Housing Problem

TODAY we asked a prominent local citizen who holds a key position in business affairs what he regarded as Prince Rupert's most serious current problem and he immediately replied HOUSING.

We talk about bringing industry and people to Prince Rupert. All of this is very desirable. Indeed, it's not so hard to do any more. The problem today is accommodating them once they come.

Yes, housing is a No. 1 problem at Prince Rupert. It's the first thing that industry thinks about. It's the first question that local employers have to answer when desiring to import help.

Harold Blanche, head of one of the country's greatest industrial empires, stops you up with the question when he talks about his company's plans for future expansion here.

It's what the railway officials mention when you wonder why the dry dock is not more active.

Lack of housing is probably why Prince Rupert has not thousands more of population today. It's becoming the principal hurdle in our path to community progress.

Two notable accomplishments have been achieved towards relieving the housing situation. There is the 50-unit apartment building which local enterprise sparked. There is the 50-unit rental housing project to which the governments have been committed and for which tenders are being called.

So far so good, but, even with them, the housing problem will still remain. The man we asked was right.

"WE HAD one of those the other day," was Mr. Churchill's easy way of diverting a reporter's question on the American election, observes the Christian Science Monitor.

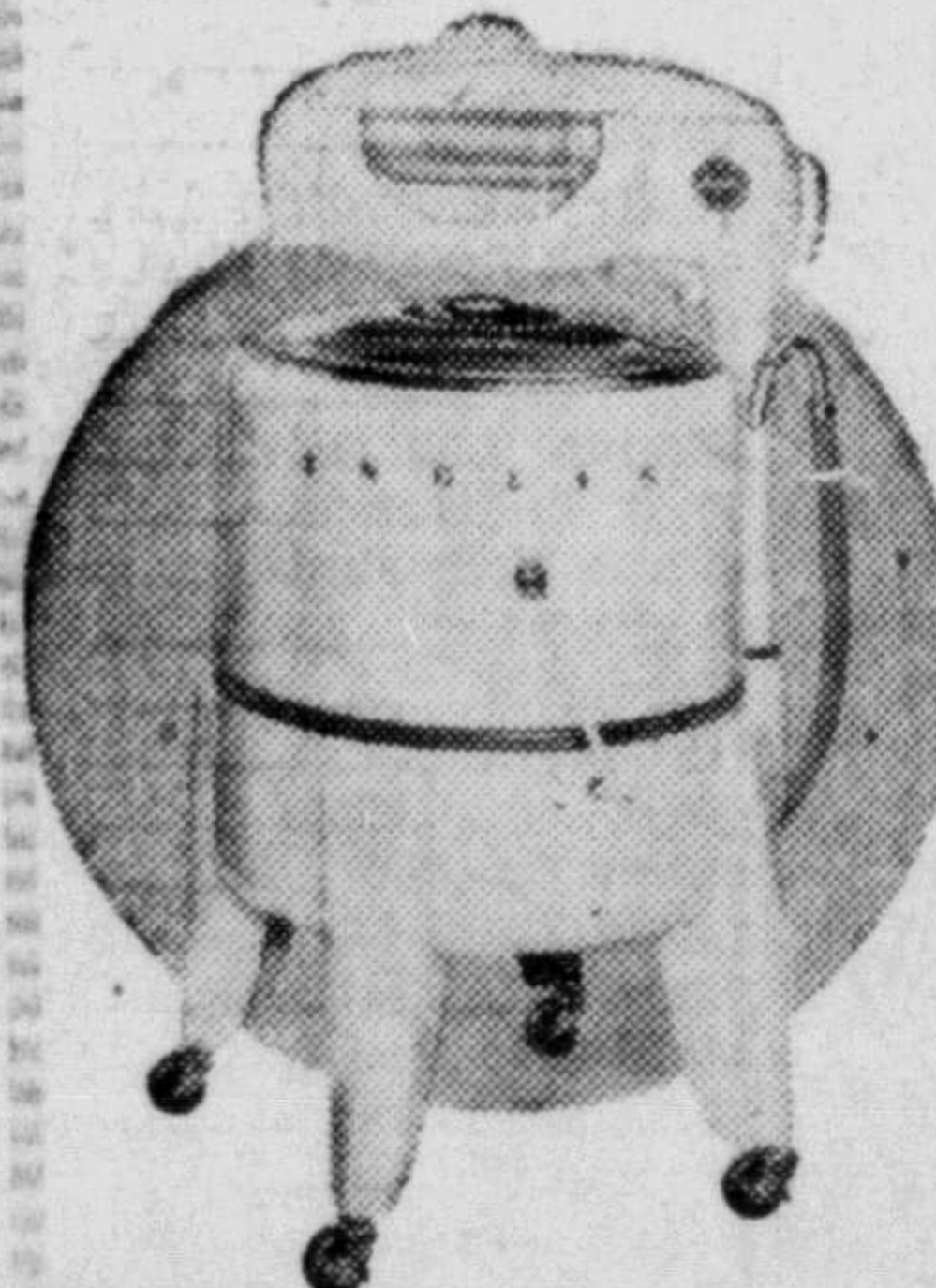

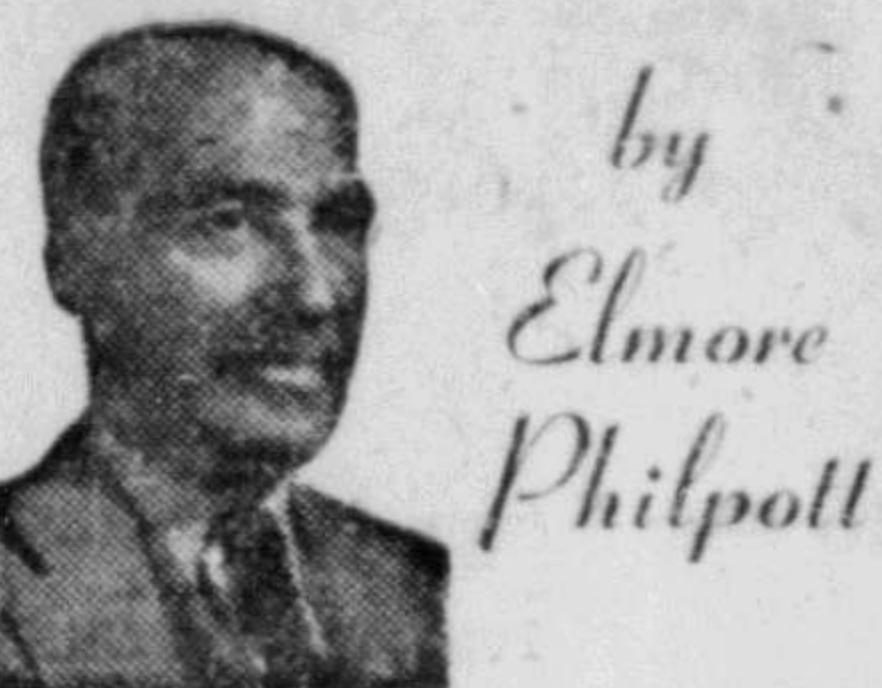

Spain and Korea

A YOUNG British Columbia mother has written the best of the many books on the Spanish Civil War.

It deals in general with the international repercussions of that war. In particular it shows how the lack of moral principle in the policies of the Chamberlain government in Britain and the Blum government in France led not only to the downfall of the democratic republic of Spain but brought Britain and France to unnecessary later disaster.

THE WRITER of the book is Pam Mitchell, daughter of the renowned surgeon, Dr. Mark Mitchell of Victoria, who served with such distinction in Malta during the Second World War.

Yet she has turned out a book of 190 pages which is the best documented of any of the many volumes yet to appear on the Spanish tragedy.

PRELUDE TO WAR, by P.A.M. van der Esch, is published by Martinus Nijhoff, The Hague, Netherlands. (Price 12 guilders paper cover, 15 guilders cloth.)

