PUBLICITY BODY IS FACING CRISIS Danger that the Prince Rupert Public Relations Council may have to curtail its year's publicity program for Prince

Rupert if its current financial campaign fails to meet public support was stressed at the monthly meeting of the joint publicity body last night. A month ago the council sent out appeals to more than 150 city business firms, some of which contributed to a similar campaign in 1945, outlining the publicity work done since its formation in that year and asking that contributions be made on either a one-year or threeyear basis.

At last night's meeting, Secretary E. T. Applewhaite reported that returns so far have been disappointing. Follow-up contacts will be made by a campaign committee within the next few days.

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NATIONALIZATION

URING the next seven weeks until Whitsuntide. when the British Labor Party Conference is to be held, controversy over nationalization will rage powerfully in Britain. The centre of it may well be in Parliament where the Iron and Steel Bill will be carried further. But the Labor Party's new statement of policy under the title of "Labor Believes in Britain," which seeks to persuade Britain to believe in Labor for another five years of government, contains proposals for more nationalization that somewhat refresh the stock of argument on both

- If the Labor Party is returned again in 1950 it will offer to nationalize industrial assurance, the cement and sugar industries, minerals, water supply (already almost entirely under public ownership by local authorities) wholesale meat distribution and cold storage, and it will hold out threat, warning or encouragement to parts of the chemical industry, and to shipbuilding that they too may

NOT TOO SOON-As anyone who has had any experience in mucking around with clay will confirm, one can dig or cultivate soil too soon in the spring or too soon after a heavy shower. If stirred up while still really wet, heavy soil is liable to bake into lumps as hard as brick. And it doesn't do a bit of good, and it, may cause some harm, to cultivate even light loam while it is wet. Technical people have various scientific tests for determining whether it is safe told cultivate, but the old gardener simply takes a walk around. If the soil is muddy and sticks to his boots then he finds other jobs indoors. But if the soil is damp but doesn't squeeze tightly together ,it is just right to cultivate. And this rule holds good whether the winter snows have just gone or after a heavy spring shower.

Well-rooted cow manure is probably the best, as it is well-balanced. Any kind, however, will be useful, but because it is so strong poultry manure should be used sparingly. Another excellent source of plant food will be the compost heap. Every garden, no matter Get Kelloggs how small, should have one. This is a hidden spot where all vegetables refuse is piled, stuff like weeds, grass clippings, straw, leaves, even garbage, provided it is free from tin cans and glass which will not rot.
