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### GOLF INTEREST HITS PEAK IN TOTEM FINALS

JASPER PARK LODGE — Never before was golfing interest at such a high pitch around these parts as it is today as a result of the semi final matches in the Totem Pole Golf tournament.

Bing Crosby, "Everybody's Friend," is meeting his pal George, Coleman, Miami, Oklahoma, over the 3-hole route for the Totem Pole championship. It has the large gallery goggle-eyed as both are tremendous golfers and close pals.

Next in point of general interest was the final for the ladies championship in which Mrs. J. C. Seawright, of Scarborough Golf Club, Toronto, defeated little Miss Dainty Chisholm, Royal Montreal Golf Club, Montreal on the 18th green.

The Montreal player took an early lead and maintained it until the 15th hole when the Toronto player staged a series of brilliant golf shots to cut down the lead hole by hole and won the next four holes in a row. The match was settled on the 18th green when Mrs. Seawright knocked in a birdie after Miss Chisholm had missed her second putt.

The finest display of golf ever seen in these parts was given by George Coleman, who was Oklahoma State champion in 1946. He was matched with Eddie Oana of Point Grey Golf Club, Vancouver and while Oana played close to par golf he didn't have a chance. Coleman was simply red hot and has six threes and three fours going out for a 30.

He was 5 under par at the turn and seven holes to the good. Oana won only one hole—the ninth with a birdie. It was tough for the Vancouverite, but it just was not possible to match the eagles and birdies that came so consistently.

Bing Crosby had a see-saw battle with the veteran Los Angeles player Carl Haymond. The match was not as good golf as the top half of the draw, but the good and poor shots were well distributed to keep interest at fever heat until the long 13th when Bing snatched a keen birdie with a 25-foot putt and won the next hole. The match ended on the 17th.

In the Coleman-Oana match, the Oklahoman started with a par four to win the first hole and then turned on the heat to such an extent that he won the

### Hungary Charges Former Leaders

BUDAPEST — The Hungarian government today accused eight former high-ranking Communists of treason and trying to overthrow the present leaders of Hungary.

The eight men—including former Foreign Minister Laszlo Rajk and Lieut.-Gen. Gyorgy Palfy, former chief Inspector General of the Hungarian Army—will go on trial on the indictment on September 16.

## Limited Help For Great Britain Appears Likely

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CP)—Great Britain appeared assured today of limited United States help in meeting its current dollar crisis. Long range aid, however, seemed likely to be slow in developing and would require congressional action on several major proposals.

### MORE AID TO FISH INDUSTRY

OTTAWA — Prime Minister St. Laurent indicated to a meeting of the Fisheries Council of Canada Friday that there will be more government aid to the fishing industry.

He said that he thought that both the federal and provincial governments could make "profitable investments in the industry to improve and enlarge its output."

### FISH CONSUMER PROGRAM URGED

OTTAWA — The Fisheries Council of Canada today suggested a nine-point program to boost fish consumption in the Dominion and help find new markets for fishermen.

### THE WEATHER

Snow is falling this morning in the foothills country of Alberta. In B.C. the cold air has spread to the valleys of the southern interior bringing clouds and rain showers. At Prince George where skies have cleared behind the advancing cold air the temperature dropped to 30 overnight. Frost is expected in the valleys of the northern interior tonight and temperatures elsewhere in the province will be much cooler than those of the past week.

As the American-British-Canadian economic conference entered its third day, American officials were reported reasonably confident that measures now under study will block the drain on Britain's gold and dollar reserves before the end of the year.

### GOV'T HELP IN HOUSING

OTTAWA — Housing construction is on the increase in Canada but government action to help solve the still serious housing problem is expected at the session of Parliament which opens next week. Indications are that Parliament will be asked to approve legislation that would eventually mean expenditure of millions of dollars to clear the way for low-cost housing.

It is believed that a housing plan has already been placed before the cabinet that would involve federal financial aid to projects to be administered locally—proposed by provincial and municipal authorities and approved by the federal government.

### GOOD PROGRESS IN HARVESTING

WINNIPEG — With favorable weather continuing, good progress has been made in harvesting western crops during the past week, according to the final crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

Many sections in all three provinces report delays due to showers or rains which are of little benefit to any crops which remain standing. They occasion bleaching and toughening of grain in swath or stock.

Weather was very hot in the Okanagan and all fruits are moving freely. Ninety percent of peaches have been shipped and packing of McIntosh apples has commenced. Although they are not yet released to market, all fruits and vegetables are in good demand and moving freely. No damage is reported.

## An Accurate Press

FA BIG CITY is lashed by a hurricane, destroyed by an earthquake or flooded by a river, the rest of the world learns about the disaster almost immediately. Radio stations flash special bulletins to millions of listeners, newspapers carry detailed information in a matter of hours. A few days later newsreels in the theatres thousands of miles away bring their audiences right up to the scene.

All of the newspaper reporters, radio correspondents and newsreel cameramen covering the subject agree that it is a hurricane, an earthquake or a flood. There the similarity ends, because a dozen reporters describing the same hurricane may produce an equal number of different accounts of damage and casualties.

