### MacArthur Says Undeclared War With China Is Now On

Communists Gathering Forces for Assault On Former South Korean Capital

LONDON (CP)—Announcement of the coming meeting of President Truman of the United States and Prime Minister Attlee of Great Britain to consider the Korean crisis, with the possibility that French Prime Minister Rene Pleven may join them, appears to have eased the tension among the democracies.

### Fishermen's Co-op Meet

Grave Position of Oil Industry Cause of Concern

Grave situation in which the fish oil industry finds itself owing to the competition of imported Japanese oil and synthetic oil was emphasized in the course of discussion at yesterday's opening session of the annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative Association. Production of livers had dropped from a former 1,200,000 pounds per year to 200,000, the meeting heard. The price had dropped to almost one-third and now straight fishing for liver fish was discontinued, only liver being brought in being that incidental to other fishing.

With President Martin Erickson in the chair, the meeting heard detailed reports from the board of directors on 1949 and 1950 operations. The report of the Fishermen's Co-operative Federation was presented by the general manager, T. H. Sorenson, and was still under consideration when the meeting adjourned on last evening until this morning.

### Attlee - Truman Meeting Tuesday

WASHINGTON D.C.—The meeting of Prime Minister C. R. Attlee of Great Britain and President Truman of the United States will take place on Tuesday, it became known yesterday. Mr. Attlee is crossing from London tomorrow and on Monday will meet with the British ambassador to the United States and other officials.

### Conviction Here Has Been Upheld

VANCOUVER—Appeal of George McKnight, convicted at the April Assizes in Prince Rupert of breaking and entering, was dismissed Friday by the Court of Appeal here. He is serving a five-year sentence for burglarizing episodes in Prince Rupert during the Christmas and New Year season a year ago.

INGLEWOOD, California—Mrs. Charles Howard's Noor defeated Palestinean and Assault in the tune-up for the \$100,000 Gold Cup, coming up December 9. The horse raced the track in a record of 1:46.

### Marine Insurance Company Meeting

Revolutionary Decision by Co-operative Insurance Firm  
Pacific Coast Mutual Marine Insurance Co., a co-operative-operated concern for the handling of boat insurance, held its annual meeting Thursday and made what was described as a revolutionary recommendation—that non-co-operative members should in future be accepted for insurance. This, it was suggested, would clear up the problem of over-valuation of boats.

Harry Hanson is chairman and the new secretary, Harold Christiansen, made his first appearance. Mr. Christiansen is also secretary of the Vessel Owners' Association of Vancouver.

### Oil and Seed Outlook Good

OTTAWA—The 1951 outlook for oil seed crops in Canada looks promising, the federal Department of Agriculture says. The supply picture for fats and oils—except soy beans—has been changed. The report says that considerable change has taken place in the growing of vegetable oils between pre-war and post-war periods.

### Stranahan, Mayer Tie in Golf Open

MIAMI, Florida—Amateur Frank Stranahan and Dick Mayer, aged 27, a professional, were tied for the lead at the end of the second round of the \$10,000 Miami open golf tournament with eight-under-par 132's.

### More Snow Hits City

According to the weather predictions there will be more snow in Northern British Columbia this week-end. It will also be colder for both today and Sunday. This was a wintry dawn for the past few days, there had been cloudless conditions and frost. Then about 8:30 last night, a windy snow storm came on for some hours and then the fall stopped. There was fair sleighing by breakfast time.

STEEL BAN ON  
OTTAWA—Minister of Trade and Industry Howe today announced a ban on the sale of primary steel for non-essential construction starting Monday, January 1. Construction now in progress will be allowed enough steel to complete programs. The ban includes steel for building of all varieties of entertainment and amusement centres, liquor, tobacco, carbonated beverages, confectionery factories, warehouses and stores and outdoor advertising.

### Alberta Coal Miners Trapped

COLEMAN, Alberta—Rescue workers worked feverishly tonight to reach two miners trapped in a coal mine cave-in. Officials said there was little hope that the men would be found alive. Joseph J. Sikora, aged 24, and George Raipos, 48, were trapped by a rock fall last night.

