

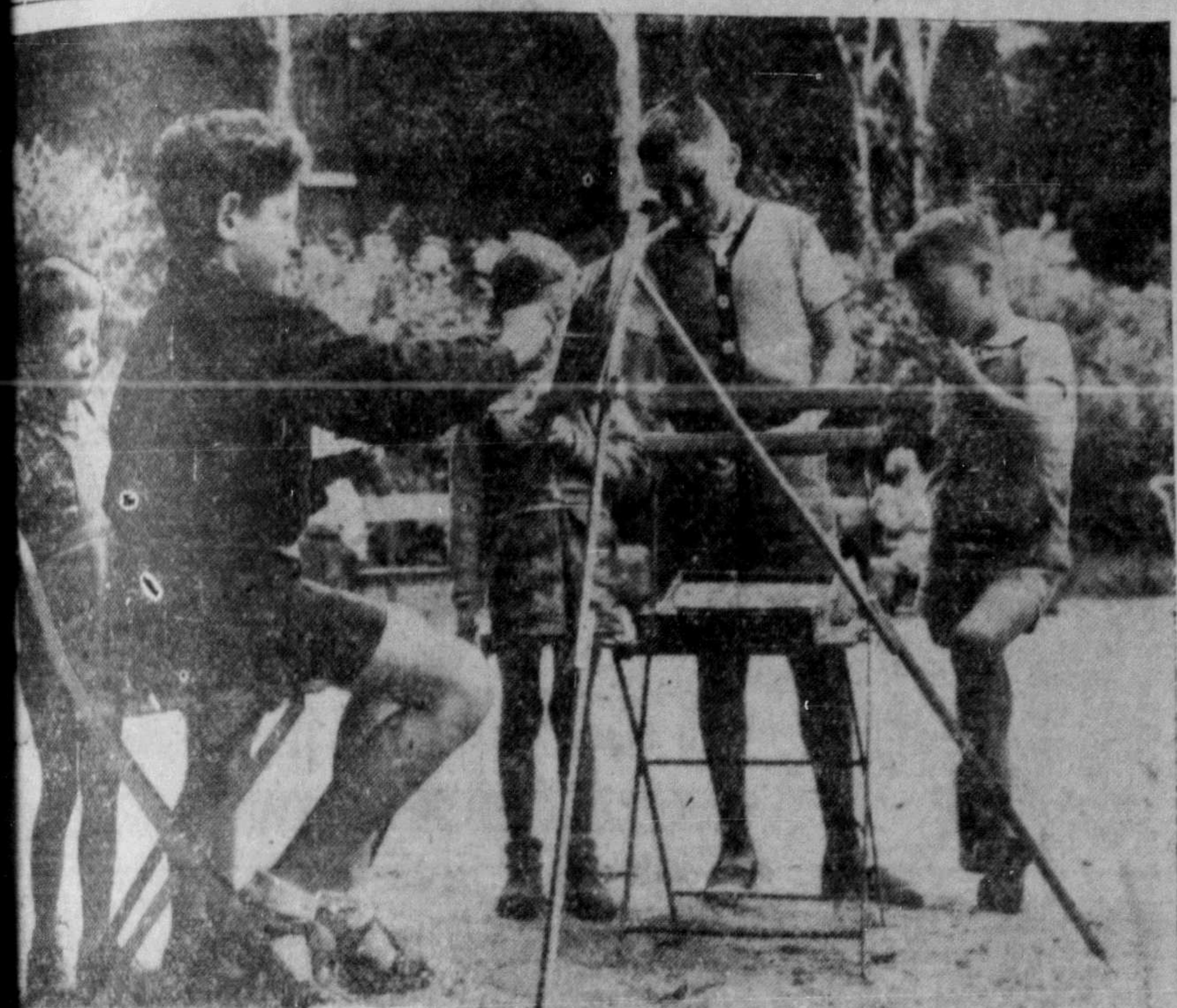

## With Korean Calls Kingpins Purged Regime 'Imposters'

Kim's real name was Kim Sung Jo. He was born 42 years ago in a small village near the Red capital of Pyongyang, the son of an anti-Japanese nationalist. He became a member of the Chinese Youth Association of the Communist party when he was 17. At the age of 30, Kim became commander of the guerrilla corps in Manchuria. During the Second World War Kim commanded a Korean army corps that fought alongside the Russians. In the battle of Leningrad, he won special recognition from Stalin. He was ordered to Manchuria to fight the Japanese in the final days of the war. However, by the time he reached Manchuria, Japan had surrendered. Kim arrived at Nam-hi, his birthplace, in September, 1945, carrying secret instructions from Stalin on how to communize Korea. He adopted the name of Kim Il Sung, a Korean patriot who had been fighting the Japanese as a guerrilla in Manchuria. The real Kim Il Sung was then about 53 years old; the imposter about 34. In October, 1945, the bogus Kim appeared in public for the first time under his new name. Oct. 14, he was introduced as a "victorious general" to more than 200,000 North Koreans assembled at a parade ground in Pyongyang. The story of Nam Il's life revealed that his real name was Kim Chang Man. He now is about 47. He was born in a small Korean village near Pyongyang. Nam Il was propaganda chief of the North Korean Labor (Communist) party until he was appointed chief trade delegate for the Reds in July, 1951. He was not a general. He appeared at the Kaesong and Panmunjom truce negotiations first under a title of lieutenant-general and later as a full general. The real Nam Il is a man about 50, trained in Russia. He was president of a Communist college in Pyongyang and also an instructor at the Kim Il Sung University there. He also was chief of the education bureau in Pyongyang and had been educated in Moscow.

# Crippling French Strikes Spread To Country's Offices, Industry

## Paris Bus, Subway Service at Standstill

PARIS.—The crippling series of strikes in state-owned industries in France spread to government offices and some sections of private industry today, taking some 4,000,000 workers from their jobs.

The strike of postal, telephone and telegraph workers went into its ninth day. Paris was without bus or subway service for the second straight day. The railway strike was in its third day. Bank and insurance company clerks walked off the job today and so did workers in metal industries, including automobile factories. A few department store workers went out.

Printers and other mechanical newspaper workers announced a 24-hour strike and said no newspapers would appear in France on Monday.

Marseille, France's second-largest city, was without public transport today.

In Lyons, banks were hit by a stoppage and cheques could not be cashed. Metal workers came out and army trucks and private buses took over the city's transport.

STERN WARNING  
The strikes went on and grew despite a stern warning by Premier Joseph Laniel Wednesday.

right that the government would not give in. He called on the strikers to go back to work for the good of France, but his plea fell on deaf ears.

The government, by use of policemen, soldiers and non-strikers, was trying to deal with the mountain of backed-up mail, but with little success. Only a few deliveries were made.

Most of the workers today were ordered to walk out for only 24 or 28 hours. But a hard core of more than 1,000,000 already is committed to stay out until the premier backs down, tying up mines, railways, gas and electric works, and public health services.

Laniel, a millionaire textile industrialist who learned to fight in the wartime French underground, however, stuck his chin out and said he would not yield.

In a fighting speech Wednesday night, the 64-year-old premier exclaimed:

"I say not to strike. I say no to pressure moves, direct or indirect, which have been imposed on the government."

All factions of French labour pressed him. The first walkouts last week were called by the Socialist Workers' Force, but the Communist-led General Federation of Labor and the Christian (Catholic) Trade Unions quickly joined in.

Laniel said it was the duty of the government of a democratic state to oppose the strike.

