

Doubtful Blessings

IM/E ASSUME that the political system that does YY the most for its citizens might be said to be

the system that is best for them. It is on such a premise that the advocates of communism, and even the advocates of some of the paler shades of the same thinking, have based their claims. Under capitalism, they assure us, the worker is wickedly exploited, while under the leftish way of thought, all benefits accrue to the worker and producer.

Under our form of enterprise we have to admit frankly that the worker hasn't always been wholly satisfied. He has said so with frankness and determination, and with very considerable effect. Under the Soviet system he has appeared satisfied or, if not, for his own good reason, he has kept his dissatisfaction to himself. But, possibly these silent - or satisfied - communist workers would actually have been a lot better off, even as veguely dissatisfied workers under the system in our land, defective as it may sometimes be held.

Some figures provided by experts of the notably honest and dispassionate New York Times relate wages and prices in a common denominator of what an hour's work-effort will buy in Russia or United

Here are a few items. The Russian worker will labor an hour and ten minutes to earn a pound of white bread. The American will secure it in 71/2 minutes effort. A pound of sugar will cost the Russian worker 21/2 hours work, the American will earn the necessary price in 51/2 minutes. A dozen eggs will cost the Russian just short of five hours work, a pound of tea will require ten hours, and coffee a little more than 14 hours. For exactly the same items, the average American worker will work, for the eggs, 381/2 minutes, for the tea 391/3, and for the coffee 221/2 minutes. The same difference applies in other commodities. A man's worsted suit will require the work-hours of almost four weeks; his wife's cotton house dress means four days work. The American will work three days for the suit and a little short of 21/2 hours for the dress.

AND COLDWELL AGREES

totalitarian system no better than what would have existed had the German Nazis won the war. Possibly no further comment on Mr. King's denunciation on communism may be needed than merely to point out that Mr. Coldwell, the C.C.F.

leader, has expressed the hope that Mr. King's statement may contribute to a better understanding by the people as to the seriousness of the situation.

L.P.P. BACKS C.C.F.

THERE IS NO particular surprise at the withdrawal by the Labor-Progressives of their candidate, Bruce Mickleburgh, from the Saanich by-election. The L.P.P. has found a C.C.F. candidate red enough to suit its taste in Colin Cameron whose tendencies toward the extreme left are well enough known. At that Harold Winch, knowing, of course, that too close affiliation with the Communists would alienate a large part of the more moderate Socialists, is not making any official acceptance of the Labor-Progressive support.

Meantime in staid old Saanich, the Coalition is probably not worrying very much whether or not the C.C.F. and the L.P.P.'s get together.


PIONEER OF ALICE ARM

It's Peoples for Solid Comfort Catching herring is a rather tricky job, beset by the possibility of mishaps that may result in the loss of large quantities of fish and even of the ex-

pensive seine net itself.

When a skipper surrounds a school with his seine, he must take great care not to close the top of the net too tightly. This would suffocate the herring and they would die. The weight of perhaps 1,000 tons of dead fish on the bottom of the seine would tear it. Then there is the possibility that the school might "sound", or decide to head, en masse, for the bottom. In cases of sounding, schools of herring have taken the seine down with them. The net has been returned to the surface later by the tide, torn and useless.




