RAILWAY COMPANIES MAKE FINAL OFFER

Bulletins

SHIPMENT DEFERRED VANCOUVER — Shipment of one million dollars worth of British Columbia iron to Japanese steel mills will be delayed because of a fifty percent jump in ocean freight rates, although contracts for the order have been signed following year-long negotiations. The ore was to have come from Texada Island.

MENZIES IN VANCOUVER — Prime Minister R. G. Menzies of Australia arrived here today from Ottawa and was met at the airport by Premier Byron Johnson and Mayor Charles Thompson. There was a 19-gun salute. Accompanying Mr. Menzies was Minister of Fisheries R. W. Mayhew. Mr. Menzies proceeds from here by air to Japan and Korea.

COMMIES DENOUNCED OTTAWA — P. R. Benough and A. R. Mosher, presidents of the A.F. of L. and C.C.L. respectively, today condemned union Communists who sought to withdraw support from United Nations action in Korea.

Cliff Fall Is Possible

Body of Smithers Indian Found Near C. N. R. Park
Police were endeavoring today to ascertain more of the circumstances of the death of Andrew West, middle-aged native from Smithers, whose body, stiff and cold, was found this morning in Stiles Place cut below a 20-foot cliff off the Canadian National Railways Totem Hill Park. His face was battered and this may or may not have been caused by a fall down the cliff which is considered a possibility. An autopsy is being held this afternoon to determine the nature of further possible injuries.

Papers found in the clothing indicated deceased had been employed as late as August 6 at the Columbia Cellulose mill construction work.

Canadians On Escort Duty

TOKYO — Three Canadian destroyers, the Cayuga, Athabaskan and Sioux, operating in Korean waters, have been assigned to the duty of escorting American troopships to a South Korean port. The Canadian destroyers have not struck yet against the North Koreans.

Latest Compromise As Far As Managements Will Go

Donald Gordon Warns Union of Folly of Precipitating Strike

MONTREAL — The Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways today made a final offer to the non-operating unions who have threatened to begin a strike on August 22, that would completely tie up the nation's two largest rail carriers and with them the Ontario Northland Railways and the Tor-

onto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway.

The offer was made personally to the full negotiating committees of the two union groups by Donald Gordon, chairman and president of the Canadian National in behalf of himself and W. A. Mather, president of the Canadian Pacific. Mr. Mather being in western Canada, the C.P.R. was represented at the meeting by N. R. Crump, vice-president.

The final offer which excludes hotel and water transport employees was as follows:

1. Recognition by railway management of a moral obligation to implement the 40-hour week at the appropriate time.

2. Recognition by the unions in principle, subject to negotiation in detail, of ten amendments to existing contracts.

3. Either (a) A 44-hour basic work week with a 9.1 percent increase in hourly rates so as to maintain take home pay. In regard to monthly rated clerical employees there will be an understanding that a five-day actual work week may be granted by local arrangement in selected cases where the hours now actually worked are less than 44, on condition that the requirements of the service are protected up to 44 hours, per week, or (b) an increase in basic wage rates approximately equivalent in expense to that involved under plan (a). This would average 8 1/2 cents per hour for all employees but it is to be graduated in three steps so as to provide for (1) a maximum hourly or monthly wage increase, (2) Lesser amounts in specific cases where it is necessary (a) to avoid raising the occupational rates still further above those paid in outside industry for comparable work. (b) To widen the differential between successive positions so as to provide a reasonable incentive for advancement.

In making the offer for both companies which he described as representing "the ultimate which can be expected," Mr. Gordon emphasized that "it is a final offer and no good purpose will be served in taking it as another bargaining point if it is not accepted, then it must follow that all compromise offers in this dispute are withdrawn and the railways stand by the provisions of the agreement dated July 16, 1948, without any amendment."

Solemn Warning
Mr. Gordon solemnly warned the union leader of the weight of responsibility they will be assuming if they refuse to accept the terms and call a strike.

The fact that a strike weapon in the railway is such a devastating one imposes upon those who propose to use it, a grave and frightening responsibility far greater than any power given to government even during our greatest national emergency, he said. "Have a care," he cautioned, "that in winning an apparent victory you do not damage your own organization. If you force this issue to a conclusion through imposing upon the Canadian public the disaster of a strike, then we predict you will live to regret it. It may be thought," he continued, "that the risk of a strike will force the settlement of this dispute out of the hands of railway management, on that point we would also urge labor to stop, look and listen. Railway management are best qualified to discuss and adjust working conditions and remuneration with their own employees and if we fail to find a procedure whereby we can reach agreement between ourselves as

Coalition Breaking?

WINNIPEG — The provincial leader of the Manitoba Progressive-Conservative party, Warrick Willis, resigned today as minister of public works in Manitoba's Liberal-Progressive Conservative government.

In a press statement, Mr. Willis accused Premier Douglas L. Campbell of "indecision and delay" and "repeated resistance to progressive and reasonable changes in government policy."

The resignation is effective August 19 and was delivered to Mr. Campbell whose Liberal-Progressive party dominates the coalition.

Mr. Willis said it was a personal matter and party participation in the coalition would be determined later by a party convention.

Mr. Willis has been minister since the coalition was formed in 1940 but was at odds with the Premier over decreasing number of party members in the cabinet. There are two now where formerly there were four.

Truman Satisfied

No Change In United States Policy in Far East

WASHINGTON — Averill Harriman, White House foreign affairs co-ordinator, returned here Wednesday from a conference with General Douglas MacArthur in Tokyo to assure the world that there is "no sign of change whatsoever" in the United States policy toward Formosa.