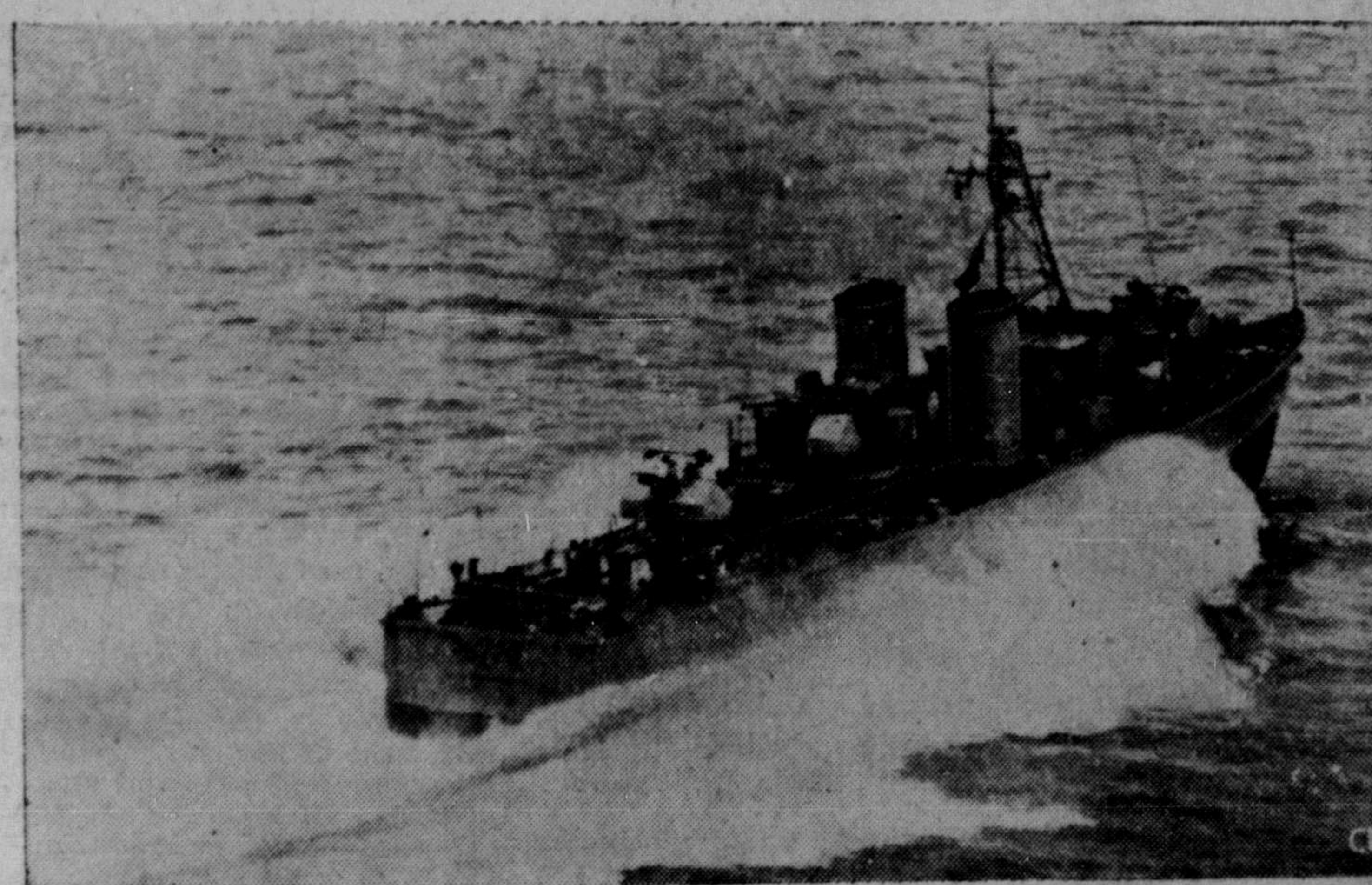
The walkouts were sparked by disclosure that the government's program for rescuing the treasury from near-bankruptcy included lopping some employees off public payrolls and upping the retirement age for civil servants.

Workers also were angered that Laniel's plan did not put a heavier tax bite on the wealthy. Communists chimed in with calls for a general wage boost.

The premier hinted the government would not make any reforms as long as the strikes continue.

## \$100 Fine Levied On Liquor Charge

## Royal Navy Hails Torpedo Boat 'Fastest Fighting Ship Afloat'

LONDON.—A squat, sawed-off little plug-ugly of a boat spearheads Britain's bid to remain one of the world's greatest sea powers.

This is the Bold Pioneer, a motor torpedo boat which the Royal Navy proudly hails as probably the fastest fighting ship afloat. Her peak speed is a secret, but the admiralty acknowledges she has already exceeded 40 knots—more than 50 miles an hour.

Bold Pioneer is powered by diesel engines with a gas-turbine "boost." With disarming candor, uncharacteristic of the silent service, the navy adds that this type of boosted power is to the ordinary steam engine as steam was to sail in Victoria's day.

"The gas turbine is used as an auxiliary power unit in combination with diesel engines," an admiralty spokesman explained.

"This principle is the death knell, with certain reservations, of steam used on its own. In the next 10 years ships which are not boosted by gas turbines will become obsolescent." The spokesman said Britain believes she has a four- to five-year lead on other countries in application of the turbine-boost principle to fighting ships.

The Bold Pioneer, first of the gas turbine-propelled ships in commission, recently completed trials in the English Channel, to the complete satisfaction of even the most cynical old salt.

The 122-foot craft, with a take-off noise which has been likened to a seagull, is equipped with two 4.5-inch guns, giving it a punch possessed by few other small craft. She tears past other ships of the same size as though they were standing still, and is easy to manoeuvre.

With a 25-foot beam, a seven-foot draught and displacement of 130 tons, Bold Pioneer would prove especially useful in maintaining command of narrow seas, such as ring Britain's coast. She isn't much to look at—her cut-off stern gives her an unfinished look—but naval officers say there's nothing to touch her anywhere.

## Quakes Continue to Rock Islands Off Greek Coast

ATHENS (AP)—Earth tremors continued until their fifth day and unchecked fires brought new horror today to three quake-ravaged islands off the western coast of Greece. Ships of all sizes shuttled unceasingly across the Ionian Sea, bringing hundreds of injured to hospitals in Patras, the closest big city.

There still was no official estimate of the total dead among the 120,000 persons on the wrecked islands of Ithaca, Kefallinia and Zakynthos. Unofficially the figure was placed so far as just under 1,000, with "countless" injured. It was feared the uncleaned rubble hid many more bodies.

MANY FIRES  
Fires were reported still burning in the cities of Zakynthos, population 15,000, and Argostolion, population 10,000. Both were destroyed by the earth disturbances.

The interior ministry said officials of Kefallinia advised that Argostolion, the island's chief port, was "beginning to sink underwater."

Most or virtually all of the 120,000 islanders were reported homeless.

Not let up was in sight. The brief reports from the area said the tremors were continuing.

## CRUISER ON WAY

From Naples, the speedy 20,000-ton cruiser Salem—flagship of the United States 6th Fleet—headed to the islands with doctors, stocks and medical supplies and food and a helicopter aboard.

Another American helicopter was on its way from Tripoli and others were expected from Germany. Without them, rescue and aid could come only by ship or amphibian plane. The islands have no landing strips. And only the rotor-bladed aircraft

could reach mountain-locked villages whose fate remained a mystery.

King Paul and Queen Frederika, cutting short an Aegean Island vacation, planned to leave at once for the disaster scene aboard a Greek destroyer.

RUSHING FOOD  
Defence Minister Panayotis Canellopoulos and Welfare Minister Constantine Adamopoulos already were at Kefallinia supervising relief work.

Britain rushed the frigate Ranger and the destroyer Darlington from the Mediterranean island of Malta and diverted the cruiser Gambia at sea to bring food, medicines, doctors, tents and demolition tools to the disaster area. Three other British warships in Valletta harbor were under sailing orders.

For many of the evacuees, the trip was their first look at the outside world. Many of the villagers had never before left the communities their ancestors founded centuries ago.

## Egypt to Cut Off Talks With U.K. Over Suez Base

CAIRO (AP)—Egypt today decided to break off talks with Britain on the Suez base and not to resume them, sources close to the government disclosed.

Informants said the Egyptian government will issue a communique tonight announcing rupture of the informal talks.

The talks, seeking a basis of formal negotiations which broke down last May, were started July 30. There were three informal meetings.

The informants said Egypt's decision not to continue informal contacts with the British negotiators came after Lt.-Col. Gamal Abdel Nasser, chief Egyptian negotiator, submitted a report to President Mohammed Naguib on the latest discussions.

The decision coincided with unrest in the Suez canal zone. A British airman and two Egyptians were wounded Wednesday. Britain was reported to have made strong representations over the increasing number of incidents.

Egypt wants evacuation of the 80,000 British troops in the canal zone. Britain wants assurances first that arrangements can be made to keep the vital waterway in good working order and to assure its defence.

## Determination Paid Off

AN OBJECT LESSON in community enterprise was provided at Bella Coola recently when citizens of the town completed a 45-mile road which makes connection with the interior highway system. The project brings Bella Coola into the select company of Prince Rupert and Vancouver as a west coast terminal.

The undertaking merits attention not only as a step in the development of coastal trade but also as an example of what can be accomplished in the face of governmental indifference and broken promises.

The string of broken promises started back in 1894 when a road was promised to a group of Norwegians and Swedes settling in the locality. Nothing happened and, with variations, the same experience was repeated through succeeding generations.

Finally in 1949 the community despaired of help and started building the road by itself. Although determination was plentiful, money was not, with the result that numerous improvisations were necessary. One of these was the human radar set in the person of an Indian guide, Thomas Aquinas. If the road-builders were unsure of their direction, they would ask Thomas, who unerringly put them straight. Thanks to the Indian's uncanny instinct they hit the connecting road at Aniham Lake dead on.

The road, which cost \$10,000 instead of the \$500,000 estimated for it in contracted labor, appears to be paying off. An oil line company has shown interest in Bella Coola as a coastal outlet and the provincial government has advanced \$10,000 to assure the project that promises of additional help are soon to come.

We in this district also know what it is like to be surrounded by the cool atmosphere of indifference. Perhaps, like its Indian guide, Bella Coola has pointed a good way out. To coin a phrase, "Maybe the government helps those who help themselves."

## Gold, Silver Articles to Bear Hallmark with Queen's Effigy

TORONTO — British gold and silver articles made this year will rate a special place in the collector's showcase.

In honor of the Coronation, the 1953 hall mark stamped upon all such items will include the Queen's effigy.

Dating back to the early 14th century, the hall mark is actually a series of symbols pressed into the metal denoting where made, by whom and when. This mark of identification and quality was formally started in 1340, when the Worshipful Company of Goldsmiths established the Goldsmiths Hall in London.

At one time hall marks included the reigning monarch's head. This started in London in 1784 and stopped in 1890.

However in 1935 to celebrate the silver jubilee of King George V, both his effigy and that of Queen Mary appeared on gold and silver goods, the first time in the long history of the hall mark when a King's and a Queen's head appeared together.

George Carter of Toronto, head of the silverware department of a large Canadian jewelry house, said a great deal of British gold and silver was purchased that year and he has not come across any of it since.

