## YugoSlavia Admitted to U.N. Security Council

### Dire Consequences Threatened By Russia in Violent Protest

NEW YORK (CP)—YugoSlavia won a seat on the United Nations security council today over Soviet-sponsored Czechoslovakia. The action by the 59-member General Assembly was a rebuff to the Cominform-Soviet bloc.

Vote on the second ballot was: YugoSlavia, 39; Czechoslovakia, 19.

Thirty-nine votes were required for election. YugoSlavia thus squeezed by the minimum number of votes needed.

The first ballot had been deadlocked when YugoSlavia got 37 and Czechoslovakia 21 out of 58 votes, thus forcing a second ballot in secret.

Russian United Nations Delegate Andrei Vishinsky charged that the election of YugoSlavia was a violation of the charter because it failed to take into account a provision regarding distribution of council seats. The west had previously contended that YugoSlavia was as justly qualified as Czechoslovakia to represent Eastern Europe.

Vishinsky declared that YugoSlavia's candidacy was advanced by the United States and Great Britain through behind the scenes manoeuvring.

Assembly President Carlos P. Romulo banged his gavel repeatedly but Vishinsky held the floor for about four minutes.

"YugoSlavia cannot and will not be considered a member of the Eastern bloc," Vishinsky said. He described the election as an attempt to turn the security council into an obedient tool of the Anglo-American bloc."

Russia threatened "painful consequences" for the United Nations if YugoSlavia was elected to the Security Council over Soviet-backed Czechoslovakia.

Soviet sources said that Russia had lined up a new strategy in her last-ditch battle to prevent YugoSlavia's election. After Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinski's angry blast at the YugoSlavs and their American supporters Tuesday, Soviet sources said that Vishinsky might try to carry the battle to the floor of the 59-member general assembly before Security Council balloting today. That was what he did.

Vishinsky declared at a press conference that the atomic bomb had been a "real weapon" for Russia since 1947.

### Forty-Five Go to Night School

Gratifying Enrolment at Night Classes

Last night was the first session of the adult Night School in Prince Rupert with a gratifying enrolment of forty-four. Twenty entered for bookkeeping, eighteen for typing and seven for wood work.

A number of those who had put their names in for the wood working course did not come out to the first session. Unless more are interested in this course, it may be necessary to cancel it. The requirement for government aid is a minimum enrolment.

The "getting back to school" seemed to be enjoyed by all who turned out, although some of the beginning typists found that their fingers did not have the flexibility they had hoped for. These sessions will take place for two hours each Wednesday for the next two weeks.

**FORTUNES IN DRAW**  
DUBLIN—Holders of tickets on the Irish Hospital Sweepstakes for next week's Cambridgeshire race will divide up prize money totalling \$2,404,190. The prize total was disclosed yesterday as pretty Irish nurses began drawing numbers from a tank-car sized drum. And officials said that top prizes of \$77,500 each will go to persons drawing the first horse in the Cambridgeshire Stakes at Newmarket, England, October 26.

**CZECH PURGE ON**  
PRAGUE—A score of Communist-approved government-appointed executives were fired today as the Czechoslovak purge reached into the ranks of directors and managers of nationalized industries. The directors were, apparently, unreliable or unable to meet absenteeism among employees in falling production records.

**CONGRESS RISES**  
WASHINGTON—With a 75-day breather ahead, members of the 81st Congress of the United States went home today to listen to the ideas of the voters about how to run the country. They had finished a heavy 239-day session of Democratic-controlled Congress. Progress was made on international matters but little headway was accomplished on domestic political commitments.

**COMMUNISTS ADVANCE**  
HONG KONG—Communists stabbed westward today in what may be a death blow to the Nationalists on the Chinese mainland. Nationalists have abandoned the port of Swatow although Communists had not yet entered.