United States policy, Harriman said, stands just where it was when President Truman announced June 2 that Formosa must not be allowed to fall to Chinese Communists.

Later, President Truman himself said that he was quite satisfied with everything that MacArthur was doing and he was optimistic of the outcome.

Notification Of Police Change

News of the R.C.M.P. taking over British Columbia Police next Tuesday has been confirmed here. To date no specific instructions have been received, and it is expected present staffs will carry on for at least a short while after the changeover.

The change means that the city of Prince Rupert like the rest of the country will come under Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

It was not known if there would be any retirements in this area. A Canadian Press dispatch says nine senior officers in the province are being retired.

Conscription Is Advocated

KAMLOOPS — Davie Fulton, Kamloops representative in Parliament, Wednesday advocated a system of compulsory military training as the "only fair way" of recruiting the special Canadian brigade for duty in Korea.

The Progressive-Conservative and war veteran said veterans should refrain from enlisting until "equality of service for all" is introduced.

Atlantic Plane Taken On Ship

NEW YORK — The Polish liner Batory plowed toward Europe today with an airman who landed his rented seaplane near the vessel more than 100 miles out on the Atlantic. Whether it was by accident or design no one could immediately determine.

VICTORIA — The Royal Canadian Mounted Police administration in British Columbia will become effective Tuesday, August 15 according to an announcement yesterday. They will take the place of the Provincial Police and number 550 officers and men. There will be 124 detachments.

Liquor Sales Lag In South Africa

JOHANNESBURG — South Africans are making drastic cuts in their liquor consumption in an effort to balance their budgets. The effect of this economy has caused a slump in liquor sales which is giving concern to hoteliers. Bottle stores have also experienced a big drop in sales.

Some hoteliers have reported a 25 to 35 per cent falling-off in bar sales compared with last year. Trade in hotel lounges, which was booming two years ago and encouraged hoteliers to spend lavishly on interior decoration, is practically at a standstill.

One hotelier said, "I have never known the bar trade to be so bad."

Waiters in smart city hotels said that on some days they did not serve a single customer in a four-hour spell of duty.

The position in a number of Johannesburg hotels is so bad that the proprietors are serving behind the bar counters and establishments which have had six or eight bartenders for years have cut down staff.

Nazi Interpreter Writing Memoirs

LONDON — Dr. Paul Otto Schmidt, Hitler's interpreter from 1923 to 1945, is in London correcting proofs of his memoirs.

His book is to be published this fall in North America, France and Britain.

Schmidt told a reporter who interviewed him in a London hotel that he regarded Hitler as an amateur with considerable gifts — "the trouble was" he thought he knew everything.