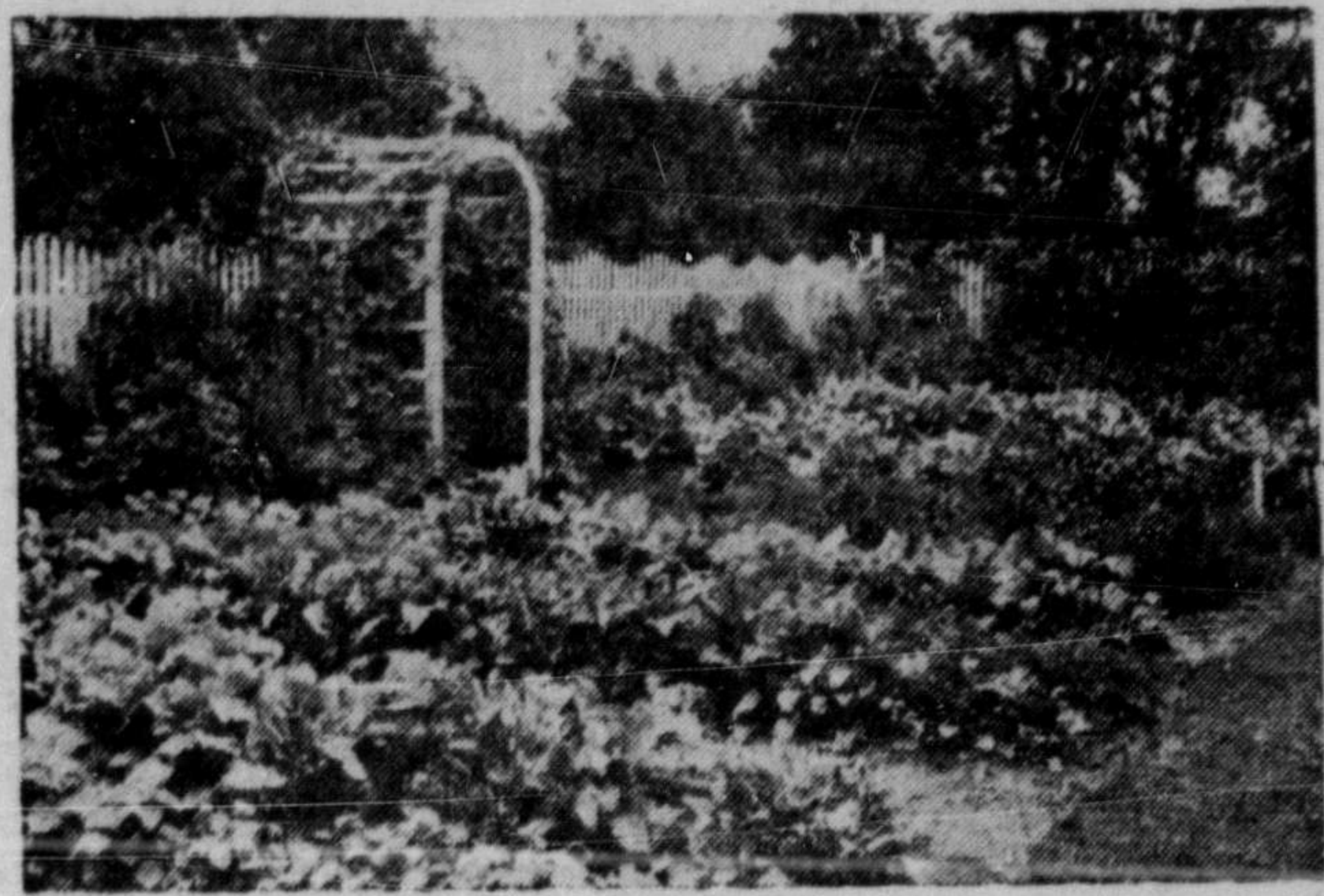
Yesterday she made her first adult public appearance with her own face and is going to continue it, she said.

IDEAL VEGETABLE GARDEN OF
1000 SQ. FEET FACES SOUTH



Area 20x50 feet with fence on East, West and North gives high yield

The ideal vegetable garden plot ought to be level, free from the shade of trees, shrubs and buildings, with soil in which there are no roots of trees or shrubs. It should be near the kitchen door, where vegetables can be gathered easily, just before they are to be cooked.

To produce sufficient fresh vegetables for a family of four during four to five months, a minimum of 1,000 square feet is required. This will not allow for potatoes, cabbage, peas for canning, or any considerable quantity of vine crops except those grown on a fence or trellis. Another two thousand square feet would be required to supply the family with the others.

