Amid the universal preparation for Christmas there is fear if not terror in the nearts of many, even in this country, which until now by God's grace has escaped the worst horrors of war. It is common to hear people say: "We can't escape the next time." That "next time" seems to many to be approaching fast. How utterly deceived we feel! Instead of the long years of peace we have scarcely known the feeling of peace, though the war ended officially in 1945. The present day quarrels of nations in which Canada is involved give rise to a feeling of general uneasiness lest another war should break out. This war in our minds looms up as the most dreadful of all because of the atomic bomb and the other deadly weapons being prepared in the research plants of the world.

We Christians need to recall the words of our Saviour. He, the Son of God, knows all things; knows well the blessings and the woes of humanity; knows in every detail the special dreadful events that will accompany the end of the world. Speaking in this connection He painted a picture that must have been both awe-inspiring and filled wih gloom for His listeners during the days he was on earth. We experience the same awe and the same sense of gloom when we read His words in the Holy Gospel.

Then somewhat unexpectedly in language that is almost lilting He reassures us: "When these things begin to come to pass, look up and lift your heads, because your redemption is at hand." Salvation! That is the word ever on His lips. No wonder, for He came to save us and to assure us a place of rest and peace where He Himself will wipe all tears from our eyes and where all our troubles and sorrows shall have an end.

We are on the eve of celebrating the great day of our Saviour's brith. Is it too much to say that there is a rather general inclination to celebrate the event and overlook the reality? This Babe born in Bethlehem is the Divine Son of God, equal to His father in all things. Him we must adore and must serve. Without our loyal, constant devotion to Him we cannot say we are among those to whom thes creassuring words are spoken. But if we try to observe His Commandments and if we live as His children and His servants day by day, no calamity or man-made terror need make us tremble for it is God Himself who says: "Lo, your salvation is at hand."

# Light on Horizon

"Uuto you is born this day . . . a Saviour which is Christ

This is the good tidings which the Angels brought to the Shep. herds on the night that Christ was born. And the birth of a Saviour WAS glad idings to these people—tidings that their whole nation had been anxiously awaiting and woold rejoice to hear No wonder they hurried off to Bethlehem to "see this thing whi had come to pass."

That was over 1900 years ago and all the world at this season is celebrating that Divine event. The Saviour that was born have so impressed Himself upon the world that all roads this week lead to Bethlehem and multiudes of all peoples, nations and languages fall on their knees before the Infant Saviour.

Yet when we look around on the world today what we see is not a world that is saved but one that is desperately in need of being saved. The world has kept the festival of the Saviour's birth but it has gone on its way unsaved. In some respects it has advanced. Since Jesus came Christendom has been haunted by a vision of the true life for man which it seems powerless to fulfill. It is like a man who remembers the bright hopes of boyhood and is conscious all the time that somehow he has lost the way though he has not forgotten the vision. The Christian spirit has gained ground here and there but in comparison with the mass terialism of the world, it is not much more than a drop in the bucket. Envy, hatred, malice, and all uncharitableness are just as dominant as they were at the beginning of the Christian era and no thoughtful person can regard them with complacency. But for all that there is one ray of light on our horizon—there is universal recognition of the fact that there is a Saviour for mankind and that the bells of he world are ringing as loudly as ever to the memory of His birth and to His glory and honor on Christmas Day.

The first application of the Christmas "Glad Tidings" of the Saviour is to our own souls "Unto you is born a Saviour." He came to save us from our sins, from the things that separate us from God and from our fellowman. I feel sure we have believed that all our lives. We have celebrated the fact every Christmas. But has Christ actually saved us from our sins? Do we love God with all our heart, mind, soul and strength and our neighbor as ourselves?

Merely celebrating the Divine Christmas event will not save as nor will it save the world. We must go further and offer to the Incarnate Lord the complete devotion of our lives. The Babe in the manger! Wonderful and marvellous it was on that first Christmas morn. There is but one thing more wonderful still and that is the Babe in the heart of man for this brings Peace on Earth and Goodwill Among All People.








A year ago we declared that never before was this world in greater need of the true spirit of Christmas. That declaration, we must admit, holds as good today as it did then.

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

The queues of those seeking to emigrate are still long. An estimated 90,000 are waiting to go to South Africa and some 30,000 to New Zealand. Australia House has a waiting list of "several thousand" and hopes to move 46,000 next year.

But the queues at Canada House are not as long as they were. Main reason is the Labor government's action in cutting from £5,000 (\$20,000) to £1,000 the amount emigrants are allowed to take to countries outside the sterling area. This will save Britain dollars but means emigrants to dollar countries may not be able to take their entire assets with them.

Every now and then a controversy breaks out in the letter section of the British Press about the advisability of leaving Britain in her hour of need. There are arguments for both sides, but the "Nos" get added support from a fact-finding agency during the year.

Political and Economic Planning, an independent fact-finding organization probing Britain's population structure, said its middle-aged groups were being drained through migration because mainly the young and vigorous were leaving. This could only be halted if the Dominions were prepared to accept a cross-section of age groups.
