Truter bases his weather calculations on the various wind directions. To be exact in the predictions, he says, one should sleep outside during the first 12 days of the year.

The way certain stars shine also assists him in his forecasting.

**The Experts Say...**

**SCHOOL LUNCHEES**  
It's time to start planning those school lunches again. And of course mothers know it takes plenty of imagination to concoct daily lunches that are nutritious, tasty and lovely to look at.

May we suggest that you set aside a corner of the kitchen for all those necessary lunch-box trappings—a sharp slicing knife, waxed paper cups with covers, waxed paper and paper napkins. In the long run this will save a lot of time and energy.

Two sandwiches with a variety of fillings and bread are the mainstay of any lunch box. Egg salad with pimento makes an appetizing sandwich filling. Chopped roast meat with pickle and mayonnaise is another. Peanut butter and salad dressing also is an interesting combination.

An uncooked vegetable should be included, whether it be a few crisp celery curls, carrot sticks or a tomato.

The youngsters will always welcome a banana or an apple with perhaps a piece of gingerbread or a cookie for dessert.

Either hot or cold drinks may be carried in a vacuum bottle. If the beverage is hot rinse the bottle with hot water before filling; if cold, rinse with cold water first.

**GINGER SNAPS**  
Ginger snaps make a welcome addition to any lunch box.

Ingredients: One cup molasses; one-half cup shortening; two teaspoons baking soda; two tablespoons warm milk; 2½ cups all-purpose flour; one tablespoon ginger; one teaspoon salt.

Heat molasses to the boiling point and add shortening. Dissolve soda in the milk and add to the molasses mixture. Sift ginger and salt with flour and mix well with other ingredients. Form into rolls and wrap in waxed paper. Chill overnight. Slice and bake on greased cookie sheets. Yield: about 75 cookies.

**BALANCED MEALS**  
The health department reminds every homemaker that when planning meals be sure to include foods from every group in Canada's food rules. These groups: milk, fruits, vegetables, cereals, bread and meat.

It also notes that cheese should play an important part in everyone's diet. Cheese is a good source of calcium, protein, vitamin A and riboflavin. It

should be included in the diet at least three times a week by itself or in a combination with other foods.

