Halibut Boat Sunset In Disaster

Were Feared Lost In Upsizing Of Sunset

Marine Tragedy In False Pass In Aleutian Chain—Vessel Was Well Known Here

Word was received here this morning that the halibut boat Sunset had foundered north of the Aleutian chain with the apparent loss of five men of her crew. The Sunset was well known as a three men died, two are missing and four survived when the fishing vessel was last night in the frigid Pacific waters, United Coastguard headquarters here reported today.

PRINCE RUPERT—Two youths killed and five persons injured in a crash between a truck and a car on the highway at Kokislah, 35 miles north of Victoria last night.

Injured are Stanley Dyke Crofton, driver of the truck, who suffered a fractured rib, face cuts and severe lacerations; Eyvon Fortin of Lake, serious injuries; Mrs. Amelia Larofe, Victoria, demur and severe lacerations; her son, Ronald, four, forehead.

Fortin is believed to suffer internal injuries. Report was that the truck crashed into a two-wheeled car which had pulled over the side because of light rain.

Construction Of New Hotel Expected Soon

Fine Hostelry and Theatre Structure to Take Year to Complete—Principals Coming to City

Construction of Prince Rupert's magnificent new "Charles M. Hays Hotel," projected 165-room hostelry on Canadian National Railways park property on Second Avenue which has just been acquired as the site, is expected to get under way by late summer. The handsome building of steel and concrete, including up-to-date theatre as well as the modern hotel with all facilities and services, is expected to take about a year to erect. As already announced, the overall cost of the project is estimated at about \$2,500,000, a company with capitalization to this amount having been incorporated by important American and British interests.

Olier Besner, Prince Rupert pioneer, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon from Vancouver on business in connection with further preliminaries of the project.

"The whole project," Mr. Besner said "is based on the acceptance of the fact that a new era is opening up in the industrial development not only of the city of Prince Rupert but the whole of the north country, something which we have long confidently anticipated and which can certainly be delayed no longer as evidenced by such events as the coming of the Celanese Corporation of America and other impending developments."

Dramatic Move By Russia Expected At Paris Parley

Important Speech to Be Made By President Truman at Week-end

PARIS (CP)—Western officials look for a new and dramatic move by Russia when the council of foreign ministers reconvenes tomorrow. Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky of Russia had asked before adjournment yesterday that no meeting be held today. His western colleagues agreed to the Russian's cryptic request.

The western officials speculated that Vishinsky, after consulting with the Kremlin, might make a move that could change the course of the Paris conference.

Meantime, it was announced in Washington that President Truman would make an important speech this week-end on the international situation.

ALBERNI'S SKIPPER SURPRISED AT PUBLICITY OVER SHIP'S MISHAP

More than a bit puzzled about all the publicity that had accompanied the beaching of his ship in Fitzhugh Sound this week, Capt. Joe Peterson of the government lighthouse tender Alberni put the damaged vessel into dry dock here this morning, then told a brief, unadorned tale of what had happened.

"I don't know where they got all those stories about us," he said. "All that happened was that we sprang a leak in Queen Charlotte Sound and had to beach her at Clark Point."

A patch on the Alberni's bottom, just aft of midships on the starboard side showed where the leak had opened, but it will not be until Monday that the extent of her damage will be known.

The patch—it looks like a neatly placed poultice—was put there by George Collins, a diver on the tug Salvage King, which accompanied the Alberni from Safety Cove on Calvert Island where she was beached a second time for temporary repair.

"We were in Queen Charlotte Island, anchored off Egg Island, when we developed a bad leak," Capt. Peterson said. It was about 2 o'clock Monday morning. "I immediately started up and

headed north with the intention of beaching her at Safety Cove. However, she was filling faster than our pumps could take care of the water so we put her on the beach at Clark Point."

On Monday, the Alberni pulled herself off Clark Point with the aid of two fishing boats, the Klatawa and China Hat, and proceeded to Safety Cove where she was beached on the sandy bottom.

It was there that the Salvage King found her and that the diver placed the patch over her leaking hull.

