Does It Balance?

REPORTS from the United States show that 547 persons lost their lives over the four day Memorial Day week-end. Whether the pleasure derived from the holiday is commensurate with the grief and misery is a moot question.

Few, if any, would want to return to the days when travel was slow and the average life span was shorter than it is today. In those days deaths from disease were much higher; industrial accidents were higher; but deaths on the roads and highways were almost negligible. Fewer persons were in a position to take a four-day week-end; so that travel on highways was lighter, perhaps enough lighter to put the 330 traffic accident death of the week-end on a par with those suffered in Dobbin's day. Perhaps the one killed in an automobile accident for more than a million of population in a four day period is not high at all. Even projected at that rate over the period of a year it means about one in 46,000.

But it is true that, with all the safety devices on modern automobiles, there should be little possibility of accidents if drivers are on the alert. Perhaps more thorough testing of drivers would tend to reduce even that relatively small percentage of accidents.

WHAT'S INSIDE COUNTS

FINANCIAL POST has dug up one for the sleek and-streamlined school of industrial designers to ponder.

Cows today look much the same as they did in Noah's time—same number of legs, eyes, ears, etc. They are a little larger and certainly better fed, but they come with the same standard equipment. But a good milk cow today would flick her tail with proud disdain at the miserable half-gallon buckets that held the milk one of her ancestors could produce just a century ago. A two-gallon pail is, on an average, the size of the pail today, and in some 1950 commercial herds a four-gallon container is closer to a single cow's capacity. Carnation Ormsby Madcap Fayne, a Holstein with a milking record of 41,943 lb. in one year, boasts a daily milk output that would have frightened her forebears entirely out of the milk business and into some less competitive line of production (or caused them to protest unfair tactics to the bovine union).

The moral, of course, is that you don't need a radically new fender and radiator design to make a superior automobile, or refrigerator or toaster. It's what's inside that counts.

Victoria Report

Who Will Be Next Lieutenant Governor?—Coalition Boat Still Rocking

VICTORIA—This capital heard the other day from Ottawa that Lieutenant-Governor Charles A. Banks may resign his office in the autumn, a full year before his term is up.

There could be some truth to this. It is known the Lieutenant-governor and his wife have not been particularly happy at Government House. They have cut down on entertainment, have frequently been absent. Twice a year His Honor finds it necessary to go to San Francisco on private business. Two years ago he went to England. Now he's in England again. This necessitates swearing-in of Chief Justice Gordon Sloan as administrator of affairs of state. The Ottawa Government, which appoints Lieutenant-Governors, take a dim view of the King's representative being out of the province so much.

Who to get to succeed Lieutenant-Governor Banks is a problem confronting the Provincial Government, which recommends a man for the highest office in the province. There was talk not long ago of former Premier John Hart but it's now thought hardly likely he would accept. The government would like Hon. and Mrs. E. W. Hamber or Hon. and Mrs. W. C. Woodward back in Government House. Their regimes were among the most popular in the province's history. Mentioned too is Norman A. Yarrow, millionaire retired shipbuilder, Col. Victor Spencer, Austen Taylor and Victoria native son R. H. B. Ker. Then there's Hon. R. W. Mayhew, Minister of Fisheries. There's talk he will soon leave the federal cabinet. He can become a Senator if he wants. But that way lies obscurity. He's a rich man, he loves to live in Victoria, he would make a perfect Lieutenant-Governor and his wife a gracious chateleine.

Finding a man to be Lieutenant-Governor these days is no easy task. There aren't so many rich men about as there used to be. Although the taxpayers put out \$40,000 a year to maintain Government House, it costs the Governor about the same sum in entertainment and staff wages. Not many men are able, or willing, to part with so much, even for the prestige of the highest office in the province.

There's some talk that Government House may be closed, that the government would maintain a hotel suite for the next Lieutenant-Governor or have the Chief Justice carry on. Comparatively few provinces in the country now have Government House. Even Ontario some years ago closed its gubernatorial mansion.

Government House is purely social. Biggest events of the year are the Christmas reception and the August garden party. There are also two state dinners for cabinet ministers and members of the Legislature, as well as a number of formal luncheons, parties for the blind and the orphans.

