## Nations Security Council Talk Adjourned

### Nations Move to Have Crisis Ironed Out; Delegates Propose 3-Month Truce

(CP)—The security council of the United Nations adjourned until Saturday or Monday in the Berlin question. Meantime, it is reported that neutral nations are trying to find some compromise over the matter between the United States and Russia. A three-month truce has been suggested.

Foreign Minister Molotov today announced that the Soviet Union had bid to end the dispute over Berlin. He said it was in 24 hours that he had talked with leading United Nations executives.

## War With Russia Ends Bluntly Now

(N. D.C.)—United Nations are to be casting their votes on proposals for ending the war with Russia. The day of softening the Soviet Union to a new period of peace is expected.

## Blind Teacher

Seventeen years ago William Joseph Johnson of Brantford lost his sight in an archery accident. Today he delivered his first lecture at University of Toronto as a teacher and lecturer. The interval represents years of hard work for the blind man to obtain an education which qualified him for such a position. He attended the Ontario School for the Blind, McGill University and finally Columbia University at New York. All his notes had to be taken in Braille and his examinations written with aid of a typewriter.

## B.C. Boat Founders

Malibu Inez, from Princess Louisa Inlet, Believed Lost on Cocos Expedition

(SAN DIEGO, CP)—A former British Fairmile patrol boat, converted to a post-war pleasure craft, is believed to have been sunk 800 miles south of here with loss of 14 lives. She was built in Vancouver and renamed the Malibu Inez. Having come from Princess Louisa Inlet, British Columbia, the vessel had left California last August to visit Cocos Island in search of pirate loot.

(WINDSOR, Eng.)—The Duke of Kent, who will be 13 on October 9, is one of the 120 new boys attending Eton College this term. The Duke is treated the same as other new boys and has to fag for a senior, i.e. clean his study, make toast and tea and run messages. He is attached to G. W. Nickson's House, largest at Eton, and sleeps in a large dormitory overlooking the football ground. The Duke of Gloucester also went to Eton. Other sons of King George V were educated for the Navy.

(STIRLING, Scotland.)—The Labor Party retained a House of Commons seat in this constituency in yesterday's by-election. Malcolm MacPherson won the contest with a 3,000 vote majority over a Conservative candidate, Col. William Forbes.

## Logging for Celanese Mill to Start Next Year; Plant to be Operating by 1950, Planned

Large scale logging operations in the Kitsumkalum River area adjacent to Terrace in 1949 and commencement of manufacture of acetate celanese pulp in the 250-ton plant at Port Edward in 1950 are the objectives of the Columbia Cellulose Co. Ltd. in the great new \$25,000,000 Celanese Corporation of America industrial undertaking.

Organization of the logging and plans for the delivering of timber by floating down the Kitsumkalum and Skeena Rivers are getting well under way.

The big engineering job of preparing plans and specifications for the huge Port Edward mill is nearing completion and within the next few weeks tenders for the actual construction work will be invited. Early next year it is expected the building will be under way. Orders for materials were let some weeks ago.

## DIXIECRAT VOTE COULD DEADLOCK U.S. ELECTION

### Due to Rebellious Democrats, Dewey and Truman May Not Get Majority in Electoral College

(WASHINGTON)—Rebellious southern Democrats who call themselves "Dixiecrats" are not likely to elect their candidate for president of the United States but they may cause an election stalemate.

In that case the choice of president for the next four years could be decided by the House of Representatives. The last time that happened was in 1825.

Southern Democrats bolted the national party organization in anger over President Truman's demand for equal treatment of Negroes and the inclusion of that demand in the party platform. The Dixiecrats have their own candidates on the ballots in 13 states and are trying to get on two more.

If they succeed in electing their candidates in those states, they would control about 160 votes in the "Electoral College" which legally and constitutionally elects the president and vice-president.

The winning presidential candidate must have a majority of the 531 electors in the so-called College—266 votes. Every vote lost to the leading contender makes it less likely that any candidate will get a clear majority.

Under the law, the "electors" are permitted to vote for anyone they please, regardless of the people's will but they always give the whole Electoral College vote of their state to the party winning the majority in the popular voting.