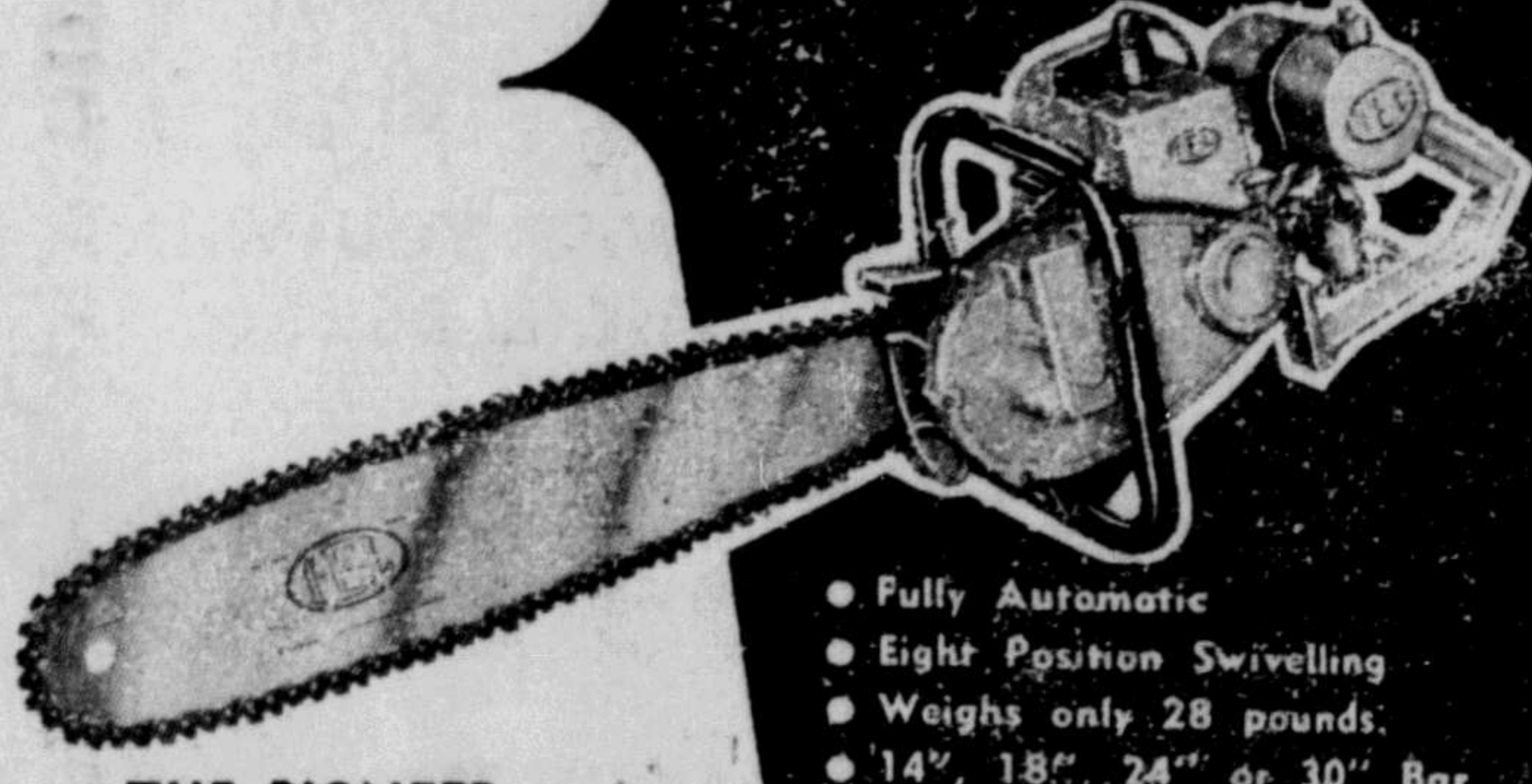

HOLLYWOOD, (AP)—Pat Hall, probably California's most photographed model, has made herself famous with skimpy French swimsuits and one of the most enviable bodies in Hollywood.

A brown-haired, green-eyed gal, Pat has a nice but average face. She's of medium height, 5 feet, 5 inches, weighs an ordinary 115. But it's the way those pounds are distributed that makes Pat distinctive. The brief garb in which Pat poses artfully shows off her perfect proportions. The measurements? Bust 35 inches, hips 35 inches and waist 24 inches.

Pat's shapely legs have been voted the world's most beautiful by several photographers' associations (all male, of course) and even her feet have been titled. She has decorated thousands of calendars, millions of blotters and advertisements and scores of magazine covers.

Just a little over two years ago, Pat could hardly get a job. They said she was too fat. Models were supposed to be lean and long. The first assignment handed Pat was modeling maternity wear.

But Pat is shrewd and she was determined to be a model. When a photographer asked her to pose in a swim suit, she brought along one of her own abbreviated suits. After that Pat was in constant demand. Now she has 150 suits as her working wardrobe.

Pat has no false modesty about posing in such brief wear. She is convinced that the French suit will some day be standard beach wear.

**HEALTHFUL SWIM SUITS**  
"I think the French suit is more

healthful," she said. "Those girly-type suits hold a girl's figure in and give her a nice line, but she isn't using her own muscles. In the French suit she has to rely on herself. Besides, she can get more sun."

Pat, who was born in Aberdeen, Washington, and admits to 23 years, has also established herself as a swim suit designer. She would like to become a movie actress but so far has played only extra parts.

Pat makes considerably more money than the average secretary. She lives alone in a modest one-room apartment. She shares a kitchen and bath with a couple of other working girls. They take turns scrubbing. She does her own cooking, cleaning and sewing.

Her figure just happened. She doesn't diet, even indulges in sweets. She almost always has a box of cookies beside her bed for a quick snack. Her exercise is walking.

Pat plays the piano, dances and sings. She read a great deal, most inspirational books. Pressed, she'll even quote from them. Her favorite maxim: "Other's cannot hurt you. Only you have the power to let them."