Collectors of silver have great respect for the initials "HB" included in a hall mark. They belong to a famous woman, Hester Bateman, who ranked as one of the best of the early Georgian silversmiths.

About the period 1774 to 1800, Mrs. Bateman favored a comparatively simple line of design. She evidently passed her skill

on in the family and much fine silver bears the initials of her eldest son, Jonathan Bateman and Peter and Ann Bateman, Hester's second son and his wife.

## "Home to Mother" Normal Process

TORONTO — Here's a word of consolation to brides who are nearly ready to go home tearfully to mother: It's normal to have problems in the first years of marriage.

That's the view of Lillian Thomson, general secretary of the Neighborhood Workers' Association of Toronto.

"One third of all the people who come to us for help are husbands and wives who don't get along," she said in an interview.

But despite the stream of unhappy couples into the offices of her organization, she believes nearly all are capable of real happiness together.

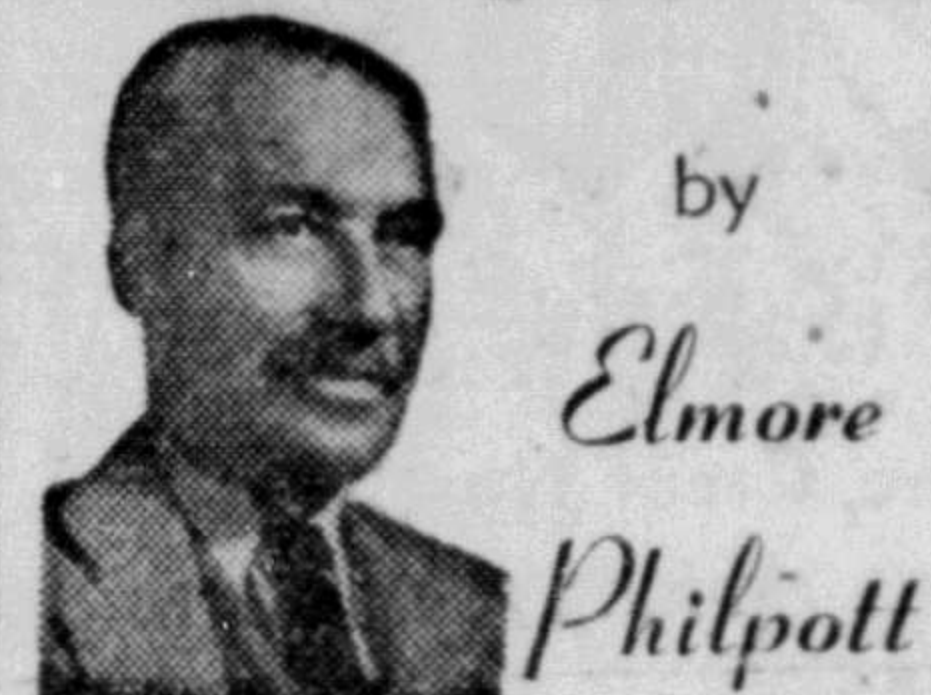
Some of the blame for souables and quarrels can be placed on today's living conditions, she says.

"Housing shortages are placing special pressures on young couples, eating up their money, cramping them so they get on each other's nerves."

She feels a community could do more to provide organizations to relieve the young matron and her husband of 24-hour duty with their children.

Miss Thomson and her marriage counsellors also advise couples to discuss their worries, problems, hopes and dreams with each other.

## As I See It



Bravo Milwaukee

ABOUT a year ago I referred to a fine series of articles on Canada by Austin C. Wehrwein of the Milwaukee Journal.

They were, I think, the best articles ever written on Canada by a citizen of the U.S.A. and they are well worth study by any Canadian who wants to see how Canada looks to a friendly, keen, shrewd observer.

Mr. Wehrwein was later awarded the 1953 Pulitzer prize for those articles. Professionals agree there probably never was a more deserved award.

But now Mr. Wehrwein has come up with an idea which might bear great fruit, for good.

SPEAKING to the Milwaukee chapter of the Sigma Delta Chi journalism fraternity recently, Austin Wehrwein proposed "an exchange program between American and Canadian newspapermen."

"We need Americans with an appreciation of Canada more than they need Canadians who know us. They know us pretty well already, although naturally, some of them have misconceptions—and serious ones—which a hitch on, say, the Milwaukee Journal would clear up."

Mr. Wehrwein thinks both the U.S. and Canadian governments might be interested in backing the idea, but he (correctly) concludes that a purely private plan would be better.

"The chief stumbling block would be money. Unfortunately, some Canadian papers pay lower wages than do most of ours, and a Canadian would probably need extra money to live here. Aside from that I believe that both the Canadians and Americans should get a generous—if not munificent—allowance for travel and entertainment in the respective countries."

Mr. Wehrwein thinks the newsprint companies or Ford Foundation might "pick up the check."

THE IDEA seems to me to be a natural, and could do tremendous good.

Whenever I get in a period of depression myself about something in the U.S. (such as the activities of a certain Senator), my wife and I pick up and travel by car across the States. We always come back home to Canada wondering how you can get such a wrong impression of a country from reading; about it in brief wire reports, or hearing about it on the radio. Nobody could live among ordinary Americans and not like them.

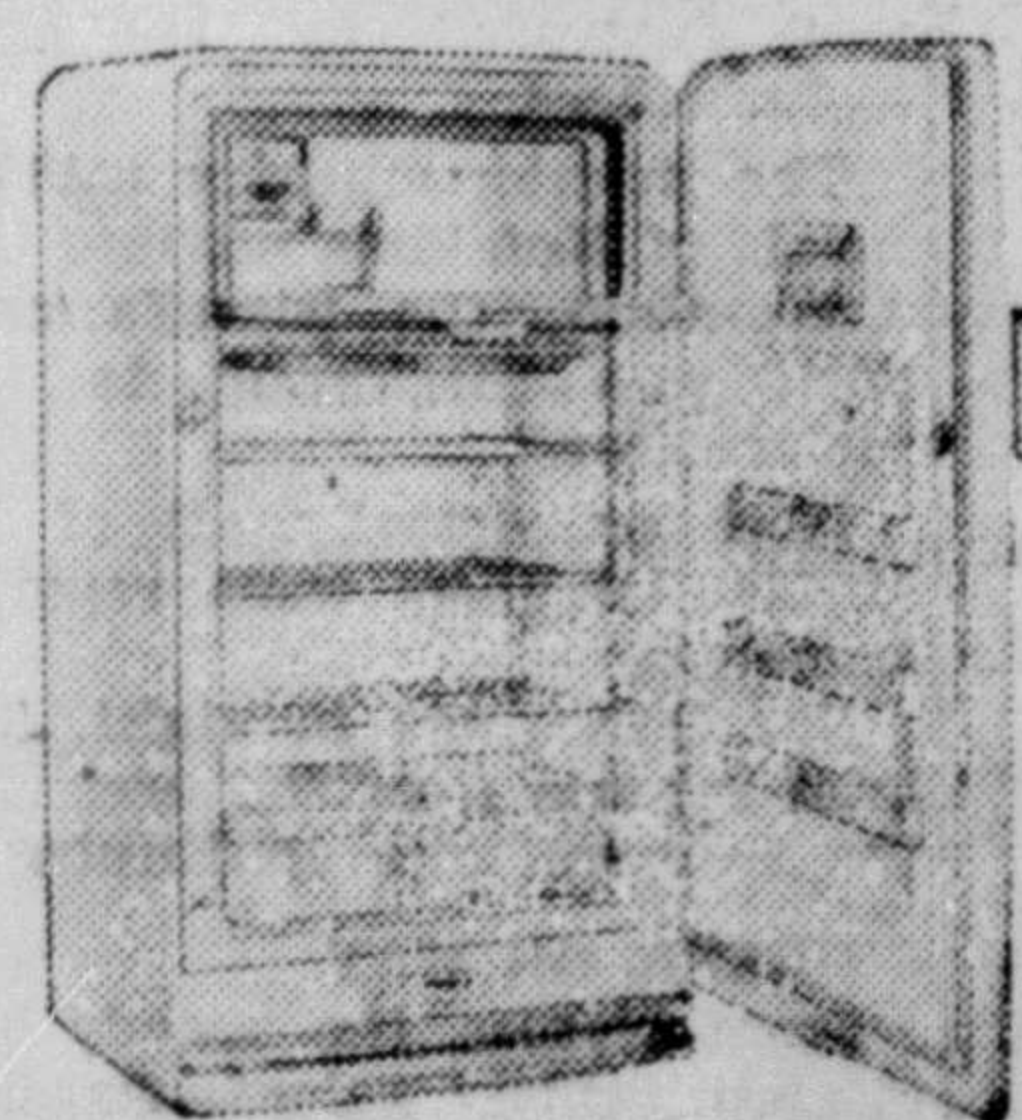
THERE is of course a somewhat similar plan in operation between Britain and Canada.

Certain bright Canadians are selected to go over to Britain and do regular newspaper stints with good papers there.

One drawback is they make such big names for themselves (like Pat Keatley) that their original papers may have trouble getting them back home again, and hence publishers might think to themselves, "Why should we take chances on a scheme which might lose us our best men?"

But these are minor matters. The main fact is it would do both countries good if key working newspapermen from both countries did a stint of duty in the other—especially if they had to write for readers of both countries while doing so.