### FOUR STATES PLEDGED

In four southern states the Dixiecrats have received pledges from the Democratic candidates for seats in the Electoral College, that they will vote for some candidate other than President Truman. It certainly will not be for his Republican opponent, Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York, nor for Progressive candidate Henry Wallace.

Those four states, with a total of 38 electoral college votes, are Alabama, Mississippi, South Carolina and Louisiana. In addition, the Dixiecrat ticket of Governor Strom Thurmond, South Carolina, and Governor Fielding Wright, Mississippi, is on the ballot in Arkansas, Texas, Georgia, Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia, Florida, Kentucky and North Dakota.

### INTERIOR SAWMILL BURNS

## SEES LARGE SHIP ROLE

British Builder Expects More Like Mary and Elizabeth

(MONTREAL.)—One British shipbuilder who hopes to see more 80,000-ton ships like the Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth is Sir Wilfrid Ayre, now touring North American building yards.

Many believe that high costs of operation mean the end of the road for the big queens. But Sir Wilfrid, visiting here, said there are good counter-arguments to this line of reasoning.

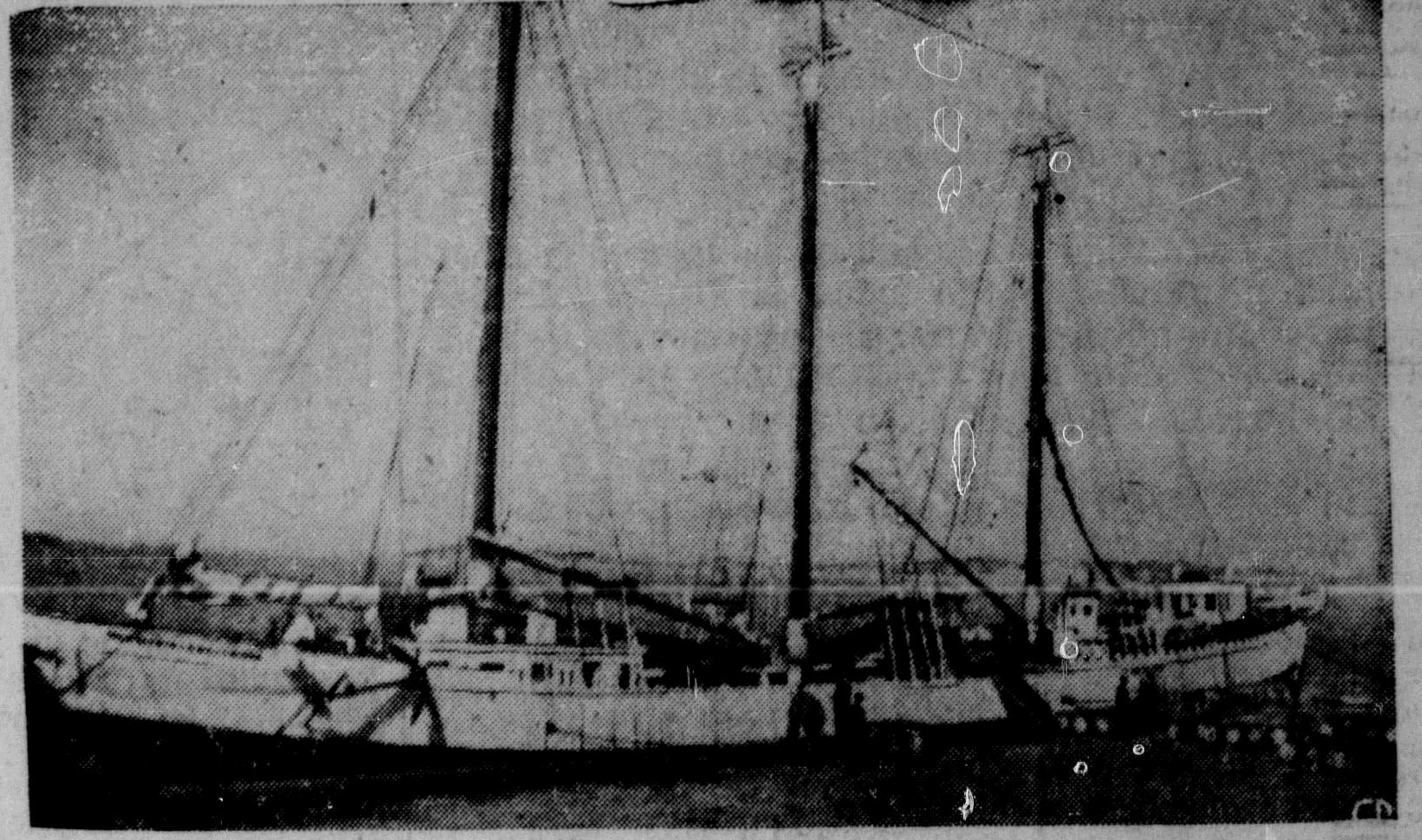
Costs have risen, he said—but so have incomes. Passenger rates have increased but there are more people wanting to travel today than ever before in history.