The Coalition boat continues to rock. Everyone is wondering whether a break will come before the next session with the Conservatives ousting the C.C.F. as official Opposition, with Mr. Anscomb being Leader of the Opposition instead of Harold Winch.

B. C. Liberal Association President H. G. T. Perry has been in Victoria for some days recently talking to Liberal stalwarts. He said he's not going about the country advocating immediate dissolution of coalition as some people seem to think. Speaking as a private Liberal, not as president of the Association, he says that it's his opinion Coalition will be broken before the next election. He says there cannot be peace and harmony in the Coalition as long as it's composed of two opposing political organizations. Talk of peace and harmony, he says, in that forthright way of his, is humbug and cant. The Coalition was necessary, he repeats, in time of war emergency, but today it is a house built on sand. And then he said he would paraphrase Patrick Henry "Why cry peace, when there is no peace?"

No, though Mr. Perry doesn't want to cause trouble, you can see when he talks that he's advising Liberals. Coalition must end in the interest, not only of the Liberal party, but in the interest of the people as well.

Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

Spring is bringing with it an abundance of fresh fruits and vegetables which the thrifty housewife will want to hold for less productive seasons and, for many, this will involve home canning.

The home economists have many good ideas and hints about canning that they would like to pass on in the hope that they will be found useful.

First of all, foods do not miraculously improve in flavour or appearance during canning, therefore fruits and vegetables to be canned should be of the highest quality. In addition, they should be canned as soon as possible after gathering. The home economists emphasize the point "only tender, young vegetables and well-formed, mature fruits should be canned."

Before the canning season really gets under way, it is important to check on utensils to make sure that they are in good condition. Pressure canners are now used by many housewives the year round but if, by chance, they have been stored away for the winter, they should be taken out well ahead of time and thoroughly checked, particularly the penings to the petcock, safety valve and pressure gauge.

Glass sealers should be checked carefully to make sure they are not cracked or nicked in the rim. New glass tops or metal crew bands may be required as well as new rubber rings. When buying rubber rings, be sure to get the correct size for the sealers. The narrow rings are for the screw top sealers and the wider ones for the spring top sealers. The boxes in which the rings are sold are clearly marked with the trade-names of the sealers on which they should be

used. Rubber rings should not be used a second time.

When tin cans are to be used, the sealing machines should be carefully inspected and a test can sealed to see that the machine is working perfectly.

There are two methods of packing . . . hot pack and cold pack. The hot pack is the method recommended for canning vegetables. In this method, the product is actually packed into the containers while boiling hot and then processed for the required time.

The cold pack is an excellent method to use for fruits or tomatoes. As the name implies, the food is packed cold into the sealer or can and is then covered with either hot or cold liquid and then processed. This method should never be used for canning vegetables.

A few minutes spent in careful planning and checking with last year's results will show the homemaker which method she prefers for each of the products to be canned. It is a good idea

to look at the vacant spots in the storage shelves because they tell one very quickly what the family liked best and, no doubt, one will want to do up more of the favorites this year.

Modern methods of canning recommend leaving a headspace when packing. Headspace is the space between the surface of the liquid and the rim of the container. Leaving such a space helps to prevent loss of liquid from sealers or bursting of tin cans.

After processing, the sealers should be cooled in an upright position, out of draughts, with some space between them for circulation of air. Tin cans are cooled by plunging them immediately into cold water. Changing the water frequently helps to speed up the cooling.

The canning bulletin has been revised recently and is now available, free of charge. This bulletin will be a boon to the home-canning novice since it not only gives all the steps in canning fruits and vegetables but also

Big Halibut In Old Days

Through the courtesy of Jack Cobb, a page of the Evening Empire, dated Saturday, July 27, 1912, found its way to the News office yesterday. It is featured with a two column illustration of a huge halibut hanging in front of a small shop in Rupert Road. Thirty-eight years ago, Rupert Road was in the heart of the business district, being situated in the immediate neighborhood of where the railway station now stands. The picture, which bears the caption, "The Kind of Halibut They Catch Off Prince Rupert," is of timely interest. The halibut looks heavy enough to rival the one that today is the centre of the weight guessing contest now being held in connection with the Manitoba Flood relief fund.