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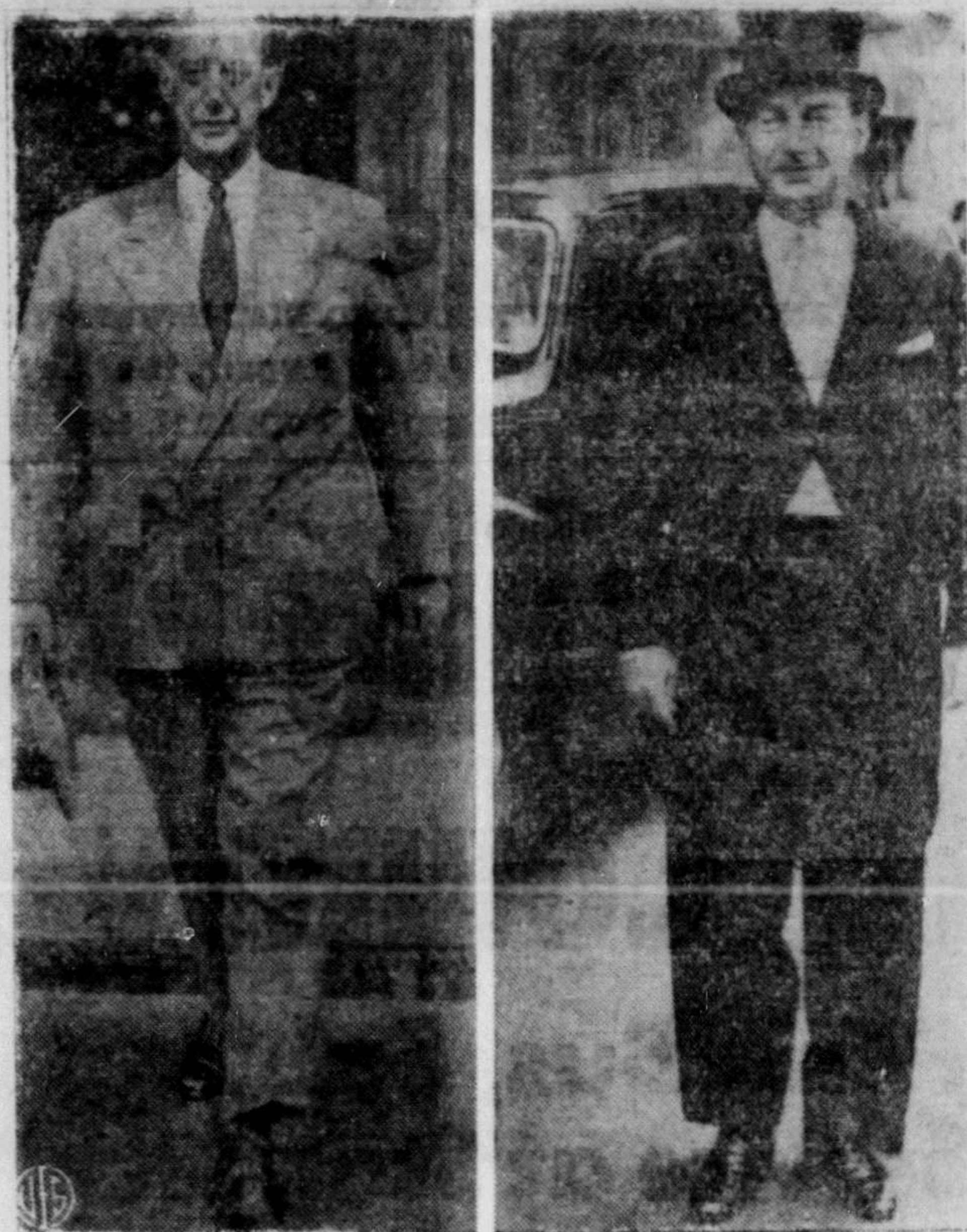

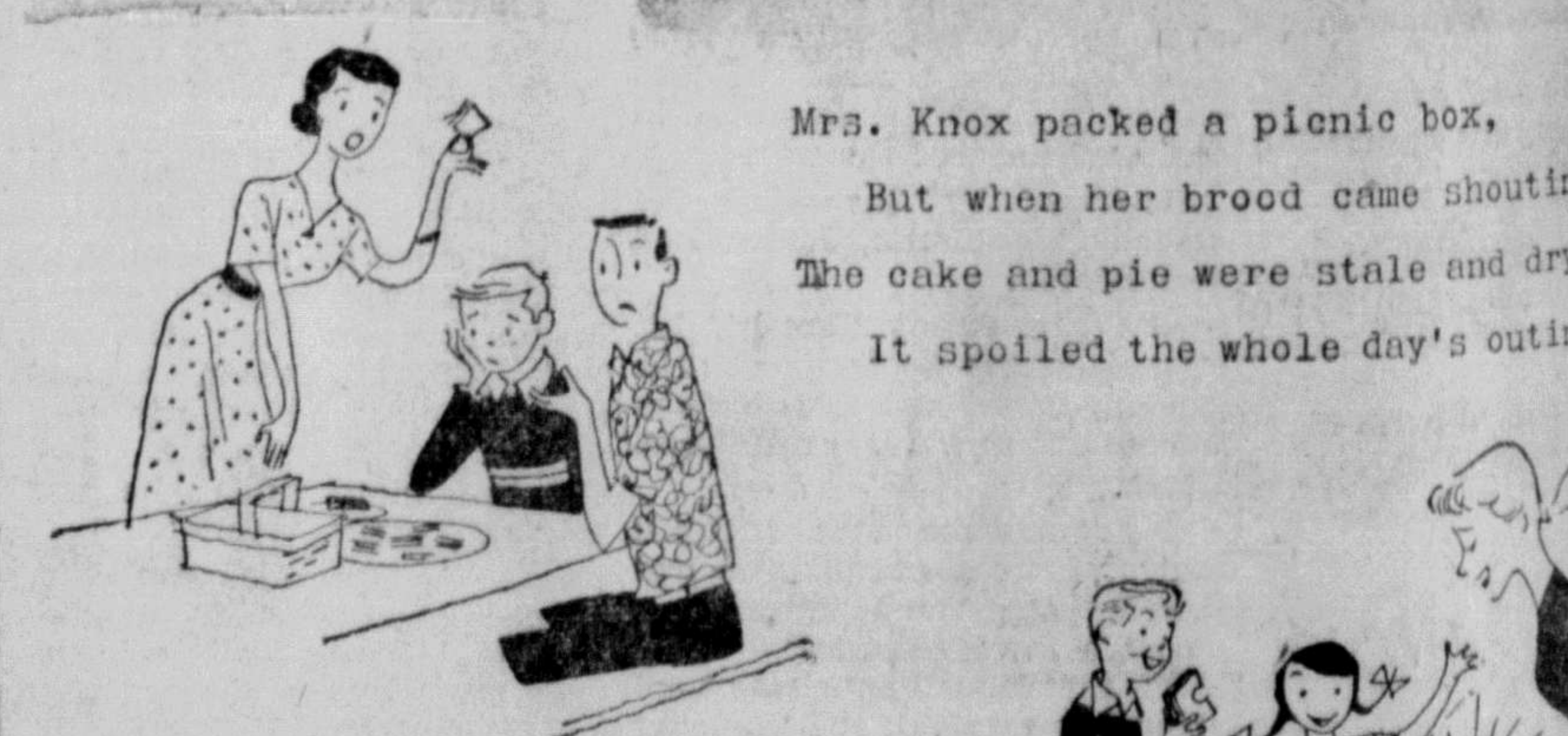

## Tenders for \$40 million fuel link Expected To Be Called in Fortnight

OTTAWA (CP)—Defence forces in strategic Alaska and north-western Canada will be fed oil and gasoline through a 610-mile pipeline to be built immediately by the United States, partly over the storied Trail of '98.

Work on the \$40,000,000 fuel link, passing through north-western British Columbia and the Yukon over sections of the turn-of-the-century gold rush trail, probably will start this year. Terminals will be Haines, near Skagway, Alaska, on the Pacific coast, and Fairbanks, Alaska, keystone of the defence arch that bulges towards Asiatic Russia.

About one-third of the line will be buried, mostly in the Canadian sections, and the rest will be above ground. The eight-inch line will follow the Haines cut-off, a side road from the Alaska Highway, to Haines Junction, where it will bend northward along the vital defence artery.

Sources here said the U.S. engineers in charge of construction will call tenders for pipe and other materials in about two weeks. The aim is to get preliminary work completed before snow forces a halt in the mountainous region. The big drive for construction will be next spring, but no target date for operating the line was announced.

After secret negotiations extending over the last year, the reaching of an agreement between Canada and the U.S. was announced simultaneously Wednesday in Washington and Ottawa.

How much fuel the line will be able to carry is a variable quantity since the capacity of a pipeline depends on the type of fuel transmitted, the temperatures in the area, and the number of pumping stations.

Oil tankers will bring fuel into Haines, about 450 miles northeast of the Queen Charlotte Islands at the head of an inlet called Lynn Canal.

The new line will take over most of the job now performed by the smaller Canol pipeline, built by the U.S. during the Second World War and partly

dismantled later. The pipeline also will be available to fill Canadian military requirements. Civilian needs also will be satisfied.

Cost of the project is estimated at \$40,000,000. Of this, \$12,000,000 will be spent on the Canadian section.

The line will be built northward from Haines, near Skagway, along the Haines cutoff, a road linking the Pacific coast town with the Haines-Junction on the Alaska Highway. From Haines

Junction, it will follow the Alaska Highway to Fairbanks.