"It was a fine patching job. We took very little water on the trip north," Capt. Peterson said. At all times the 27-man crew of the Alberni remained with the ship.

At the time the leak occurred, the Alberni was anchored off Egg Island where she was unloading building supplies for a new lighthouse. About half her cargo had been unloaded. The cargo was transferred to the Birnie and the Berens at Safety Cove and later taken to Egg Island.

The Alberni proceeded north under her own power but was escorted by the Salvage King which left for the south again shortly after arrival here.

Department of Transport Marine Agent N. A. Beketov flew south from here Tuesday, joining the Salvage King at Port Hardy.

Morse, Edgar Woodward, E. A. Evans, David Crocker, Mrs. David Crocker, Thor Sollen, W. S. Hammond, J. DeJorme, Olaf Rursviek, Mrs. G. Coulture, S. L. Peachey and Mrs. Edna Bond.

Accompanying Mr. Archibald's nomination papers was a \$200 cheque covering the deposit required by the Elections Act. Deposit cheques are returned if the candidate wins or polls more

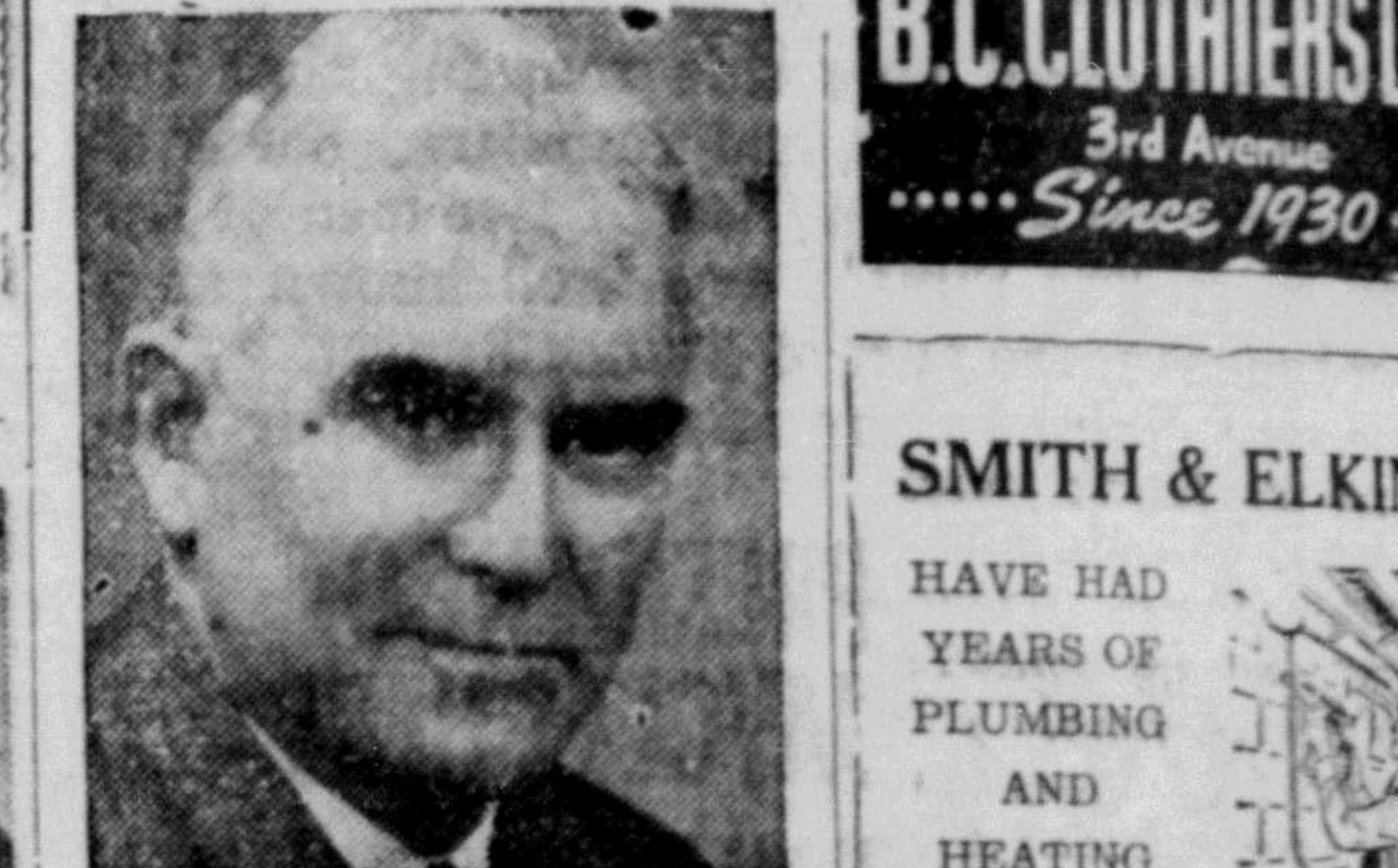

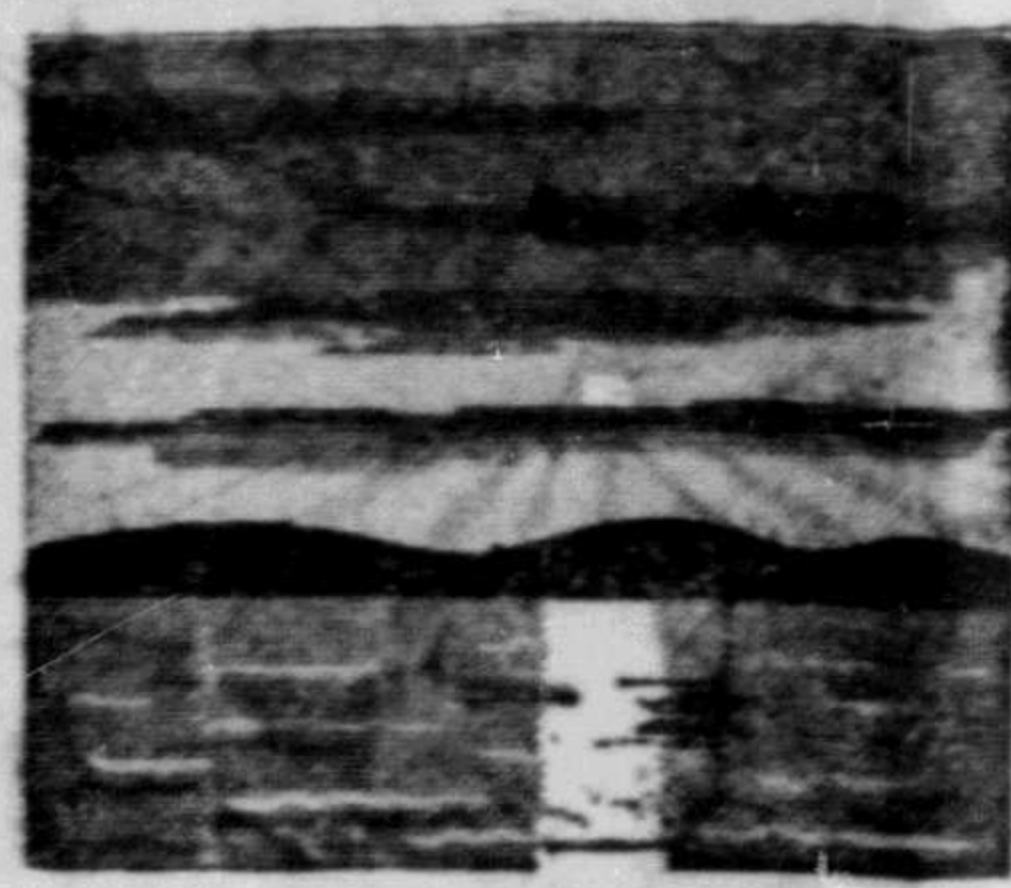

SOCKEYE SEASON OPENING JUNE 19—HALIBUT LANDINGS OVER TEN MILLION POUNDS

SOCKEY salmon gillnet season on the Skeena and Naas rivers will open at 6 p.m. Sunday, June 19, according to word received at the Dominion Fisheries office here Friday afternoon. Opening of the areas will spark the canneries season on the Skeena. Just how profitable the season will be remains to be seen, although cannery operators and fishermen alike are hoping that last year's bumper season will be repeated.

