##### Synopsis

A thin layer of cloud moved into the southern section of British Columbia overnight but the rest of the province remained relatively clear. Frost was reported in the northern Cariboo and in the Prince George-Bulkley Valley region.

There will be an increase in cloudiness during the day over the northern coast with the approach of another weak disturbance from the Gulf of Alaska. A few showers are expected in this region overnight. Some cloudiness will spread to the southern coast tomorrow but otherwise the weather over the province will be unchanged.

Police said "on the face of it" 30-year-old Leonard Spence killed his wife, her sister and then shot himself. He also fired shots which seriously wounded his mother and father-in-law.

EXPECT "CONFESSION"  
WASHINGTON — The United States will not be surprised if Moscow eventually produces an alleged confession from a purported crew member of the American Navy plane lost in the Baltic, April 8. A government official said it was on a basis of what he asserted to be American "knowledge" that Russia made prompt efforts to salvage remnants of the plane, to pick up its occupants, dead or alive.

Woodworkers In Portland Strike  
PORTLAND — About 8,500 lumber workers struck today against the huge Weyerhaeuser Lumber Co., but the rest of the Northwest lumber industry continued operations. Weyerhaeuser was the only major lumber operation not to have reached a settlement with the International Woodworkers of America (C.I.O.) when the union's strike deadline arrived this morning. The deadline in British Columbia operations is June 15.

### Land Plane Takes Off

What was to have been a trial run turned into an actual take-off at 12:35 noon today as Ralph Pott, controller with the Civil Aeronautic Administration at Annette Island, Alaska, sped his light Cessna 140 into the sunny, cloud dotted sky. Take-off space was about 300 feet at the C.P.A. Seal Cove airbase runway.

Pilot Pott gunned the motor at the far end of the hangar and was going to try for a trial run. But, apparently, he changed his mind when one of the wheels lifted. It appeared as if he was going to bring the plane down, but he continued until the light craft was airborne.

He swerved to the left slightly as he nosed the plane in a north easterly direction. It was a good take-off.

Pott and Companion Bruce Ingalls, Communications chief with C.A.A. at Annette Island, made an emergency landing at Seal Cove Saturday afternoon after running into bad weather near Dundas Island. They were on a flight from Arlington, Washington.

This morning, a Taylorcraft, equipped with pontoons, landed at Seal Cove to pick up Ingalls. It later followed the Cessna to Annette Island.

"O Canada" in Place Of "Rule Britannia"

OTTAWA — Strains of "O Canada" have been selected to replace "Rule Britannia" as the formal salute of Navy bands to the chief of Canadian Naval Staff, the Naval Board of Canada, Admirals of the Fleet, Admirals, the Commander in Chief, naval headquarters announced yesterday.

### Two Women Are Injured

A broken steering wheel in a vehicle driven by Manuel Heise, 1152 Seventh Avenue East, Sunday night, sent two women to General Hospital with cuts, bruises and abrasions. Mr. Heise's wife and her mother, Mrs. A. Greenwood, were occupants of the car which sped over the Seventh Avenue East embankment at McBride Street. Mr. Heise escaped injury.

The accident occurred shortly after 9 p.m. The vehicle was travelling towards Seal Cove. Mrs. Heise sustained very bad cuts on her knee and nose. Mrs. Greenwood received a fractured ankle, fractured wrist and fractured rib.

The condition of both women is reported as satisfactory.

river, in St. Boniface, it forced 5,000 Manitobans from their homes.