The Canadian section of the line will start at the Alaska-B.C. boundary, about 30 miles north of Haines, and end of the Yukon-Alaska boundary on the Alaska Highway, a total of about 285 miles.

Title of right-of-way for the Canadian section will be held by the B.C. and Federal governments. The B.C. government is making crown-owned lands available for the project.

## Turbo-Prop Airliner Earns Large Profit For UK Firm

LONDON (CP)—Turbo-prop Vickers Viscount airliners operated by British European Airways have earned a clear profit of nearly £70,000 in their first 2,000 hours of scheduled service, it was announced here.

Peter Masfield, BEA's chief executive, says in an article in the corporation's magazine that this represents a profit of about £34 a flying hour, and is "tremendously encouraging for the future."

The Viscount went into service April 18. BEA now has nine in service on routes from London to Cyprus, Istanbul, Zurich and Geneva.

Masfield says the profit was made over BEA's most lucrative longer routes and during summer peak traffic. Even so, the

says, it is encouraging that the Viscount is operating already at the lowest cost a ton-mile of any passenger airliner in the BEA fleet.

"It shows," says Masfield, "that in the Viscount we have a plane which is not only in the lead in its attraction to passengers, but also one which is going to be a first-class proposition economically—a wonderful start for the world's first turbo-prop airliner."

Trans-Canada Air Lines has an order for 15 Viscounts. Deliveries are to start in 1954.

### Recount Sought

NEW WESTMINSTER (CP)—William Mott, a Liberal defeated in New Westminster riding in Monday's federal election, will ask for a recount. The seat was taken by George Hahn, Social Credit, who won by 132 votes.

"My campaign committee feel there is no question about the need for a recount," said Mr. Mott today.

New Westminster has been a federal Liberal stronghold for 23 years. Mr. Mott, a former mayor of New Westminster, was elected to Parliament in the 1949 election.