**ELIZABETH REBUKED**  
LONDON—Britain's marriage law reform committee today publicly rebuked Princess Elizabeth for saying that divorces lead to many of Britain's social evils. R. S. W. Pollard, chairman of a committee of sociologists and lawyers who want to make divorces easier to get, said the Princess had the wrong slant and her comment was regrettable.

### Mayor Arnold Retiring; Daggett to Be Candidate



Mayor Nora E. Arnold, a seven-year veteran of civic responsibility in Prince Rupert, today said that she "definitely had no intention" of seeking office again in the December civic elections. Her two-year term as Mayor expires this year.

"No, I have no intention of running again this year," Mayor Arnold replied to a Daily News query. "Health is one reason but I feel that it is time that I moved out and let some one younger move in."

Mayor Arnold, who operates a real estate business in addition to her civic duties, has sat on every city council since 1947, when the commissionership was created and government-by-council resumed its function.

She entered the 1943 council on a one-year ticket, supported by the Prince Rupert Ratepayers' Association. She was re-elected for a two-year term in the December, 1943 elections, and again in 1945. However, in 1946, she contested the Mayorship with then-Mayor Daggett and won. Since 1946, she has successfully contested the Chief Magistrate's seat twice.

"I have given seven years to civic work," Mayor Arnold said. "I think that it is now time that I stepped down and allowed someone younger to take over."



Alderman Harry M. Daggett, who earlier in the decade, served three years as Mayor of Prince Rupert, today announced that he would seek a return to the Chief Magistrate's post at the civic elections on December 15.

Alderman Daggett, who is completing his first year of a two-year term as alderman, was the first to announce his intention of seeking the office which has been held by Mayor Nora E. Arnold for the last three years.

His intention to run for Mayor will necessitate an aldermanic by-election to fill the seat which he must vacate in order to contest the Mayor's office.

A year ago, he ran for a two-year term as Alderman and was elected as an independent. As Mayor and in his earlier aldermanic campaign, he had sponsorship of the city's Labor groups.

## British Politics

BRITISH PARLIAMENT is in session again. Now that the government has cleared the air with its timely declaration that there is not to be a general election this year, Members of Parliament are eager to hear how the time gained will be employed. Since no one supposes that the election would be held in the later winter months anyway—short of some formidable crisis, which, of course, is very possible—the expectation now runs of a general election in March or June—probably June.

The Prime Minister is to make announcements within a few days on the measures in which the government will ask the people to join to overcome the economic crisis this winter, and the feeling grows that the government intends to try to rescue from the superheated political exchanges of the past weeks some sense of common national effort in a national emergency.

On the whole, all political parties are probably gratified by the decision to defer the election whatever one leader or another may say in the heat of political argument. The Labor Party will be able to complete its program set out in 1945 in "Let Us Face the Future," and will hope to be able to take credit for weathering the economic difficulties of the coming months. The Liberals will have more time to prepare, and get more candidates into the field to strengthen their bid for many more than their present 10 Parliamentary seats. And the Conservative Party likewise, will be able to carry its preparations to a keener pitch and is able to reckon also that the harder times that revaluation may bring will have begun so that it, at any rate, will not be able to be blamed for bringing them upon the nation.

## EASTERN GERMANY

THERE IS NO NEED to stress the undemocratic character of the new Parliament in Eastern Germany. Perhaps the last word on the subject was said by Wilhelm Pieck, the puppet president, himself at the foundation meeting. He congratulated the new "People's Chamber" on having passed unanimously and without debate the long resolution put before it. And he expressed the hope that all its future decisions would be equally unanimous.

That is a frank, indeed cynical avowal of the real character of the new body. It exists not to discuss but to endorse the decisions and declarations of policy which originate in the Kremlin. And Herr Pieck's hope that there will always be unanimity is a warning that there must never be dissent. Any members of either Chamber who may think of opposing or criticising the prescribed line of policy at any moment is invited to remember what has happened to such people in Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Bulgaria—anywhere where the will of Stalin is the substitute for law.

