VICTORIA (CP) First session of British Columbia's twenty-second Legislature prorogued yesterday after the 42 sittings held since it convened February 14. The House passed 103 measures and approved a budget calling for the expenditure of more than \$100 million in the year ending March 31, 1951.

"OPERATION AIYANSH" Five Patients Brought Out And Emergency Food Supplies Taken In

Queen Charlotte Air Lines hopes to complete by the end of this week a relief operation to the native village of Aiyansh, one hundred miles northeast of Prince Rupert on the Naas River, which has involved five ambulance and emergency food supply flights since the first of the week for the ice-isolated native community. Five patients were brought out, one of whom died.

The operation was arranged by Indian Superintendent F. E. Anfield on behalf of the Department of Indian Affairs, Superintendent Anfield and Dr. Charbonneau, resident surgeon of the department, flew into Aiyansh and found several of the natives there ill and requiring hospitalization.

On Wednesday Mr. and Mrs. Titus Nisiok were brought out but surgery failed to save Mrs. Nisyok's life and she expired soon after arrival in Prince Rupert.

One flight on Thursday brought out John Morven, Ena Ryan, a young woman, and Lloyd Woods, a four-year old boy, and a second had Stephen Claton, another patient, and Dr. Charbonneau.

Pilots Ken Sorko and Norman Gernyn operated Stinson seaplanes on these flights, taking food supplies for the villagers as they flew in.

Today or Saturday Pilot Roy Berryman with his DeHavilland Rapide will fly into Aiyansh with five hundred pounds of food.

The Naas River is still ice-bound between Aiyansh and its mouth but is clear for aircraft landing in front of Aiyansh village.

MANY WOULD BE HARBOR MASTER
Twenty-seven applicants for the position of harbor master at Prince Rupert are being called in for oral and written examination April 24 and 25, according to information received from E. T. Applewhite, M.P. for Skeena. There were other applicants who were not qualified to take the examination.

United States Navy Is On Hunt For It

EUREKA, Cal. (CP)—The United States destroyer Colahan prowled around the Pacific Ocean today hunting for a mystery submarine which was sighted five miles off Northern California. Planes were also searching.

The Navy, after listening with some skepticism to several recent reports of unidentified submarines in this area, took a more serious view this time. A Navy airplane pilot made the report which was substantiated by a fishing boat skipper.

Nothing can be done about submarines roving around beyond the three-mile limit but the Navy likes to keep track of them when they come so close.

There is only one United States submarine out on the coast just now and it left San Francisco yesterday, headed south.

Killer-Mother To Be Hanged

RIMOUSKI, Que.—Mrs. Elise Dube today was sentenced to be hanged July 7 for the "jealous" murder of her 17-year old daughter, Irene.

The 45-year-old woman was found guilty by an all-male jury last night of the shotgun killing of the girl as the climax of an all-night drinking party in her Matamoras summer home last April 5.

Crown witnesses said Mrs. Dube was jealous because youths at the party had passed her up to dance with her daughter, Anita, 18, and Irene.

The dead girl was described as the mother's favorite daughter. The French-speaking jury deliberated for seventy minutes before returning the verdict of murder.

THOMAS CONROY, TERRACE, DIES

TERRACE—Thomas H. Conroy, 73, rancher and prospector at Kalum Lake, passed away at his home in Terrace on Wednesday morning. Canada's Size Impresses Him Seen At... Civic Centre

It is only since I came to Canada that I found out how small Ireland is. I was surprised at the vastness of this country," declared David Murphy, relieving student pastor at First Presbyterian Church here, who spoke at a Rotary Club luncheon Thursday afternoon.

Mr. Murphy confessed he liked Prince Rupert very much but, he added, it comes second to Ireland. "It is very beautiful country," he said. "If a person from Prince Rupert went to Belfast, he would experience a similar climate."

Mr. Murphy described the terrain of the northern and southern sections of the country and mentioned certain particular beauty spots, attractive to the tourist trade.

Southern Ireland, which is an independent nation, he said, was slightly backward as compared to the northern section. Agriculture engaged 75 per cent of the people. In northern Ireland, he pointed out, this is reversed, with 75 per cent of the country engaged in industrial work.

The speaker told of Belfast, a city of 500,000 people, very industrial, with the linen industry, the largest rope works in the world and one of the largest spinning mills on the globe.

Much damage was done during the war, he said. He remarked that various accents are spoken in his section of the Island. But in southern Ireland, a distinct brogue is evident.