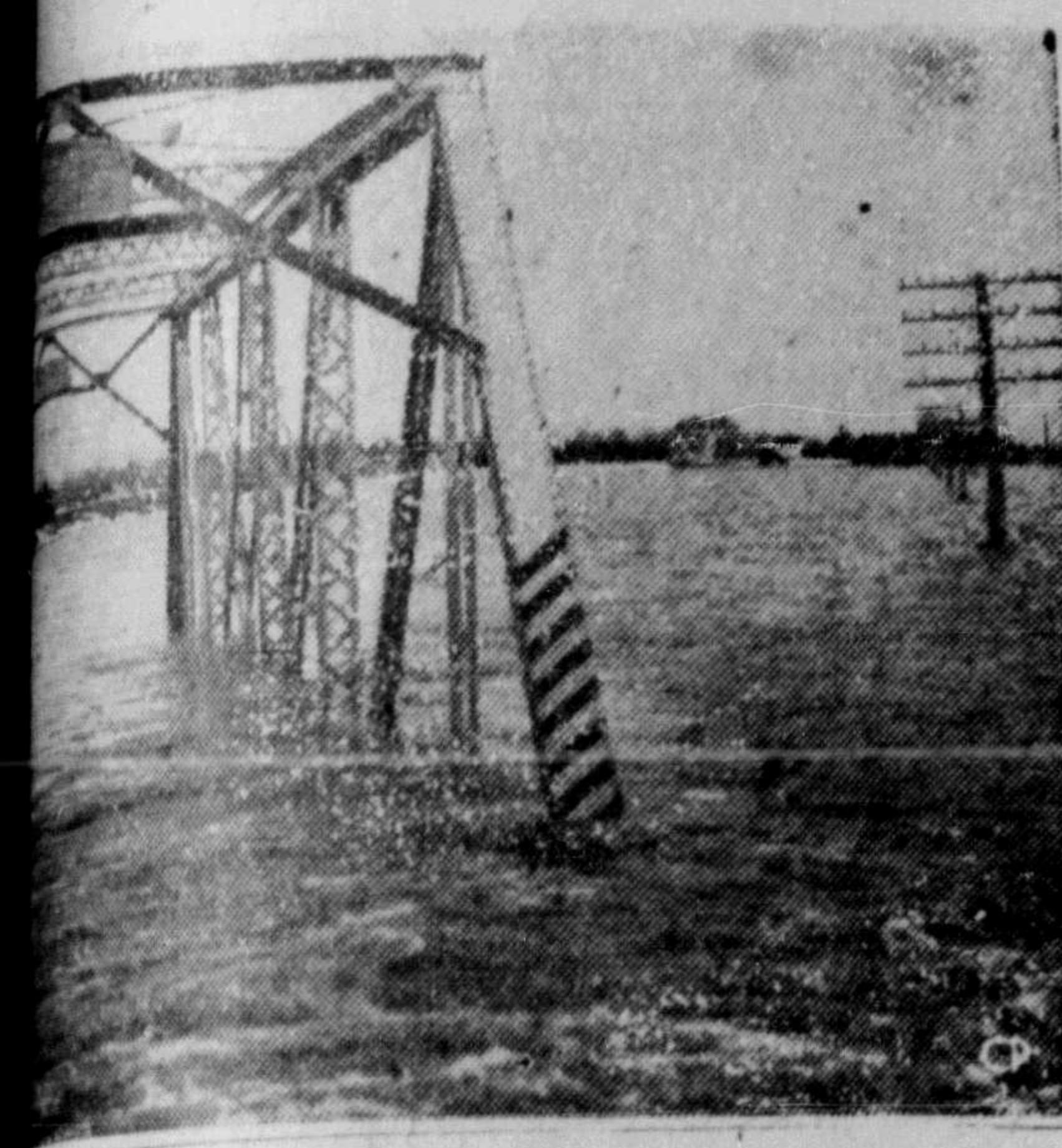
The exodus, the third in three days from places in the metropolitan area, was the latest chapter in the migration — the most extensive in Canadian history.

### Interior Air Seeks Licence

OTTAWA (Special to Daily News)—Application for a licence for Central British Columbia Airways for an air service between Prince George and Terrace, with intermediate points, is now before the Transport Board. The parties interested are

until June 5 to make representations. Applewhite M.P. is in close touch with the board.

Central Airways is applying for permission to operate air mail and express service from Prince George, Vanderhoof, Burns Lake, Woodstock and Terrace to operate by visual flight until such time as facilities have been fixed at which time fixed wing aircraft would go into effect.

Such a service was approved at the annual meeting of the Associated Trade of Central British Columbia at Smithers.

### Scientists Leave Government Jobs

OTTAWA—An official of the Atomic Energy Control Board, one or two foreign scientists have left the Government scientific organization in the last two years for scientific work. However, he later returned to the big atomic energy project not involved.

Dr. J. H. Coombs, physicist in the atomic project as well as in radar, superconductivity and vital research, much of which was military in nature.

OTTAWA—The Bell Telephone Company of Canada has applied to the Board of Transport Commissioners for permission to boost rates on an interim basis effective June 1. The proposed higher rates are designed to increase the company's telephone service revenues in Ontario and Quebec by about 20.6 percent. The requested rate boosts are for the full amount now being sought on a permanent basis by the company in its main application before the board.

### Brooke Tells Why Ireland Divided

OTTAWA—Prime Minister Sir Basil Brooke of Northern Ireland said that differing loyalties, religions, standard of living and economies will perpetuate the division of Ireland into two parts. He told a press conference the majority of Northern Ireland's 1,300,000 people see no reason why they should join a southern Ireland whose living standards were lower and whose republican form of government was in direct contrast to their loyalty to the Crown. Sir Basil is in Canada on a three weeks' visit.