When we look at the much more complex field of international relations, the viewpoints diverge even further, and sometimes dangerously so. Bad reporting or the omission of essential facts by a newspaper in one country can create a one-sided view of a delicate international situation. If readers in another country happen to get a viewpoint leaning to the opposite side, a dangerous seed has been sown, which may cause distrust and misunderstanding.

The press, radio and newsreel are powerful instruments of propaganda and their accuracy is a matter of utmost importance.

## OIL ON CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

"GREAT CORPORATIONS are building pulp and other industrial plants; other companies are looking to B.C. natural resources so that they might be utilized and British Columbia grow and prosper as a result," says the News-Herald. Then news has come from Victoria that Royalite Oil Co. is going to explore for oil in the wind-swept Queen Charlotte Islands out in the Pacific off Prince Rupert—lands for so long looked on as barren of everything but shellfish, totem poles and wild beauty.

Even the distant Queen Charlottes, it now appears, might well play their part in the astonishing growth of B.C. Quite rightly, Premier Johnson says, discovery of oil in the Queen Charlottes would be of immense value to this province. Such production, the Premier points out, would be so close to seaboard transportation that it would overcome transportation costs that exist in shipping oil from Alberta.

## SATURDAY SERMON

### BIBLE READING

(By REV. CANON BASIL S. PROCKTER, St. Andrew's Cathedral)

After a summer when you may have let things slip comes the time to recast your design for living and in this the reading of the Scriptures daily most surely has a place.

Or, if you have never done this by yourself, would it be possible to get together with a few friends or neighbors for a quiet time at regular intervals.

I have never been able to see much future in the Bible designed to be read as literature. There is only one way to take the Bible and that is that it contains what Almighty God in His Wisdom has been pleased to reveal to mankind, concerning Himself. You had better begin with the New Testament, but I have here a list of questions which could be used for any chapter in the Bible. These questions can teach us how to read the Bible and get something out of it, as the saying goes. They are also most helpful for anyone who ever wants to lead a Bible class. Taking one chapter at a time, these are the ten questions:

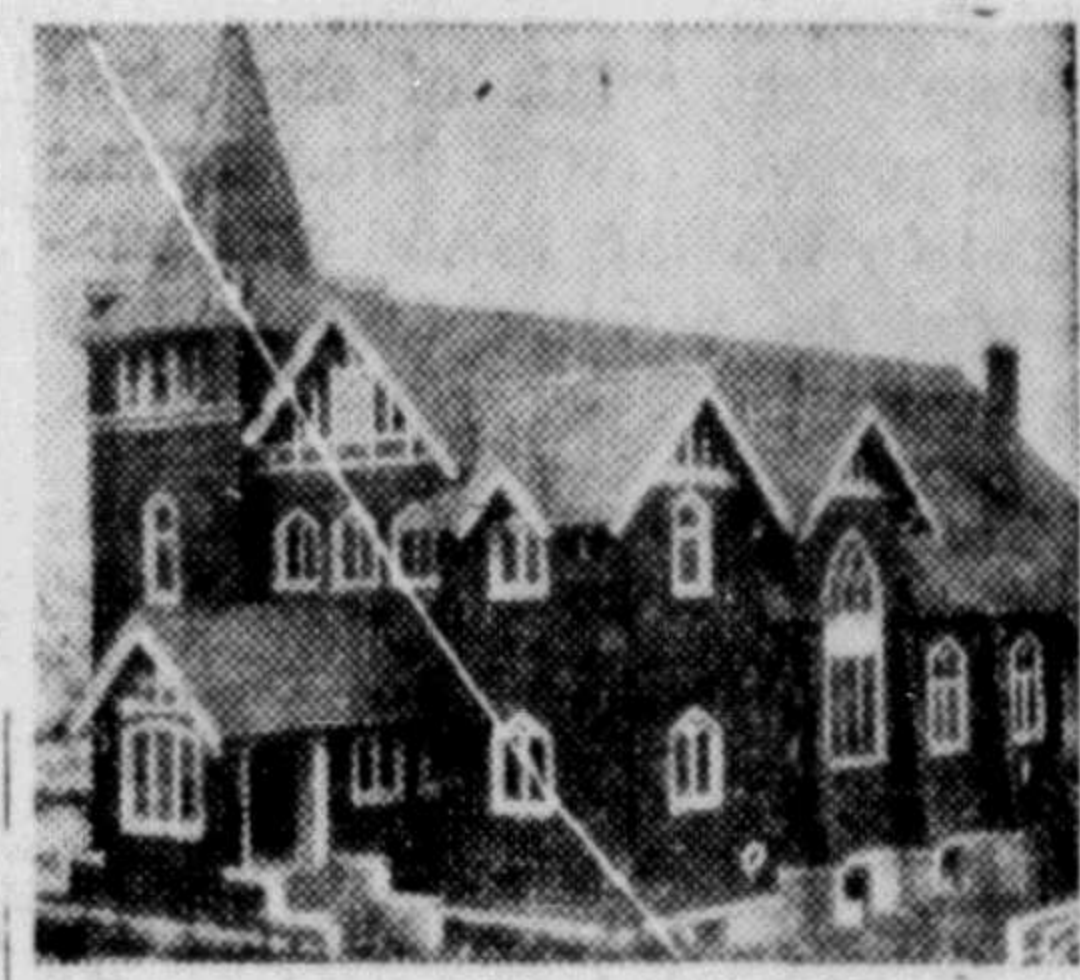
1. What is the Principal Subject?
2. What is the Leading Lesson to be learned?
3. Which is the Best Verse?
4. Who are the Principal Persons?
5. What is the teaching Concerning Christ?
6. An Example here to follow?
7. A Sin or Error to avoid?
8. A Duty to Perform or a Command to Obey?
9. A Promise to Claim?
10. A Prayer to echo?

