Community Planning

THE idea of community planning is catching on in Canada. As a result, planning agencies in Canada this year are spending over two million dollars on their activities.

Community planning too is now taught at Canadian universities. Prior to 1945 Canadians had to go to the United States to study planning. Courses are now on the calendars at McGill, the University of Manitoba and the University of British Columbia.

The need to extend planning is still great. It is likely that the volume of new construction in Canada will be very heavy in the next few years. For this and other reasons there must be more and better community planning.

Alan H. Armstrong, executive director of the Community Planning Association of Canada, points out that one of the major obstacles to community planning, especially in residential areas, is that many builders and their clients are not aware of the full possibilities of working together new federal housing legislation with provincial planning legislation.

WHY SHUN POLITICS?

DO businessmen participate adequately in politics?

A Denver, Colorado, executive took his own local poll to find out. He got over 2,300 replies.

Over a third of those executives responding hadn't registered (a U.S. requirement) so were unable to vote.

Of those who had registered, 41 percent were unaffiliated with any party so could not participate in party meetings or in the selection of candidates.

We suspect a Canadian poll would be almost as disturbing.

With the great growth of shareholder-owned corporations and with the increase in company size, the practice of businessmen and their employees taking no active part in politics has become more widespread—and more dangerous.

Like 'em or not, party politics are the way democracy is run, and democracy we are trying to maintain. But with the executive group—the people of responsibility and experience of affairs—refusing to co-operate in the operation of our political institutions, our system is gravely jeopardized.

Certainly other groups are extremely active in party politics.

The Denver test found that 80 percent of organized labor was registered for voting; and affiliated with a party, hence able to have some influence on the choice of candidates. It revealed too that nearly every old-age pensioner is registered, affiliated and active in party affairs.

Businessmen should, in the national interest, re-examine their policies in this regard.

By ELMORE PHILPOTT HOW SMART IS JOE?

This is the second of two special articles

HERE IS MORE proof to buttress my former argument that Stalin's policies, since 1945, are not only not smart, but downright dumb.

Suppose Uncle Joe himself were today to land by plane at Washington. Suppose he told the hordes of newsmen that he had come to talk peace with President Truman—to end the cold war—halt the little war in Korea and stop the mad rush to world war three.

Of course Uncle Joe would have to deliver the goods. He would have to mean real peace—not fake peace. It is true that powerful interests might try to block real peace. But, if Stalin and Co. were really in earnest, these interests could be overcome. The will for peace, now stifled in the hearts of the millions of people everywhere, would sweep like a tidal wave over all attempted opposition.

Now let us examine the actual results of such a policy. A "cease fire" would be possible in Korea in a matter of hours—with a fair, free election to follow in the whole of Korea—not just the part below the 38th line of latitude.

Russia would have to agree to quick peace in Austria—and liberation of all the satellites in eastern Europe. There would have to be REAL freedom and democracy in all Germany, Poland, Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria, Albania.

THE DIE-HARDS (in all countries) would say that such a change would weaken Russia's relative position in the arena of power politics. I say "Bunk." Russia would certainly lose on one level. But she would gain infinitely more on other levels.

The talk of "the next war" would die overnight.

NOW CONSIDER WHAT would happen to the American economy. The complete relaxation of war fears would knock the bottom clean out of all war markets and war manufacturers.

Even if the U.S.A. went ahead with her all-out armament program for a few months—just in case Uncle Joe might be trying to pull a fast one—this could not be prolonged. The people will consent to a national policy of "guns before butter" only when they really fear or want war.

Within a few months of Uncle Joe Stalin's peace mission to Washington there would be the biggest economic crisis in all the history of the U.S.A.

