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### Gas Infraction Brings Seizure Of Alberta Car

Confiscation of their car, a 1940 Pontiac, was ordered by Magistrate W. D. Vance after he had convicted two Alberta men of illegally using tax free gasoline in their vehicle. The pair also were convicted of theft of the gasoline from a construction company at Port Edward.

Edward Chisholm and E. J. Everett, who recently arrived from Alberta, were convicted of illegally using "purple" gasoline in the car. Colored purple to identify it as tax-free for industrial purposes, the fuel legally cannot be used in vehicles on the highway.

On charges of theft of the gasoline, Chisholm was sentenced to three months in jail and Everett received a \$10 fine.

### THE WEATHER

#### Forecast

**GALE WARNING**

#### Synopsis

A westerly flow of moist Pacific air is bringing showery weather to all coastal sections of the province. The interior district cleared overnight and sunny skies are expected in these areas today. Another storm developing about 1000 miles west of the Queen Charlottes is expected to bring south-east gales to northern coastal waters overnight. This storm appears to be of only moderate intensity and is not expected to bring gale winds to south coastal areas.

### Want Repair Of Wharves

A "snowball" resolution, that started on a single matter and wound up dealing with several, was passed by city council last night and, as a result, some action may result on the repair of the three fishermen's floats on the waterfront.

Alderman H. S. Whalen started it off when he suggested that the provincial Department of Public Works be contacted regarding the condition of the Cow Bay floats which he said have received only temporary repair since they were damaged in a gale early this year.

Alderman George Rudderham caught the ball and suggested that the floats east of the drydock be made subject of a similar petition to the Federal Department of Public Works. They are, he said, in bad condition.

Alderman T. B. Black agreed with both suggestions and added one of his own—that the long-promised breakwater at the Fairview Bay floats be constructed.

Estimates for the Cow Bay floats and the Fairview Bay breakwater have been passed by the respective governments.

### Record Peacetime Defence Budget

OTTAWA, C.—Defence Department's 1949-50 expense account—the highest in Canada's peacetime history—was approved by the House of Commons last week but, in allowing the estimates to pass, George Drew, Progressive Conservative Leader of the Opposition, said he was not satisfied with procedure followed in dealing with estimates. He gave notice that next year his party will insist upon a defence committee through which the House could get all necessary information on which to base an intelligent appraisal and expenditures of the Department.

At a regular meeting of local 510, International Union of Operating Engineers held Friday night, an industrial film was shown by member C. Young. Following the show, regular business was discussed by the 30 members in attendance.

### No Pressure On Fido Until Mid-Century

Prince Rupert's free-roving dogs got a reprieve from city council last night after a fortnight of more or less judicial study indicated that perhaps the 1950 council should concern itself with their licensing and control.

Following a letter from a disturbed home owner two weeks ago, council referred the matter of unlicensed canines to the licensing committee. Last night the committee recommended that "applications be called for the position of dog tax collector and pound keeper on the basis of a percentage of collections."

Alderman George B. Casey considered it "unnecessary to appoint a dog catcher." The city could, he said, save expense by passing a bylaw "demanding persons to come to the City Hall and pay their dog licenses, subject to a penalty for failure."

"It's done that way in Vancouver," he declared.

Alderman Stone, chairman of the licensing committee, said that he could not see how the collection of licenses could be enforced without the aid of a collector. He favored the appointment of a collector on a commission basis.

Alderman Casey stoutly supported his idea for a bylaw until informed by Alderman Daggett that the city had had a bylaw covering the matter on its books since 1912.

Alderman Rudderham doubted that the matter should be handled by the present council at all, since it was doubtful if action could be obtained before next year anyway. Why not, he said, refer it to the 1950 council.

Everybody agreed. And Alderman Black suggested that poll tax collections might be dealt with at the same time.

### Atlantic Pact Chiefs Of Staff Are Unifying

Three Thousand Mile Line from Arctic to Aegean Sea

PARIS (CP)—Chiefs of staffs of the armies of twelve North Atlantic treaty countries met here of twelve North Atlantic treaty countries met here on unified defence against any new future foe. Military experts, a reliable source said, now have only to put "the technical experts to work" to complete

North Atlantic defences. Most of this work, he said, would be done here within the next two days before the Atlantic Pact country defence ministers meet Thursday to approve the plan.