It was my privilege while away this summer to meet a man and his wife whose home for many years has been open to a group of men who would come together to read and discuss a chapter on this basis. And neither one of them led the group. They got everybody in turn to do that. The ten questions are of English origin but are widely used today in many parts of the world.

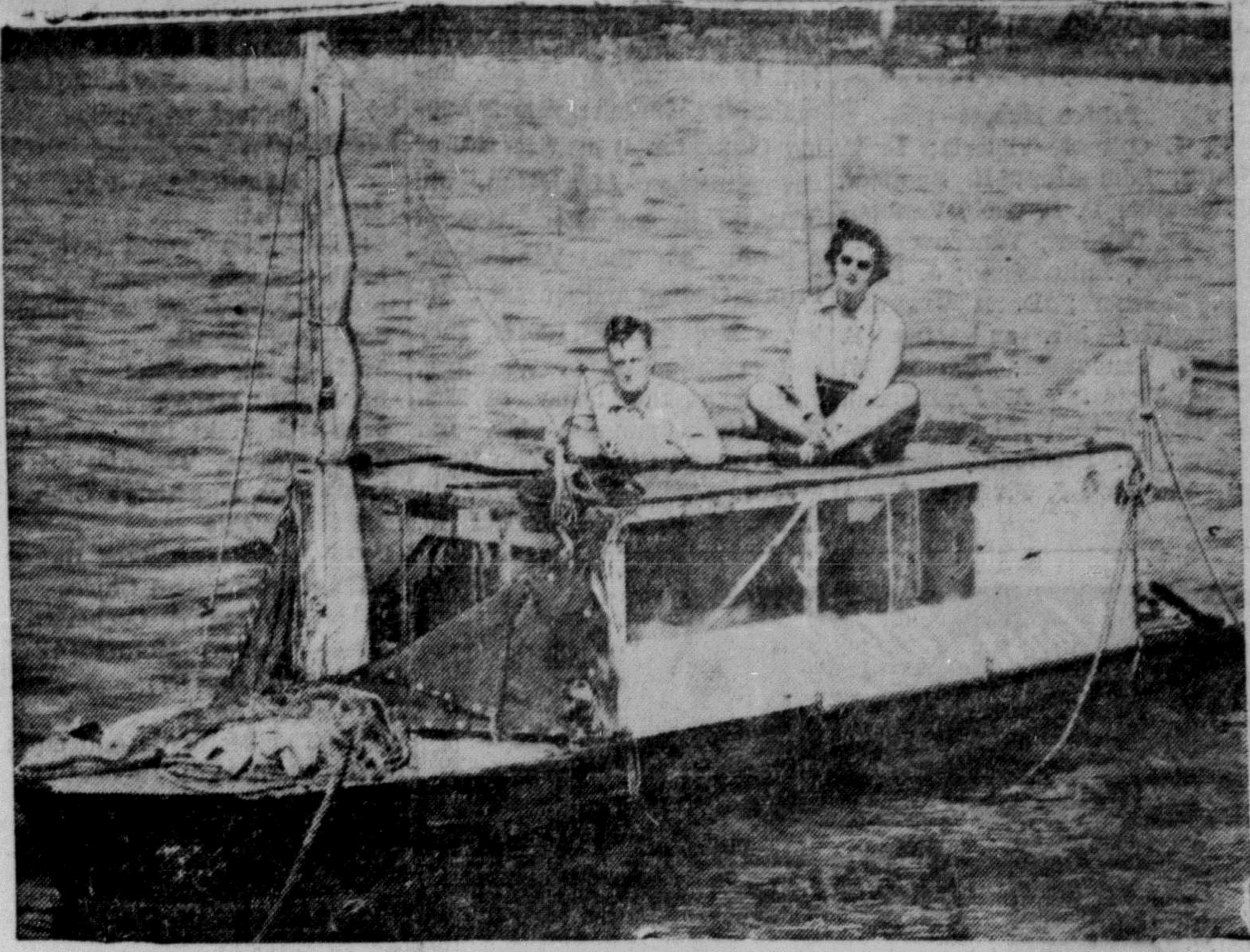
