The new building is a splendidly designed structure which will be operated in future. E. E. # North Atlantic Defence Plan Reached

## Grim Prediction— Sees Atomic War Certain

OTTAWA—On of Canada's top atomic scientists, in an unusual speech, today suggested Canada is in danger of falling behind in world's atom race and will do so unless she puts up more money and scientists. In an address prepared for delivery before the Ottawa Rotary Club, Dr. L. G. Cook, head of the chemistry branch of the research division at the Chalk River Atomic Project, flatly predicted that the children of the present generation of Canadians "almost certainly will be involved in a war in which atomic bombs are used".

## Strachey Barred From Secrets

LONDON (Canadian Press)—The Conservative Daily Mail said today that Prime Minister Attlee will be questioned in the House of Commons about the latest political storm revolving around Minister of War John Strachey who years ago wrote in favor of communism. It all started with an Associated Press report, later denied by British government officials, quoting well-informed American sources at the Hague as saying Anglo-American defence chiefs had agreed to keep highly confidential military secrets from Strachey.

## Best Talent Helps Drive Much Sun And Little Rain

Prince Rupert had 105.8 hours of bright sunshine on eighteen days during the month of March and but 5.9 inches of rain on nineteen days, according to the official summary of the Digby Island meteorological station issued today.

## RESTRICTIONS ON IRON, STEEL OFF

OTTAWA—Removal of restrictions on the import of cast iron and steel scrap into Canada was announced yesterday by the Department of Trade and Commerce. The controls, applying to United States material only, were imposed two years ago at the request of the American government.

## Attended Session Of Legislature

During his brief visit south last week to attend executive sessions of the British Columbia Hospital Association, D. C. Stevenson, administrator of the Prince Rupert General Hospital, crossed over to Victoria and attended one of the sittings of the Legislature as the guest of J. D. McRae, M.L.A. for Prince Rupert. It was an interesting experience and, by a fortuitous coincidence, Mr. Stevenson heard part of the heated debate on the amendments to the Hospital Insurance Act. He also got in on part of the discussion of the bill providing for the absorption of the British Columbia Police by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

## WOMAN KILLED BY WIND IN ARKANSAS

TUCKERMAN, Arkansas (Canadian Press)—One woman was killed and nine other persons were hurt as a series of tornadoes hit Arkansas yesterday. Mrs. Hazel Clayton, aged 32, died in Newport Hospital about four hours after a tornado demolished her home. Her husband, Floyd Clayton, was critically injured.

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## CZECH PRIESTS BEING TRIED

PRAGUE—The controlled Czech radio said 10 Roman Catholic clergymen on trial for treason testified today they took orders from the Papal Nunciature in Prague. The Communist-led government last month ordered the expulsion of Msgr. Ottavio De Liva. Of the 10 priests and monks on trial, four have pleaded guilty to charges of treason, anti-state activities and espionage for the Vatican. Three have entered pleas of partially guilty and three argued they are innocent.

## Girls' Basketball Team Returns Home

Principal A. M. Hurst and the Booth Memorial High School girls' basketball team returned home on the Coquitlam yesterday afternoon from Powell River where they participated with other teams from various parts of British Columbia in the inter High School basketball championship tournament.

A slight gasoline blaze in the garage of Art Murray at Third Avenue West and Ninth Street prompted a call to the fire department at 9 p.m. Sunday. The fire was extinguished when firemen arrived and no damage was done.

## Reports of Unidentified Submarines Off California Coast Substantiated

SAN DIEGO (CP)—Captain of the United States Navy destroyer Colohan said today that he had contacted by radar last week one and possibly two unidentified submarines which were obviously of an ultra-modern type. Again today a strange submarine was reported to have been sighted off the California coast. It was the second such report in five days. Coastguardmen at Point Arguello lifeboat station told the Navy that they saw a craft believed to be a submarine on the surface at 6:20 a.m. It was eight miles offshore. T. A. V. Tremblay, with the Columbia Cellulose Company in Victoria, arrived in the city by plane Saturday on one of his periodical business visits.

## Flash

PRIME MINISTER RESTING—OTTAWA—Prime Minister St. Laurent is in Bermuda for a ten-day Easter holiday and rest. Word of his arrival by air from Montreal reached his office here today. The Prime Minister is accompanied by his two daughters.

WILLIAM SOUTHAM DIES—TORONTO—William Wallace Southam, director of Southern Co. Ltd. of Montreal, died in hospital here Saturday following a lengthy illness. He was 48 years of age.