The June 19 opening date is the earliest in recent memory. In past years it has opened in the last week-end in the month. The 1948 season on the two rivers opened on June 27.

However, the opening on June 19 this year is confined to the Naas and the Skeena and does not include the whole of this fisheries district. Sockeye fishing in other parts of the district—Rivers Inlet, Bella Coola, Bella Bella, Principe Channel and Gardner Canal will not open until the following week-end, June 26. Salmon fishing will be under way on the Fraser River with preparations being already well advanced. From the port of New Westminster alone there will be an exodus of about 200 boats.

Spring salmon fishing in the district has been poor throughout the last week, continuing a trend that has held since fishing started about the middle of May. Trolling off Stephens, Dundas and the Queen Charlotte Islands has yielded poor results while gillnetting on the Skeena has been equally skimpy. About 50 boats have been gillnetting spring salmon on the Skeena. None have been operating on the Naas.

More than 10,000,000 pounds of halibut were landed at the port of Prince Rupert during the 34-day period in which Area Two was open, although part of that total will be included in the Area Three figure when complete landings for the coast are added up. Actual Area Two

landings here between the opening of the area on May 1 and its closure on June 3 were 8,380,000 pounds, the bulk of which was delivered by the regular fleet and only a small portion from the fishing camps. Canadian vessels delivered the greater part of the Area Two catch, bringing in better than 6,000,000 pounds, while American landings were 1,931,000 pounds, part of which came from Area Three.

A number of boats of the Canadian fleet which has been fishing halibut in Area Two are planning at least one trip to Area Three before they go black codding or after tuna if the latter appears this season. Among them is the Five Princes which headed out into a gale Thursday afternoon with owner, Jack Prince, at the wheel. The Five Princes made four trips into Area Three, bringing almost 100,000 pounds.