The main task of the military chiefs is to outline a main 3,000-mile defence barrier from the Norwegian Arctic to the Aegean Sea past which no attacker from the East could march without a fight with the members.

Defence Minister Brooke Claxton and Lt. Gen. Charles Foulkes, Canadian chief-of-staff, are here for the conferences.

## More Civic Interest

WE heartily subscribe to the sentiments expressed in a letter to this paper from Eric Alderman candidate, deploring the apathy which is being shown insofar as the aldermanic contest at the forthcoming civic election is concerned.

Nominations take place on Thursday and, while there appears to be almost a surfeit of mayoralty candidates, there seems, so far at least, to be a serious paucity of material available for the six aldermanic seats.

The time is not long to go now but it is much to be hoped that there will yet be a good list of "dark horses" entering the field and that there will not only be sufficient material but enough over so that the people may have something to choose from in deciding who shall run the city's most important business.

It does not speak well for the civic political health when interest is at such a low ebb that the civic offices are filled by a last minute lot of acclamations on nomination day. This is little better than default.

## What City Council Did

Approved the granting of the following trade licenses as reported by the licensing committee: Ole Tweed, delivery service; Fred Thornton, interior decorator; Gerald Fetterly, taxi operator.

Adopted a licensing committee recommendation that taxi licenses of Barney Turbitt and Dominic Montesano be reinstated.

Accepted a recommendation of the board of works authorizing Mrs. Nora Mostad to erect a garage on the west side of lot 1, block 1, section 1, providing construction meets with the approval of the city engineer.

Granted the Community Ratepayers' Association the right to use the city council chamber provided the dates do not interfere with other uses of the chamber.

Accepted the resignation of Alderman H. M. Daggett from council in view of his announced candidature for Mayor in the forthcoming elections. His resignation is effective at the end of the year.

## Police Court Busy In October

City police court was a relatively busy place during October, with 186 cases coming before the magistrate of which 182 resulted in convictions and four in dismissals, monthly report of Sgt. L. A. N. Potterton, considered by the police committee at the week-end, stated.

Fines and court costs totalling \$2,048 were collected. Of this \$1,750 was in fines and \$298 in costs.

Drunkenness among the native population increased considerably over September, with 50 convictions as compared with 34 the previous month. On the other hand, offences against the Government Liquor Act were below the September level.

A police drive against violators of speeding and parking regulations resulted in 57 convictions. However, continuous check of traffic in school zones indicated that drivers are becoming aware of their purpose, since no charges were laid in this respect.

Monetary loss from criminal code complaints was assessed at \$265, with recoveries at \$190.