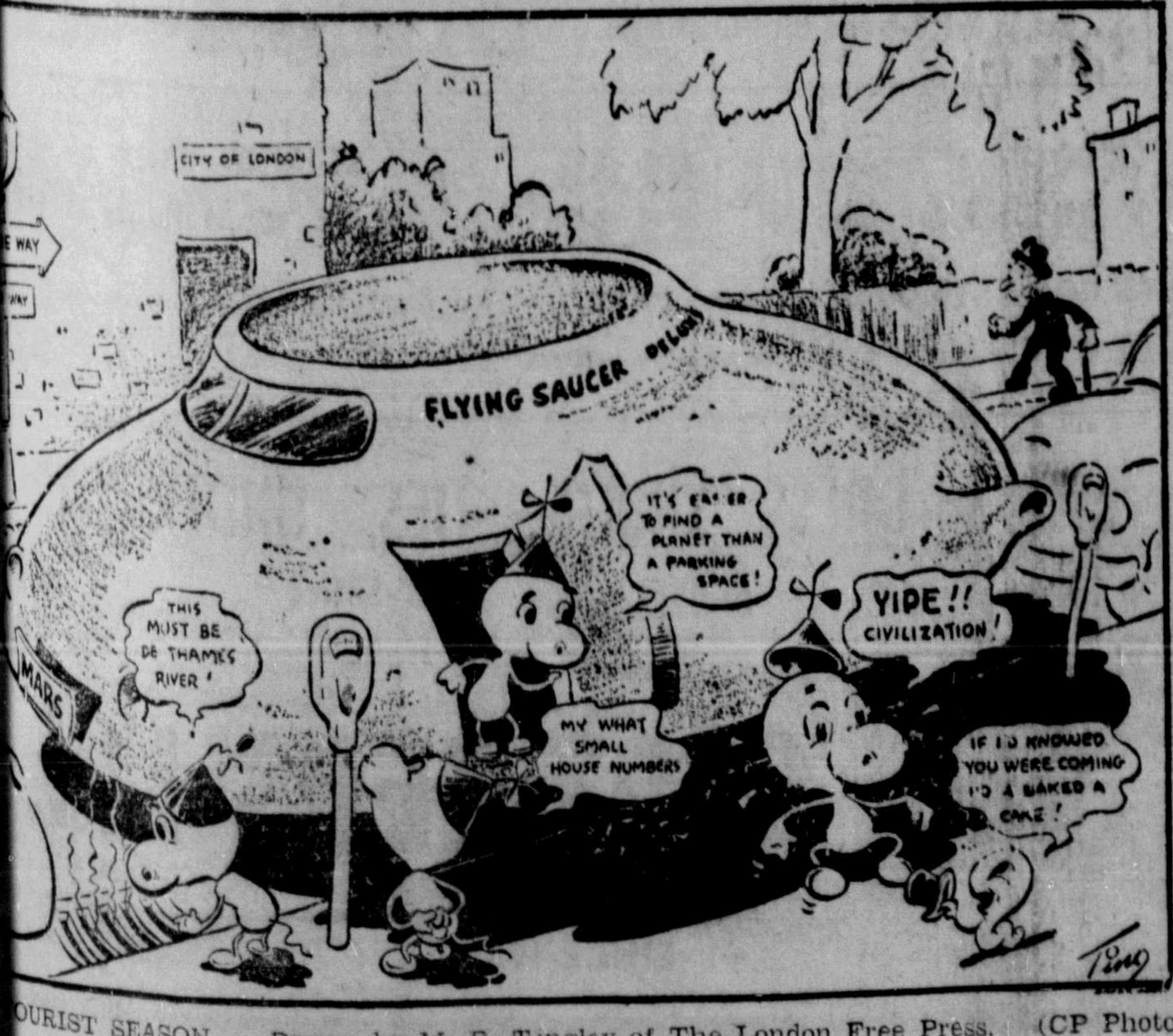

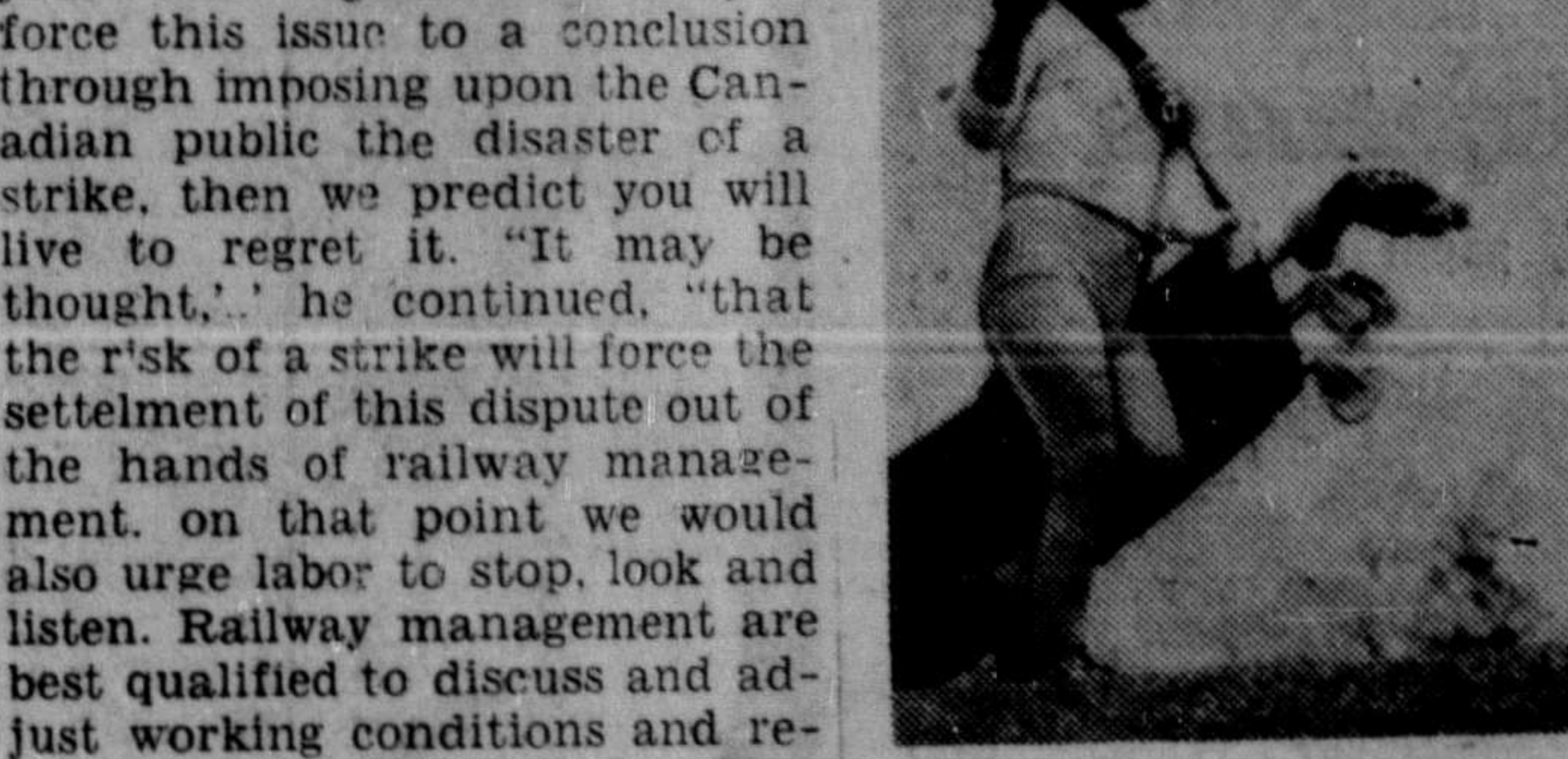


Russia Massing Ships And Supplies on Pacific Coast

NEW YORK — Russia is reported to be assembling dry docks, merchant vessels and supplies at Vladivostok right on Korea's doorstep.

A study, released yesterday by American shipowners, reports a large number of Soviet vessels of all types sailing out of Baltic and Black Sea ports to the Soviet's chief Siberian seaport only 500 miles from Korea.

The American Merchant Marine Institute, a trade organization of shipowners whose vessels fly the American flag, drew up the study.

