UNITED STATES POLITICS

POLITICAL doings in United States are always of keen interest to us here in Canada and so the off-year elections on the other side attract a considerable modicum of observer interest here.

With a third of the seats in the Senate and the entire House of Representatives in competition, the actual political control of the country could be changed.

In this case, the Republicans have to win but six seats to control the Senate and 26 to dominate the House of Representatives.

After 20 years of one-party rule, what happens in these mid-term elections might well be of important significance prior to the presidential contest in 1952 which, of course, is always the most spectacular if not always of the greater importance.

CRACKPOT ACT

IT HAS BEEN part of the careers of six presidents of the United States to be shot at or otherwise made the target of assassination attempts.

In almost all cases such incidents are the work of some fanatic laboring under delusion, malicious or otherwise, as is, of course, any murderous assault.

The incident this week concerning itself with President Truman was, undoubtedly, something of this character. To go up to the executive mansion flourishing and firing pistols was, of course, unequalled.

It cost them dearly. One is dead and the other is seriously injured and charged with murder. He will probably get short shrift.

SATURDAY SERMON

By REV. LAWRENCE SIEBER (First United Church)

FOR THIS HIGH PURPOSE

The plainest of facts is this: we do not have one world. We have hoped and prayed and tried to believe that we do have one world; but we have two.

There are two ways in which two worlds can become one. One way is by total conquest, the other is by some sort of voluntary agreement. This is the first task of our time if we are to survive.

These are the facts. But what are we going to do about them? If we stop with saying: "these are the facts," then there is nothing ahead of us but the autopsy.

What is the highest truth we know? I speak with humility and with undaunted confidence to proclaim the witness of the ages to the truth which is in Christ.

If we were to go on and read further we would find what He meant by these words. We would be impressed, too, with the way that Jesus sought to face the old facts of hate, greed, lust, pride, bigotry, ill will and evil; not by fighting fire with fire which brings ruin, but with spiritual and moral forces which man can use with God, jointly in faith.

This was the terrific problem: Jesus had to wrestle with in the Garden of Gethsemane. He knew that the high cause for which He had come into the world was to be a revelation of the power of love, mercy, forgiveness, at work among men and in conflict with powers of darkness.

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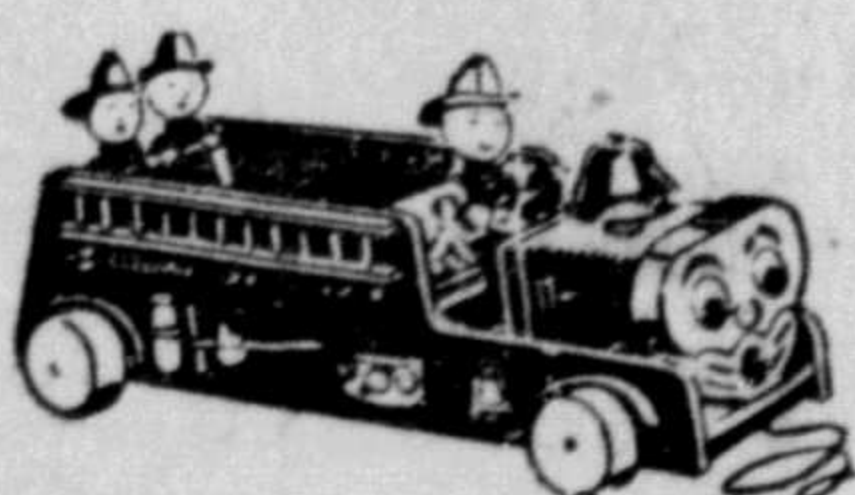
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**Mrs. Green Is Art Club Head**

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As I See It

**SHAW'S PASSING**

I WAS HAVING dinner with Gilbert McAllister, the Scots M.P. who is chairman of the all-party M.P. group in the British Parliament which favors outright world government. The newspapers carried headlines to the effect that George Bernard Shaw was at the pass-over point we humans call "death."

It turned out that we both regarded Shaw as the greatest writer of this age, and that "Saint Joan" was Shaw's greatest production.

McALLISTER TOLD me how he got to know Shaw. It was in his student days at Glasgow University. They were electing a new rector and three famous men had been nominated. These included G. K. Chesterton and Sidney Webb. Mr. Allister's sympathies were with the latter.

McAllister got the idea that George Bernard Shaw could, if he would, write something that would mean victory for Webb. He bombarded the famous playwright with letters but received no answer. However, he learned that Shaw always visited a certain spot in the Scottish highlands for a summer holiday. He took himself thither, and went walking every afternoon on Shaw's route.

You can guess the rest. He got to know the great man, Shaw turned in a 19-page masterpiece of wit and wisdom.

I FORGOT to ask how the election came out. We got talking about "Saint Joan." As most everybody knows, it is a play about Joan of Arc, who heard heavenly voices which told her to help the King of France drive the English armies home. French religious leaders ganged up with the English generals to burn Joan to death, as a witch. One of the themes in Shaw's classic play is that organized religion which persecutes great souls in one age gets hindsight and makes saints out of them a few centuries later.

But what fascinated me was that, according to McAllister,

Shaw himself told close friends that he had "heard heavenly voices" while creating that great play.

THAT DOES NOT surprise me one teeny little bit. For there is a list as long as your arm of composers, poets and writers of plain prose who have testified to the reality of similar inspiration.

These include Tennyson, Walt Whitman, Blake, Robbie Burns and hundreds of others. In fact, a Canadian psychiatrist, Dr. Bucke, of my old home town, Hamilton, Ontario, long since wrote perhaps the world's best book on the subject. It is called "Cosmic Consciousness." It gives details of inspiration or illumination of preachers, prophets, speakers, poets, playwrights and writers of plain prose.

Even those of us who write for the newspapers once in a blue moon or so get the feeling that we are writing "right on the beam," so to speak.

I SMILED to myself to think how Shaw himself would laugh if anyone said that the church might get around to making HIM Saint Bernard Shaw a few centuries hence.

Shaw delighted all his life in his reputation as an "iconoclast," which means smasher of images.

He was a destroyer of hypocrisies and shams. But all his writings that I can recall had a profoundly moral purpose. I take his best, "Saint Joan," for what does it all add up to? Surely this:

When will the human race be willing to listen to its saints when they are still alive? When will humanity quit crucifying its own redeemers?

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**Transplanted Kidney Works**

CHICAGO (AP)—A dead woman's kidney transplanted into a once-doomed woman's body June 17 is functioning, surgeons who performed the unprecedented operation reported Friday. Its activity, however, is below par and it will be some time before the permanency of the graft is definitely known. The operation may bring medical science to a new frontier—successful transplanting of whole human organs—described in the journal of the American Medical Association.