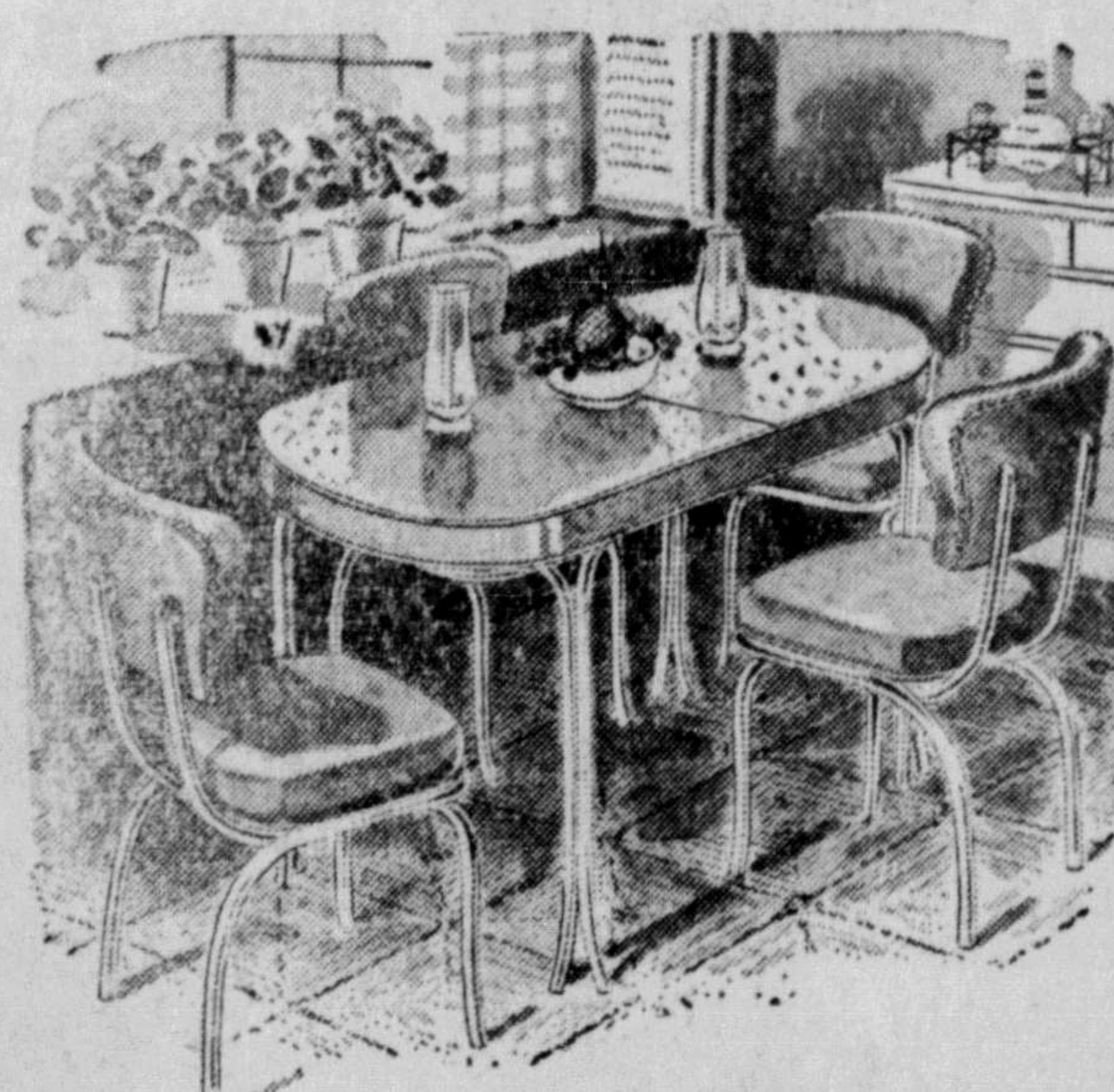

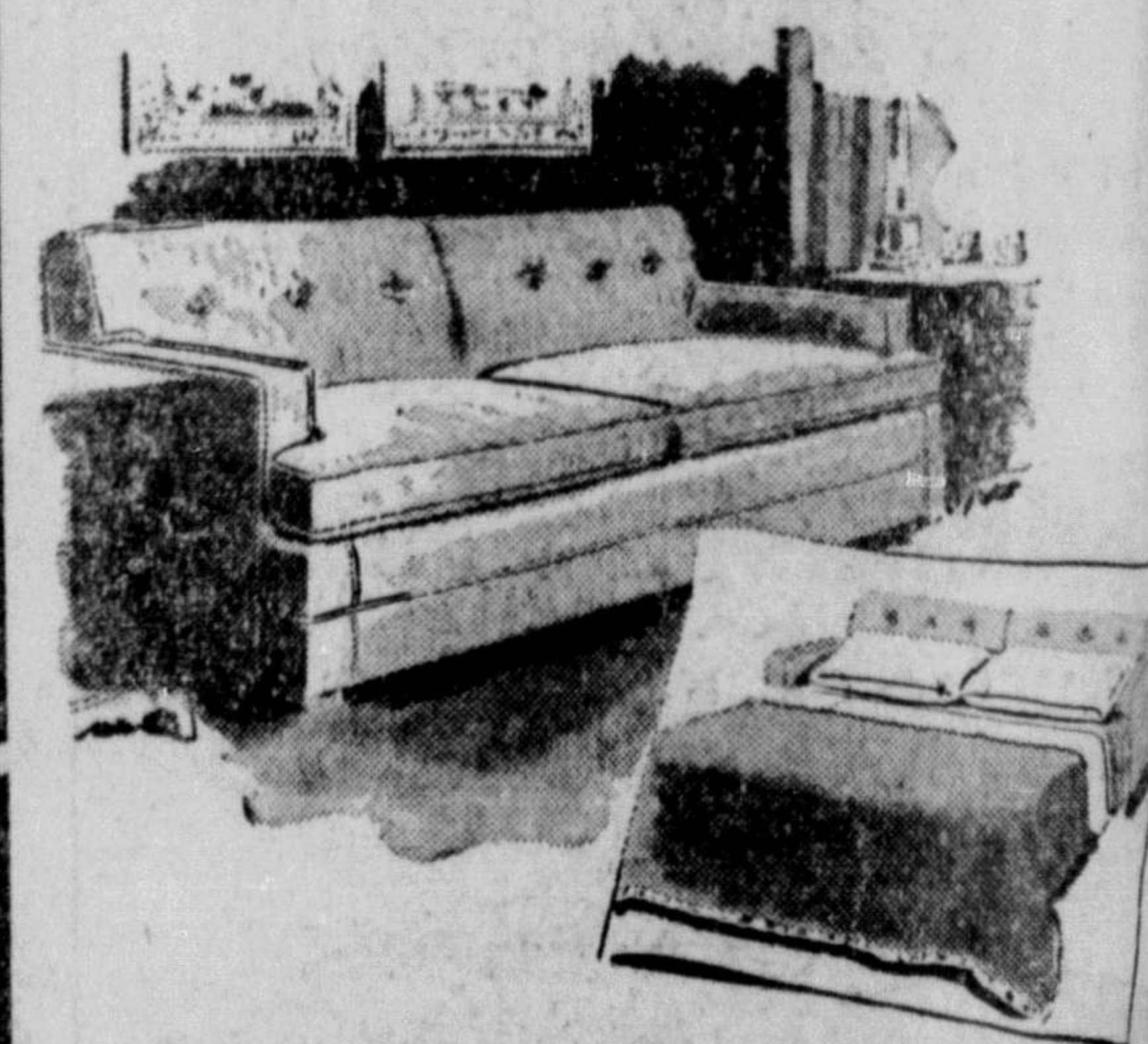

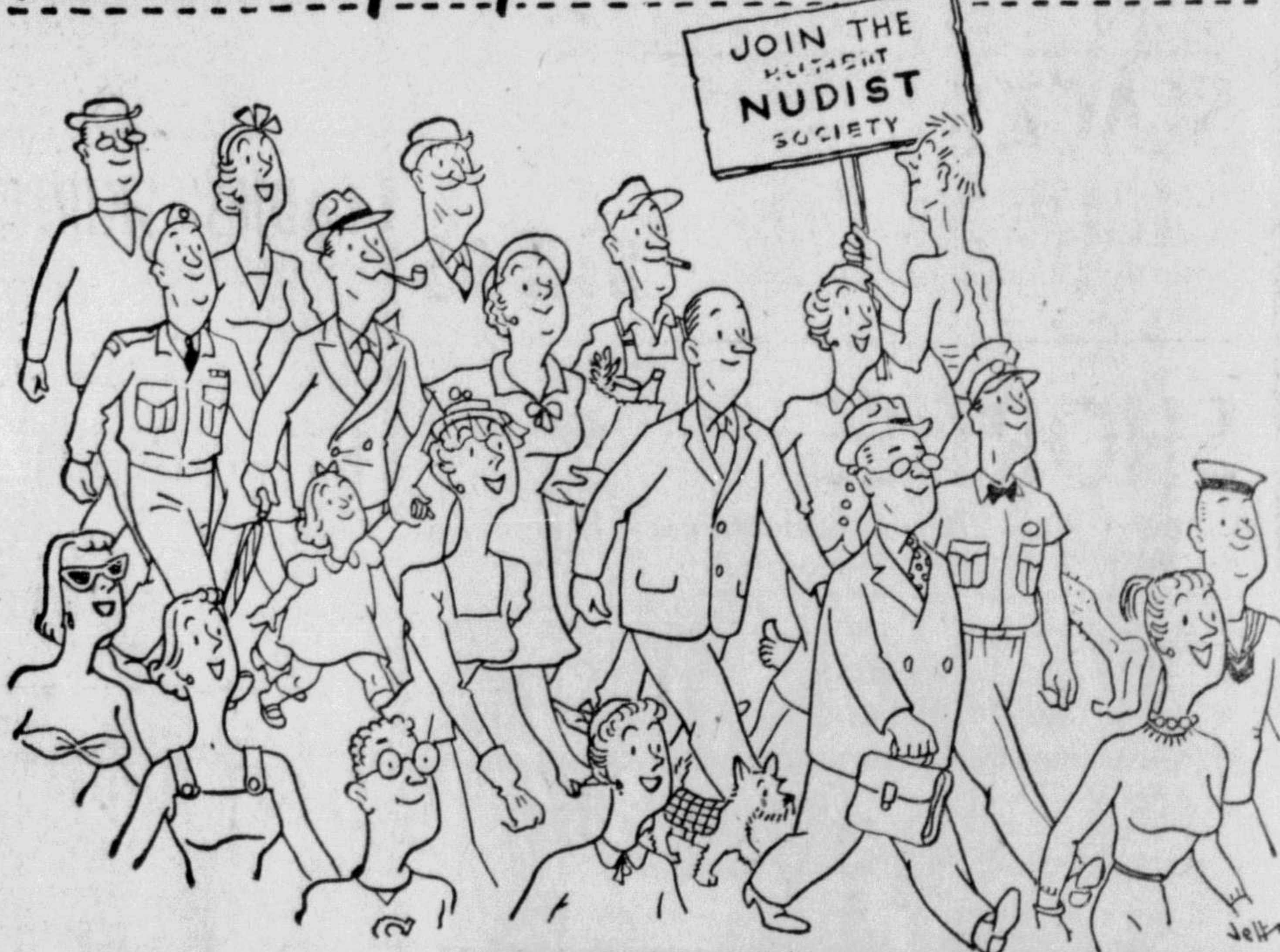

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## Third American Group Conquers Mt. Robson

JASPER.—Mighty Mount Robson, highest peak in the Canadian Rockies, has been climbed for the third time this year.

Word of the new ascent by five United States climbers was brought out today to Harold J. Gunning, manager of Jasper Park Lodge, by Mount Robson Park forest ranger Jack Wilson.

Latest party to conquer the 12,972-foot "Monarch of the Canadian Rockies" included Will Siri, Allen Steck and Bill Dun-

mire of Berkeley, Cal., Dick Houston of San Francisco, and Bill Long of Richmond, Cal.

The California group followed the same route up the mountain, previously unclimbed since 1938, as the other two 1953 climbing expeditions.

Mr. Gunning said the Californians are members of the Himalayan expedition planning next summer's attempt on 27,790-foot Mount Nakalu, fourth-highest mountain in the world. They made the Mount Robson ascent to test high altitude equipment.

## Soviet Zone Food Seeker Sent to Jail

BERLIN (AP)—East German food-seekers brought word today of a three-month jail sentence given a Soviet zoner for bringing an American food parcel back from West Berlin. It was the first report here of such a penalty.

Arrivals from the Communist-held territory said a Brandenburg railway official, caught by the Communist police as he carried his package through the Potsdam rail station, was summarily tried and sentenced to three months in prison.

Border crossers told also of two new measures which have stirred up considerable resentment:

- Peoples' police handling the control points on East Berlin's Warsaw Bridge seized dozens of packages and threw them into the Spree River.

- Police checking all passes on trains are tearing up those which do not belong to the holder.

Many East Germans bring the passes of friends to pick up food packages for them. An East German who lacks an identity pass is in trouble. A new one costs him 30 marks—several days' pay for the average worker—and loss of the old one means an additional fine of 30 marks.

Despite the tight controls, those still coming over the border say most packages are being smuggled through.

## Paper Questions Fall in Price Of Wheat

MANCHESTER (U.S.)—The Manchester Guardian, in a newspaper story on the fall in world wheat prices, says today the decline does not necessarily prove that Britain was right to withdraw from the International Wheat Agreement.

"One would have to be sure that the British withdrawal had sufficient psychological force in the world wheat markets to contribute to the price fall," says the article by the paper's financial editor.

"That is quite possible, but the price was in any case bound to fall as a result of the heavy accumulation of wheat supplies."

In a survey of crop prospects, the Guardian says the Canadian crop is likely to be heavy. Australia has a "good" crop. Western European countries are likely to have a better harvest than last year. India may gather a heavy grain harvest in the fall and a considerable quantity of wheat will be available from Argentina after a series of small crops.

"If supply and demand were allowed to take effect freely, wheat prices no doubt would fall much further."

The new International Wheat Agreement went into effect this month. Britain declined to sign at the maximum price of \$2.05 set under the agreement.

# Homers Play Vital Parts As "Majors" Records Fall

The major leagues are two-thirds on the way through a fence-busting campaign that threatens to endanger a flock of modern home run records.

At least five already have been equalled or broken. The National League is well on the road to an all-time seasonal total. Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee is keeping close to Babe Ruth's 1927 pace—the year the Babe clouted his never-equalled 60.

One mark was tied and one surpassed last night. At St. Louis Ray Boone hit a bases-loaded homer in the ninth inning, providing the winning margin as Detroit beat the Browns 7-3. It was his fourth grand slam drive of the season, tying a major league record shared by nine other players including Ruth in his Boston Red Sox days of 1919, Lou Gehrig and Ralph Kiner.

## YANKS 100TH HOMER

At Washington, Yogi Berra homered in the first inning of New York Yankees' 22-1 landslide against the Senators for the Yankees' 100th homer of the season—the 30th year since 1920 that the Yankees have hit 100 or

more. No other club comes close to this all-time mark.

The other records equalled or erased this season include:

Most seasons of 100 or more homers by a National League club—22 by New York Giants who have 122 to date—old mark 21 by the Giants.

Most homers in five consecutive games—20 by St. Louis Browns—old mark 17 by the Yankees.

Consecutive home runs in an inning—three by the St. Louis Browns—equals a record held by numerous teams.

## SNIDER CLEANS BASES

Grand slam home runs played vital roles in two National League games last night. At New York Duke Snider of Brooklyn blasted his second bases-loaded drive in three games as the Dodgers came from behind to nip the Giants 6-5. And at Chicago Andy Seminick cleared the bases with a homer in the ninth for the winning margin as Cincinnati whipped the Cubs 10-6. The Cubs won the second game of the doubleheader 3-1.

The Yankees' lop-sided victory increased their league lead to seven games over Chicago White Sox who lost to Cleveland 7-4. Boston beat Philadelphia 3-2 in 10 innings.

Milwaukee clipped half a game off Brooklyn's lead—now seven games—by winning a doubleheader from St. Louis Cardinals 8-2 and 5-3. Robin Roberts became the first pitcher of the season to win 20 games as Philadelphia Phillies beat Pittsburgh Pirates 8-4.

Roberts, failed in his first attempt to win 20 at Chicago last Saturday, took matters in his own hands Wednesday night and drove across three runs.

LONDON, Ont. (C)—If Marlene Stewart doesn't win another golf tournament—and that's unlikely—she can still take her place among Canada's greatest competitors.