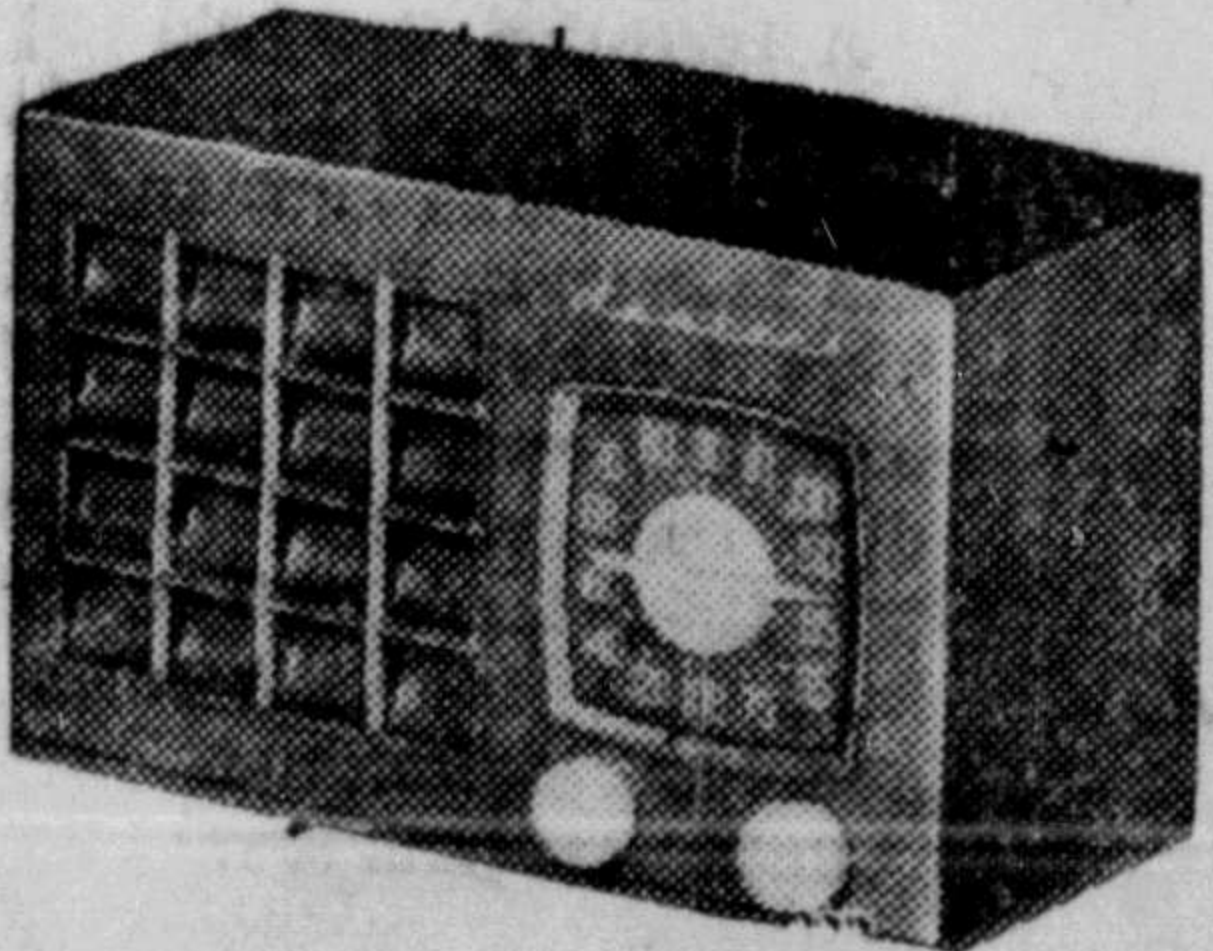

## Housing Meet At Victoria

City Clerk H. D. Thain will attend a conference in Victoria between provincial, federal and municipal officers next month on a proposal by Premier Byron Johnson that the federal government supply increased aid to new home construction in British Columbia.

Proposal, according to a letter received by council from the provincial Premier last night, is that the two senior governments work out a scheme of financing the actual construction, while the municipalities, where additional homes are needed, contribute land and services for the projects.

For the rental homes, the federal government would put up 75 per cent of the construction funds and the provincial government 25 per cent.

Mayor Nora Arnold was the initial choice but City Clerk Thain was later selected to attend the conference on grounds that, because she is retiring at the end of the year, a permanent official should attend and report to the new council.

The conference will be held in mid-December at Victoria.

## TELEPHONE SYSTEM

I approve the new proposals of our telephone superintendent to rebuild the system on a "pay-as-you-go" basis. No major bond issue appears to be necessary.

## WATER AND SEWAGE

All work to be done in accordance with an overall plan to be provided by a consultant hydraulic engineer of the highest calibre. This work is very urgent as our steam pumping plant at Shawat-lans has been condemned until the completion of six thousand dollars work in repairs. This means that in the event of another line break no household in Prince Rupert would have water.

## FINANCE

Efficiency and economy in all departments of civic administration. With the exception of the by-law to be submitted to the ratepayers this year, any money by-law should be withheld, if possible, until some of the current city bonds have been retired.

## CITY HALL

City Hall management should be the concern of the Mayor and Council. They should feel free to call for expert help as problems arise. The employment of such experts in various phases of municipal administration to reorganize departments when necessary will be less expensive and of more benefit to the City of Prince Rupert than the employment of a city manager who cannot hope to possess all the qualifications of such a team of experts.

## LAW ENFORCEMENT

Continuation of the policy of employment of the British Columbia Police. Full support of the law enforcement agency by the City Council.

## ROADS

The city owns its own asphalt plant and road building equipment. Eleventh and Third Avenues and McBride Street all should be hard surfaced before the end of 1950. With this new equipment further improvements are possible to all our roads out of our maintenance funds.