### Bow River at Calgary Floods

CALGARY—Three thousand persons were forced from their homes by flooding waters of the Bow River caused by an ice jam near the Bow's junction with the Elbow in East Calgary. The jam sent water coursing over both banks, inundating about seven hundred homes. The water began to recede later today, dropping a foot by 11 a.m. At the peak, water was four feet deep in the low-lying areas.

### Stockpiling Of Plutonium

CHALK RIVER, Ontario—Plutonium, used in the production of atom bombs, is being produced, and stockpiled increasingly at this \$30,000,000 atomic project. It is being turned out in 3000-ton \$5,000,000 heavy water pile, considered by scientists to be the best of its kind in the world. So far the United States has not bought Canadian plutonium and Canada is not making the atom bomb. But scientists here are driving toward greater achievement in civilian atomic fields.

### Moose Initiate 4 New Members

Four candidates—A. Dandaneault, K. Slater, J. Cail and C. Hallan—were initiated into membership in the local Moose Lodge which met this week with Governor Harold Hampton in the chair.

### Labor Wins Welsh Seat

LONDON—The Labor government won another by-election when a Labor candidate retained a Welsh seat. The Labor candidate received a vote of 24,500 and the Conservative only four thousand. This gives the government a majority of six in the House of Commons.

## Canada and U.S.—

Now Integrated for Peace As Well as War, CNR Head Observes  
CHICAGO.—Under the stress of the present world situation, Canada has become more than a trusted neighbor of the United States, Donald Gordon, C.M.G., chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, told the presidents of 15 U.S. railroads at a luncheon given in his honor here today. The two countries now are partners, not only in defence matters, but also in the economic field, he said.

He cited the co-operation between the railroads of Canada and the United States in the transportation of war materials so necessary to hemisphere defence in the two world wars and in the present United Nations effort in Korea. The economic integration of the United States and Canada is something new for peacetime—even this strange kind of peacetime, he said. "But it's nothing new to railroads. Our freight cars ride each other's lines, our schedules are integrated over many routes, and so on."

The importance of the railroad in developing a country's economy has been thoroughly demonstrated in the United States, Mr. Gordon asserted. In Canada, the railroads are even more essential to the development of otherwise isolated communities in the vast northern areas which are so rich in natural resources.

Mr. Gordon's visit to Chicago is his first since he was appointed chairman and president of the Canadian National. He is inspecting the facilities of the Grand Trunk Western, CNR subsidiary, and will go from here over the GTW lines in Indiana and Michigan. This evening, 100 of Chicago's leading industrial executives, headed by Mayor Martin H. Kennelly, will pay tribute to Mr. Gordon at a dinner given in the Saddle and Siroin Club by William Wood Prince, president of the Union Stock Yards and Transit Company and the Chicago Junction Railroad, and J. W. Barriger, president of the Chicago, Indianapolis and Louisville Railroad.

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### What Course Next?

IT IS very easy to say use the atom bomb at once and end the war in the Far East quickly. The more mature authorities appear to be pretty well united against such a desperate course for the time being at least. No doubt, introduction of the atom bomb would end the conflict with dispatch but—at what cost? That is the question.

If we used the atom bomb in Korea, what would be the sequel? Certainly, if we used the atom bomb across the Manchurian frontier, no matter how much justice we might consider there was on our side, we would be pretty sure that the whole world, few if any sections excepted, would soon be involved, not only economically but physically, in all the horrors of modern warfare. The suggestion of Syngman Rhee, the president of the Republic of Korea, to use the old-fashioned atom bomb (the type that devastated Hiroshima and Nagasaki) is, of course, stupid. There would be no use trying to restrict the degree of horror in the next war. Our enemy, providing he has the power, would not do so even if we would.

The most reasoned judgment would seem to be today, as it always has been, to get together with our enemy in the cold war, which is steadily becoming warmer, before it is too late. Even that old war horse, Winston Churchill, who has never been known to draw his punches when the time came to hit, talks that way these days.

Russia may be the cause of war—the most of us are convinced, in spite of her protestations to the contrary, that she is. On the other hand, we cannot have peace without Russian co-operation and that is a simple fact—like it or not—that we must accept. The difficulty today is to find a course that does not involve appeasement about which we have already had so many sad lessons in the past.

