REX BEACH

REVOLVER shot in the head has ended three vears of suffering for Rex Beach. He died at his home in Florida, victim of self destruction. He was a victim of cancer in the throat and had been told the case was incurable.

When all the world, as it seemed, was still thinking of the days of '98, or trying to devise ways and means of sharing in stampedes, Rex Beach, who had had a few adventures of his own, up north, began to write novels, reminiscent of scenes and events he, himself, knew about and which could be woven into readable yarns. Not only were they strong, racy stories, with touches of subtle humor, of which "The Spoilers" and "Silver Horde" were typical, the time was ripe for publishing. In prose, Rex Beach pictured the he-man, vigorpus north, as Robert Service had painted it in poetry. Rex Beach was in Prince Rupert one morning, returning from a voyage to Yukon and Alaska. This was twenty or twenty-five years ago. A courteous, sturdy, slow-speaking man, he smiled slightly when asked by an interviewer if he planned any new books. REATER consumption of sea food in Canada J is being encouraged by the Department of Fisheries, and it is about time. The seas that surge along her shores, the lakes and rivers within her borders provide a priceless natural resource and a vast industry for Canada. Yet the people of Canada to a large degree indeed, turn elsewhere for their daily bread. This is singular, yet true. Of course, we do eat fish, but nothing to what it

might be.

There must be an explanation! Cooking can be an art, or the murdering of wholesome nourishment. Serving can be a triumph of culinary grace and finesse, or a hurried, unclean, slap-dash process, unloved and unlovely.

Products of the deep-sea fleets can be exposed for sale in a way that attracts as well as repels. Some markets may be sloppy and cold, while others offer marine viands displayed with such taste and judgment that the article almost sells itself.

It is one of life's mysteries why the pronouncement ever went forth to the effect that fish should be consumed only on Friday. Surely, an appetizing helping of fresh boiled salmon, with sauce and baked potato, ordered on Saturday would not involve danger to character. Nor should it occur to anyone that enjoyment of a juicy, piping-hot halibut steak, on Wednesday, was contrary to law.

It is a stubborn fact that most of the fish caught in Canadian waters is shipped away. If the people at home knew more about the product, how to prepare it, and in a general way, give more study and attention to the job of increasing a demand, there would be small doubt as to the result. and the second second