The ideal shape for a 1,000 square foot plot is oblong, say 20 by 50 or 25 by 40 ft., with the shorter distance running north and south. North and south rows give more even distribution of the sun and it is easier to divide up space among your different crops, when you deal with 20 or 25 foot rows, rather than fractions of long ones.

Your plot must have sunshine. Six hours full sun is usually assumed to be a minimum. But many of the crops you will want to grow need full sun all day long, and will suffer from any limitation of it. Trees too nearby, which cast little shade in mid-summer, when the sun is high, may seriously affect yields in the fall.

Never surround a small vegetable plot with shrubs, but a picket fence, five feet high bordering the east, north and west sides will add 450 square feet of valuable air space. Such a fence has no roots, casts no harmful shade, and allows the air to circulate freely around the plants that cling to it. The south boundary should be open to the full sun, with no climbers. Use a wire fence here only is required for protection.

While it is convenient if the garden described can be approached from the south, with a little ingenuity it can be adjusted to any approach, still allowing it to face the sun. The important point is to avoid a layout which results in any row being shaded for more than a brief interval of the day, by its companion crops, the garden enclosure, or outside objects. Sunshine is far more important than soil.

Real "Wild West" Never That Tough

HAMILTON (CP)—The wild and woolly West was never as wild and woolly as it is pictured in the movies, says Jim Firky, one of the last surviving Canadian Pony Express riders.

At 93, Uncle Jib, as he is affectionately known to his neighbors, likes to recall the many years he spent out West as a young man. He especially likes to reminisce about his Pony Express days.

Those were the days when he used to carry the mail from Fort Qu'Appelle to Prince Albert in Saskatchewan, a 600-mile round trip which took two weeks on horseback.

Most of the time the trip was uneventful, he says. There was a change of horses every 50 miles and no particular trouble with the Indians. However, things were different during the Reil uprising.

On one occasion he had reached Humboldt, his halfway mark, and was setting out for Batoche where Louis Reil and his followers were encamped, when he met up with an army scout. The scout warned him about the rebels and they both turned

around and headed back for Humboldt.

They had gone only a little way when four rebels appeared from nowhere and took after them. "We whipped up our horses and slowly pulled away, but I can still see those bullets kicking up the dust around us," says Firky.

During the Reil disturbances the army carried the mails from Humboldt west, after Firky took it that far.

Before riding for the Pony Express, Firky worked on the express run between Qu'Appelle and Fort Qu'Appelle, a distance of 21 miles. He was on that run two years before going to the Pony Express.

BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Blackwood Convention Helps Keep Players Out of Unmakeable Slams, Too

Here is a final and important point in this series of columns on the Blackwood slam convention. If you use the convention properly it will not only help you to get to many slams that are makeable. It will also keep you out of slams you can't make.

In today's deal, concentrate on Mr. Dale's hand for a moment and forget about the others. He opened the bidding with one spot and heard his partner raise him to three. Now, with first round control of two suits, second round control of the other two, a six card trump holding and a jump raise from partner, wouldn't you think your chances for a successful slam were overwhelming?

In pre-scientific days a player with any red blood at all would jump to six spades on the South hand. And as you see the West player would be able to cash two aces for the immediate defeat of the contract.

Yes, it doesn't mean much to be dashing and courageous if you constantly (and needlessly) take minus scores on hands like this. So often the "colorful" bidder ends up in the red.

How could you stay out of a slam on this deal? Well, the Culbertson four-five no trump convention wouldn't help. Neither Mr. Dale nor Mr. Masters had the requirements for the Culbertson four no trump (two aces and a king of a bid suit).

The Gerber system wouldn't help either. A four club asking bid by Mr. Dale would have developed the information that Mr. Masters had one ace. But which ace? That was all-important.

Those players who disdainfully avoid any ace showing convention would automatically bid six. The chances would be too good that partner had the ace of spades.

Using the Blackwood, Mr. Dale knew (not just guessed) that the enemy had two winning aces. After he himself made the ace bid of four clubs, showing first round control of that suit, his following four no trump bid asked specifically: "Partner, how many aces do you have OUTSIDE of the club suit?"

