibald, is opposed to the pact. No doubt, Mr. Archibald will, in due course, make his stand clear on the matter. If he is politically sagacious, he, too, would be well to have his ear to the ground. It is no secret that many of his own party supporters here are pro-Atlantic pact and anti-Communist.