VANCOUVER WINS OPENER—NEW WESTMINSTER—Vancouver Canucks Saturday night grabbed a 6 to 0 victory over their arch-rivals, New Westminster Royals, in the first game to decide the Northern division Pacific Coast Hockey League title. The second game will be played Tuesday night in Vancouver. Los Angeles Monarchs whipped San Diego 4 to 1 Saturday night in the opening game of the best four out of seven series to decide the southern division title.

RUSSIA IS AHEAD—MONTREAL—Kenneth DeCoursey, British newspaperman, who was the first to announce the explosion by Russia of an atomic bomb, arrived here today for a Canadian speaking tour. He said that Russia was one year ahead of United States on the hydrogen bomb and may have already exploded one. DeCoursey also said that Russia is making large scale experiments in bacteriological warfare and was using political prisoners as guinea pigs.

\$8000 ROBBERY—VANCOUVER—Bandits visited a Vancouver beer parlor during the week-end and got away with \$8000.

SMALLFOX IN GLASGOW—Glasgow—Planes from London today rushed enough vaccine for 50,000 people to Glasgow and West Scotland to help check an outbreak of smallpox. Thousands were flocking to public health centres in the infected area. The disease already has attacked 29 people. Sixty thousand people already have been vaccinated in the west and southwest of Scotland. No new cases have been reported in the last 24 hours. Glasgow health authorities said there is no need to close theatres, but warned people to avoid crowds.

EILERS ALVANCE—SASKATOON—Vancouver Eilers Saturday night defeated University of Saskatchewan Huskies 46 to 34 and qualified to meet Winnipeg in the Western Canada senior women's basketball final. The win gave the Eilers the two-game total-point series 87 to 77. They had dropped the first game 43 to 41.

## Great Victory— Communists Repelled By Nationalists

TAPEI, Formosa—Nationalist China today hailed its greatest victory of 1950—the smashing Saturday of a Chinese Communist invading force of more than 7500 on Hainan Island off South China. "We have destroyed the Communist dream of conquering Hainan," said General Li Yang Ching, chief of staff for Hainan. The Nationalists said 5000 Reds had been killed and more than 2,500 captured.

## All for One and One for All Unanimous Decision

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (CP)—Defence ministers of North Atlantic Treaty powers Saturday approved a collective plan of self-defence against aggression. Their agreement on the basis of all for one and one for all in guarding the North Atlantic Treaty area was unanimous. The meeting was held in closely-guarded Dutch general staff headquarters. About three thousand Dutch communists jammed an auditorium at the same time in protest against Dutch membership.

## Damaged Police Car—Is Fined

David Manson, in city police court at the week-end, was fined \$15 and \$3.50 costs on a charge of damaging government property Wednesday night. He was also ordered to pay \$5 for damages. He was arrested Wednesday night, after a scuffle with Const. Joe Hornell on Third Avenue. The Constable had been walking home when he noticed the accused twisting the B. C. Police patrol car aerial. Occupants of the car at the time, were busy on a call. The four constables testified before Magistrate W. D. Vance. Manson was also charged with being drunk. Sentence was time served.

## No Need For Foreign Aid

MONTREAL—Col. Robert McCormick, owner-publisher of the Chicago Tribune, arrived here by air yesterday from Newfoundland on the last lap of a two-month "fact-finding" world tour. Asked about his impressions, Col. McCormick said there was absolutely no need for foreign aid. "Every country I visited with the exception of Spain," he said "was very prosperous."

VICTORIA—H. K. Bate of Victoria has been named chairman of a conciliation board in a dispute between the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert and its fire department. He will act with Mrs. Nora Arnold, former mayor of Prince Rupert, and M. O. Howell of Vancouver on the board. Mrs. Arnold represents the city and Mr. Howell the firemen. Prince Rupert fire fighters, the Labor Relations Board here said, are requesting a wage increase of 25 percent across the board, pay or time off in lieu of statutory holidays, \$5 a month bonus after ten years' service and increased contributions to the superannuation fund. The Board is to sit in Prince Rupert this week.

## Rangers Are Riding High

NEW YORK (CP)—Pentti Lund, 24-year old Finnish-born left winger, scored three goals Sunday night to lead the eager New York Rangers to an easy 4 to 1 victory over Montreal Canadiens in the best of seven semi-final Stanley Cup playoffs. The Rangers are now leading three straight games in the best of seven series, having overcome a 2 to 0 deficit in the early stages to come back and win Saturday night's game three to two. The Ranger technique has been to concentrate on stopping "Rocket" Richard and it seems to be working out very well. Meantime, the Toronto Maple Leafs, at the Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto Saturday night, defeated the Detroit Red Wings 2 to 0 to take the lead of two to one in games of their Stanley Cup semi-final. Key man in the victory was Centre Max Bentley who scored one goal and set up another. Winners of New York vs Montreal will meet winners of Toronto vs Detroit in the final.