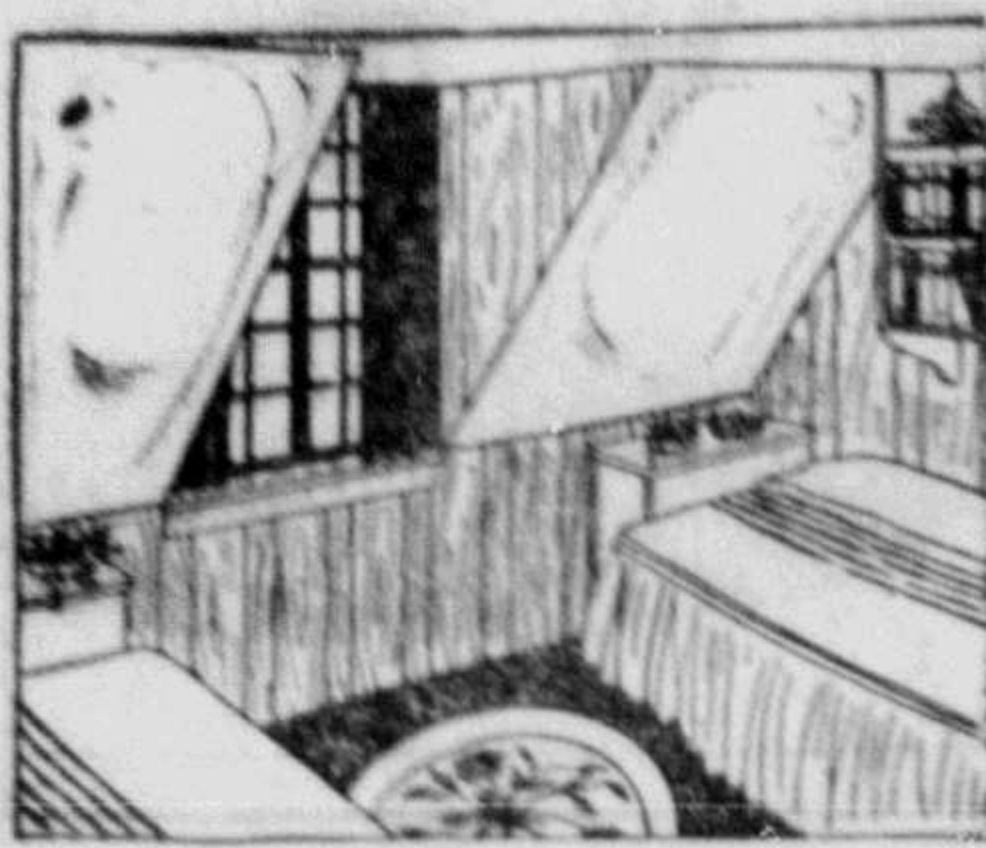

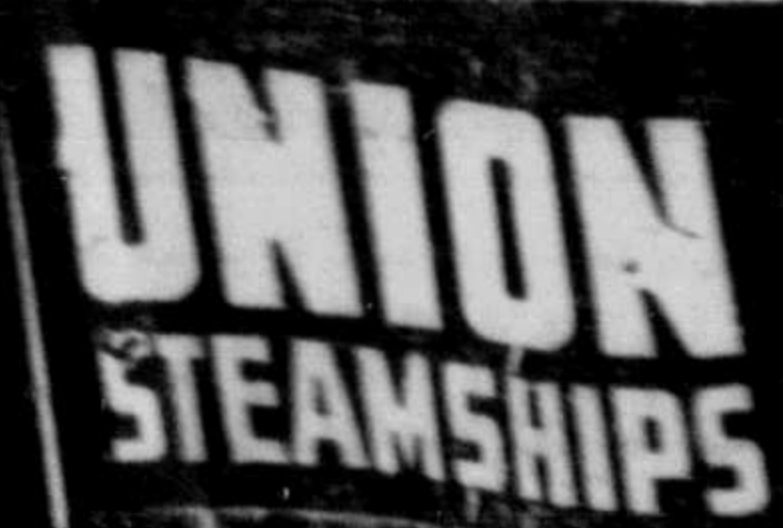

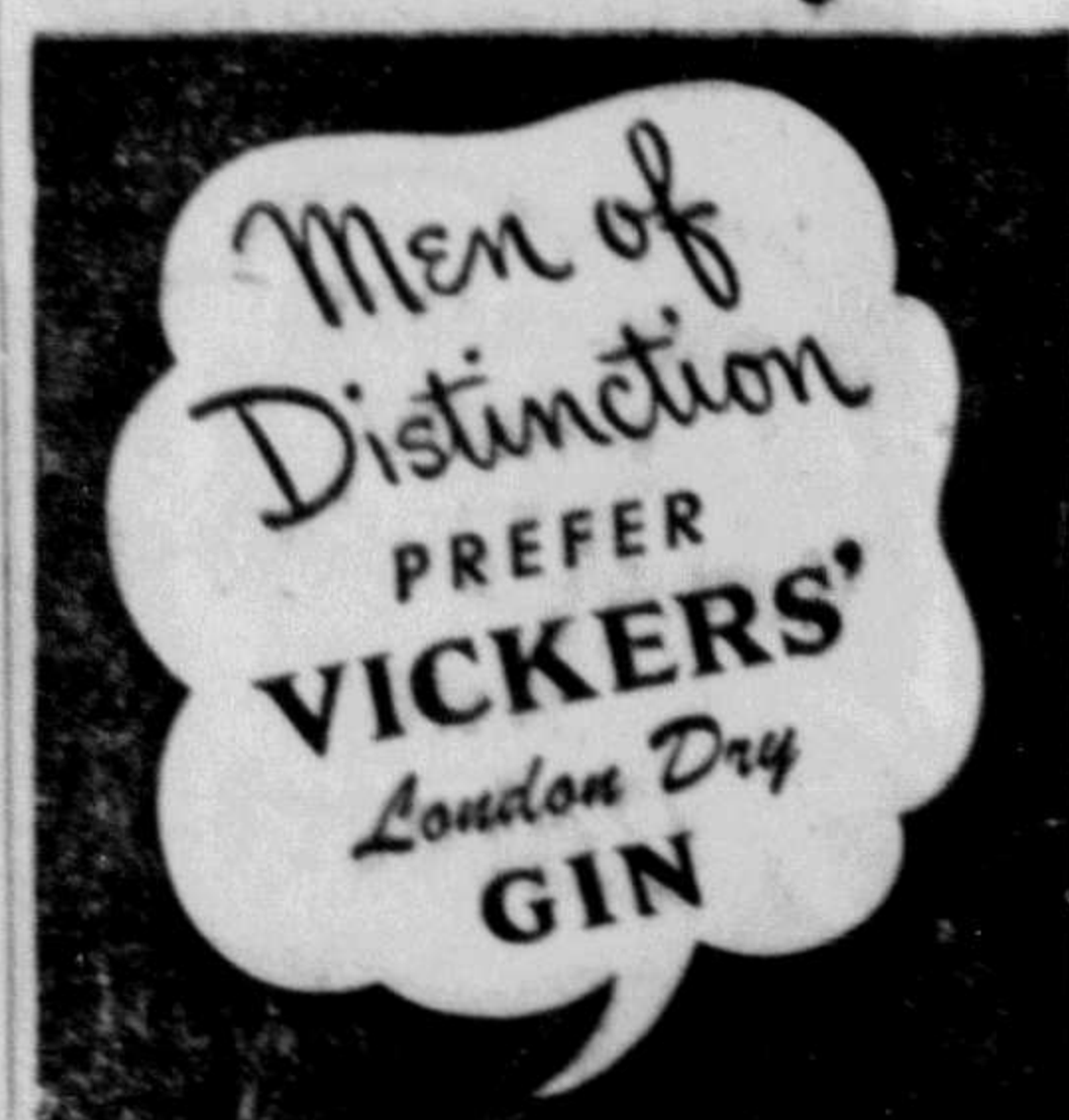

With civilization standing at the crossroads, this was a time to face realities, declared Mr. Anfield. Calling for a stiff self-searching by individuals, he asked what Masons were doing to stem the tide of two destructive forces which were in the world:

1. Complacent secularism with its "I Don't Give a Dam" attitude.
2. Militant atheistic communism with disregard for moral and spiritual values.

Against these menaces it was time to arise with militant action individually and collectively in defence of truth, Christian principles of righteousness, peace and freedom. It was a situation to which every person must face up to with determination and courage.

Mr. Anfield deplored the tendency of people to seek escape, some possibly in the sanctuary of the cloisters, others in the seclusion of the lodgeroom. "Who can say today he is not his brother's keeper?" he asked.