### TROUBLES OF WORLD

ONE TROUBLE with the world today is that it has become trouble conscious. There have always been troubles in the world, but never before has the world realized or imagined that it had so many troubles. This is an age of problems—social, economic, political, national and international. We are daily being reminded of these problems in the news, and of the making of books describing them, and prescribing perfect solutions, there is no end.

There was a time (and not very long ago) when one bottle contained a sure cure or relief for all the interior and exterior ailments of the human body, and it was also good for horses! In these days the shelves of drug stores are packed with a multitudinous variety of remedies for an almost equal number of diseases and discomforts. It is sad to think of how people in the old days went through life and died in total ignorance of the many or particular things that ailed them. Perhaps they lived and died happier for their ignorance. There are no more miserable people than those who are perpetually complaining about little aches and pains and fearing that each one is a symptom of some dread disease.

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## SATURDAY SERMON

### HOW DO YOU FEEL?

(By Rev. Leonard A. Thorpe, pastor of the Regular Baptist Church)

All the commands of God's Word—the only rule of conduct that Christians have—are important. However, there are a few that are of greater importance as can be seen by their repetition and the varied terminology and figures by which they are taught by Christ and the inspired Scripture writers.

One of the most frequent admonitions of God's Word deals with the relationship of one Christian to another. To which one of the many passages shall we turn? John 13:34-35 will do admirably.

"A new commandment I give unto you—That you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another.

"By this shall all men know that you are my disciples if ye have love one for another.

In other Scriptures we are commanded to be kindhearted, long-suffering, tenderhearted, merciful, helpful, and affectionate toward all Christians. Many more than one hundred times we are so enjoined and as many kindred teachings are found in the Word. Christ Jesus surely realized how often and how easily Christians would forget this great desire and prayer of His for them. (John 17:21-22). So let us ask ourselves, "How do we feel toward the other Christians of Prince Rupert?"

In order to fulfill this second most important commandment (Matt. 22:39), the feeling of our hearts must be scrutinized. To love one another is not a matter of acting in a certain way, an external code of conduct, but a matter of feeling, an internal, settled, God-given attitude of loyalty and brotherliness. Thus, our love being deep and genuine, it will be the oil that works the sand from the wheels of our daily doings with each other.

Marcus Dods says: "Love runs into all our relationships with our fellow man and carries with it a healing and sweetening virtue."

**PERFECT ILLUSTRATION**  
Do I hear someone say "Sounds easy; but practise hard?" Yes, it is not always easy but we have a perfect example! Our Lord Jesus Christ goes on to say that this love must be of the same type as His. Calvary love, God's love, shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Spirit, is the only type that will suffice. The Bible in the original language differentiates between God-given love and merely human love. It is the former that our Lord calls upon us to practise, and as we set out to love as He loves, we will find the difficulties along the way demand more than human love, and are met and conquered in that love which is part of God's grace. For one thing, there are many unscriptural and unloving habits that must be eliminated. The all too common practice of railing must stop. (Peter 3:9). The carrying

of derogatory remarks and stories, whether they be false or true, is positively against Biblical teaching and is a schismatic tool of Satan's. The Word tells us to go to the offending brother (Matt. 18:15), not to all our neighbors and to that instrument of gossip, commonly known as a telephone. A true brotherly love will also dispel the exclusiveness that hinders the testimony and service of many Christians. Love draws together and permits the coal of our witness to shine more brightly. Do not allow actual or supposed grievances to separate you from fellowship. If we love as He loves, our attitude must be "to support those who are weak."

The need of God's love is realized when we see that there are no conditions attached to this command. We do not love when we think it wise or agreeable when our dignity permits. We love regardless, because of our common Lord.  
If His love is unknown, or little experienced, before we can know how to love, we must open our hearts to the greatest Lover of all, and learn by a daily association with Him, how perfectly He loves.

Following passage of this By-law it shall be lawful for the following described property to be exempt from general municipal taxation but not from local improvement taxes, water, garbage and telephone rates and charges for so long a period as the said property is occupied by and used exclusively for the purposes of the Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League, Prince Rupert Branch No. 27: (a) That portion of Waterfront Block "E", Map 823, shown outlined in red on explanatory plan No. 1965. Before final passage hereof this By-law shall be submitted to a vote of the Ratepayers of the City and approved by the requisite majority. 3. This By-law may be known and cited for all purposes as "Canadian Legion Taxation Exemption By-law 1950". 

