

# United States Plane, 42 Aboard, Missing

## Widespread Search For Aircraft In North

Unreported Since Yesterday Afternoon  
On Anchorage-Great Falls Flight

TON ② — A United States Force C-54 with 34 crew members and eight crew members, has been unreported since yesterday afternoon. R.C.A.F. announced today. The plane was enroute to Great Falls, Mont., reported its position at 11:30 a.m. over Snag, Yukon, 200 miles northwest of Anchorage.

### Naval Power Not Suitable

Acting on a suggestion which was advanced yesterday, Lt. Cdr. J. D. McRae, commanding officer H. M. C. S. Chatham, communicated by long distance telephone with naval headquarters at Esquimalt as to the possibility of a warship being sent here to stand by for the protection of the port in view of the current water and power shortage.

Except for a small amount used for radio equipment, the naval craft at Esquimalt use only 220 direct current which could hardly be converted to the city's electrical requirements. And that would be in only limited amount. For fire protection or disaster relief, a formal request would, in any case, have to be made by the mayor, Lt. Cdr. McRae was advised.

### Lost Home On Wantage Road

Fire this morning totally destroyed the one room dwelling of Axel Olsen, Wantage Road. Firemen, called at 10:45, arrived on the scene to find the structure blazing fiercely with the owner standing helplessly nearby. Fire is believed to have started in the chimney and rapidly spread throughout the dwelling.

Extent of the damage has not yet been estimated but according to one of the firemen, who spoke to Olsen after the blaze, the victim lost a \$200 watch and a radio.

### NUB OF CONTRACT—

## What Original Agreement Says On Power Development

The nub of the 25-year agreement which was made March 1, 1929, between the City of Prince Rupert and the Power Corporation of Canada for the supply and development of power may be said to be contained in the following clauses from that agreement.

(16) The Company shall proceed at once with the further development of power other than Woodworth Lake, and will complete within two (2) years a hydro-electric development having a capacity of not less than 5000 H. P., but should the Company be delayed by act of God, fire or King's enemies, expropriation proceedings, or any cause over which the Company has no control, the said time for completion shall be extended for a period equal to the time during which the said cause operated to delay the Company in completing said works. The Company will thereafter complete further development until 100,000 H. P. or more shall be available for private or commercial use for the citizens and industries located within the City. Such further development shall be carried out and completed from time to time as prospects for the sale of power justify, and if the Municipal Council shall at any time require the Company to undertake further development at a time or to an amount which the Company shall not think the prospects then justify then the matter shall be referred to the Public Utilities Commission of the Province of British Columbia if such body shall then be in existence and if it shall be acceptable to both parties hereto; if not, then to the Water Board constituted under the Water Act of the said Province, and if such Board shall not be acceptable to both parties hereto then the matter shall be referred to arbitration as constituted under Clause 31 of this agreement and any such decision shall be final and binding on both parties hereto, and forthwith thereafter the Company shall undertake and complete such further development in accordance with such decision.

During the term of this Agreement or any renewal thereof the Company will supply at all times, according to the forms herein provided, the electric energy required by the Corporation and the citizens, for light, heat and power, and shall maintain a reasonable surplus to meet increased demands.

Music and Drama Syllabus Enlarged This Year

The first day of March will be the deadline for entries in both the music and drama sections, it was decided Wednesday night at an executive meeting of the Prince Rupert and District Music and Drama Festival Association held in the Civic Centre. The entry date was extended to accommodate participants who are having difficulty obtaining the required musical scores.

An enquiry was received from out of town regarding entry of a dancing routine. Adjudicator, Mrs. Johnson, from the Department of Education, will be contacted and, if adjudication is possible, a special non-competitive class will be added to the Festival program and local dancing teachers advised.

The Festival syllabus has been considerably enlarged this year. Among the additions are open vocal classes for both men and women. The Committee hopes that many local talented people will take advantage of this opportunity for vocal adjudication and, incidentally, provide varied entertainment. Entry forms will be made available at the Civic Centre office.