The new machine, in fact, is made on the familiar pattern. More important than its design is the use to which it is to be put. It is very evident that the purpose of Soviet policy in Germany at the moment is to arouse a new frenzied nationalism inspired by fierce hostility to the West, which can be used as an instrument of Soviet foreign policy.

Russia, for what she conceives to be her own national interests, is deliberately reviving the whole aggressive, revengeful spirit of Nazism, hoping to be able to control and use it as she chooses.

For the moment, the new organization is completely subservient. In his first Presidential speech, Pieck paid the personal homage to the "wise and generous Stalin" which is required from all satellite leaders. But there is an arrogance in German Nationalism which will hardly blend with humility to the Russians. The game which Stalin is playing holds dangers for his own Empire as well as for the West.

## TRAFALGAR DAY

IT WILL BE 144 YEARS ago tomorrow (October 21, 1805), since that battle of Trafalgar, famous in the annals of British naval history, was fought. The British fleet, under Lord Nelson, defeated the combined fleets of France and Spain off Cape Trafalgar, just north of Gibraltar. Nelson, wearing his decorations, refused to seek shelter and paced the deck of his flagship, the Victory, in full view of nearby enemy ships. He was shot by a marksman well up in the rigging and, taken below, died in a few hours. According to history his last words were "Thank God I Have Done My Duty."

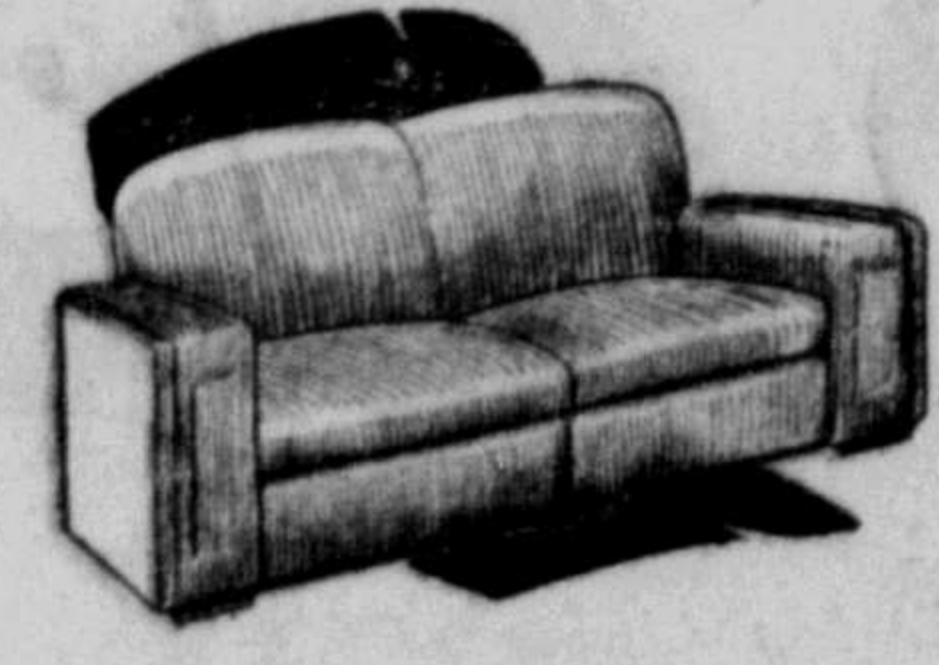

## Novel Talk On Education

Famous Quotation Applied by Principal Hurst in Talk

With an ingenious application to the broad aims of his subject of the famous quotation from Lewis Carroll, "The Time has come the Walrus Said, to talk of many things," A. M. Hurst, principal of Booth Memorial High

School, gave the Prince Rupert Gyro Club, at its weekly luncheon yesterday, a novel dissertation on what he considered the principal aims of secondary school education. He defined the secondary school as "a place in which to keep young people busy while in the difficult process of growing up."

