

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We Are Abandoned?

HE citizens of Saskatoon, Edmonton and Prince Rupert, and towns between and to the north and south should not be censured in these times for thinking and talking of highways from the standpoint of defence, says a letter from the Trans-Canada Highway System Association (Yellowhead route) of Edmonton. They know that in case of an attack from the north, they will be among the first in Canada to suffer. Edmonton and Prince Rupert are among the top strategic centers on the North American Continent.

In case of an attack from the North, there will not be time to build another Alaska Highway, or a highway between those two strategic points of Terrace and Prince Rupert about little has been said. To handle an enemy invasion of airborne troops, it is desirable to have the use of not only the skyways but also defence highways and railways.

One would have thought that the experience of the last war plus the developments since the end of the war would have naturally prompted concerted action by the governments involved to build strategic highways in western Canada as fast as possible. However, today, four years after the war, there is still not even a decent, all-year, gravelled road, to say nothing about a paved highway, between Winnipeg and Vancouver via Saskatoon, Edmonton and Kamloops or for that matter between Winnipeg and Vancouver by any route in Canada; furthermore, there is not even a decent gravelled road between Edmonton and Dawson Creek-the only highway in Canada which connects with the Alaska Highway and the Grimshaw Highway to Yellowknife; and, there is still no semblance of a through road between Edmonton and Prince Rupert due to the fact that a few remaining miles of this route between McBride and Prince George have not been built yet.

We leave it to your imagination as to what might have happened to the citizens who live along the Yellowhead Route and to the north and the south of it during World War 2, without the assistance of the United States. In as much as there has been no concerted major effort since the end of the war by the governments which should have been concerned with the building of defence highways along the Yellowhead Route and from Edmonton to Dawson Creek; and in as much as the federal government has proposed only one Trans-Canada Highway; and in as much as there have been serious suggestions by the provincial governments concerned to build this one Trans-Canada Your Support and Influence Highway 200 miles or more south of the Yellowhead Route-it would appear that from the standpoint of defence highways, the safety and the interests of the citizens of this area are being ignored.

In fact, it would appear that insofar as these governments are concerned, we have been written off. As the situation stands today, in case of an attack from the North, we will have to look again to the United States for quick help as regards highways for defence which may be too late. And, "too late" here may be too late for Canada and too late for the United States.

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