When he learned the answer was none, it was perfectly clear that the ace of spades and the ace of diamonds were in the hands of the opponents.

Make Skiing Safe

According to all reports, Mt. Hays was a popular place last week-end with the season's greatest number of skiers enjoying the mountain slopes. This appears to be a healthy sign. People are getting out-of-doors more and on the surrounding mountains no finer winter scenery anywhere can be enjoyed.

And there's no real danger in the mountains here if mountaineers use common sense and observe a few fundamental and necessary rules, advises the Prince Rupert Ski Club Patrol.

This advice is offered now because it is the time of year when people are most likely to get lost in the mountains.

Amateur mountaineers must use common sense and take due precautions, and the first thing mountain lovers should appreciate is that weather conditions on the heights differ totally from those near sea level. Snowstorms, fog and blizzards can roll upon the mountain with hardly any warning at all and mountain weather is usually much more severe.

First rule, then, is to be properly clad. Dress light, but warmly for mountain expeditions.

Second rule is to stay on travelled pathways or ski-runs. Exploring may be adventurous, but can be highly dangerous if it leads people off the beaten track. Irregular slopes distort light and shades and it's much easier to get lost on sharp grades than on the level.

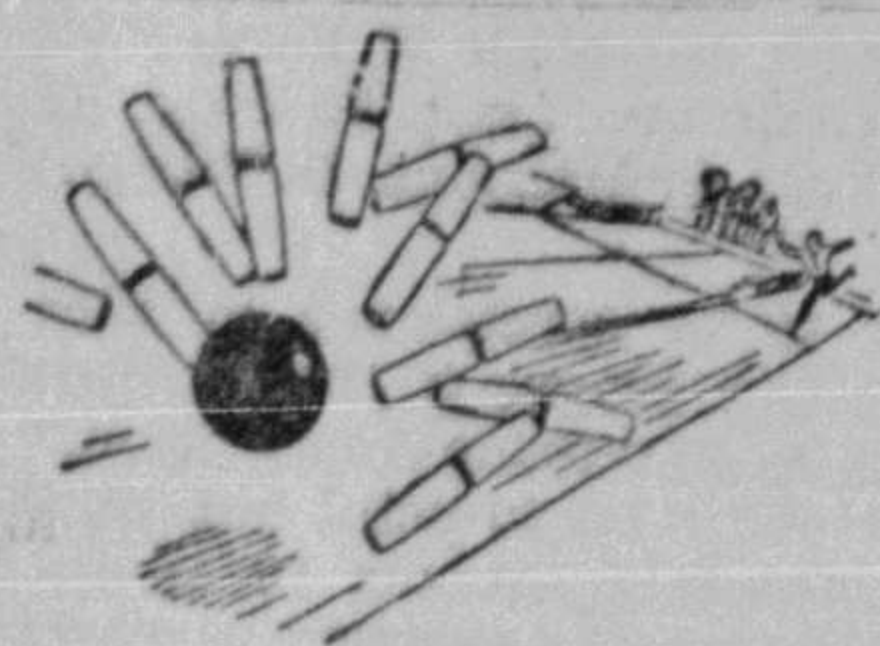
Third rule is to stay in groups. Skiing or hiking in parties is much safer than being alone and independent. An example of this was shown last week-end when one of the youthful skiers on Mt. Hays broke his leg. Had he been alone, he might have suffered terrible agony before being found and rushed to a doctor.

Another such instance occurred the week-end before last—perhaps not so severe. A teen-aged youth twisted an ankle and knee. Two emergency patrol members remained with the youth and saw him safely to his home.

There is wholesome air, beautiful scenery and the finest sport to be found in the mountains which are dangerous only when tackled in folly and contempt.