Understanding On Road

THE differences of opinion and the unhappiness over the condition of the highway between the city limits and Galloway Rapids seem to have been brought to a satisfactory issue with an understanding between the various parties concerned—the motoring public, the industrial concerns that use the road, the city, the Chamber of Commerce, the public works department and the reconstruction contractors.

Difficulties have been explained. The contracting company has assured its good faith. Suggestions have been made by the company and the British Columbia Automobile Association. Mutual understanding should have been reached and a spirit of forbearance on all sides should ensue. There may be some further difficulties and inconveniences but it will not be for long now.

After all, the final outcome is the thing and it is already evident that, when the job is completed in not too many weeks distant, there will be a mighty fine highway across Kaien Island even if it has taken a long time to get it.

MAIL CALL

ONE of the minor annoyances encountered by the newcomer to Prince Rupert is the amount of time required each day to get his mail.

With the shortage of post office boxes it is necessary to wait for a long time to obtain one. The only recourse, then, to obtain one's mail is to join the general delivery wicket queue which varies from two to five most of the time to perhaps as many as fifty or sixty at times when most people are free to pick up their mail such as after 5 p.m.

Providing more boxes does not seem to be the satisfactory answer in a city of this size and importance. The sensible solution is to bring the mail to the people rather than have the people come for the mail. Assuredly it would mean hiring more hands in the local postal service. But, at the same time, time and energy saved by citizens would be immeasurably.

Surely the revenue from the Prince Rupert post office is sufficient to pay any additional costs of such a delivery service above ordinary operating expenses? A loud demand from citizens could not but be heard in Ottawa. It's worth another try, anyhow.