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## Need of Airfield

W. R. MAY, director of research for Canadian Pacific Air Lines, has been in Prince George recently, his business there reportedly having to do with the possibility of inaugurating a commercial air line service between Prince George and Prince Rupert. Such a service would not only be useful in connecting up the two principal and growing centres of central British Columbia but would also bring Prince Rupert closer with the transcontinental air lines by way of Prince George, Fort St. John and Edmonton.

At the same time as this is going on, an application of Central British Columbia Airways for an east and west service in central British Columbia between such points as Prince George, Burns Lake, Smithers and Terrace, which was accorded the blessing of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia at its convention in Smithers last fall, is before the Air Transport Board, an advertisement giving the parties interested until June 5 to make representations.

Another indication of the growing interest and importance of air service in the business of the expanding north country is the arrangement, as announced Saturday, for an air mail service between various Queen Charlotte Island points.

With all this going on, further strength is lent to the case of Prince Rupert for the establishment here of a landing field, the city being already notorious for the fact that it is the only city of comparable size or importance in all of Canada which does not have such a field.

During the week-end, there was a practical demonstration of the need of a local air field when a wheeled aircraft, flying from Washington to Alaska, was unable to reach Annette Island because of adverse weather conditions and, in the emergency and by the grace of God, was able to make a safe landing on the tiny strip at the Seal Cove seaplane base. There might have been a serious crash in that incident. Indeed, one appears to have been expected. Over and above all this, the desirability of a direct air service between Prince Rupert and Vancouver becomes more and more apparent, particularly now that traffic is increasing to such an extent that C.P.A. has found it advisable to inaugurate two flights a day on some days of the week. The time-wasting detour by way of Sandspit, which sometimes even involves overnight hold-ups, is an irritating diversion.

Prince Rupert's case for a landing field is getting stronger every day and it is well that the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce has an active committee which is constantly keeping it to the fore. Grant MacConnachie, president, and other important officials of C.P.A. will be visiting Prince Rupert shortly in the course of a tour of all the company's operations throughout the country. That will give us a chance to advance our air field case in high and influential circles although it is well known that C.P.A. for some time has been active in the campaign for an air field here.

## BETTER DEAD THAN ALIVE

NOW that the Alberta Siamese twins have died during the course of an operation for their separation, there will be discussion as to whether the operation should have been undertaken. Of course, had they lived, there would have been approbation for the undertaking and high laudation for the surgical skill involved therein.

Without the operation, the twins might have gone on living. As it was, the surgeons who performed the operation said it had a 50-50 chance of success or failure. There is always the risk of failure in surgery, although in the most of cases today the risk of such failure is very low. Some times, of course, the risk may be high but the operation is the only chance.

In the case of the Siamese twins, their congenital handicap would never have permitted them enjoying normal life. They would have always been curious freaks and the subject of morbid curiosity. Unless separated, the commonsense view could well be that they were better dead than alive.

But how come that the inspired prophets whose words are preserved in the Bible, and who lived thousands of years ago, could picture the lion, eagle and bear of today?