The chunky five-foot kid with the twisted grin proved that yesterday over the 6,225-yard Hunt Club course when she posted a spine-tingling extra-hole triumph over classy Pat O'Sullivan of Orange, Conn., in the second round of the Canadian women's Open championship.

The Fonthill miss, shaky as a school kid on the first nine when she trailed by three holes, steadied down to a grim battle with her more-experienced opponent until she tied it up on the 18th and won the extra hole to go into today's quarter-finals.

Victory for the British open champion was the highlight of a day that saw six Canadians eliminated as the seven-day championship hit the half-way mark.

Hard-hitting Barbara Davies of Vancouver defeated Mrs. Helen Cleat, also of Vancouver, 4 and 3 to give Canada two quarter-final qualifiers.

But these matches were incidental to the Stewart-O'Sullivan thriller. Miss O'Sullivan went down in six against Marlene's five on the 16th and it left the American girl only one up.

She had a 25-foot putt for a birdie three on the 17th and Marlene, eight feet from the pin on her second shot, had to sink it or bow out of the tournament. She made it.

On the last-chance 18th Marlene was just off the green on her second shot while the American clubbed hers beyond the apron into deep grass. Marlene had a par four but Miss O'Sullivan's chip rolled 12 feet past the cup and she missed the putt to send the game into the extra hole.

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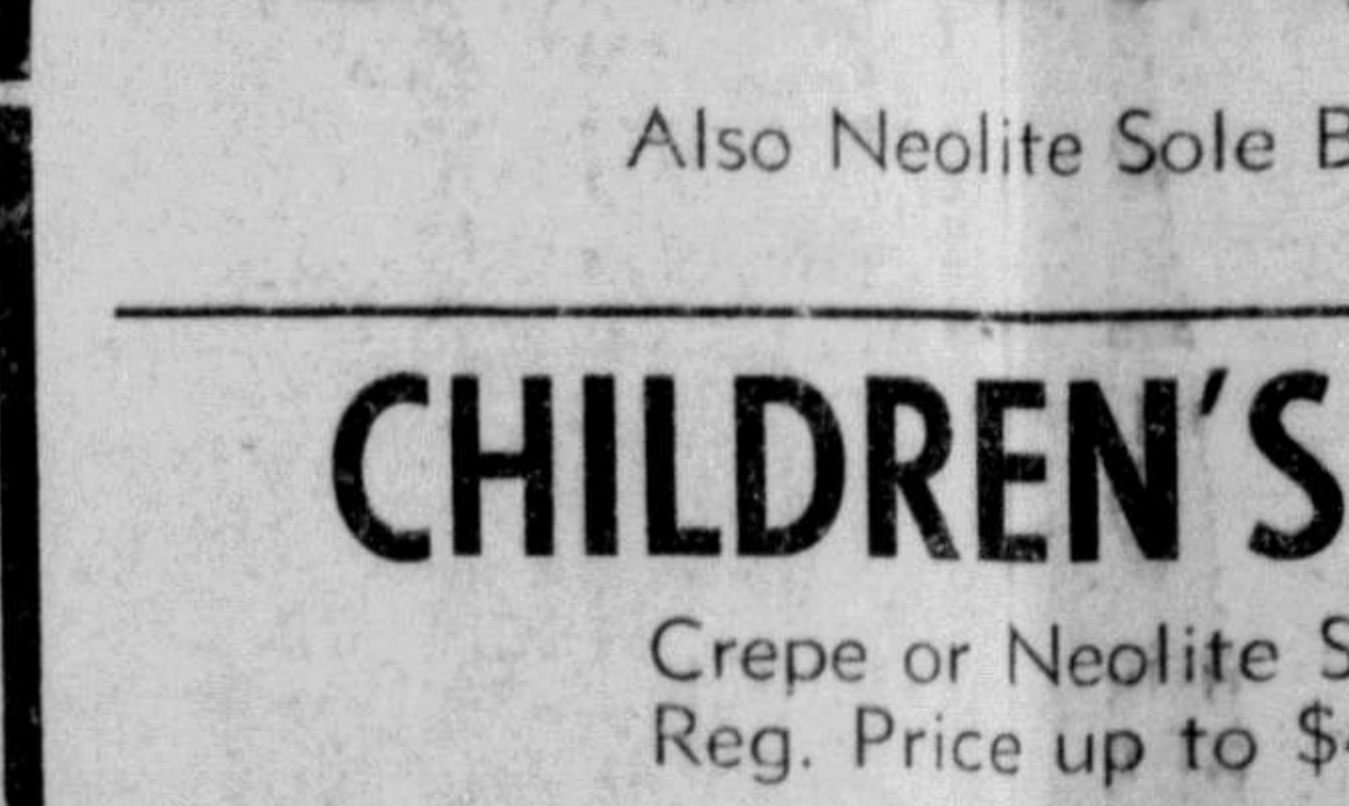

The executive set play-off dates for Little Leaguers as August 19, 21 and 24, when the top four teams will meet in sudden death games.

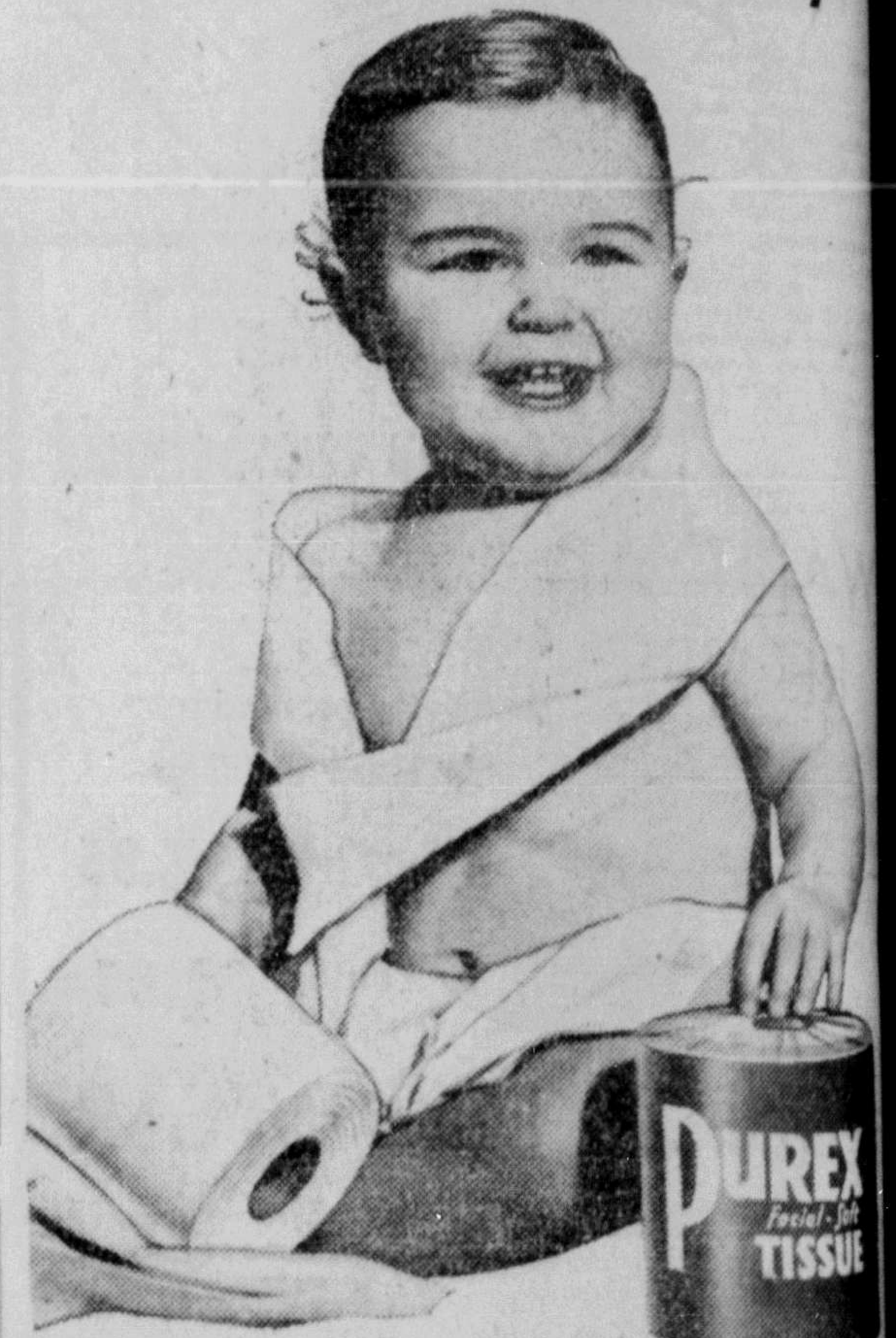

## Firefly Put to Work For Scientists After Centuries of Idle Twinkling

OAK RIDGE, Tenn. (AP)—After centuries of idle twinkling and inspiring poets—and little else—the firefly has been put to work for science here. Using lightning-bug extract,

scientists at Oak Ridge national laboratories are feeling their way closer to solution of an age-old mystery: how plants turn sunlight into energy. It's called photosynthesis.

Among other things, the scientists have learned that firefly enzyme and extract from green leaves contain a common chemical—a compound with the tongue-twisting tag of adenosine-triphosphate, or ATP for short. They've also learned that light in creases the amount of ATP in green leaves, just as more ATP seems to increase the amount of light given off by firefly extract. This, say scientists on Dr. Alexander Hollaender's staff, promises answers to such questions as how light energy is transformed by green plants into chemical energy.