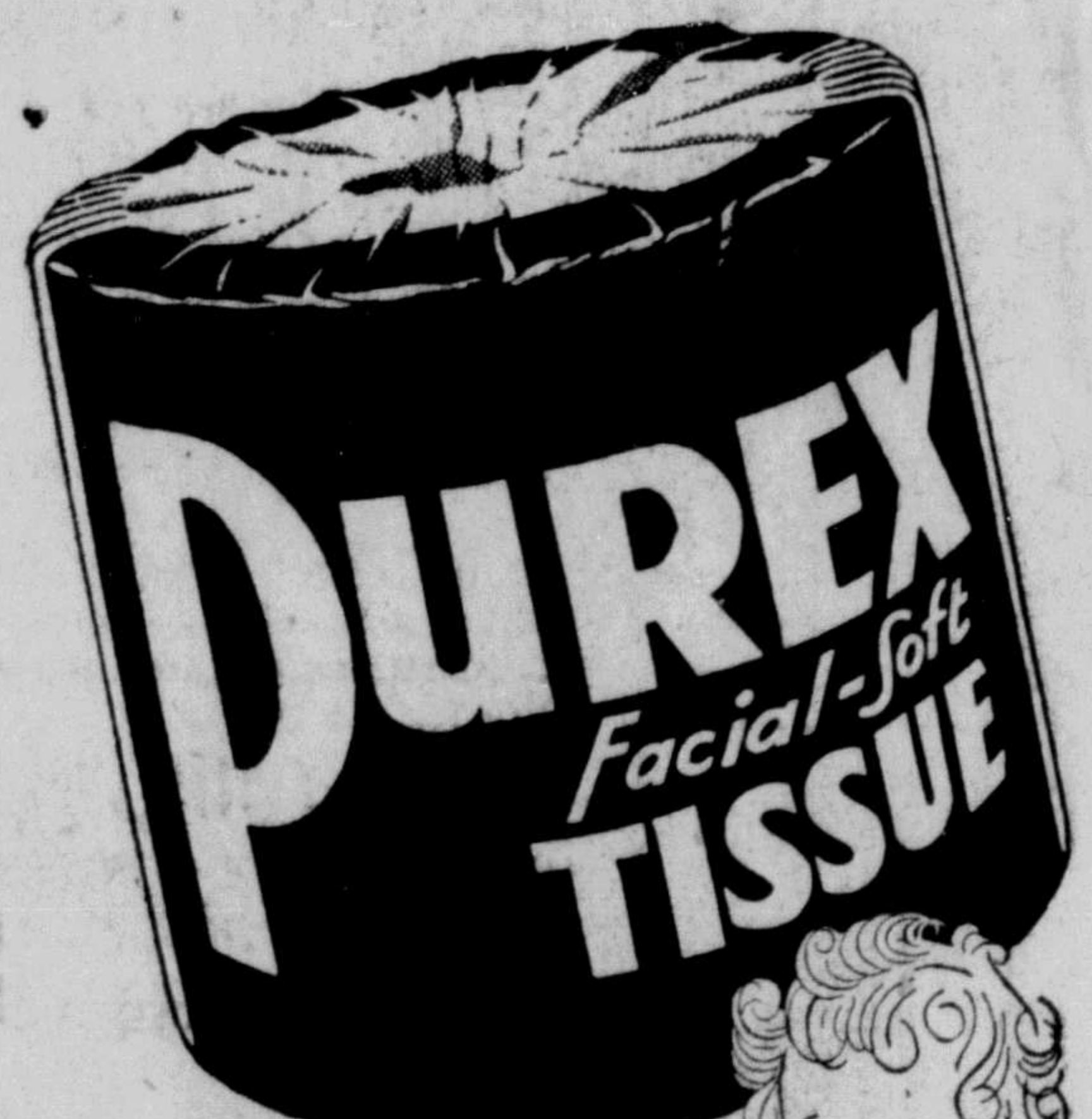

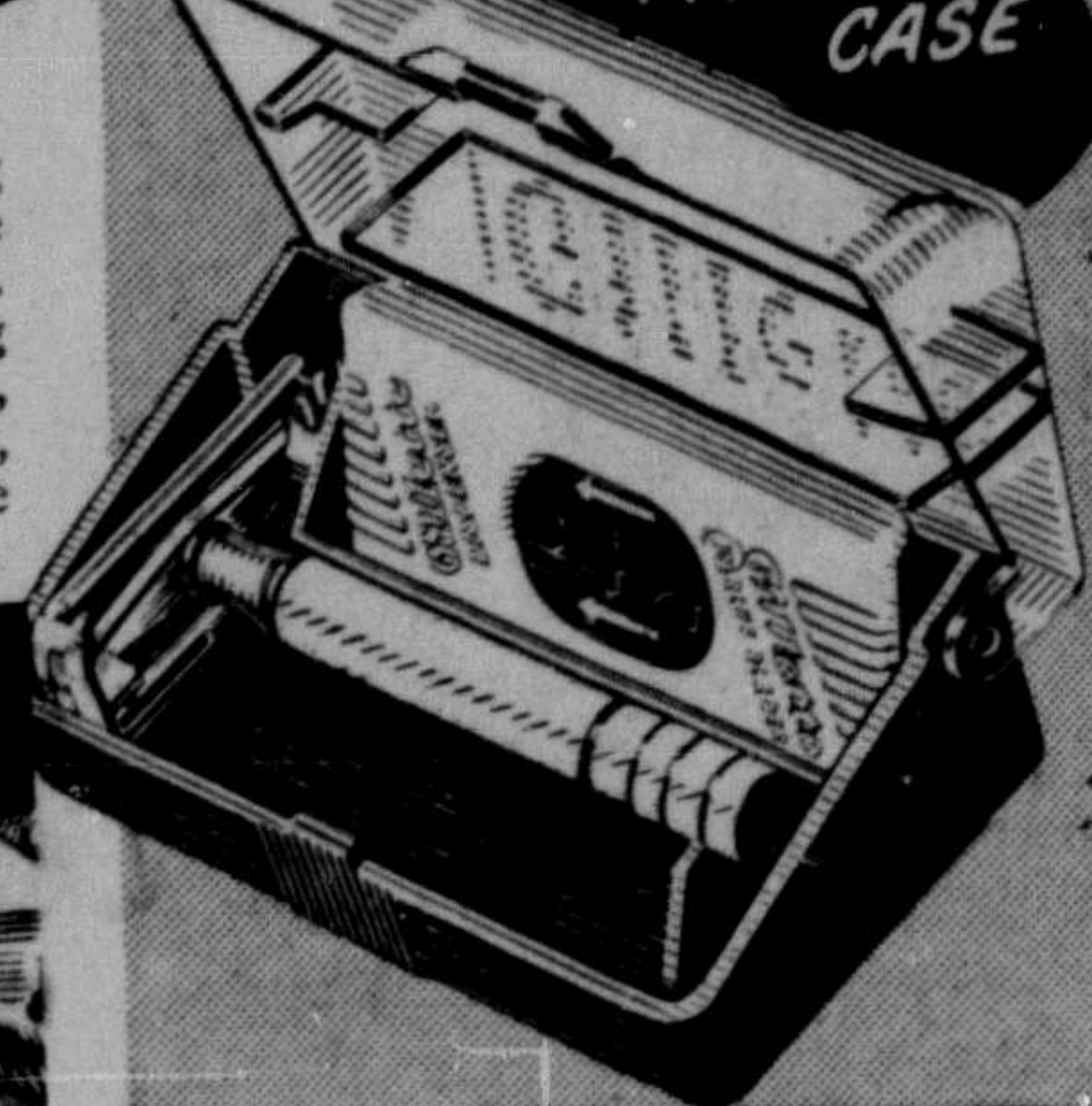

Cancer Clinic For This City

Local Unit Has Two Visits
From Headquarters

"A consultative cancer clinic for Prince Rupert is definitely under consideration," Mrs. Thelma Dawson told a meeting of the board of the local branch of the Canadian Cancer Society yesterday afternoon. The meeting was called by President Mrs. W. Rothwell at her home to hear Mrs. Dawson, field organizer, B.C. Division, Canadian Cancer Society, and Mrs. Molly Good, public relations officer for the division.

Mrs. Good explained carefully the difference between the Canadian Cancer Society, which concerned itself with early detection of the malady and the welfare of sufferers, and the Cancer Institute, which was a treatment and research organization. She said they co-operated with each other fully but their fields were entirely different. Funds for operation of the society were obtained by public subscription while those of the institute came from government grants. But the society does help the institute from time to time, she said.

Being Good Work

She explained that a \$30,000 fund had been set up in 1943 to assist cancer sufferers who had not sufficient funds and that 210 people were assisted in 1947. To date this year 300 have been assisted at a cost of \$20,000. Assistance provides a housekeeper in cases where the housewife has to receive treatment for a three month period. If such assistance is needed beyond that time additional help may be obtained, she said. It also provides doctors and other miscellaneous costs to people who have not sufficient funds and also transportation charges. The society does not give assistance to those who are the responsibility of the government.

At a meeting at the first of January 1950, the speaker continued it was agreed to absorb the home treatment visits of the Victorian Order of Nurses. The nurse appreciates the patient's ability to pay and reports according to the society. For this special V.O.N. service \$3,000 was allocated, she said. Also, there is a \$5,000 comfort fund allocated to the women's auxiliaries.

to help patients. She suggested women might be encouraged to sew at meetings for patients in nursing and boarding homes. President Mrs. Ross buys materials in bulk and allocates them to auxiliaries for making up. The speaker then mentioned sterling silver pins that were being made for members of the boards.