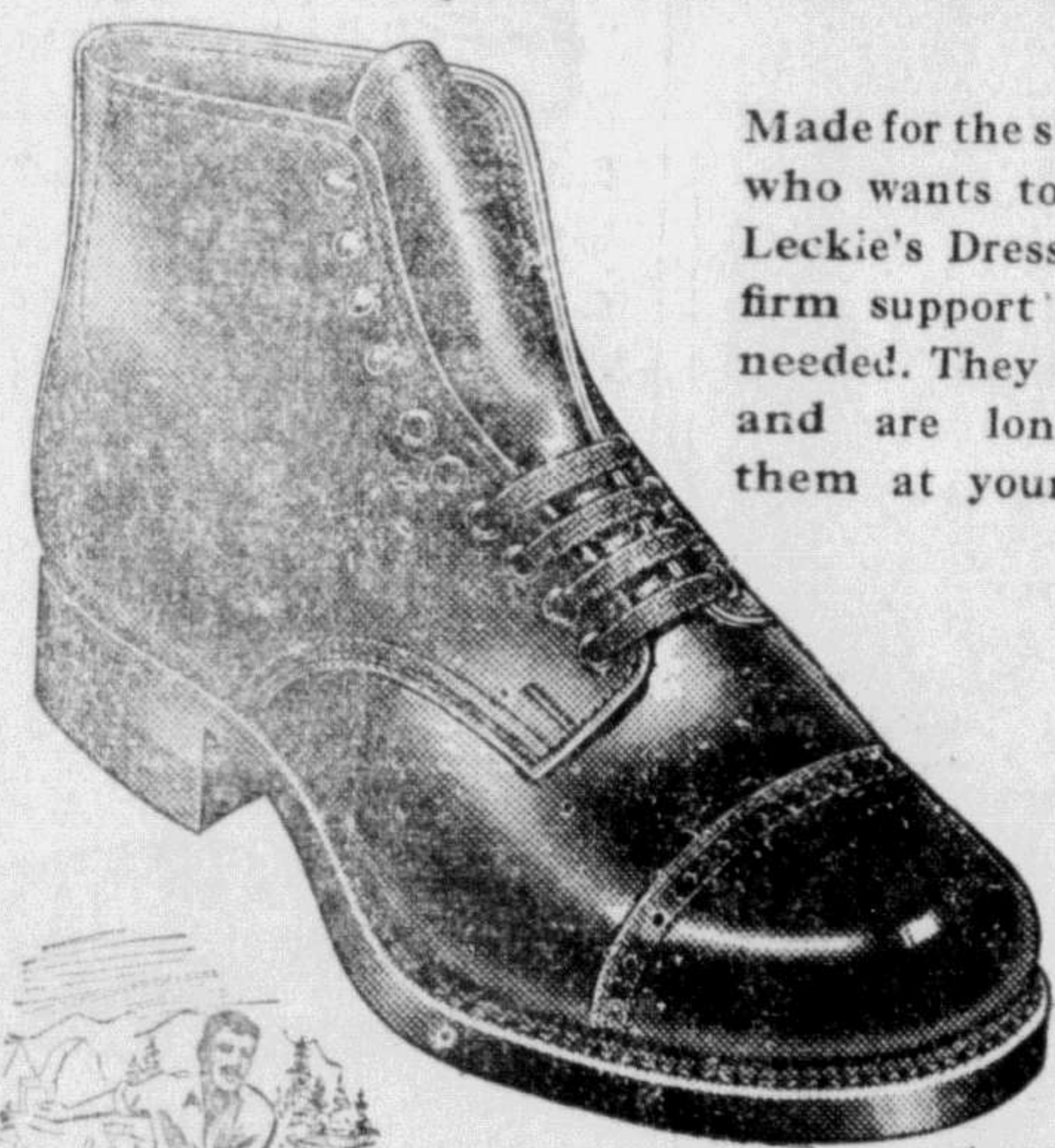

