The final date for registration under the B.C. Hospital Insurance Act is **September 30, 1948**

Information for those registering:

IT IS ESSENTIAL THAT

Every resident of British Columbia be registered for hospital insurance under the B.C. Hospital Insurance Act. There are penalties for non-registration.

Any person who has not received a registration form through the mail should obtain one from his nearest local office and complete it immediately.

Any person who has already registered with his employer under the Payroll Deduction Plan should not register again.

"APPROVED" PLANS

The only "approved" plans are:

- Telephone Employees' Medical Services Association.
- Canadian Pacific Railway Employees' Medical Association of B.C.

There are no "approved" commercial hospital insurance plans. Members of the Armed Forces and R.C.M.P. covered for complete general hospital care or persons completely covered by D.V.A. need not pay a premium but must register and pay a premium on behalf of their dependents.

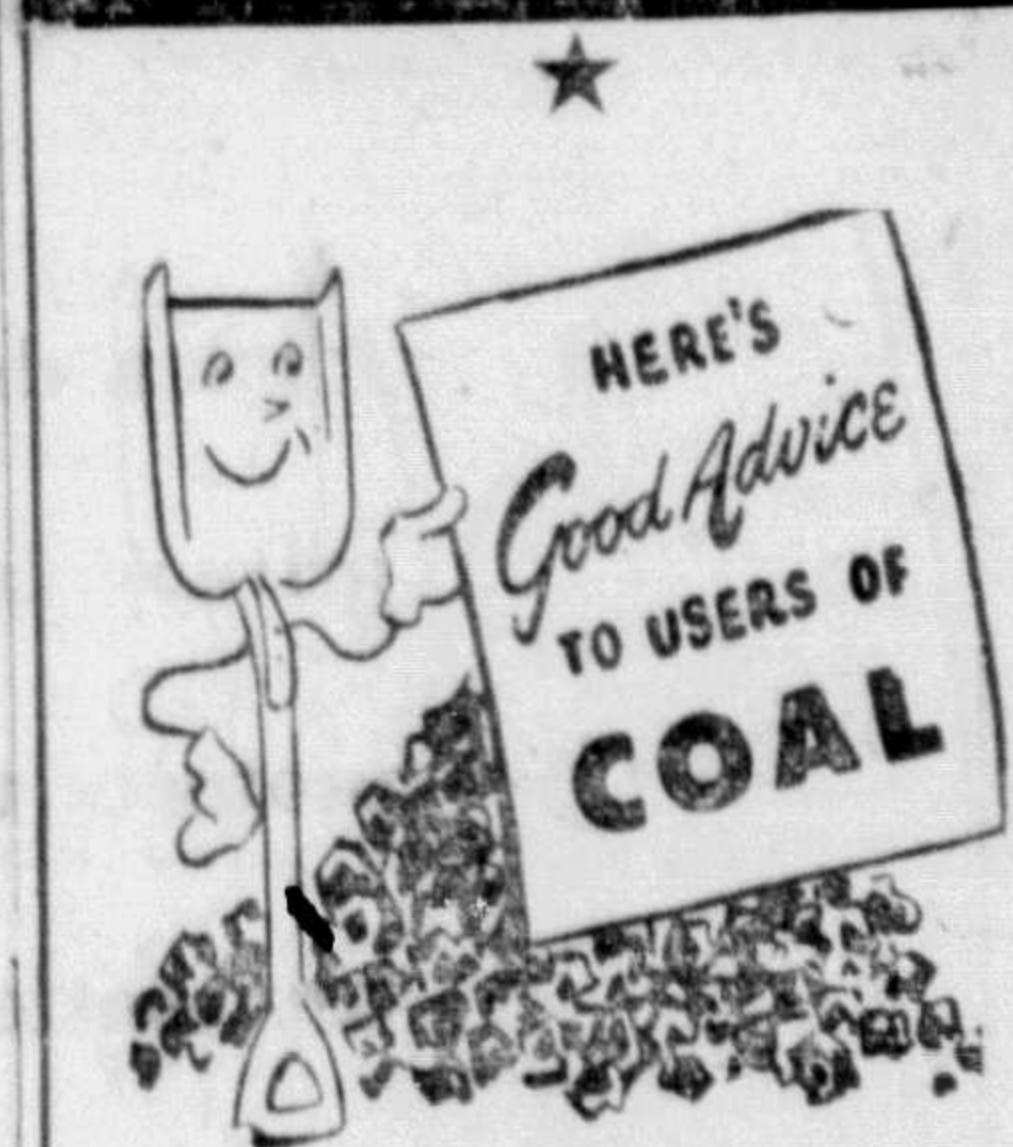
CONVENTION

Harry McLean, master of the Chilcotin, his officers and crew, and to the management of the Union Steamship Co. for the "unsurpassed" courtesy and service which had been so generously and delightfully rendered. Capt. McLean and Frank Skinner, general agent at Prince Rupert, responded briefly.