Mrs. Dawson said an agreement had been made with the Royal Bank of Canada whereby drafts were issued by branches on the Canadian Cancer Society for transportation of patients to treatment centres. This did away with the possibility of being caught in an emergency without funds while waiting reimbursement for moneys spent for transportation.

Regular Meeting

The speaker urged the institution of regular meetings at a fixed date each month. That had been mentioned at the grand council meeting at Kentville, N.S., as well as quarterly public meetings. The grand council had also recommended that local executives be enlarged and that they have a patron, such as the mayor. She also stated the grand council had decided fund raising may be extended beyond the campaign period.

Mrs. Good, speaking of the publicity angle, said much of the effort was directed toward teaching the public to be suspicious of cancer symptoms and to check up on them at first. She told about the pamphlets that were issued and films on the subject and the co-operation that the society had always found from the press and radio. There were also 94 films circulating.

She also mentioned the bulletin and said that it was circulated to all who had contributed a dollar or more. When advised there were some who had contributed who were not receiving the bulletin, she asked that their names be sent in so that condition might be corrected.

Mrs. Good spoke of the essay contest for students in high school. She did not feel grade nine was too early a time to start education in cancer, but she was convinced that cancer could be taught in biology and social science classes.

Mrs. Good then told of the provincial news that was going to be issued. It would be circulated among directors and executives of local units. It would be mimeographed. She asked that the local unit submit news of all they were doing, whether or not it seemed important. She spoke of the emblem on the pin worn by Mrs. Dawson mentioned. She said there would be a full description of the pin in the next issue of the bulletin.

Mrs. Dawson then said there should be a delegate from the local unit at the convention. Resolutions should be in well in advance, she added. She impressed on the gathering that welfare cases should come to Vancouver with approval rather than arrive there without notification. The appointment should be made before the patient is sent, she said.

She also suggested a sub-unit should be established in Stewart, where interest was high. Also, she said, there should be a representative on the local board of all places contributing through this unit. Service clubs should also be represented on the board as well as larger companies in the district.

At the close of the meeting tea was served by the hostess.

Rain Record At Ketchikan

KETCHIKAN — July was slightly cooler and twice as wet as normal, according to the portmantly weather bureau report compiled from observations of the federal building by Irwin C. Smith.

Mean temperature for the month was 56.8 degrees, compared with a normal July temperature of 57.7. Highest temperature of the month was 79 on July 21, which is far from the 92 registered on July 19, 1912. Lowest temperature was 44, which occurred on four days. Weather bureau records show that on July 5, 1914, a low of 36 was recorded.

Total precipitation last month was 16.95, more than double the normal rainfall of 8.12 inches for July. The bureau's records show that July's precipitation has a wide range varying from 1.49 inches in 1920 to 28.06 inches in 1914. Rainfall July 23 amounted to 3.20 inches, considerably under the 4.87 inches which fell July 21 and 22 in 1944.

July's rainfall brings the year's precipitation to date to 77.27 inches, or 6 inches more than normal.

Second Birthday For Quadruplets

JOHANNESBURG — The Zulu quadruplets—three girls and a boy—who were under observation at the Bridgman hospital here for their first year, have celebrated their second birthday.

They are now being cared for at the Salvation Army settlement on the borders of northern Zululand. The matron of the small hospital there said that the four already visit the local school to play with other children, and are considered advanced, both physically and mentally, for their age.

Cliveden Hospital Opened To Public

TAPLOW, Buckinghamshire, England. Cliveden Hospital, built in 1940 by the Canadian Red Cross Society, threw its doors open to the public recently on a special visitors' day.

Summer School For Preachers

LONDON, Ont. Summer schools in religion are flourishing at the University of Western Ontario here and at the University of Toronto.