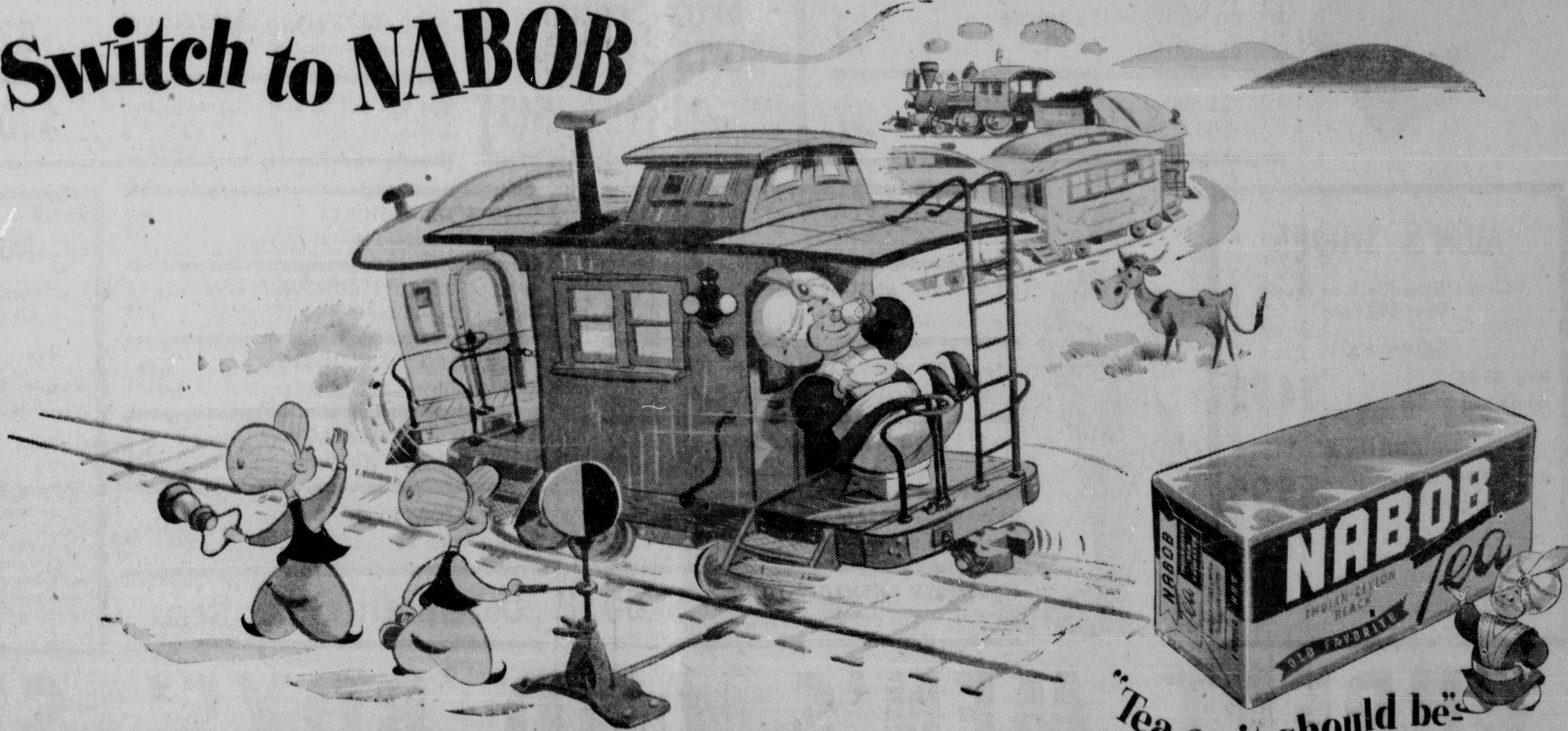

Fisherman Claims Bodies Could Have Been Recovered Early From Wrecked Aircraft from Sandspit

Bodies of American soldiers from Korea lay in shallow water in full view of rescue vessels but there was no permission for willing fishermen who offered to drag them out with their nets, it was declared yesterday in an interview with the Daily News by Monty McIntyre, crew member of the beam trawler Carolina Maria which was one of the first vessels to arrive at the scene a few hours after the tragedy to offer assistance.

The bodies—three at least of them could be seen—were lying on the sandy bottom at a depth of no more than ten feet, McIntyre declared. It would have been easy to haul them up by using the net. Sea was calm then. Later, the men of the Carolina Maria and other vessels were allowed to pull out some of the luggage and effects after having towed the ill-fated aircraft about 100 feet nearer shore and into shallower water. During that operation, effects seemed to pour out of the fuselage which probably had the bottom ripped out of it.