The Festival Association is seeking offers of awards to be presented to winners in some of the competitive classes. At present there are six challenge cup awards: the Mayor Arnold cup goes to the best senior actor; the Prince Rupert Co-op cup to the best senior actress; two Parent-Teacher Council cups to the best junior actor and actress; two cups from the Department of Education awarded for the best play and the top junior choir.

R. D. Cleland was elected chairman of the Program Committee this year. Assisting him will be Henry Pluym, Mr. Strebe, Mrs. J. S. Black and Canon Basil S. Prockter.

### Would End Coal Strike

Lewis Renewing Negotiations With Operators of Soft Coal Industry

PITTSBURG ②—John L. Lewis today agreed to renew contract negotiations at the invitation of the strike-plagued United States soft coal industry. It was the first concrete development of the year toward ending frequent coal walk-outs which have pestered the country for months and cut fuel stockpiles to the danger point.

More than 80,000 diggers are now idle in a "no contract, no work" strike in six important bituminous-producing states and unemployment in allied industries like steel mills may reach 180,000.

Lewis said he will meet northern and western operators in Washington February 1. That is the date by which the United Mine Workers' chief must reply in Washington federal district court to the National Labor Relations Board petition for an injunction against Lewis' three-day work week.

### Local Club Outstanding

Lieutenant Governor Pays Tribute In Installing Local Gyro Officers

Prince Rupert's Gyro Club is one of the outstanding ones in the international organization and the services which its members render not only to their own club but in the affairs of the community are well known abroad. Lieutenant district Governor Jack Higginbotham of New Westminster told the local club at its annual installation dinner Wednesday night at Annunciation Hall. The Prince Rupert club, he also noted, was now one of the pioneer Gyro Clubs. Twenty-seven years old it had been twenty-ninth of a chain which now numbered 109. District No. 4, to which Prince Rupert belongs, was the largest of all Gyro districts in number of clubs and members and it was growing solidly. Mr. Higginbotham expressed hope that Prince Rupert would be well represented at the interim conference to be held next month in New Westminster and at the international and district convention at Banff in June. Prince George and Duncan were cited by the lieutenant governor as two of the outstanding new clubs in Gyro.

During the evening's proceedings, Mr. Higginbotham installed A. J. Dominato as 1950 Gyro president, succeeding M. C. Brydges. ## Power Situation

THE POWER SITUATION in Prince Rupert is going to be a live issue for discussion from this time on. The application of the Northern British Columbia Power Co. for an early decision as to the renewal of its franchise brings the matter to the fore. The current power crisis, in which the company has imposed restrictions which are being accepted with none too good grace by some although they are being patiently borne by others because there appears to be nothing else to do about in the meantime, sharply accentuates the discussion.

The News, a correspondent suggests, subscribed to an accusation by the manager of the power company that the people were not co-operating in the matter of conserving power in the face of the acute shortage. What the Daily News did do, as a matter of fact, was endorse the appeals and warnings for power conservation, urging that they be heeded as the only recourse in the emergency. It was certainly no "verbal spanking" to the citizens but a friendly suggestion to meet a seriously developing situation.

There was no suggestion or intention whatever to discuss the whys and wherefors leading up to the situation or to blame or defend the Power Company in view of the crisis which has arisen more seriously this winter than it did last and which might occur again.

We have had these situations during two successive winters now and it could be multiplying into a normalcy. The citizens can reasonably enough desire and anticipate that measures are taken for assured and adequate protection against natural conditions which are to be reasonably expected.

We have been bemoaning the inadequacy of our water supply since it has high failed us on more than one occasion recently. Questions may be fairly asked, when the power, for any reason, fails to meet the situation.

Power has been added to water as a major issue for public discussion in Prince Rupert and we shall be hearing a lot about it from now on. We hope that the discussion will not be confined merely to wild and irresponsible statements around the street corners or in the gossiping circles.