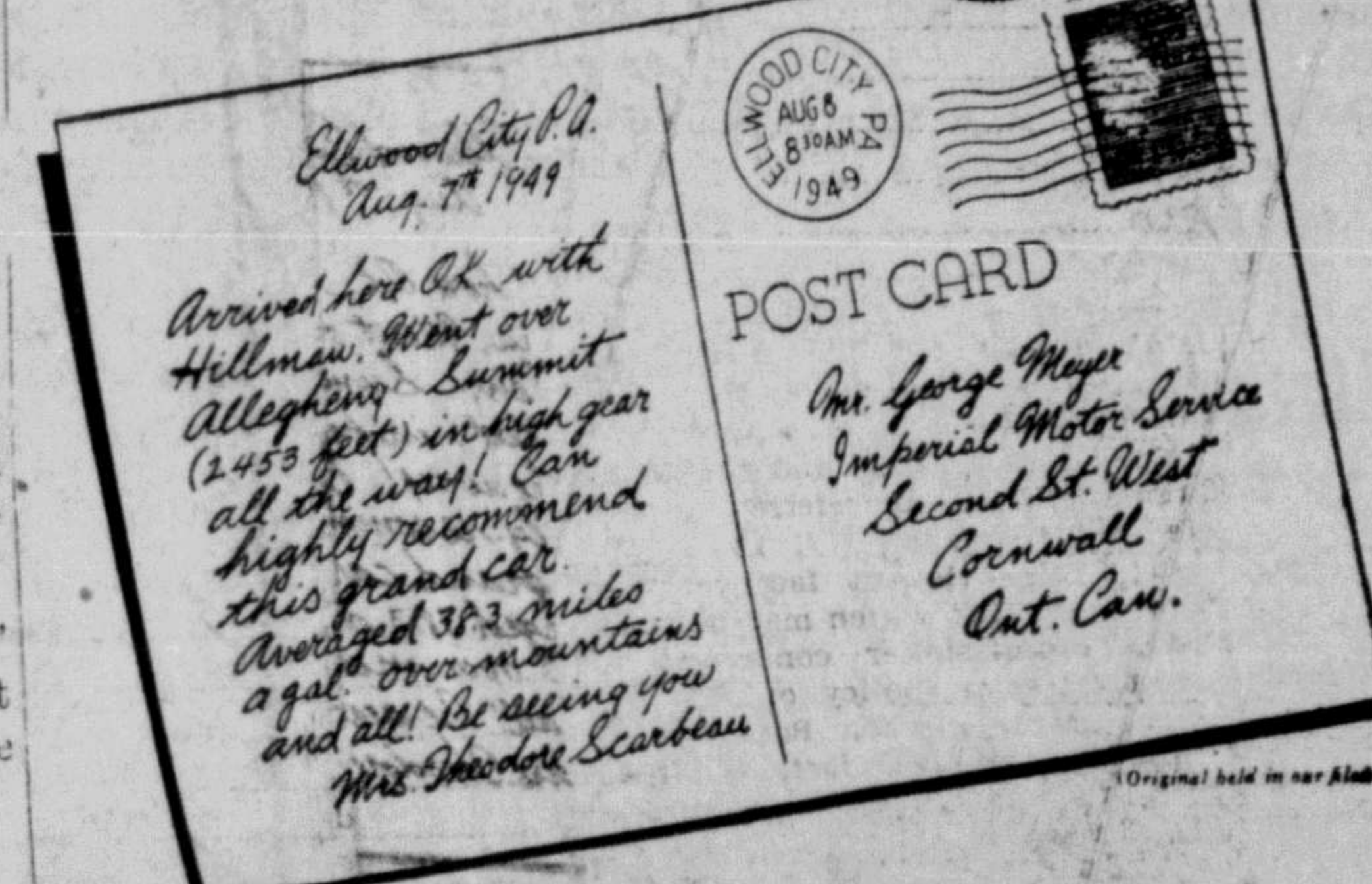