**WHO'LL FIGHT DUEL?**

HAVE YOU ever heard Mr. Hard Boiled say something like this:

"There have always been wars. So there will always be wars. So long as men are men they will fight."

The best treatment for such a sad case of mind-blindness is to say something like this:

"Have a pinch of snuff."

When Mr. Hard Boiled gets over the idea that you have suddenly gone nuts you can say:

"People have always used snuff, so people will always use snuff."

After he recovers from his contempt he will remember that people did NOT always use snuff. It is comparatively new in history, like using tobacco or eating potatoes or tomatoes.

Concede him that point and switch to slavery or duelling.

LESE THAN ONE HUNDRED years ago human beings could say "There has always been slavery. So there will always be slavery."

Now as we all know, slavery has been pretty well wiped out. I know very well that disguised or indirect slavery still exists in spots. They might call it "corrective labor" on one side of the Iron Curtain. They might call it Apartheid, or race segregation, in South Africa. They may have some other hypocritical disguise for it elsewhere.

The fact remains that no government on earth would dare to tell the world that is now legalizes or practices slavery. Yet less than a hundred years ago even

the most-professing-Christian countries condoned and practiced slavery.

Slavery was abolished. In the British part of the world it was incidentally abolished without bloodshed. In the United States it took a war to do the job. Perhaps with patience and more statesmanship they too might have got rid of slavery without the war.

But the fact was, one way or another, they did get rid of it.

DUELLING IS AN EVEN MORE striking example. In a recent debate in the British parliament, a Conservative M.P. pointed to the hanging tapes, where the members used to hang their swords.

Only inside the chamber did the M.P.'s give up their "right" to use swords.

If two men wanted to escort the same lady home, and one took offence, a duel was the result.

If challenged to a duel you either had to fight or be branded as a coward.