## Flying Bixbys Suffer Delay

CALCUTTA—The Bixby's—27-year old Dianna and 36-year old Bob were forced back here today by engine trouble after two hours out. On Saturday at 6:03 a.m. they took off from San Francisco, on an attempt to smash the round-the-world flight record of Bill Odom. The record is 73 hours, five minutes and eleven seconds for the 21,076 mile course. Both are taking turns in piloting the Mosquito bomber of the husband-wife team. On the way here they stopped at Cairo and Karachi.

## Germany's Position

IT HAS BECOME very clear that western Germany must inevitably be given full status and recognition in the company of western nations if the expansion of Soviet Russian sphere of influence, already a alarming fact in eastern Europe and Asia, is to be stemmed.

When we defeated and disarmed Germany after two wars, there were not many who could or wished to see far enough ahead to envision the distasteful situation whereby Germany would have to be re-armed and we would have to have her co-operation if an even greater menace was to be averted. Whether we like or not that menace is now becoming more and more potential as a result of undoubted progress in the cold war that has been going on by threat and propaganda.

As long as Soviet Russia continues her present obdurate and uncompromising course, there appears to be no option but to make Germany strong again. If she is not going to be for us, she is going to be against us, it seems clear.

## DEMOCRATIC GOVERNMENT

JOE RUTLEDGE, a well known Toronto writer on social-economic subjects, comes through with an interesting suggestion whereby a country might be governed more democratically with greater understanding both from within and without the government itself. Rutledge suggests how real a democracy might become if every voter could be a candidate for some public office at least once in his lifetime—not just a name on a polling list, but a name on a ballot. "We wouldn't be saying then that we wondered how they get such crummy guys for public office, because we would know just how the selection was made. We would know too that they were guys pretty much like ourselves, and if we wanted better representatives we might begin by being better citizens ourselves. We wouldn't be so likely to accept government in a let George do it attitude. We would recognize that one day we would be the George in question, and that there would be times when we would need assistance. We wouldn't be so likely to assume that government could take over so many of our obligations, if we thought of ourselves as part of it and responsible for the integrity of its decisions. We might even come to recognize that we already and always, are the government, not merely its beneficiary."

## Ray Reflects . . . . . . and Reminisces

It may be said of that three year old Milwaukee baby, recently fitted with a complete set of false teeth, that he's never going to feel a single toothache "from the cradle to the grave".

Klondike Night is still a month away but somehow, the number of whiskered faces seen at large cannot be said to equal what it was, at this time previously. There are reasons, of course. One of the most persuasive is reported to be mingled resentment and sorrow felt by wives when they note a few silver threads among the beards. It is more than they can bear. Profests may mean clean shaves but, bringing the argument to the point of tears, invariably leads to garnering the crop.

That stalwart and amiable African Seretse, and his white queen, recognized in a somewhat uncertain way as the rulers of Bechuanaland, continue to occupy considerable space on the world's front page. His wife, who had romantic notions when she worked as a London typist, is wondering just what's going to happen next besides her having a baby. Bechuanaland is a huge region north of Rhodesia, peopled by hundreds of thousands, all black. The color situation in South Africa remains a live question. Seretse has a rival to his kingship, and the British government has a new problem. All in all the press would style the facts of the case "quite a story".

Impressions received by some Prince Rupert people, visiting in Europe, help in giving, possibly a more true picture of overseas. Staggering debt, soldier cemeteries, vast wreckage, malnutrition, gloom—these are some of the consequences that too many in Canada, still think typify countries such as France, Germany, or Italy. But it can't all be that way. Some local folk now touring, tell, in brief letters of no shortage, fair prices, delightful weather, and generally speaking, worth while existence.