Who, particularly parents of children, could not but feel concerned at the immediate future of the world with the serious deterioration of attitude toward things spiritual and moral? Gone, indeed, was the sense of security in regard to the future such as the fathers of the present generation had felt.

The church-attending Masons were led by the masters of the two lodges, J. R. Morin of Tsimpsan and D. C. Stevenson of Tye.

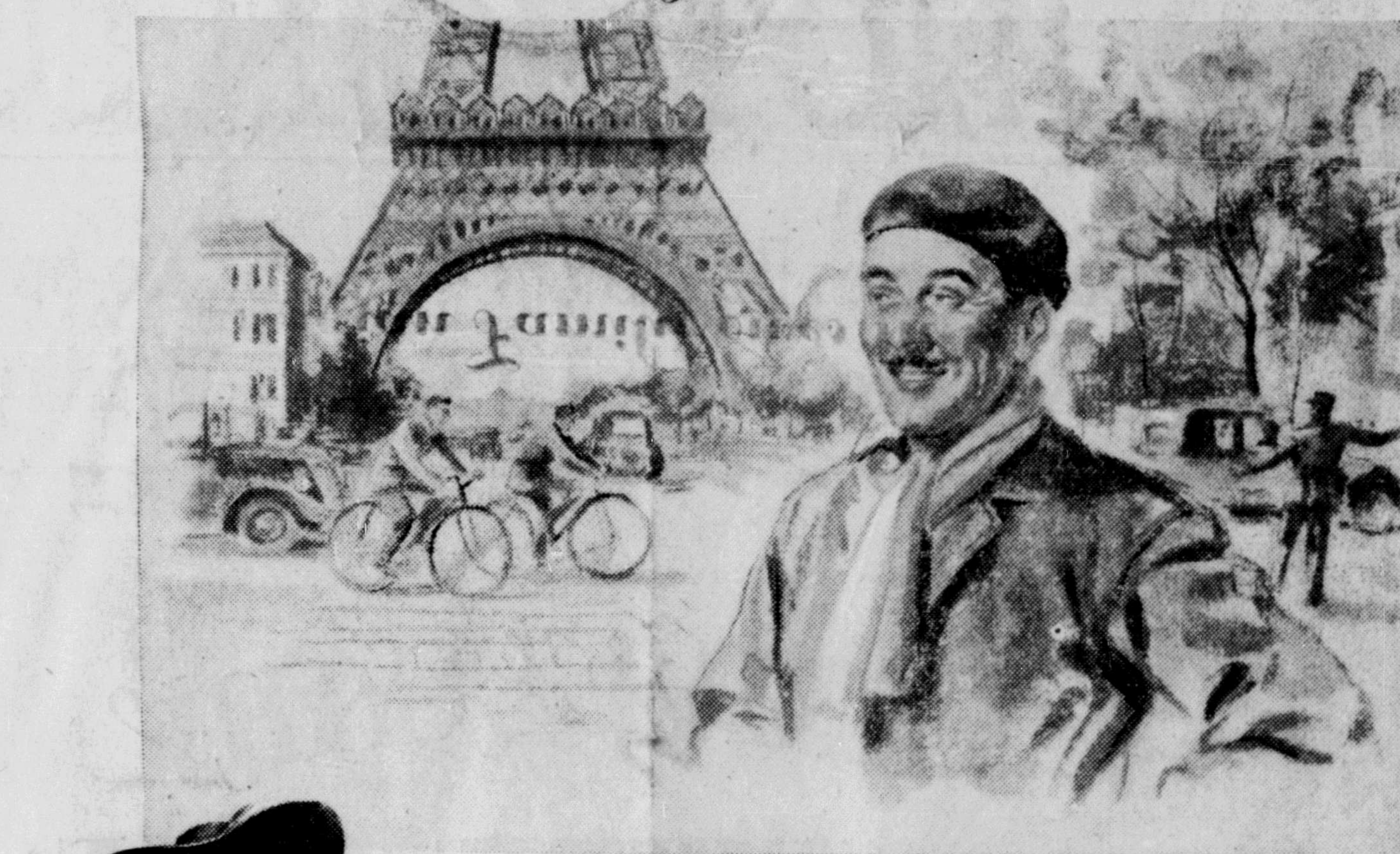