An attempt was made to extricate the body, supposedly that of the co-pilot, which was in a seated position forward but, while hold was taken successively of an arm and a leg, it could not be brought out, having evidently been caught. This is believed to have been the co-pilot who got out at first after the crash and then went back into the plane to get a rubber life-boat.

Disappointment was expressed by McIntyre that they should have had no authority to carry out what seemed simple re-

covery work—even if it was of bodies—after they had hurried to the scene on radioed summons. He made it clear that they were not thinking of recompense, even though they did lose a day's fishing, but only wished to be helpful.

By the time permission was finally given to pick up everything possible, including the bodies, weather had deteriorated and rough seas hampered operations.

Other members of the Carolina Maria's crew were Capt. Frank Gale, Benny Karasoski and James Hall.

She was called from Skidegate. Other vessels which were available were the beam trawler New Laurel, Capt. Alf Ritchie, which was called from Aliford Bay, and the John Essler, owned by Phil Turner of Skidegate.

"Dots and Spots," an experimental picture of sound and color effects drawn direct on to the film without use of camera, was shown to the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday and proved of interest even if of futuristic and revolutionary character. It depicted some of the technical aspects of sound production in film.

Graydon Roberts, field representative of National Film Board from Prince George, showed the picture. In opening, he spoke briefly of the organization of NFB which had been started in war and was carrying on in peacetime as an educational

medium. Mr. Roberts also mentioned that a NFB picture "People of Skeena" had been purchased by the local Film Council. As it was of local interest he recommended that all should see it.

A second film shown by Mr. Roberts depicted the effective operation of the Canadian Pure Food Laws, particularly its protective work on foods and medicinal preparations.

President Marc Gormely was in the chair and a good attendance of Gyros was augmented by guests in the persons of James Williams of Victoria, W. R. Clerie and Stephen Tingley of Vancouver and Frank Wilson and Jack Stanbridge of Prince Rupert.