"Aircraft are all right for men in a hurry but when it comes to luxury and comfort, there's only one way to travel—by boat." Sir Wilfrid said that British yards, like those which turned out the two queens, now are building 50 per cent of all ships being produced in the world and thus playing an important part in Britain's recovery plan.

## RUSSIAN PRINCE IS FARM WORKER

(SWIFT CURRENT, Sask.)—A Russian prince, fleeing from his native land, has come to the Beaver Flat district near here to work as a farmer laborer. The prince is Alexander Hanandjisky, son of Grand Duke Andurski of Russia, who said he had been driven from country to country since 1916 and that his wife's whereabouts were not known since he was seized by the Communists. The 44-year-old prince said his ambition was to learn the Canadian farming methods and perhaps later establish his own dairy farm.

## Disgrace of Fire

AT A TIME when the housing shortage is most acute and when building materials for all classes of structure are at their lowest levels and highest prices, Canada has established a new all-time high of \$57,000,000 in fire losses.

Of the total of 52,931 fires which occurred in 1947 more than 38,880 caused damage to residential properties to the value of \$10,207,785. The total fire bill for \$57,000,000, was not only an increase of more than \$7,600,000 over 1946 but also an increase of \$13,000,000 over the average for the past five years. Added to this is the grim fact that in these 52,900 fires a total of 390 men, women and children lost their lives.

Thus we, as Canadians, continue year by year seemingly unperturbed, along the path of destruction. Through carelessness, or wanton disregard of sensible precautions we have built up in the past year the highest record in fire losses our country has ever known.

The remedy, and there is one, lies in our own hands.

Organizations spend much time and money expounding fire prevention and illustrating how carelessness can destroy human lives and valuable property. It has been shown that fire not only brings loss to owners of properties but affects the entire community. The destruction of mercantile and manufacturing properties results in unemployment and loss of wages, which brings hardships to the families of these whose jobs are lost through fire. Likewise the public must pay for these fires, because rates of insurance are based upon losses. Regional insurance underwriters' associations of Board companies throughout Canada maintain rigid inspection services which undoubtedly help to prevent unnecessary fires, yet losses continue to increase.

The time has come when we must pay more attention to the simple rules established for our own protection. Day by day in our homes, in our places of business, in our personal smoking habits we must exercise more care.

We must stop being careless with fire if we are to eliminate this national disgrace.

## SOMETHING IS ADDED

ONE DIFFERENCE between Prince Rupert as it is today and what it was ten years ago seems to be existing in hope and living in the realization of solid prosperity and the certainty of uninterrupted growth. There are new faces and new enterprises. The tone is quicker with an optimism and vigor it is a pleasure to note. None will react to this more readily than strangers. Their impressions cannot, but be agreeable ones.

## FRASER STILL DANGER

WHEN FRASER VALLEY flood waters subsided a few months ago, it did not mean danger had passed and there would be little or no cause to feel apprehensive with the coming of another springtime.

Today, as long established pioneers and later arrivals are doing their best to recover from the ordeals, losses and trials of 1948, some of the ablest engineers in the west are studying a problem that must be solved if ever there is to be real security. The Fraser Valley must be made safe for settlement. It is getting no where to say "there won't be high water like that again for perhaps ten or twenty years." The construction of longer, higher and stronger dikes is not the answer. The history of the Mississippi River proves it. The Fathers of Waters has been checked but, at best, all that has been accomplished in battling its power is far from what it should be. Suggestions about diverging the flow of the Fraser have been heard. But how much is a plan like that practicable?

### HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I prepare baked bananas, and how are they best served?

A. After bananas are peeled, place in a buttered dish, season slightly, then sprinkle paprika and butter over the top. Baked bananas are delicious when served with port chops or ham.

Q. How can I remove grease spots from a silk dress?

A. Sprinkle a little fuller's earth on the spots and let it remain over night. Oftentimes no further treatment is necessary.

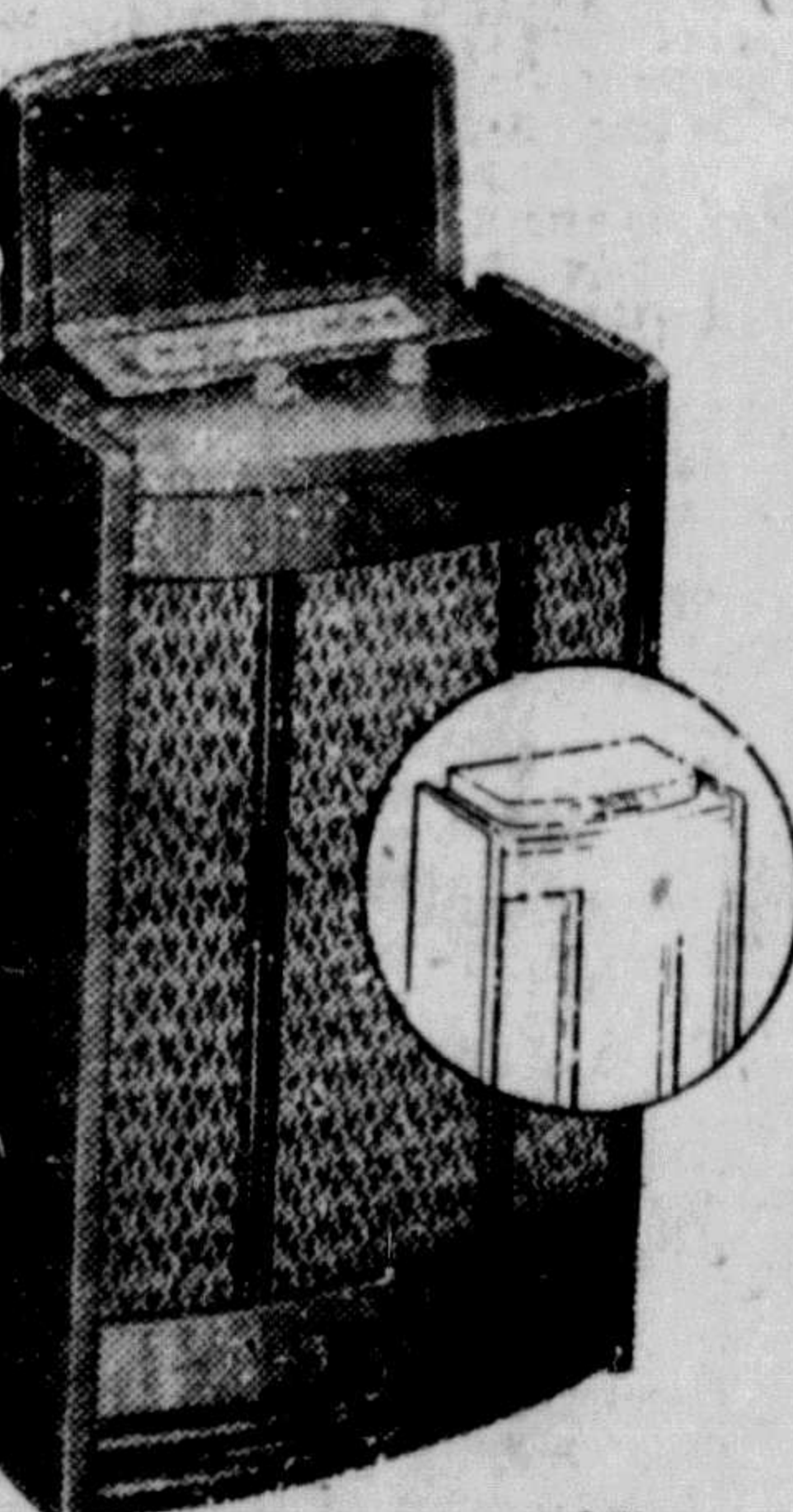

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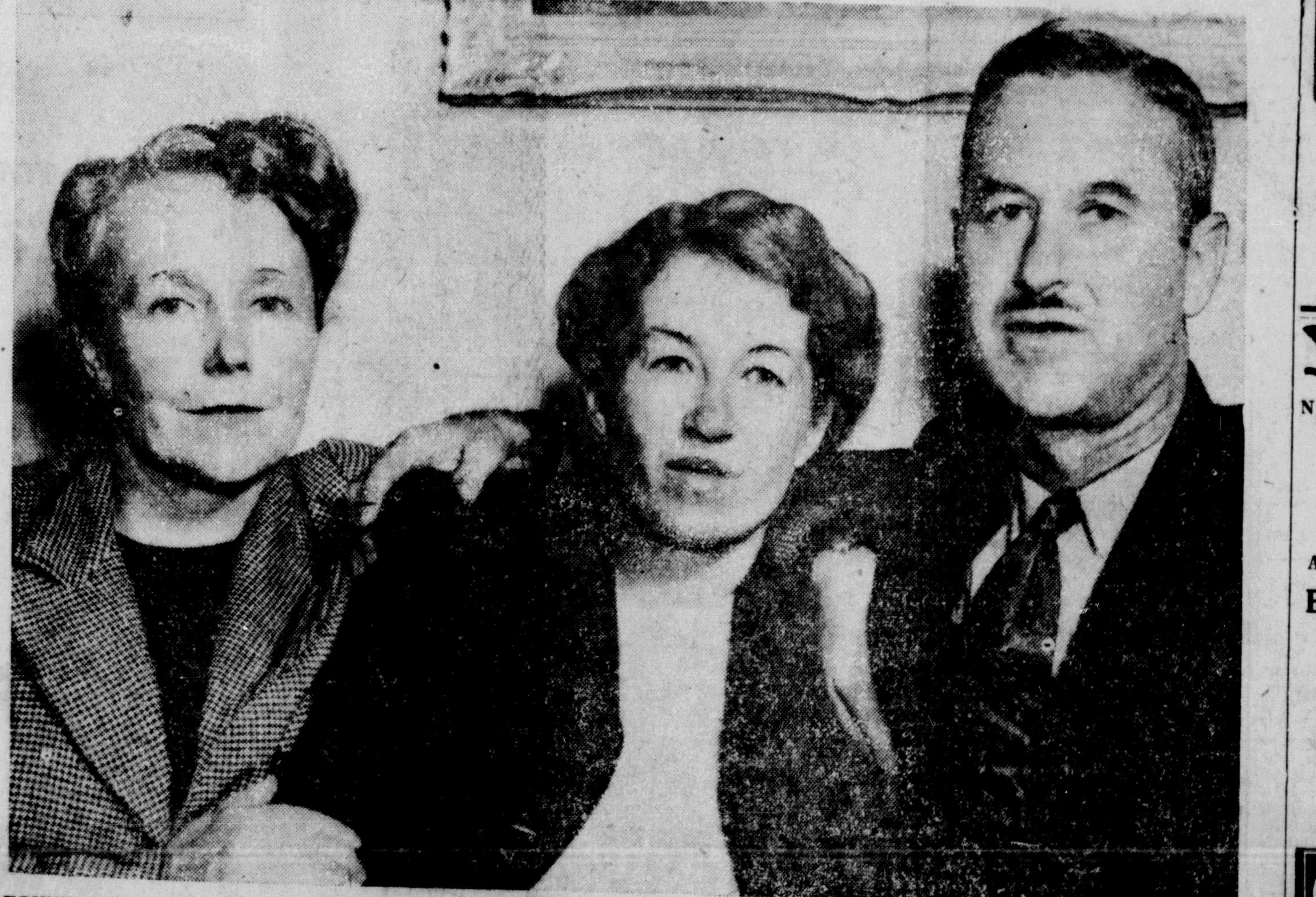