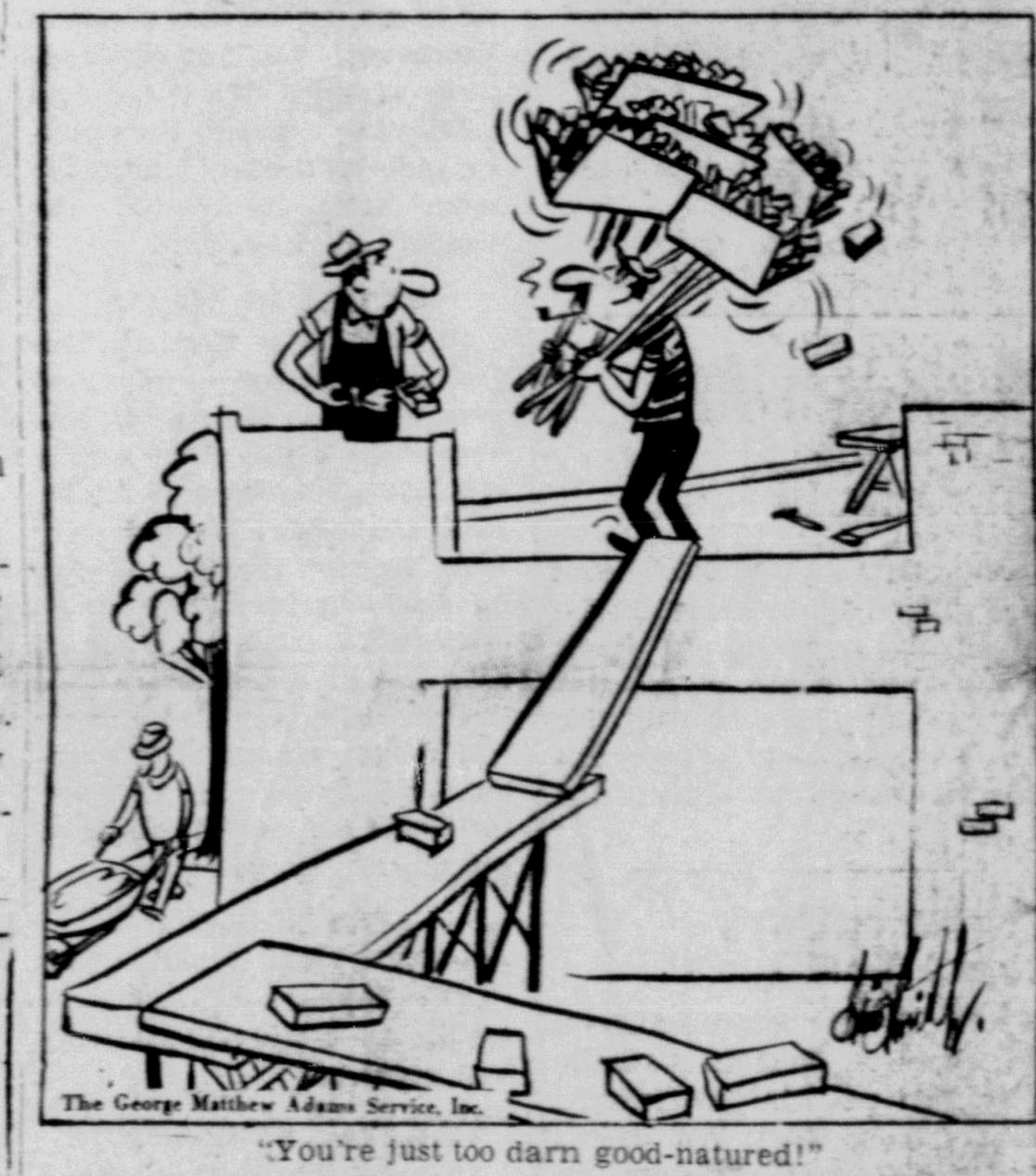

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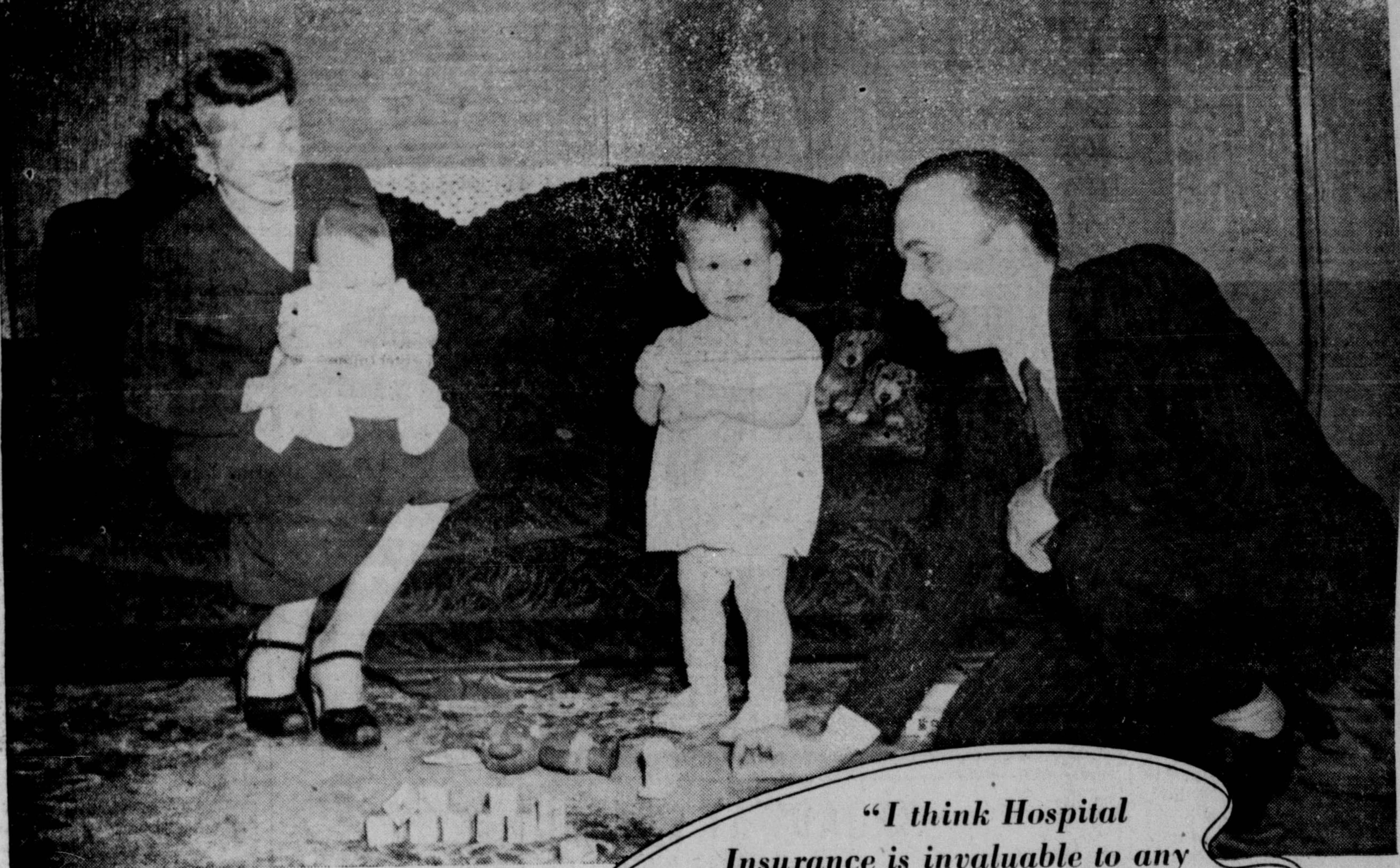

# Concert Is Appreciated

Prince Rupert Symphony Acquires Itself Well in Classical Program

To an appreciative audience of

over 300 people in the Civic Centre Monday night, Conductor Neville E. Gerrard led the Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra through eight selections of beautiful and famous musical masterpieces. The 30-piece orchestra is steadily improving but still lacks a few basic symphony instruments such as the piccolo.

One of the highlights of the program was the rendition of "Divertimento No. 1, in B Major" (W. A. Mozart) by assisting artists—Mr. Gerrard, T. A. Johnstone, clarinet, and B. F. Sprinkle, saxophone. One of two woodwind trios written by Mozart, originally written for two clarinets, the number was very well presented. The bassoon part was arranged for the tenor saxophone.

The overture "Barber of Seville" (G. Rossini) opened the program. The lively and well-known number pleased the audience a great deal. The pleasing and well-remembered melodies were expertly played by the musicians.

Tchaikovsky's brilliant waltz, the "Sleeping Beauty" from his

ballet of the same name, came next on the program. Tchaikovsky's genius for musical composition was finely brought out by the orchestra.

Probably no other light opera in North America is as well known as the late Jerome Kern's "Showboat" and last night, the 30 piece orchestra played a pleasing tribute to one of America's best loved modern composers. The arrangements were by Walter Paul, a noted American arranger. The riverboat melody "Ol' Man River", figured prominently in the orchestration.

In four separate movements, the orchestra presented one of Haydn's most popular symphonies, "Symphony No. 11, in G Major". In this lively, stirring selection, the symphony takes its name (Military) from the trumpet fanfare prominent in the second movement. The orchestra did a fine job on this particular selection. The four movements were adagio, allegretto, minuetto and finale.

The gay and lulling Lehar concert waltz "Gold and Silver" tended to transmit a comfortable wave of electricity down one's spine.

The evening's performance was concluded by a collection of familiar English melodies, featuring the various instruments of orchestra, arranged by Otto Langey. On the program, the selection was named "Sounds From England" by Otto Langey.

The audience returned home with the satisfaction of hearing an improved orchestra and hoping that more such concerts will be presented in the near future.