"A very beautiful accent," the minister said. Dublin is a tourist city. Situated in the lower half of Ireland, which did not suffer much through the war, the city is noted for its historical sights.

There is plenty of food in Ireland, he explained. Everyone is quite healthy. But there are no luxuriant dishes.

He explained that northern and southern Ireland are like two nations. In passing from one into another, a person must face the customs department.

He lauded the northern Irish government, stating that it pays good attention to children. "It is a better social security scheme than we have here," he said.

He was thanked by President Roy Van der Sluis, who remarked that he enjoyed Mr. Murphy's Irish accent, and hoped that he would remain in Prince Rupert for some time.

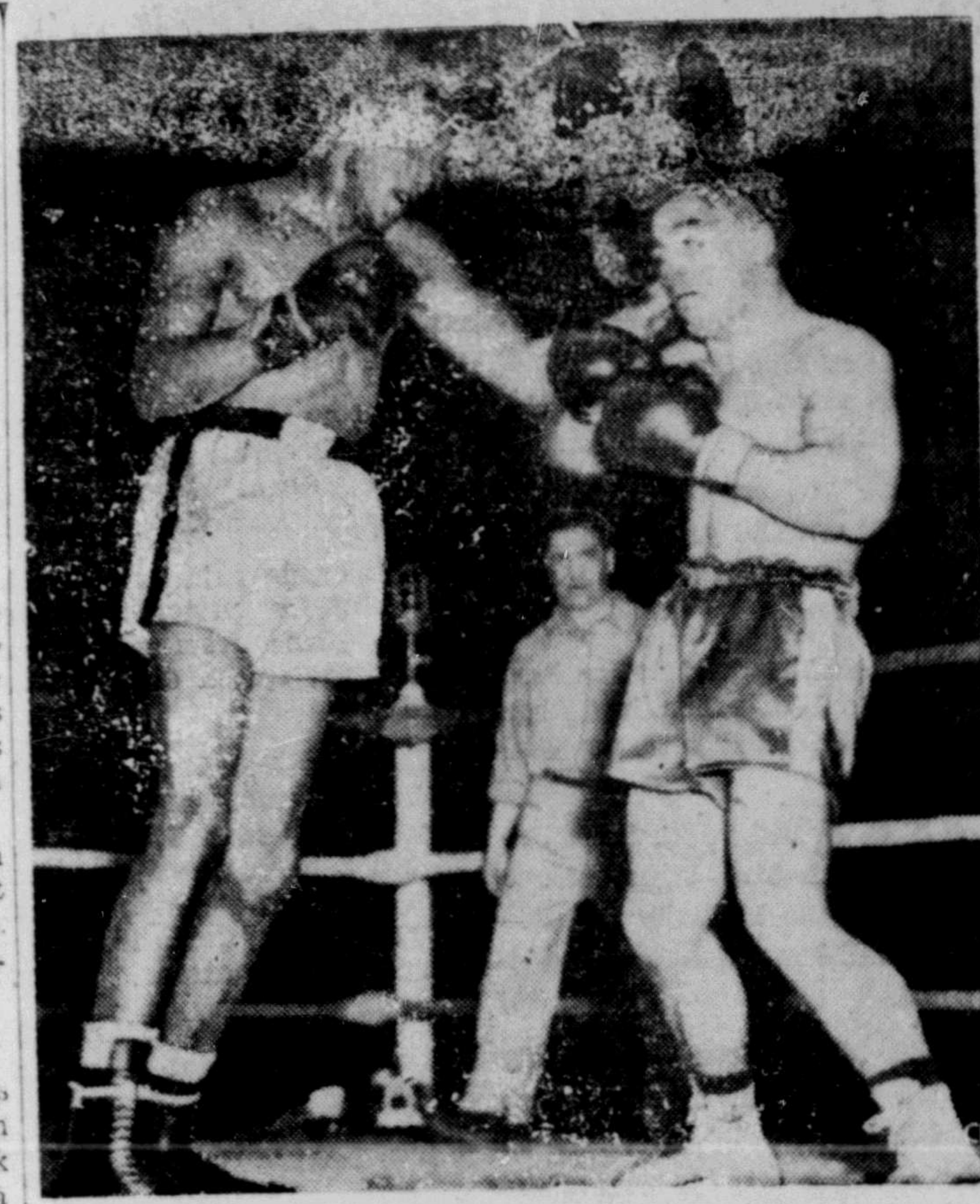