And since all living things, including man, ultimately make use of the light of the sun for their energy, the firefly may open endless possibilities for

science, which always is looking for the answer to life itself.

Already, Hollaender and his associates have learned to use the same chemicals the lightning bug does to produce an eerie green glow in a test tube.

And they've found that the lightning bug, as he flits around, nonchalantly mixes no less than five chemical components, including ATP, in the right proportion to make him light up.

Using the mixture, they have been able to measure very small portions of any one of the five compounds by measuring the amount of light given off by a solution of firefly enzyme when more ATP is added.

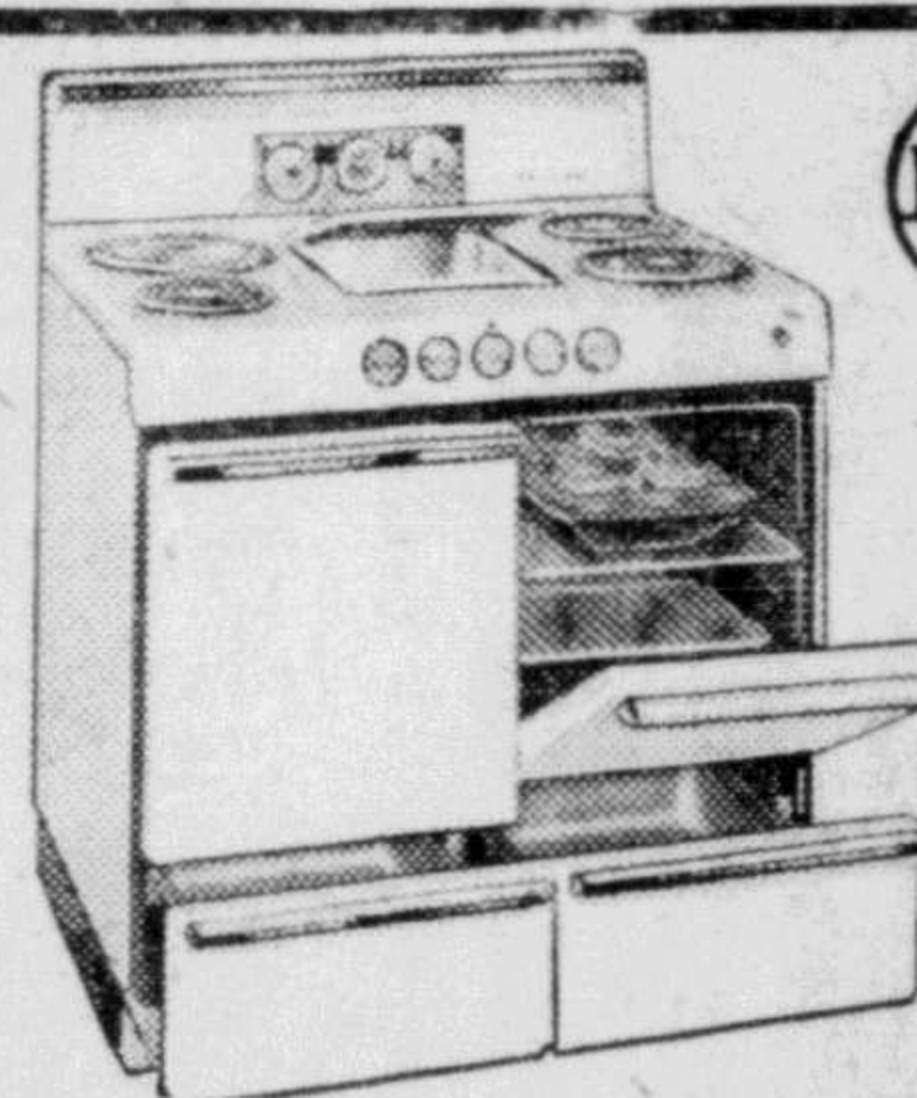
This ease with which the enzyme can be measured is one thing that makes it a valuable scientific tool—and why, in an atomic age, the little glow worm seems to glow brighter than ever.

Counting Hand Sometimes Shows "Unsafe" Lead Best

In counting a hand on the defence it sometimes becomes clear that you must lead a certain suit in order to have a chance to defeat the contract. That suit should be led in such cases, regardless of the fact that the lead is one which you would normally avoid as "unsafe."

In today's deal Mr. Champion was permitted to win the first two tricks with the jack and 10 of diamonds. Mr. Muzzy playing the nine and eight in that order.

A third diamond was led, dummy ducked again and Mr. Muzzy played the queen. Mr. Dale ruffed. Two rounds of spades were taken, clearing the suit, and Mr. Dale then led the four of hearts to dummy's nine. Mr. Muzzy won with the ace and his return at this point determined the fate of the contract.

As you see, a club lead would have put the hand down one. In spite of the fact that Mr. Muzzy couldn't see the ace in his partner's hand, the club return stands out. But unfortunately for his side, Mr. Muzzy had a "safe" lead to make—the ace of diamonds. This would drop dummy's lone king and force Mr. Dale to ruff.

That was Mr. Muzzy's choice and Mr. Dale did ruff. He then

"Lead from my queen right into the king-jack-ten?" asked Mr. Muzzy in a shocked tone. "I didn't know you had the ace."

"Makes no difference," barked Mr. Champion. "You could count Dale for five spades and almost surely for five hearts. He had played two diamonds so he couldn't have more than two clubs at the most. Now if he had the ace of clubs, there was no way to beat the hand. Right?"

Mr. Muzzy would admit nothing. "All I can say," he remarked, "is that you'll never catch me leading from a queen into a king-jack on the board."

## Cars Valued at \$300 Million Line Lots on Toronto Street

TORONTO.—Known as the street of 10,000 cars, it stretches through Toronto's east end for miles. The men who work on it call it "the great white way of Canadian motordom." The city street guide lists it as Danforth avenue.

They don't make automobiles on Danforth avenue, but the used car lots that line it put another car on the road every four minutes. Police statistics show more than 100 used car lots on this motorcar marketway.

And the lots are not broken, glass-dotted blots squeezed in between buildings. They are expanses of landscaped grounds with streamlined, air-conditioned offices where seller and buyer can sit in comfort and dicker.

Besides the office there is usually a spacious garage where weak spots are made strong, cars are given a complete over-haul.

With an estimated \$300,000,000 cash turnover the street of cars is the biggest used car market in Canada—one of the biggest anywhere. There is no other work in the used cars sold in this market place. These merchants are in business to stay a business that, to a large extent, depends upon return for its life. 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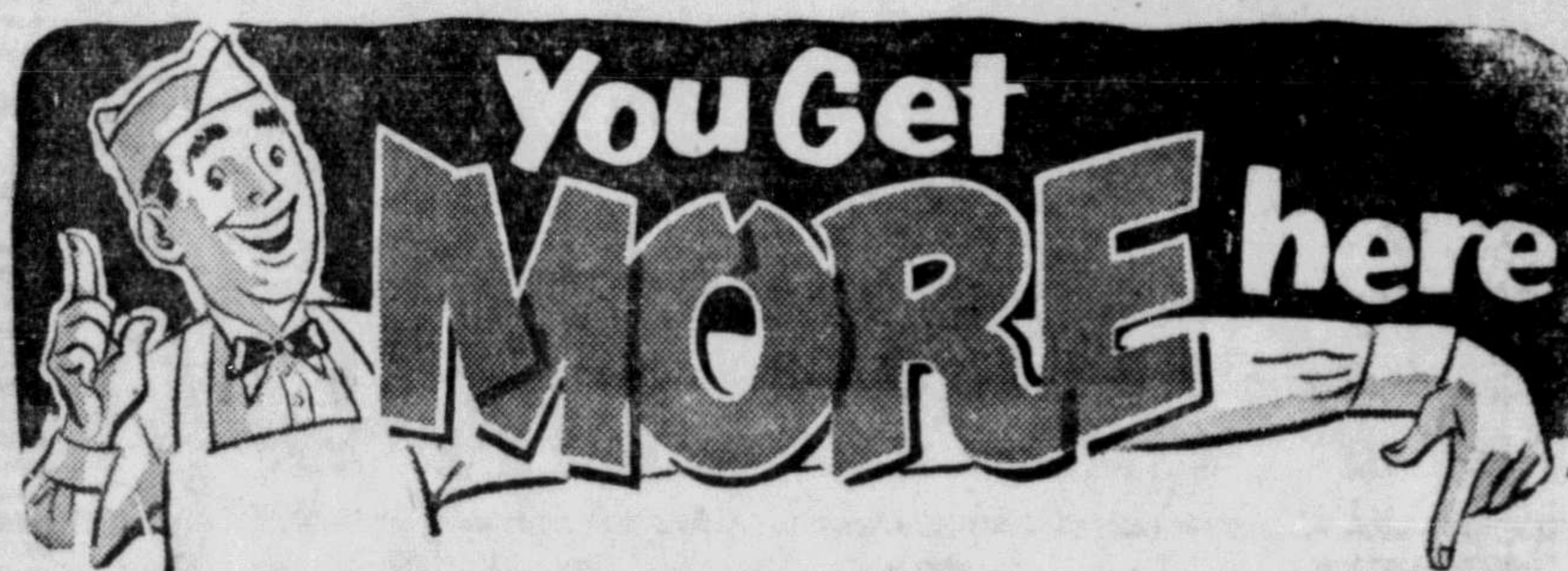
