We can think of nothing that would damage the general economy and business of the country more completely and more promptly than would a railway tie-up. It would be a very serious thing to be responsible for. The way things are shaping now, there is little doubt that the 90,000 railroad men for whom ballots are being prepared would vote in favor of strike. Unfortunately but none the less certain, they would probably turn out to be the worst sufferers themselves if a strike should come about and they would take many others with them into hardship and suffering through the cutting off of work and means of livelihood.