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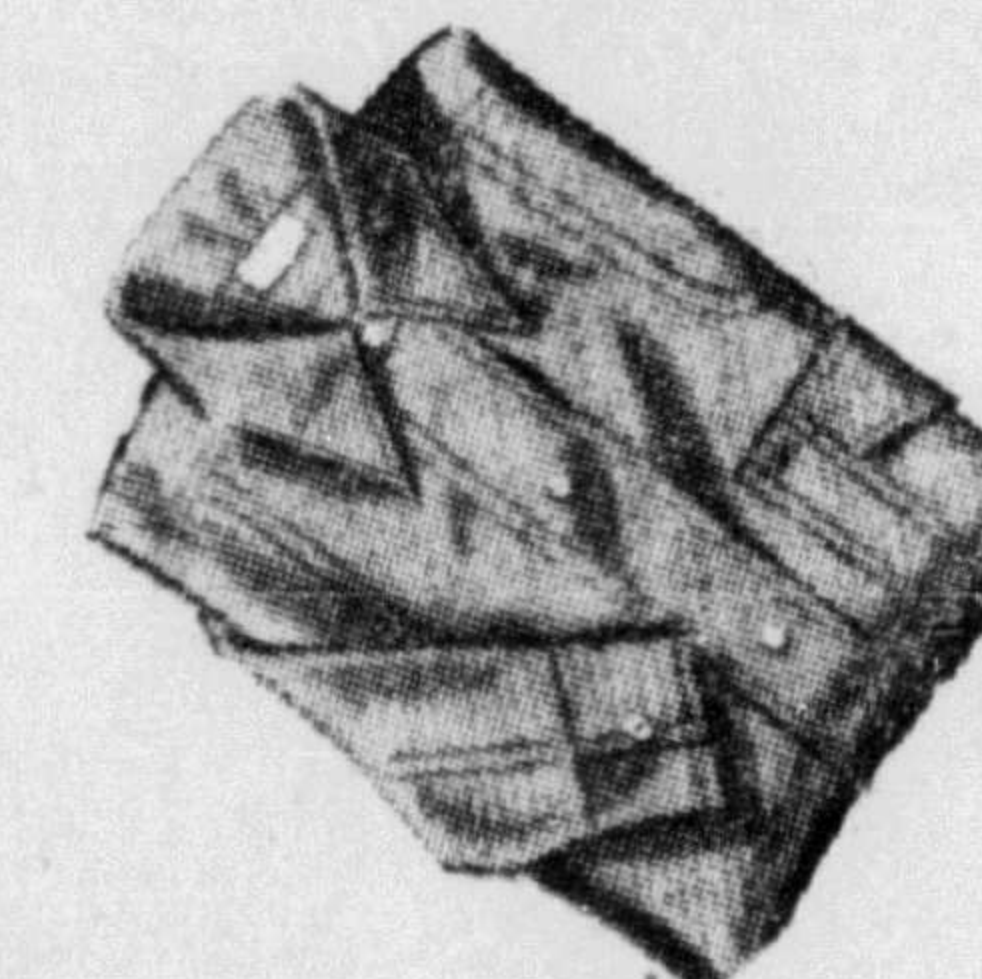
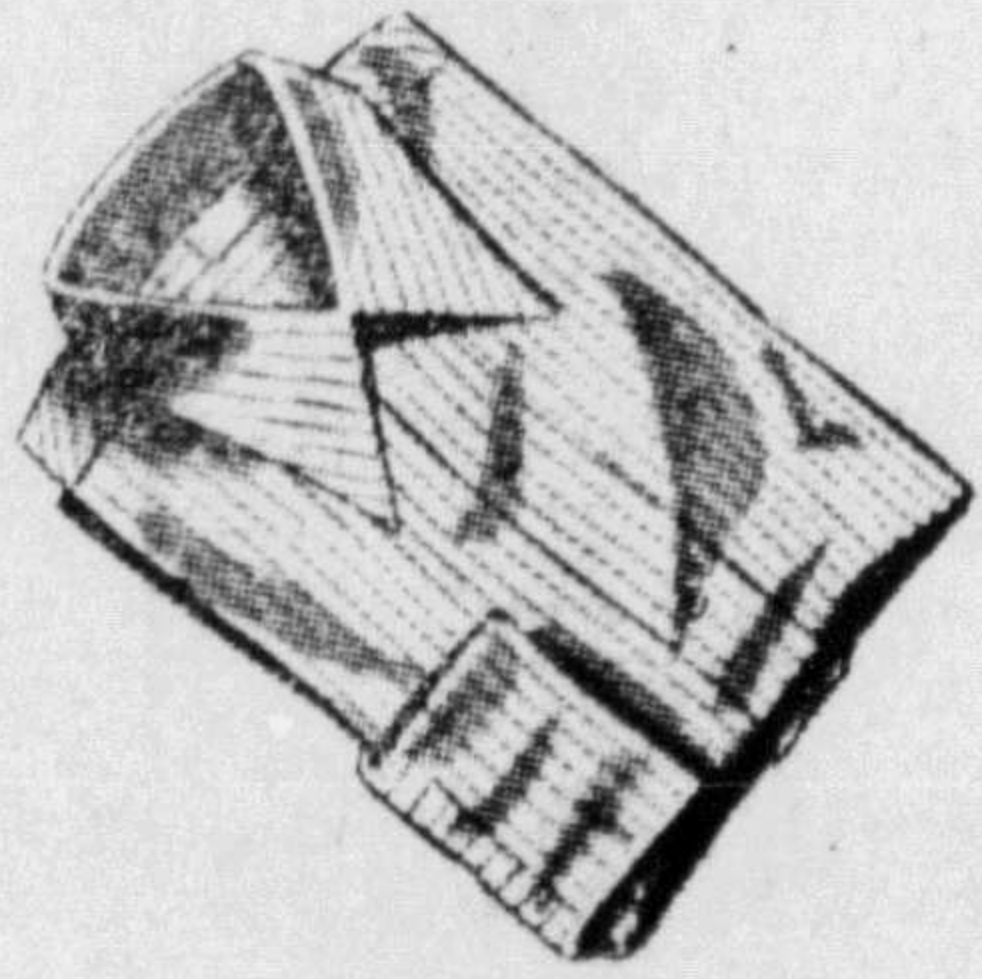
