### AN AGREEABLE PROSPECT

A DECIDED IMPROVEMENT in Canada's hold-Tings of gold and United States dollars, announced by Hon. Mr. Abbott, Minister of Finance, will come as an agreeable New Year development, to Canadians generally. The holdings at the end of September had reached a total of \$854,900,000 as compared with \$501,000,000 at the same time a year previously. This gain results in the modification of certain restrictions, such as the lifting of import bans on \$100 worth of personal purchases and gifts, bought during a stay of 48 hours in the United States. Seeing that the import bans previously had covered about everything a Canadian might wish to purchase, this variation on the part of Ottawa comes as a matter of considerable satisfaction.



PEACETIME BLACKOUTS FOR ONTARIO-During the latter part of 1948 Ontario returned to the era of the lamp, lantern and tallow candles. Electric power, which before the war was abundant and cheaper than any other place in the world, is running so low that power authorities have had to pull switches plunging whole residential and business areas into partial on total darkness. However, the province has eight new power developments in the making such as this one at Aquasabon: which won't be in operation until 1950.