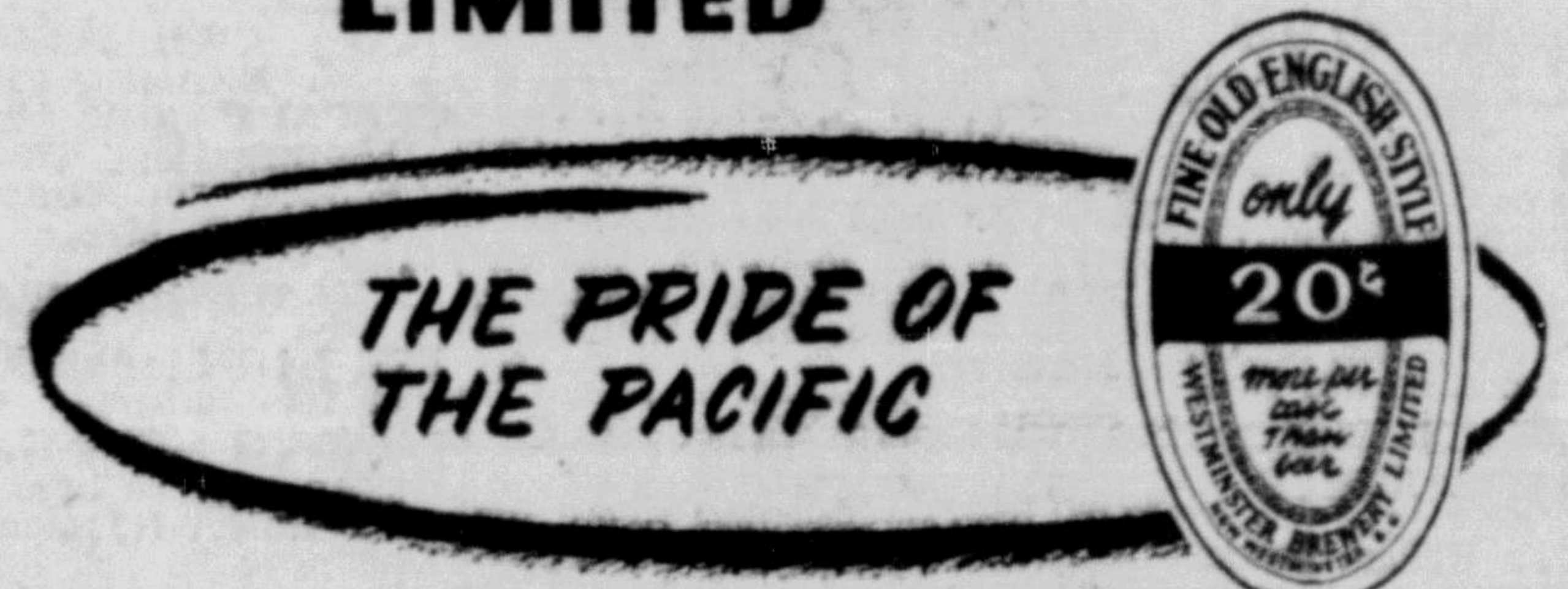

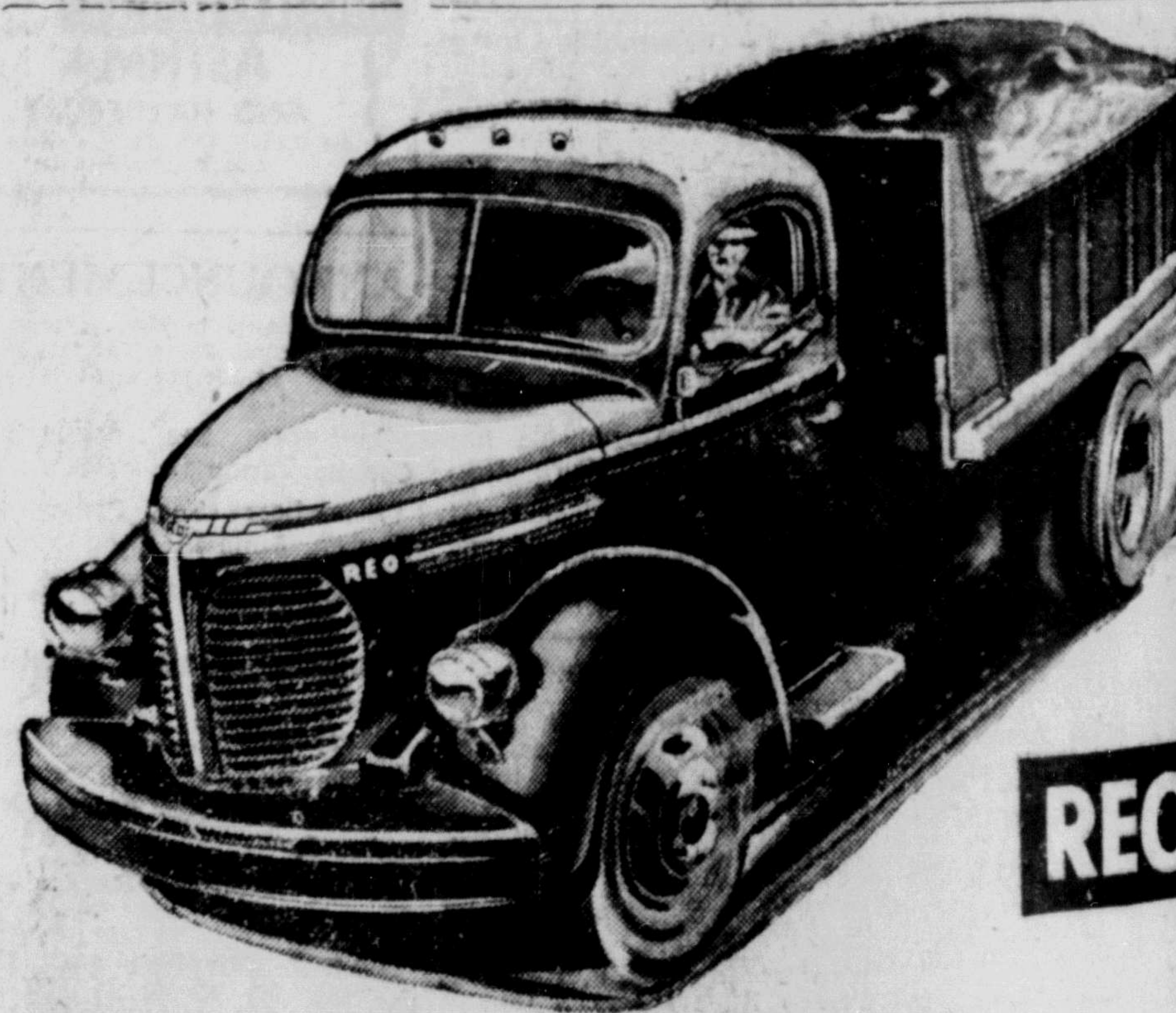

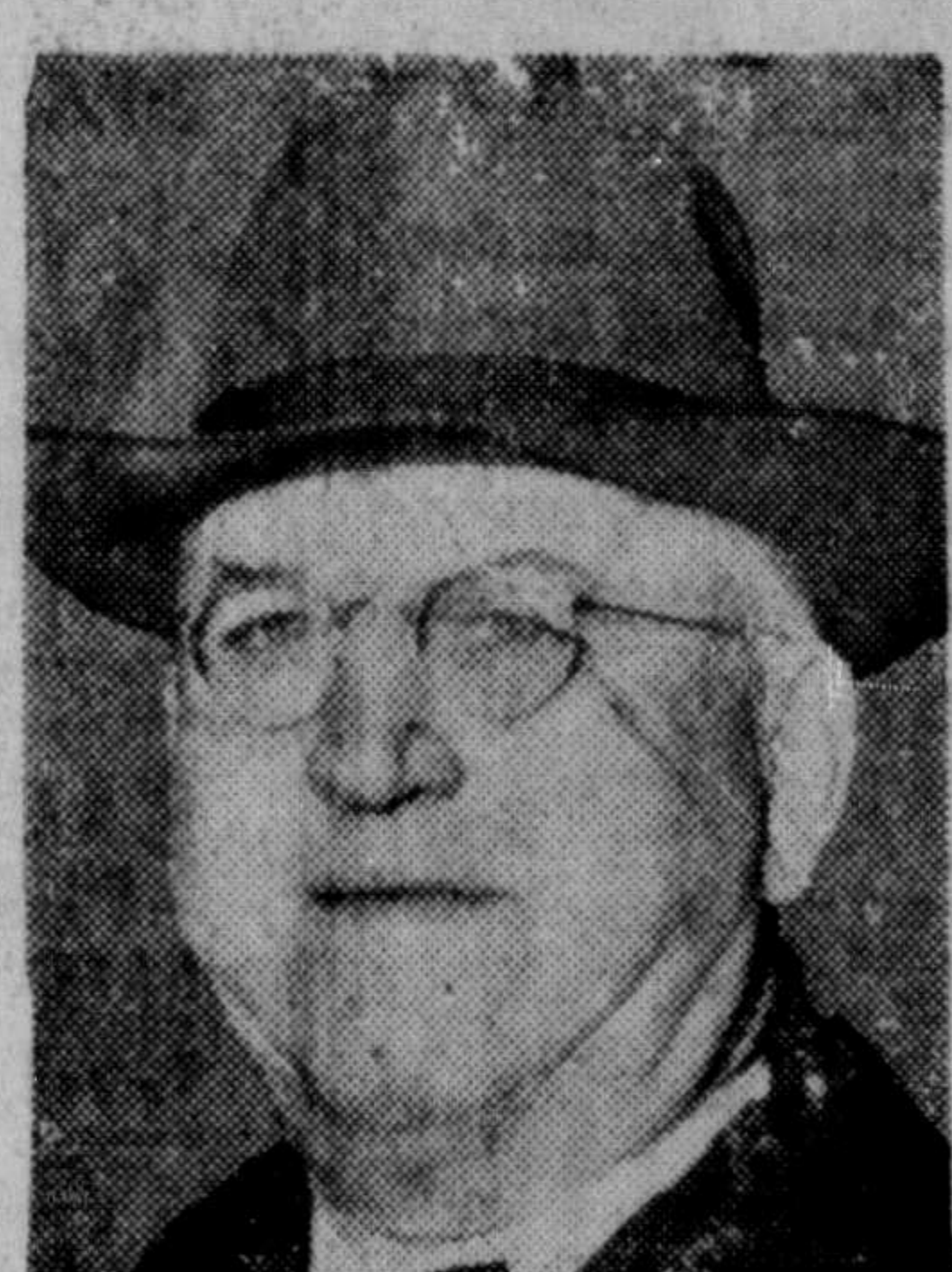

a leak in Fitzhugh Sound Monday morning, narrowly averting sinking. The Alberni was taken off the beach at Safety Cove Thursday afternoon after she had been patched sufficiently to float and was escorted more her home port here for examination and repairs at the dry dock.

The Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Kathleen—pride of the make her first northern cruise company's coastal fleet—will of the summer next week, stopping at Prince Rupert on Friday, June 17, with a substantial list of tourists. Entirely re-fitted from wartime troopship service, the Kathleen is said to be among the most luxurious vessels on the coast. Her gross tonnage is 5,908 and for day runs she has room for 1,800 passengers. However, on northern cruises, her capacity is confined to 294 for which she has sleeping accommodation in her 145 staterooms. Her