



Beiter Late Than Never

THE \$40,000,000 pipeline project from Haines to Fairbanks, Alaska, seems to be a little overdue, but better late than never.

Such a pipeline, part of the old Canol project, should have been built during World War II when a smaller, 4- and 6-inch line was strung across the muskeg, part of it paralleling the Alaska highway.

The rumor is that certain private oil companies, giving "technical advice" to General Sommervell, got him to put in too small a pipeline, so as to preserve their market with the military for petroleum products. They assertedly did not want the oil wells at Norman Wells, Northwest Territories, cutting in on their domain. At any rate the costly refinery built at Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, to handle the Norman Wells oil never operated but was shipped off to Texas as surplus property.

So now the army and air force start all over again. Why it is necessary to build a 9-mile tunnel under Kluane Lake in Canada is a puzzle to us. The lake is long and narrow, running parallel to the Haines highway, and one would think it could be skirted with the pipe laid along the shore or even on its bottom.

The construction will provide a good payroll for Americans and probably Canadians. More importand to southeastern Alaska, the inside passage becomes the lifeline of the interior, as this newspaper has repeatedly stated it should. And that should mean that Annette and Gustavus airports are modernized and given more maintenance facilities, to protect the barge canal to Haines. And Haines may be given some defense facilities to protect its harbor, the big new dock at Kitzmateen inlet and the high-

Haines will become an important little port and probably the home of another 100 or 200 families, servicing port facilities and the pipeline. Pumping and maintenance stations will be needed along the army also may want to use the Prince Rupert gateway to Haines at least as an alternate to Seattle, now that Rupert is getting a ferry slip to serve Ketchikan Pulp company anyway.



Salmon For Britain

SOME of the British seafarers who man the ships between Vancouver. and British ports are keenly interested in the plan to stockpile B.C. salmon in the Old Country, from whence gift parcels could be forwarded, and

postage charges saved. One ship's officer has brought me cuttings from the Newcastle Journal and letters between British MPs and the Food Ministry on this subject.

The following extract from such a Food Ministry letter shows that we are making some light progress:

We have agreed to the private import in bulk of limited quantities of Canadian salmon for inclusion with other foodstuffs in gift parcels distributed to recipients in the United in dollar countries and paid for in dollars ... The foodstuffs covered by the scheme are normally entirely of United Kingdom origin or imported on Ministry account but we have agreed to the import of small quantities of Canadian salmon because we felt a small expenditure of dollars was justified in view of the

WHILE Canadians who are send gift parcels to Britain adventures afterwards. will be grateful even for this slight widening of the official British bottleneck, the whole situation in regard to salmon is surely a proof of the need for new approach to British Canadian trade.


