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Pulp Mill Opening

∧ FTER three years of construction boom, Prince / \ Rupert's economy will take on a new and permanent stability with the commencement of operations next February, as announced by George Schneider, vice-president of Celanese, of the Columbia Cellulose Co. (Celanese Corporation of America) high alpha pulp plaant at nearby Watson Island.

Prince Rupert's big pulp mill, which we talked



about for so many years and almost despaired of for so long, is now almost fait accmpli. In fact, we have come to take it as a matter of course. It has become an accepted fact to such an extent that we possibly do not fully appreciate its importance.

We have had a busy time the past two or threeyears with the happy-go-lucky and careless days of the constructionist and boomer which have brought a floating, free-spending and reckless type of population. Next year, when the plant comes into operation, a change will be noted. We will be receiving a new type of worker in the skilled and high paid craftsmen-steady folk who will become worthy citizens and not the itinerant and temporary people who come to a community on any big construction job such as this.

The opening of the plant for operation will mark a new era in the history of Prince Rupert's development. .We will be an industrial community which will fit in well with our old, reliable, steady and still highly valuable fishing industry which since the very first has been our mainstay and which will, of course, go on playing a prominent part in our well-being and prosperity.

UNITED STATES POLITICS

DOLITICAL doings in United States are always of keen interest to us here in Canada and so the off-year elections on the other side attract a considerable modicum of observer interest here. The presidency is not involved except from the standpoint of significance of political trend.

With a third of the seats in the Senate and the entire House of Representatives in competition, the actual political control of the country could be changed. This has happened before in a mid-term election and has made it most embarrassing for the administration if not rendering their work almost ineffectual.

In this case, the Republicans have to win but six seats to control the Senate and 26 to dominate the House of Representatives.

After 20 years of one-party rule, what happens in these mid-term elections might well be of important significance prior to the presidential contest in 1952 which, of course, is always the most spectacular if not always of the greater importance.

CRACKPOT ACT

IT HAS BEEN part of the careers of six presidents of the United States to be shot at or otherwise made the target of assassination attempts. Of the six chief executives upon whose lives attempts have been made, three have been slain-Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley.

In almost all cases such incidents are the work of some fanatic laboring under delusion, malicious or otherwise, as is, of course, any murderous assault.

The incident this week concerning itself with President Truman was, undubtedly, something of this character. To go up to the executive mansion flourishing and firing pistols was, of course, unusual. This was obviously some sort of a crackpot act by unbalanced persons.

It cost them dearly. One is dead and the other is seriously injured and charged with murder. He will probably get short shrift.
