German said.

WHEAT POOL LOSS

The Alberta Pooi alone lost \$6.000.000 as a result of overpayment to members when the wheat price dropped 60 cents a bushel in 1929; he added. In the fact of these losses and despite continued low price for grain, the prairie wheat farmers did not lose their faith in the co-operative idea of marketing, Mr. German declared. Instead, they sought to widen their organization to pull out of the slump.

Churchill Speaks Again

THE WORLD was almost shocked by Winston Churchill at Fulton, Missouri, three years ago when, at the invitation of President Truman, he delivered a speech in which he drew attention rather frankly to the danger of Soviet Russia to world peace. The dogged old British war hero was accused of war-mongering and stirring up trouble generally. It was with a notably different attitude of sympathetic receptiveness with which Churchill's speech at Boston last night, none the less candid in regard to Russia, was heard. Events of the intervening time have more than vindicated Churchill at Fulton. What he said at Boston last night will be accepted as merely realistic. It was a candid dissertation on current international conditions. Yet there was also something about it of the hopeful and even, what is unusual in Churchill, something Micawberlike-something may turn up to ease the situation, he suggested. The doughty British spokesman spoke not as a student or a scientist, admitting that he was neither, but it was to be noted the great respect and admiration which was so obviously expressed by his audience of scientific masters and students.