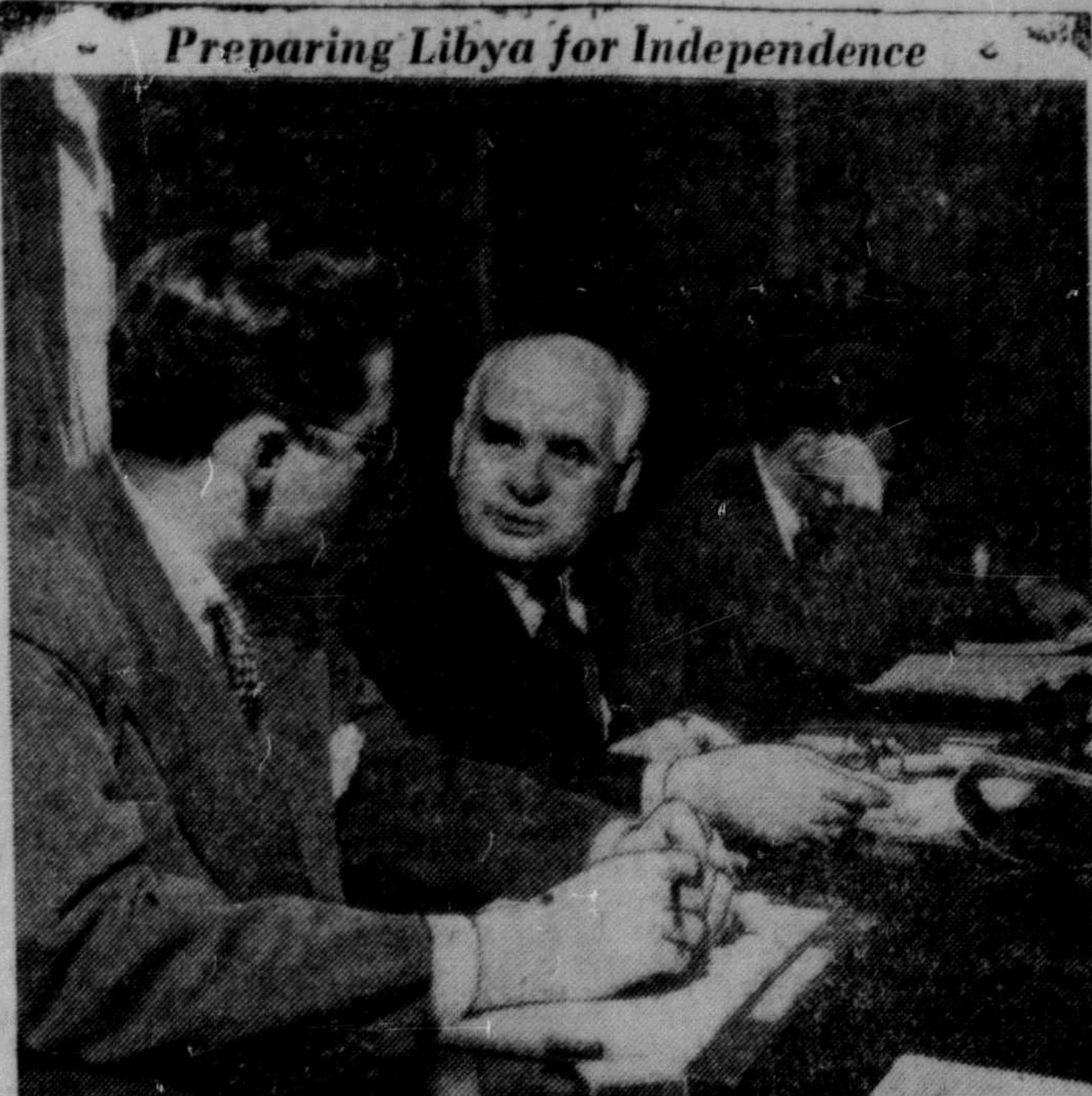

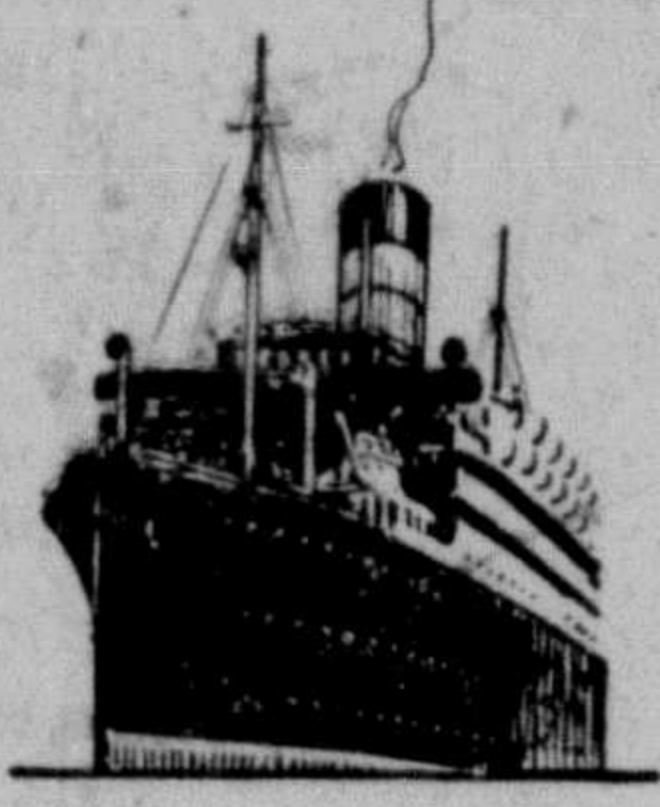

**New Tank Ship  
On This Coast**

A new tank vessel will make its appearance along the British Columbia coast this season with the acquisition by Frank Waterhouse and Co. of Canada Ltd. of the 182 ft. motorship Argo from the Pacific Navigation and Trading Co. of Seattle. The vessel, of 800 tons deadweight, will be used for carrying caustic to pulp mills along the coast and taking fish oils from various plants. The vessel has 240,000-gallon tank capacity. Work of reconditioning the vessel is starting this week at Vancouver.

The Argo, which is expected to be renamed Argus, will handle traffic formerly handled in the tanks of the dry cargo vessel Southholm, which was recently decommissioned, and the steamer Nootka which is shortly to be retired from service. It will also provide accommodation for increased varieties of liquid cargo on various Frank Waterhouse freight routes.

The Argo was built at Oakland in 1944 for service of the United States Navy in the South Pacific.