dining saloon can accommodate 173 at a sitting. She will be under command of Capt. Graham O. Hughes, who has been on the Princess Louise early this summer. Capt. W. C. Hubenet is taking over the command of Louise for the summer.

The American power barge Pat B. and the Canadian fish packer Western Ranger are both back in service again following an accident at the end of last week when the former vessel had a brief stranding at Herbert Reef, south of Prince Rupert, and the latter fouled her propeller while giving assistance, having to come to the local drydock under tow of the lighter tender Birnie to have the wheel cleared. The Pat B. grounded at 11:45 p.m. on Friday. The Birnie, Capt. Norman MacKay immediately left port for the scene of the grounding. In the meantime, the Western Ranger, under charter to the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative Association, reported by radio-telephone that she was stand-

ing by the American vessel. On arrival at the location of the stranding the Birnie found that the Pat B. had been successfully refloated by the Western Ranger, but the latter vessel had herself been disabled by having her propeller fouled with the tow line. The American vessel was then standing by to render assistance to the Western Ranger. The Birnie took the Western Ranger in tow and arrived with her at dry dock at 8:00 a.m. Saturday. The Pat B. is a power barge, sixty-nine feet long, with 107 gross tonnage. She proceeded to Ketchikan under her own power, apparently undamaged in the grounding. The Western Ranger was taken on the pontoons to have the cable removed from

her propeller and has now returned to sea.

IT WAS A SEA LION

Young fur seals and sea lions may be look-alikes to landlubbers, some fishermen and even some people who have had occasion to handle fur bearing mammal's pelt but to Henry Brown of the Halibutter "Fleetwing," there is no confusion. 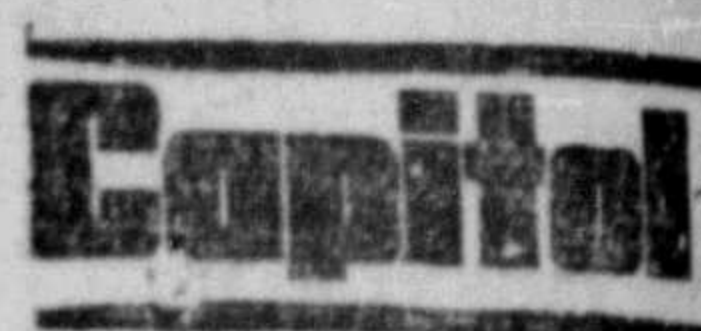