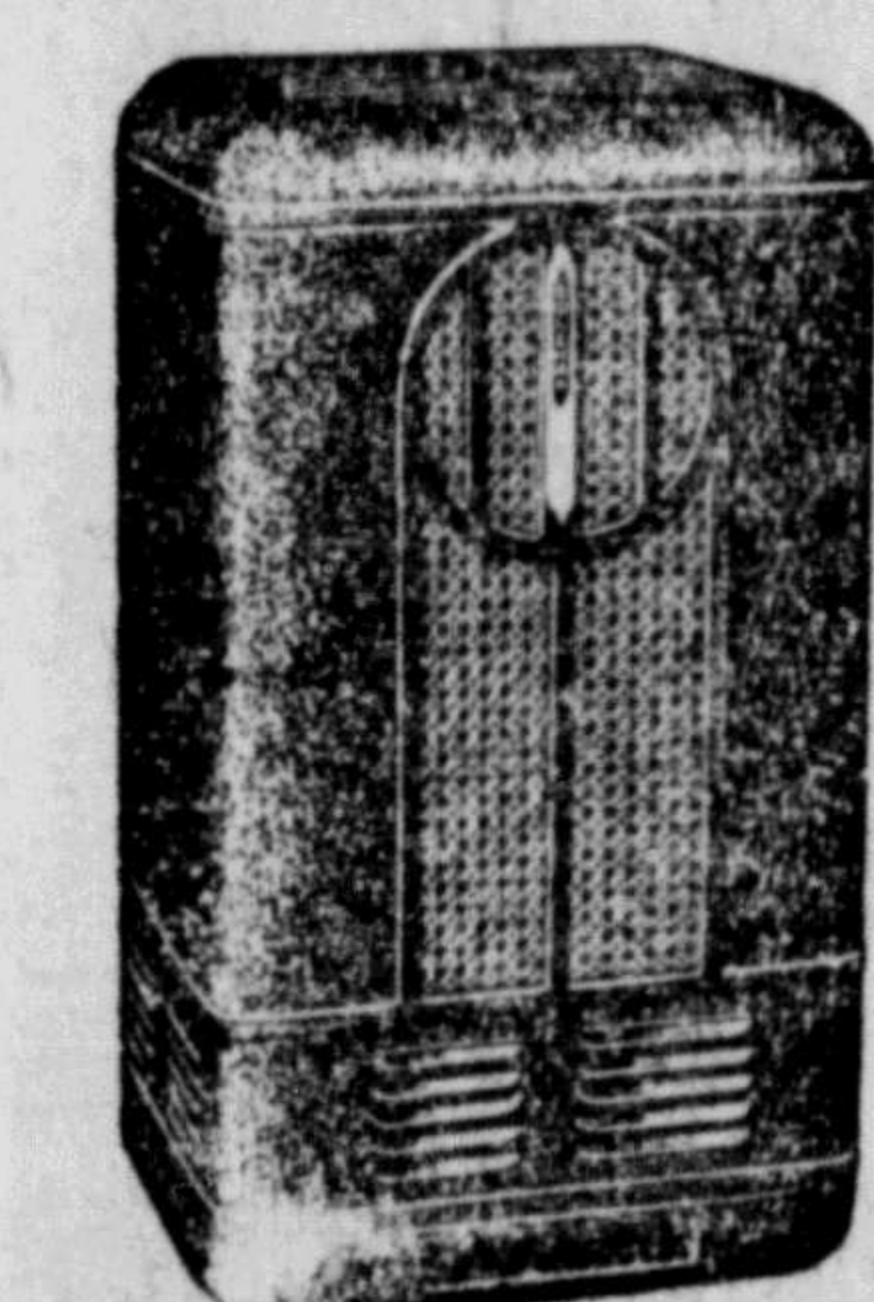