The cut in the old Empire includes the photos of three pioneers, Jim Bacon, Jimmy Thomas and Wm. Cummins. They are grouped around the fish, and in all likelihood were discussing its size. The figures 300 pounds

Questions About Halibut Fishing

Following questions and answers pertaining to the vexed question of changes in international halibut regulations and the authority to make them appear in a recent issue of Hansard from Ottawa:

- Mr. Green:**
1. Has the international fisheries commission requested that the halibut treaty be amended to give the commission power to regulate the halibut fisheries, for instance by splitting the season?
 2. Has the United States government signified its willingness to amend the treaty?
 3. Have any recommendations been made by the Department of Fisheries to the governor in council that the treaty should be amended?
 4. If not, for what reason were recommendations withheld?
 5. Has the commission supplied the Department of Fisheries with data indicating that some 4,000,000 pounds more halibut could be taken annually if the treaty was so amended?

6. Did the commission in 1949 hold open hearings at all principal fishing ports?

7. Was the consensus of opinion in favor of extending the season?

8. Has the United States government informed the commission that under the present treaty they have no power to split the season?

Mr. MacNaught:

1. Yes.
2. Yes.
3. No.
4. The proposed amendments to the treaty were varied in kind, and among them were proposals which, if sanctioned, would involve the halibut commission directly in the regulation of the halibut fishery for economic and marketing purposes as well as for conservation. This would mean a significant change in the original terms of reference to the commission. Strong differences of opinion have been expressed by different sections of the Canadian industry on the desirability of this extension of power to an international commission. Discussions with the fishing industry are still being held with a view to achieving some reconciliation of these views.
5. No data have been supplied, but in our estimates this year we are asking for additional funds to provide our share in increasing the commission's scientific investigations into this question.
6. Yes.
7. Yes, but not under the formula of the split season as proposed by certain sections of the fishing fleets.
8. Yes.

As I See It

JIM WRIGHT'S BOOK
A MONTREAL reader wants to know where she can get Slava Bohu, Jim Wright's book on the Doukhobors. The publishers, Nelsons, say it is out of print and she thinks that's a shame.
It is a shame.
There ought to be a new edition of that book. It is the only one that I know about which gives the background of the Doukhobor history—who they are, and why they came to Canada.
It won the Governor-General's prize but you never find it now outside public libraries.
WHAT'S IN A NAME? Plenty. Often the difference between success and failure in book sales. "Slava Bohu" is not a good name with which to sell a book. A tabloid editor would call it "The Naked Truth." The story of the Doukhobors is a fascinating one. More Canadians should know it.
I hope Nelsons put out a new edition brought up to date. For

instance, they might include a bit about how the Doukhobors lost the vote in Canada. I can't vouch for this, but here's how I heard it:
On Peter Lordy Verigin's advice they once all voted Liberal. That so outraged the late R. B. Bennett that he later had the voting laws amended. R. B. was not doing this to be vindictive. He honestly thought that such mobilized voting was the negation of democracy.
THE ATTORNEY GENERAL of B.C. has set up an advisory committee on Doukhobor relationships. It is a good move—but only if it leads to something that is long overdue—namely consistent social engineering in regard to all the Doukhobors.
The old British Colonial Service, and even the government of Communist Russia, is far ahead of Canada in this respect. In both cases trained social welfare workers were given permanent assignments with minority groups who presented some sort of problem to modern national life.
We in Canada have to long accepted the traditional American "melting pot" theory. The idea was to bring over immigrants from Europe, either individually or in groups, and dump them down here. They were supposed to fit themselves into society.
In most cases that is exactly what has happened. Indeed, the most important thing to remember about the Doukhobor troubles of 1950 is this:
Behind the latest outbreaks of exhibitionism is the knowledge, by the small minority, that the vast majority of Doukhobors have already fitted themselves into the general picture of Canadian life. There is the fear that all Doukhobors will lose their differences and

In my opinion, it could transform the whole Doukhobor community into a shining asset to Canada. For in many respects the Doukhobors are far ahead and far above the rest of us.


