Two Hundred Million Dollars In Windfall for Prairie Farmers

OTTAWA ()-Announcement of a financial windfall of nearly \$200,000,000, injecting new purchasing power into retail trade channels in Western Canada, is expected shortly for 225,000 prairie wheat producers. It works out at roughly \$800 per producer.

This huge sum will come when initial wheat payments, retroactive to 1945, will be increased, possibly boosting the payment from \$1.35 per bushel to \$1.60 and possibly more.

U.S. Tanker Says Leak Under Control-British Vessel In Serious Trouble

NEW YORK (P)-An American freighter radioed today that she had a crack in her hull and was taking water fast in rough seas 800 miles east of Newfoundland but later she sent out a message that she was holding her own.

The vessel, the Pierre S. Dupont, operated by United States Lines, carries a crew of about

HOSPITAL FINANCES

N THESE DAYS of rising costs, an increase of 50c per day in the basic rate of the Prince Rupert General Hospital, as announced today, cannot, it must be admitted, be considered excessive although, like all the other rises, it contributes to the cumulative increase in the cost of being and keeping alive. It leaves the rates at the local hospital still lower than in many of the hospitals of the province.

Fortunate, possibly, is the Prince Rupert General Hospital that its deficit for the year 1947 is no greater than \$6181.69 which is already offset by a special 30c per day grant which the provincial government has made to apply against the extra cost of operating during the last six months of 1947 and which for the local hospital amounts to \$2390.40.

Good management and the fact that the hospital did not have to bear all the overhead it might have had there been plenty of nurses and the nth. degree of service been given helped to keep the costs down and the loss within such reasonable bounds.

Meantime, Prince Rupert General Hospital patients are probably getting as good value for their money as is given in other hospitals with their higher rates.

And here a word of appreciation might not be out of place for the special provincial government grants amounting to \$550,000 for all the hospitals of the province. This lump grant is broken down into two parts—\$250,000 covering an additional daily allowance of 30c on the existing per diem grant and \$300,000 for hospitals with major deficits and which are in a critical financial position. In the former grant Prince Rupert Hospital is sharing.

VV long range view appearing on the up and up these days, even greater unity, vigor and concerted effort will be necessary in the promotion of community interests from the business standpoint. For the good of the city in which they make their livelihood, for the advancement of mutual interests and for the satisfaction to be derived from taking part in unselfish community work, these people and others should without further delay get into the Chamber of Commerce which has done fine work in the past and which has big jobs yet to do.

The Chamber should meet with spontaneous response in its drive for membership which business people, at least, might well consider both a privilege and a duty.

FOR HELP OF CHILDREN

EMOCRACY in many countries in Europe and Asia is rocking on its heels. Unless help is immediate, democracy will

fall on its face.

The Canadian Appeal for Children is seeking to right future wrongs where righting should first take place—the children.

Estimates place the number of children who need help in Europe and Asia at over 400,000,000. These children have survived man's most determined efforts to kill them. Many are homeless, thousands fill orphanages, and if hospitals were available, their number would cram the wards.

These chilldren must be fed. Example: In Greece a child's allotment of milk for three days is barely equivalent to what a Canadian pet kitten receives in one saucer.

It is the purpose of the Canadian Appeal for Children to feed these children . . . to nourish their starvation-bloated tummies and put weight where weight belongs.

It is the purpose of the Canadian Appeal for Children to clothe these children . . . to replace their sack-swathed feet with shoes which fit.

But the Appeal has further aims! Education received a Sunday punch when Hitler first hit out. Schools were left rubble and books were burned. Libraries were sacked and universities looted. The pieces were hardly worth picking up.

It is the purpose of the Canadian Appeal for Children to give education a lift. If education is to resume, re-tooling must be done for the process. It must start with chalk and pencils and blackboards and ink. Schools must be re-built and libraries re-lined with books. The fate of Europe and Asia in the next generation is being decided today. What today's children think and how they think tomorrow may shape the course of history. It is the duty of civilization to teach rights and wrongs. To teach the ways of democracy and the ways of peace-that is one purpose of the Canadian Appeal for Children.