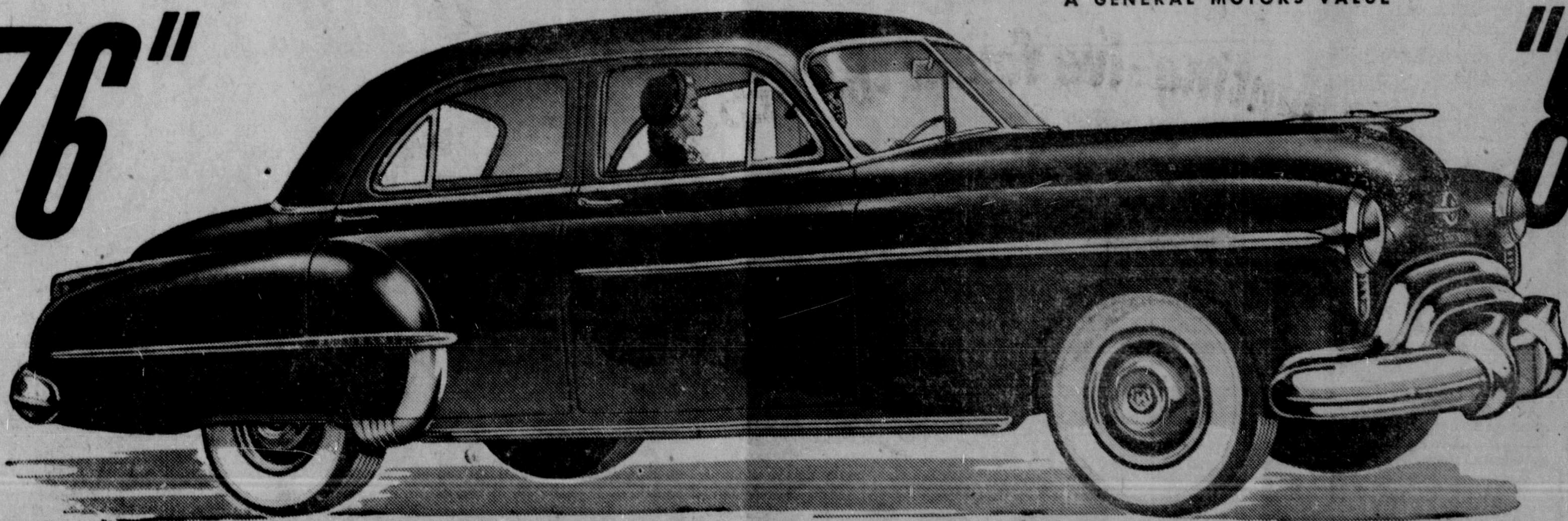

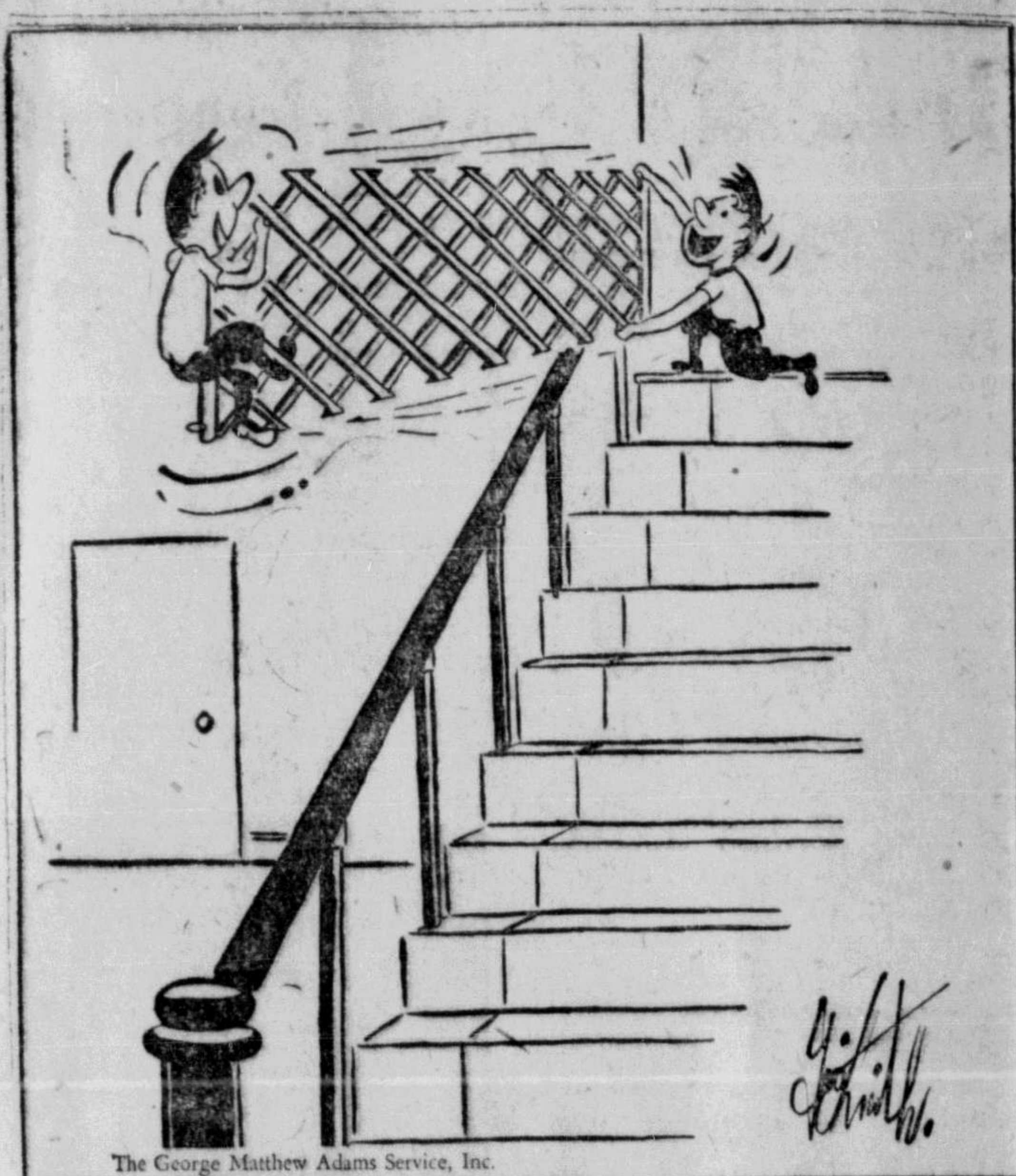

Nations Co-operate— Benelux Is Successful

THE HAGUE, (Reuters)—
Benelux—most detailed of the
many plans for international
co-operation since the war—is
a success.

The Benelux plan, aimed at
economic union between Bel-
gium, the Netherlands and Lux-
embourg, was put into effect
on an experimental basis a
year ago, with the idea that
full economic union should be-
come a fact by July 1 of this
year.

Although it has been neces-
sary to postpone the date of
the full economic union for a
few months, there has been no
coolingoff of the idea on the
part of the three countries.