During the voyage a sum of \$42.30 was raised by Capt. McLean through various means for the B.C. Cancer Fund. Among other things there was a raffle of an autographed echo sounder graph, the winner of which was Mrs. A. G. Ford of Smithers. This brought the grand total amount raised for the Cancer Fund from among passengers on the summer cruises of the Chilcotin to \$319.12.

The Chilcotin was back in Prince Rupert at 9:30 Saturday night and, with immigration and customs officers, co-operating helpfully and expeditiously, the passengers were ashore in record time. 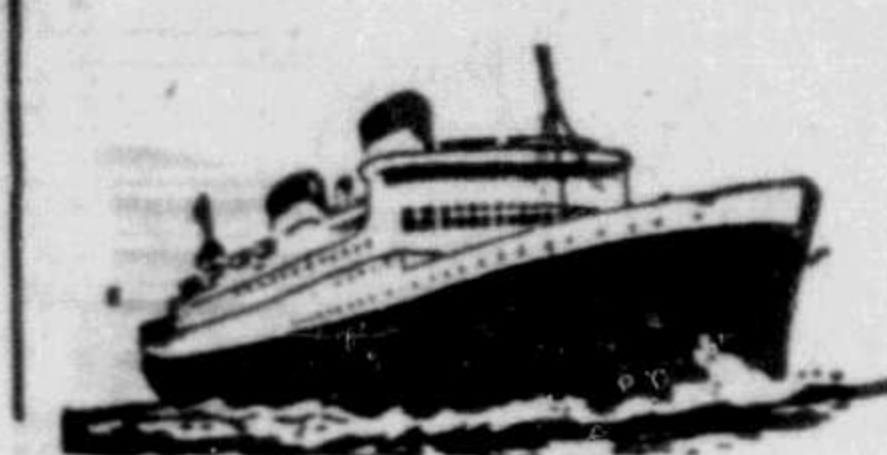

Veteran Nome Liner Here With Alaska Fish Cargo—Chilcotin Helps Get People Out of Territory

Alaska Steamship Co.'s historic old steamer Victoria, once a transatlantic liner and later operating for some 40 years on the Seattle - Nome run, is in port today discharging eight carloads of frozen fish and 20,000 cases of salmon for transshipment East over Canadian

National Railways. The Victoria arrived last night from Ketchikan. The smaller boats Dagney and Signe were also in port over the week-end with smaller fish cargoes for transshipment.