I am not suggesting that this would necessarily mean disaster for the U.S.A. or for the rest of the world. Faced with the problem of disposing of the then huge surplus, the American gov-

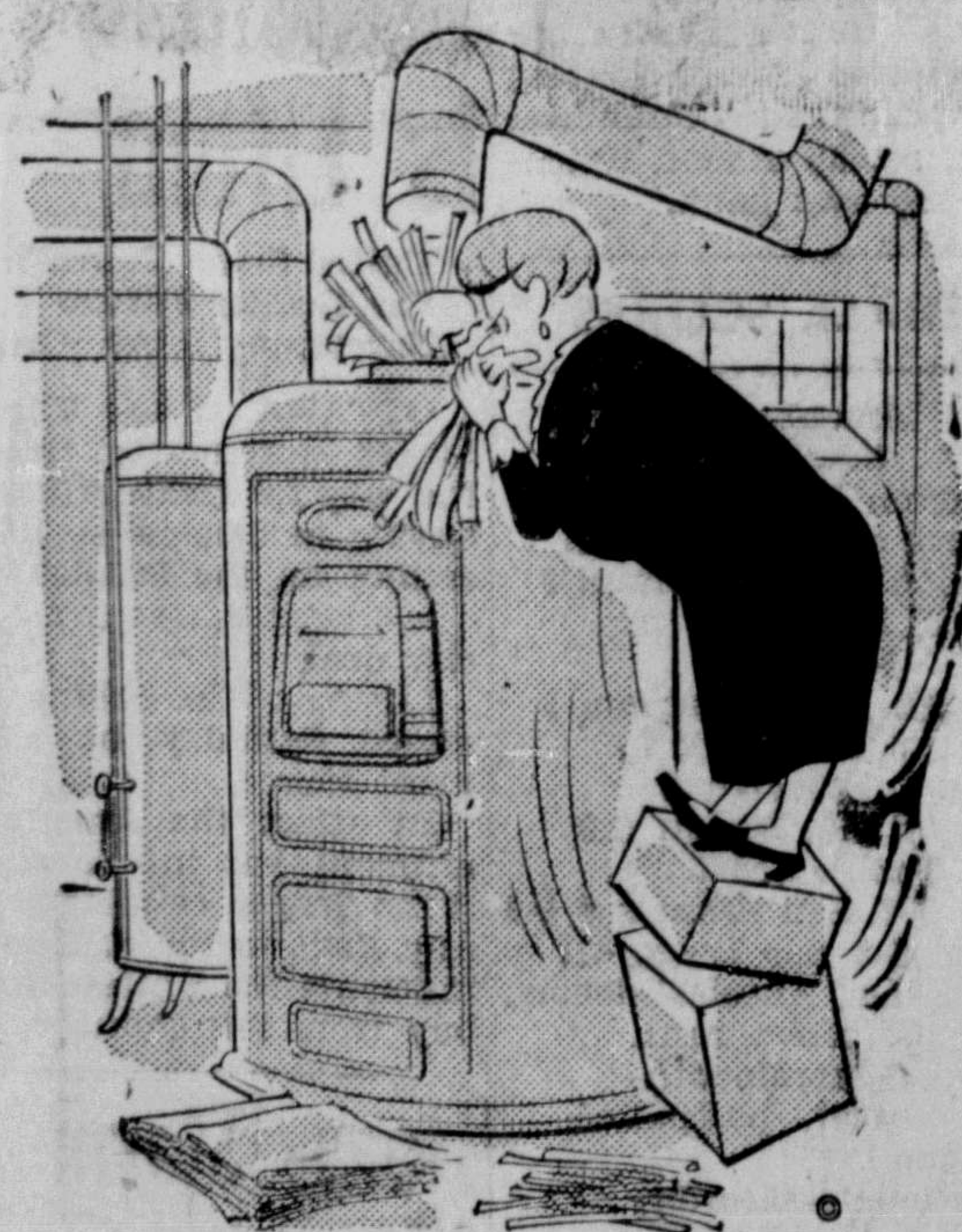

said after measuring 800 outside

He measured women with hips

"The accepted methods, hand-

have been to add an inch or two
all round as the sizes get bigger,"