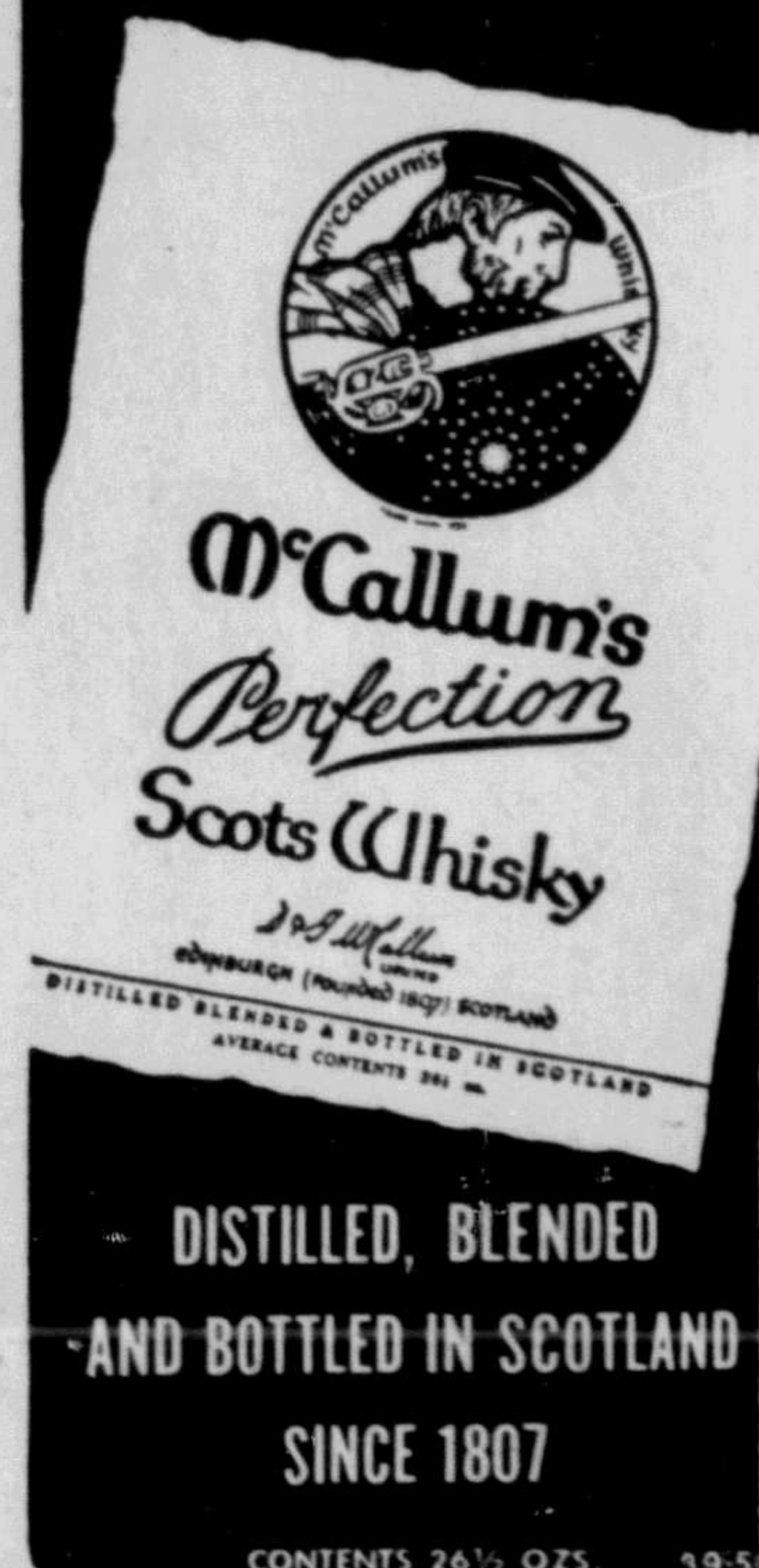

