Invitation From Ottawa On TransCanada Highway Welcomed by Western Provinces

OTTAWA-Premiers of British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan have indicated that their provinces will be represented at the Dominion-provincial conference to discuss the TransCanada Highway question, which Hon. James A. Mckinnon, minister of mines and natural resources, announces will be held soon.

At Victoria Premier Byron Johnson said British Columbia welcomed and would definitely accept the invitation. In fact he is already conferring with Hon. E. C. Carson, minister of public workrs.

Premier E. C. Manning of Albert and Premier T. C. Douglas of Saskatchewan also announced their provinces would be represented. Premier Manning did not indicate what route through the Rocky Mountains might be favored.

Chinese Premier 1234 Beaten By Budget

NANKING - Premier Won-Wen Hao's announcement that he will resign with his cabinet adds further to the woes of President Chiang Kai-Shek. The tiny premier, who accepted the post under protest, has twice already attempted to quit. He reported on the economic situation to the hostile legislative Yuan, admitting his efforts to balance the national budget were a "total failure."

Trans Canada Highway

TAKING OF THE INITIATIVE by the federal government in calling a conference with the provinces on the subject of a TransCanada Highway is an encouraging more, in line with other signs of active interest and appreciation which Ottawa has been manifesting of late in a matter on which it seemed so long to be indifferent.

Needless to say, the provinces will waste no time in accepting the invitation to the conference and preparing their representations.

Now that federal aid appears at last to be coming for the development of highways on a national basis so that the country may be able to exploit the growing tourist industry, much of the business in which it is now losing to the better roads of the United States, it is to be hoped that no sectional differences will be allowed to weaken the general representations such as disputes as to what routes are to be selected. We have already been warned that such disputes might delay action in the general accomplishment.

ish Columbia, it is interesting and reassuring to note, declared at the recent convention of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Vancouver that there were three routes through British Columbia and that the two which might not be chosen for federal aid in an over-all TransCanada highway project could count upon adequate attention from the province. One of the three routes referred to by Mr. Anscomb was the northern transprovincial highway terminating at Prince Rupert.

CANADA AND UNITED STATES

THE CLOSE ALLIANCE between Canada and United States in spirit was never better exemplified than during the recent presidential election campaign.