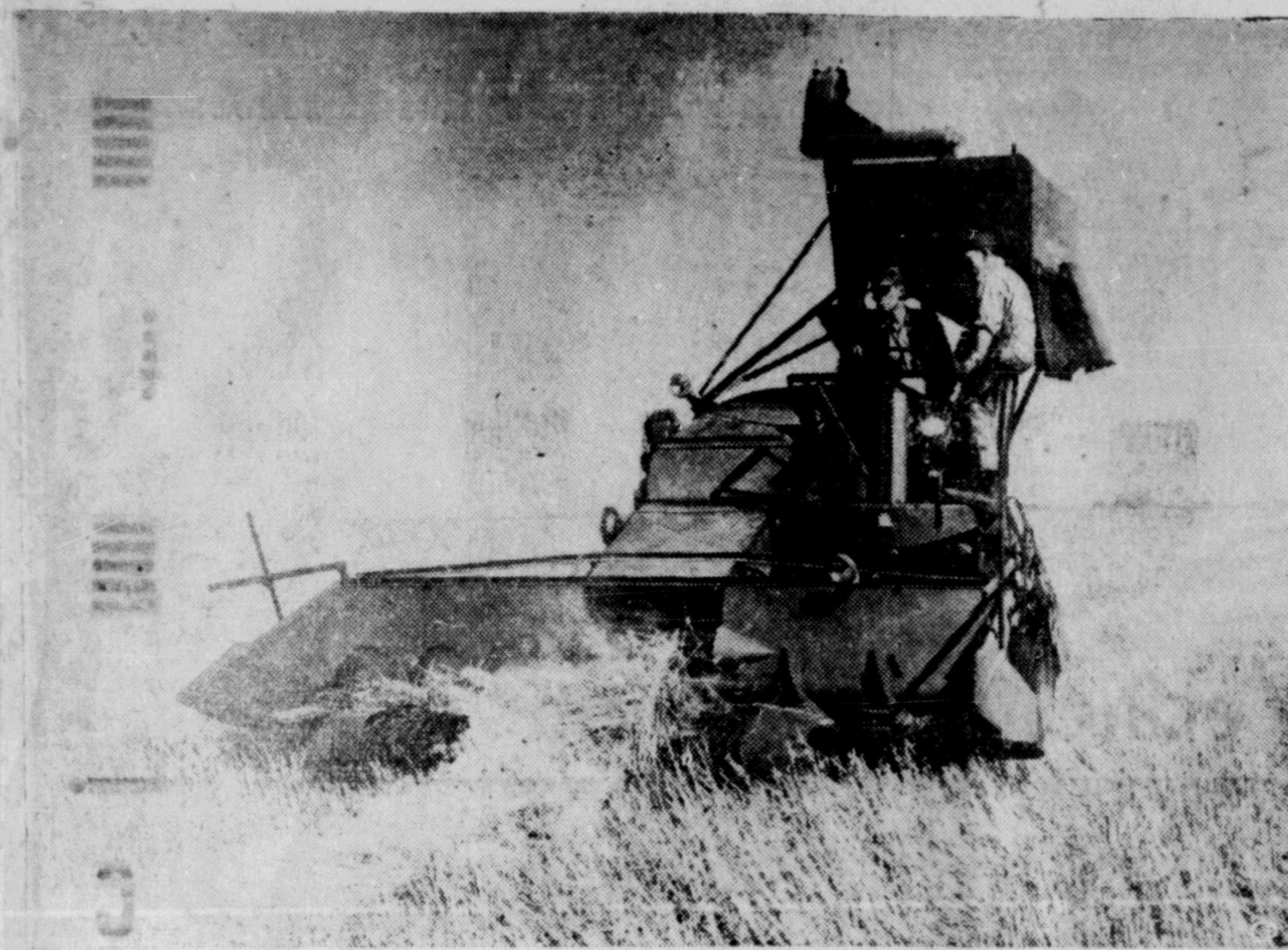

Married 71 Years Advice—Keep Busy

BRANTFORD, Ont. — Married 71 years, Mr. and Mrs. D. Frank Roy of Brant County have a suggestion for making a success of marriage: maintain a cheerful outlook and always keep busy.

At 93, Mr. Roy still keeps busy on the farm that has been in the family for more than a century. He raises chickens and does odd chores around the farm.

Mrs. Roy, who admits only that she is a few years younger than her husband, does her own housework, her shopping and says she likes the movies. She made her annual trip to the Canadian National Exhibition again this year, but couldn't persuade her husband to go along.

"When you get up in your 90's, you don't want to go to the fair," he told her.

Mrs. Roy vividly recalls Sept. 10, 1897—her wedding day. It was also the day she and her husband drew the horse-drawn trolley cars of New York city, where they spent their honeymoon.