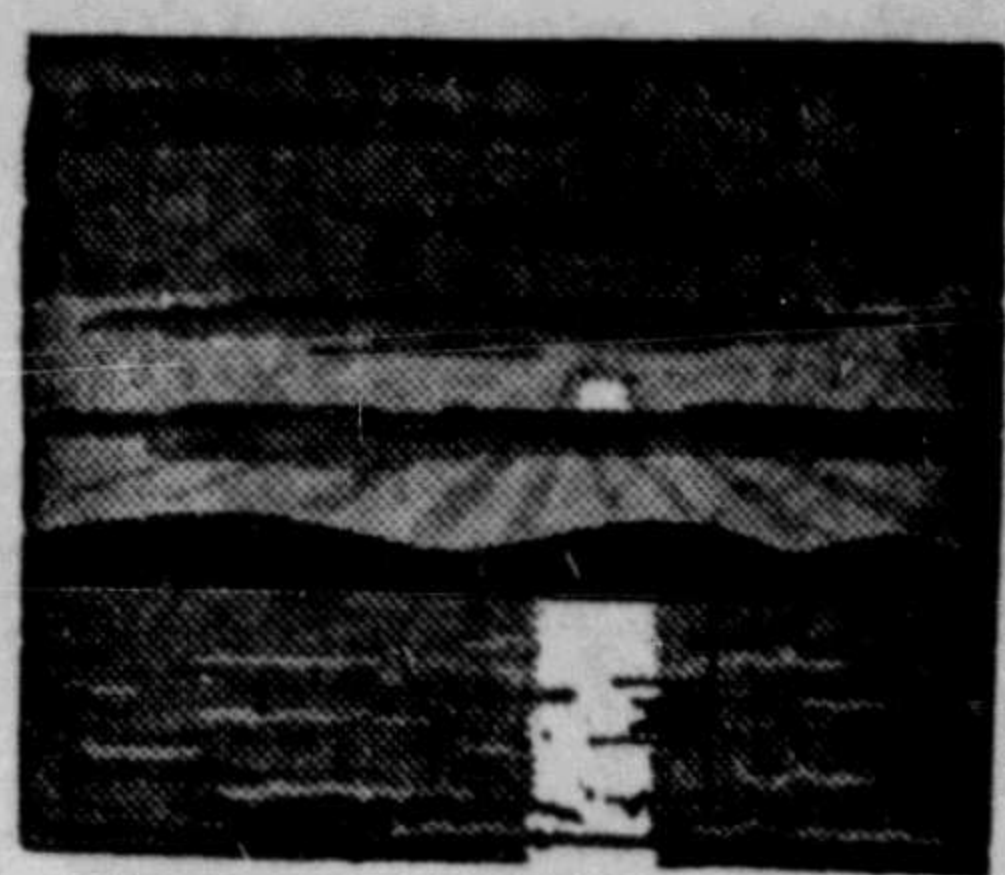

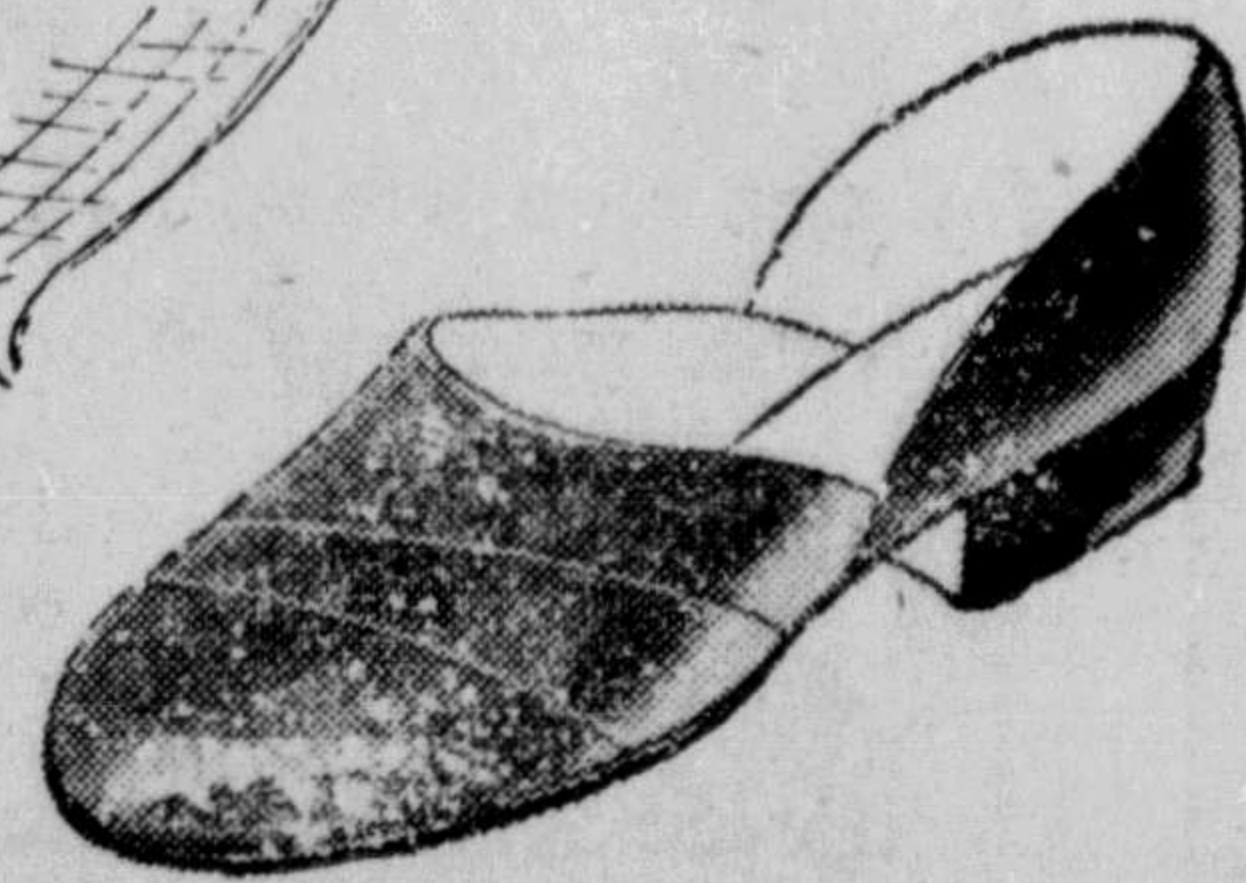