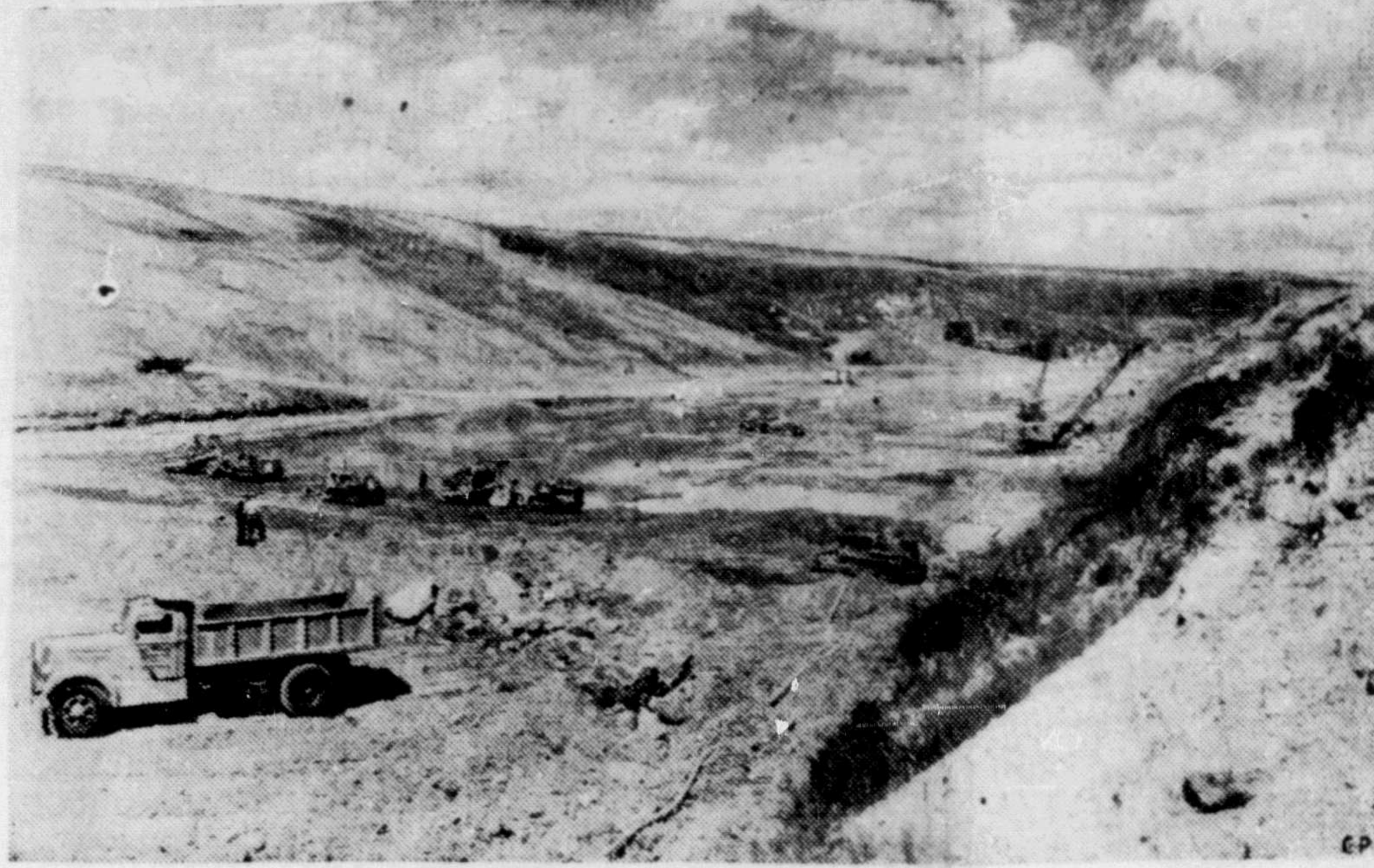
On her arrival here Saturday night enroute back to Vancouver after having made the special voyage to Juneau with the Associated Boards of Trade party, Union steamer Chilcotin, Capt. Harry McLean, had on board a record list of passengers, more than 150 in all. Besides the Associated Boards party, she had picked up 22 passengers at Juneau and 57 at Ketchikan all of whom were grateful of the opportunity for transportation south since the American passenger ships have been tied up on account of the Seattle longshoremen's strike. Most of the Alaskan passengers could not be assigned their accommodation until the Associated Board's delegates left the ship at this port.

