Will Atomic Age Be Last?

N THIS AGE, when there are so many political movements for establishing a perfect and permanent Utopia for mankind, it is an ironic coincidence that the very basis of such an ideal structure of society has been shaken by the atomic bomb. This disclosure of the secret of matter, in the dissection and explosion of the atom, has revealed to man that his material domain is not only insecure, but that it is evanescent. Science has confirmed the teachings of Christianity, that "things that are seen are temporal," and that, as Prospero declared, "The great globe itself, yea, all which inherit, shall dissolve and, like this insubstantial pageant faded, leave not a rack behind." Astronomers tell us that the solar system was originally a fiery nebula, and that our earth and the rest of the planets were formed in the process of cooling. They say that the interior of the earth is still in a compressed molten state, and that we are living on a comparatively thin, cooled-off crust which is liable to collapse or be blown up as it contracts. That has happened many times before. The story of those convulsions is written clearly in the rocks; the mountain ranges are the monuments of gigantic upheavals, while our active volcanoes today tell of interior fires of which they are the chimneys and the safety-valves. From this it would appear that the earth itself is an electric bomb which is continually exploding where it can find an outlet. Sir James Jeans claimed that at the centres of most of the stars "the electrons must have broken loose from their parent atoms, leaving the stellar matter pulverized." That is what happens, some declare, when an atomic bomb explodes. Some months ago a French scientist warned of the possibility of setting up a chain of atomic detonations that would blow up the whole earth. That was laughed off, but it reminds one of the Scriptural prediction that "the elements will burn with fervent heat," which is a good description of the effect of the explosion of an automic bomb.