To celebrate the anniversary, they held a big dinner for the immediate family and held open house for their numerous friends the rest of the day. Mr. Roy was resplendent in a new wine-colored dress, specially bought for the occasion.

The Roes, who still live in the white brick farm house Frank built for his bride, had a family of three—two girls and a boy. One daughter survives. They have seven grandchildren, six great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild—Susan Waddell of Hamilton, born last July.

As a direct anti-inflationary measure increase minimum payments are being required as from today on instalment buying and time for completing payments is being shortened.

Ray Reflects and Reminisces

Ghost towns linger in British Columbia. There are more in the south than up north. That, no doubt, is explained by the fact of camps appearing earlier, nearer the United States border. Phoenix was one of these. A broadcast, the other evening, recited some of its luster, if limited, history. There are thousands of old timers still in the province who can recall the Kootenays. They can see again the days when times were indeed flush and to whom the story of Phoenix could not come as news, but to this generation, it might be of rare interest. No town lacked "characters." Each camp had its day of fond expectations, its boom, and its lush glory. And then, the slow but inescapable declining years, inaction and finally little else, other than a return to wilderness silence.

Phoenix must have been the home of super-optimists, who would tell freely why they had become that way. If there were any pessimists they might have become discouraged. Surely, here was the wrong atmosphere. Yet there was one man who, above all others, clearly perceived, or thought he did, a coming city.

Adam Forepaugh, or so he called himself, is said to have had an ambition that would not languish. He wished to be the mayor, and there he remained until the desire of his heart was gratified. He became, indeed, His Worship, the mayor, the board of aldermen, the city solicitor, the clerk and the janitor, as well as any other minor office holder it was necessary to find. By this time Phoenix was becoming shy on population. Forepaugh was the sole resident. Yet a mere detail, such as people, never worried the brisk first magistrate. Tourists and other visitors might make casual inquiries as to local conditions and replies were prompt and informing.

There must be almost countless ghost towns, scattered from the Arctic to the Gulf of California, and many have a long history. It cannot be said of some, as years multiplied that they actually expired. They have been the home of colorful ancients whose faith could not weaken, and who liked to stick around, anyway. They seem, in a mysterious way, to be alive more in the past than in the present.

Northern British Columbians need go no further than Cariboo to hear worth-while tales, and ponder diverting scenes. The story of Barkerville goes back to the beginning of things—to days when railroads were unknown, and Confederation hadn't been heard of. Barkerville must be able to look back over a century of history, at times memorable, and often as not, quiet enough. P. don't call Barkerville a ghost town. She is still alive, and on occasions, kicking.

Closest of all the ghost towns to Prince Rupert is the famous mining and smelter camp of Anyox which, in its heyday a quarter of a century ago and more, was as modern a community could be found in B.C.'s swank restaurant, well appointed theatre, fine recreation hall, it had all the civilized amenities and had a population which was definitely of what was known as the "fast type." Today, Anyox, largely burned out and dismantled of its multi-million dollars' worth of machinery and equipment, except for its power house, is as sad a scene of desolation and nostalgic memories as any town in British Columbia. There was a relationship in a way between Phoenix and Anyox. Both were Granby towns and, when Phoenix died, many people went from there to Anyox. In Prince Rupert are survivors of both towns who remember such colorful figures as F. M. Sylvester, "Wake" Williams, O. B. Smith, the Wing boys and others.

Yet another ghost town in these parts is Sovarson Bay, which for a few years was a thriving pulp manufacturing centre. However, it never attained the fame or affluence of Anyox.

London Salon Closing Down

LONDON — Captain Edward Molyneux, British born dress designer of Paris and London fame is closing his London salon.

Molyneux, who made his name in Paris after the first world war—holding his own among such names as Dior, Fath, Paquin and Balmain—has shops in Paris, Biarritz, Cannes and Monte Carlo. The London premises were opened in 1932.

After 18 years in Grosvenor Street, the Molyneux doors will finally close in mid-November. No further orders are being taken but the workshop is completing all outstanding commitments.

The designer, who lost an eye

in the 1914-18 war, has recently been experiencing trouble with the remaining eye. He finally accepted his doctors' advice against the strain of maintaining premises in both countries. For many years he has travelled monthly between Paris and London, giving seasonal fashion shows in both cities.