The Skeena and Naas Rivers will be closed to all net fishing after 6 p.m. Friday, September 24, it is announced at the Dominion Fisheries office.

Unloading of canned salmon from Alaska continued through yesterday and Saturday night. Some are saying this is about the busiest spell the longshoremen have ever experienced and it is not often there is such a rush.

The fish boat Isobel, owned by Alec McPherson, sank at Port Alberni last week. This was when McPherson tried to beach his boat after striking a dead-head in the harbor. The Isobel, valued at \$4,000, was 32 feet in length.

OPERATION HOLE—Working virtually round-the-clock, over a hundred men keep a \$600,000 battery of monstrous power machinery roaring at the largest earth fill ever attempted in Canada. Located on the St. Mary River, 30 airline miles southwest of Lethbridge, Alta., is the St. Mary dam site, part of a \$20,000,000 irrigation scheme being developed to irrigate 513 acres of southern Alberta farmland. It will require 3,300,000 cubic yards of clay, 1,000,000 cubic yards of gravel, 90,000 cubic yards of screened sand and 50,000 cubic yards of rock to build the dam, 186 feet high, and 2,640 feet wide.

NEW JUSTICE IS WELCOMED

Mr. Justice Norman W. Whittaker, who is presiding over the fall session of Assize Court which opened here today, was welcomed to Prince Rupert this morning by T. W. Brown on behalf of the Prince Rupert Bar Association. This is Mr. Justice Whittaker's first visit to Prince Rupert since his elevation to the Supreme Court bench last year.

Former Speaker of the provincial Legislature, Mr. Whittaker was appointed to the bench late last year after serving continuously as member for Saanich constituency since 1933. He was re-elected in the general election of 1937 and chosen Speaker shortly afterward. He was elected again in 1941 and continued as Speaker until his elevation to the bench.

Southolm, Capt. William Gleason, arrived in port Sunday morning after discharging coal at Port Simpson, the Naas River and Stewart and is today loading salmon in the Skeena River. Tomorrow she will come into Prince Rupert to pick up a large tank for delivery to Alert Bay. On the way south she will call at Surf Inlet with mining machinery and at Kiemtu to load canned salmon.

DOCTORS REFUSE TO CO-OPERATE

SYDNEY, Australia ☉—Doctors throughout Australia continue to ignore the federal government's legislation providing for free medicine for all patients.

The department of health has revealed that there are fewer than 30 doctors writing prescriptions for medicine provided free by the government.

When the scheme began to operate on June 1, this year, the British Medical Association ruled that doctors should not co-operate with the government unless they were given the unqualified right to prescribe what they thought best for their patients, and were given the right to use their own prescription forms.

A deadlock was reached when the government refused the B.M.A. request.

After a number of conferences with the health minister, Senator McKenna, the B.M.A. refused to consider the matter workable unless the government alters its attitude.

The B.M.A. demands that the government extend the formula set out by the health minister to include all medicines and remove the more offensive penalties against the doctors who do not comply with the government regulations, and eliminate the necessity of filling in the official prescription forms.

OBJECT TO FORMULARY

Main objections are to the formulary. The government claims that it meets practically all prescribing needs, but the doctors claim that if the government is sincere in its attitude there is no reason why there should be a limited formality covering the drugs they use.

The doctors insist that they should be free from the indirect influence of cost consideration when they make out a prescription. They object to filling

in the official form in triplicate on the ground that they are busy men and the forms take up too much time.

Earlier, this year, it was reported from Auckland that cost of prescriptions written under the New Zealand free-medicine scheme since it was introduced in 1943 has almost doubled.

The New Zealand government has ordered an inquiry into reported over-prescribing and

over-visiting of prescriptions issued. The scheme have been the rate of over-visiting. J. A. Jenkins, President of the New Zealand Medical Association, at a B.M.A. conference that medical men "circumstances to what they know bug," and are from scientists to