It is now almost exactly five
years since the idea was sug-
gested of an economic union
between Belgium, the Nether-
lands and Luxembourg, under
the short and snappy title of
Benelux. After many trials and
tribulations, the pre-economic
union, or experimental period,
for one year began on July 1,
1949, thus setting the target
date for the full union at July
1, 1950.

There is little doubt that
this date would have proved
practicable but for the Belgian
political crisis over the royal
question, which virtually de-
prived Belgium of any real op-
erating government for the
months of March, April and
May—months vitally important
to the real introduction of the
full Benelux scheme of July 1.

The experts now are ready
with the administrative machi-
nery, but the constitutional
machinery, demanding a treaty
which must be passed by the
parliaments of all three coun-
tries concerned, is slowing down
the program.

Postponement Good
In some ways, a postpone-
ment for a few months may
prove to be all to the good.

One Dutch economist told
me: "a little delay now can only
produce good results, provided
that it is made clear that it is
due 'solely to constitutional
procedure and not to political
or economic expediency.'"

Although the pre-union has
been in operation for about a
year, it is still impossible to
prove that it has been advan-
tageous to all three countries.
The Dutch have had to pay
more for their gasoline and the
Belgians more for their beer.
This was the result of an agree-
ment by both the govern-
ments to bring their respective
prices for these commodities
nearer to a common level.

Yet gasoline is cheaper in
Holland than in any other
country in Europe. It is prob-
able that if the price had not
been raised under the Benelux
scheme, the finance minister,
faced with a deficit budget,
would certainly have looked in
that direction for more money.

It is admitted in Benelux cir-
cles here that the whole plan
was a long-term rather than a
short-term attraction and that
the man-in-the street must not
expect any sudden or spectacu-
lar changes in life or conditions.

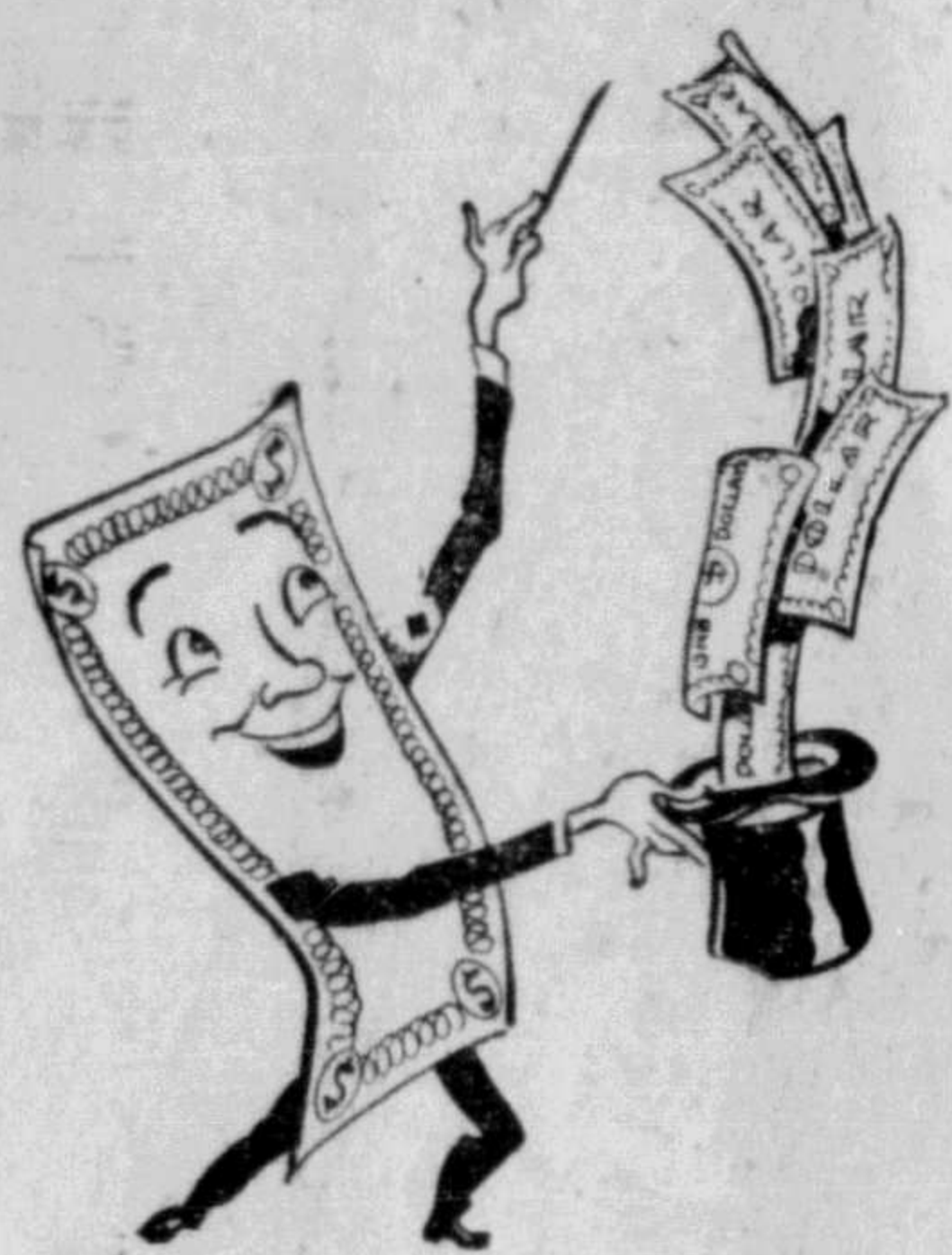