FIRST BREAK
His first break with London came this July when he found himself unable to contribute to the fall shows presented by London's big ten fashion designers.

His first trip to England since May was made for the sole purpose of personally conveying the bad news to his London staff of 350, many of whom have been with him for the full 18 years.

"He was terribly upset and returned to Paris immediately," said his sister, who has been his assistant from the start.

His departure will make it difficult for British clients to continue as patrons. The British

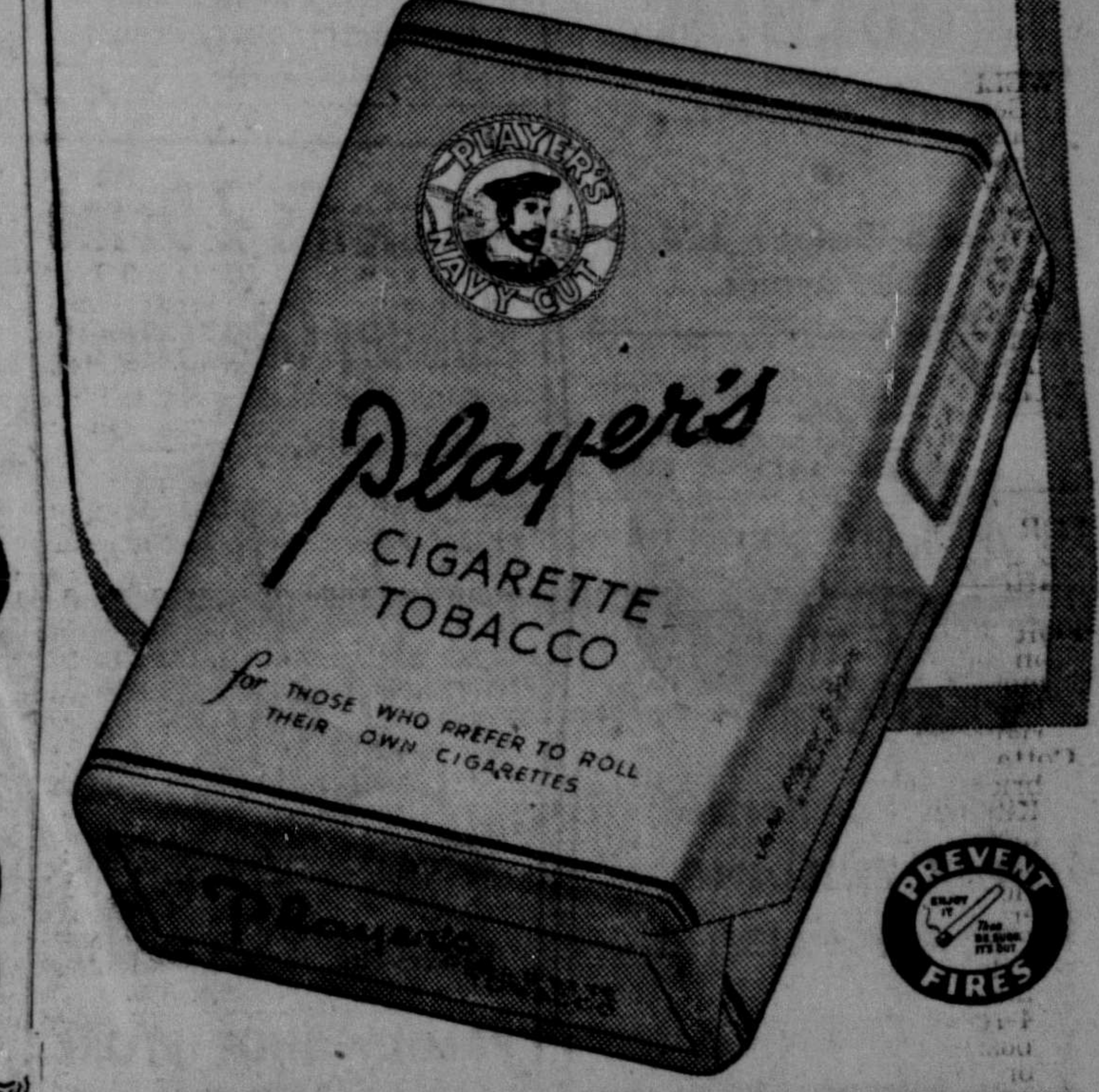

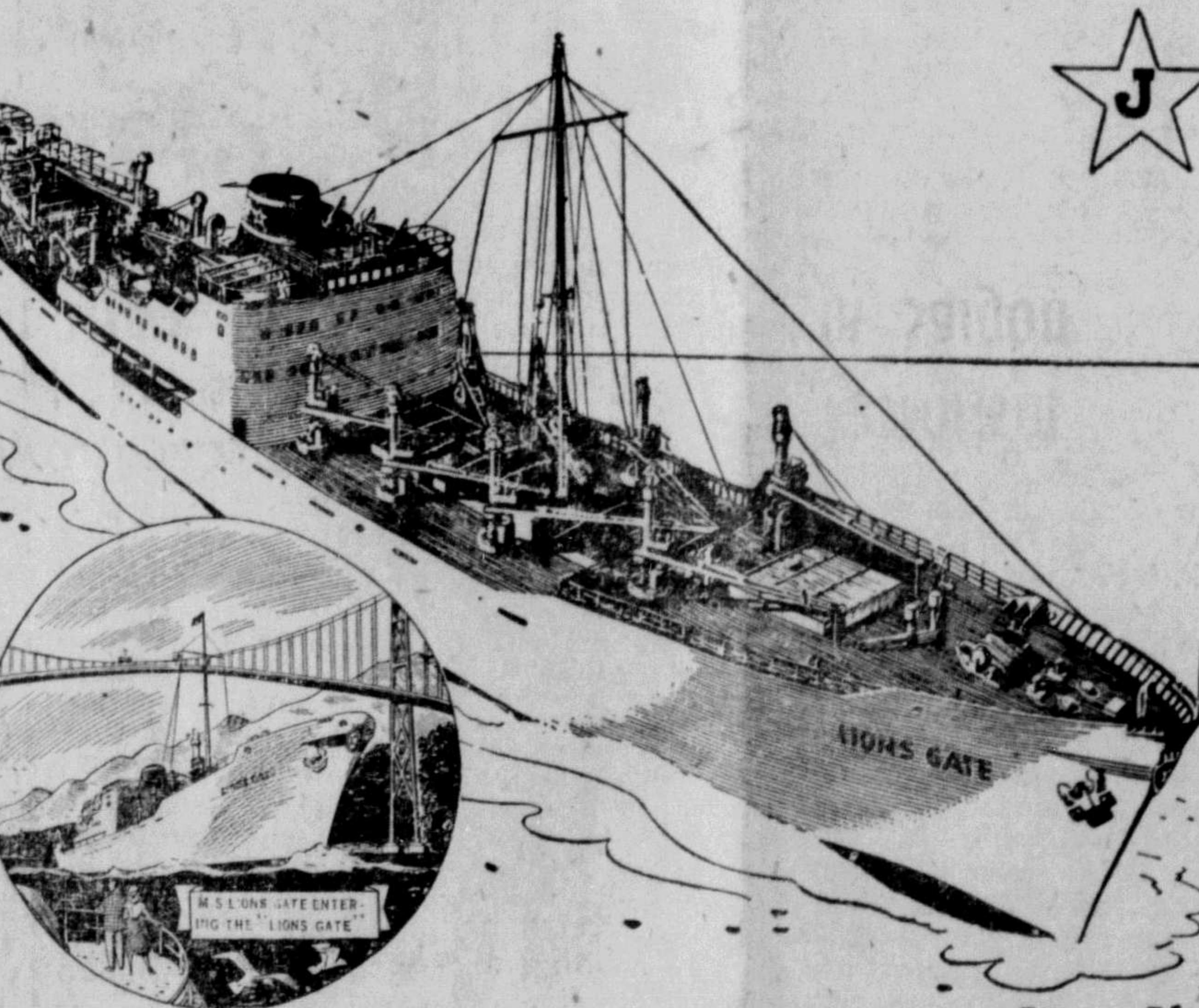
