The vote was 314 to 289. The first test came last week, only a few days after the newlyelected government, with majority in the House of Commons whittled to six seats, began its second term.

The vote showed a Labor victory of only fourteen against Conservative. Leader Winston Churchill's attacks on the government's program to nationalize the iron and steel industry.

The Liberals, who hold only nine seats in the Commons, were responsible for the slight gain in the government's majority last night.

Tonight's test comes on a Conservative motion saying the Commons "deplores the failure of the Chancellor of the Exchetions that government departments not over spend so extensively their estimates for the current year."

Government whips in the House of Commons breathed a little easier tonight as unomicial reports circulated that nine Liberal mempers would again refuse to vote, or vote with Labor, on a new Conservative effort to unseat Prime Minister Attiee's government, In last Inursday's Tirst confidence test the Liberals voted with the Conservatives.

If the government loses, it is expected to resign, forcing a new election.







Learning to Fly —

Do you know what it feels like to get your feet off the ground K.C.'s. and zoom through the open air hands. But there is nothing to it. Learning to fly is as simple as eating home made pie. And it's safe. So say the enthusiasts of the Prince Rupert Aero Club at Seal Cove.

Engineer of the club is Bol Davis, connected with a flying company here.

The club expects to purchase another aircraft. This will enable a larger enrolment and entitle a student more flying hours in his log book. At present, Instructor Kelsey prefers to limit student hours to one hour or less in order that every member be accomo dated. But with the arrival of a second plane, the problem would be solved.

The instructor stated that learning to fly in a plane equipped with pontoons is not any simpler or any more difficult than handling a land-based aircraft. In fact, he added, knowledge gained in a sea plane is much more valuable than any instruction obtained in a wheeled craft. Graduation from a sea plane to land plane is simple.

"Nothing to it," he declared "But it may be more difficult by the vice versa method," he added.

Cost of flying instruction here as far as a sea plane is concerned is believed to be the most reasonable as compared to any school across Canada.




