### Vancouver and Medicine Hat See Strange Aerial Objects

VANCOUVER-The superintendent of operations at Vancouver airport reports having seen at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon an object, shaped like an ice cream cone and which he believed to be about 150 feet long, flash into the sky from the west at an estmiated altitude of 2500 feet. It passed over at great speed. Many Vancouver citizens reported seeing what they believed

to be "flying saucers."

At Medicine Hat, Alberta, at midnight a "v-shaped object" was reported seen a great distance from the earth on the bright and clear night moving rapidly overhead. Suddenly, it veered upward and disappeared into the heavens.
